During Executive Director Brenda Gilliam's report on the budget, she said numbers were on track as the fiscal year was wrapping up.

"I'm feeling pretty good about where we are," Gilliam said. "The final average daily membership count is up slightly from the projection, which means we might get more money because of it." The General Assembly had not passed a budget as of the meeting, so no final decisions could be made about next year's budget.

Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union) said she was happy that more money was "going toward education" in the next budget.

Board member Andrew Pullen (Columbia) said the number one email

complaint he receives is about bullying. He encouraged the school to develop a program that speaks to that problem.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler said each school handles the topic in its own way. All have programs during bullying prevention month. Others, such as the middle school, developed their own programs. Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) suggested each school report to the Board about the programs in place.

Johnson proposed the Board have a day-long seminar prior to school beginning Aug. 9, during which the Board would review the budget line-by-line, set strategic priorities and goals, and conduct an overview of testing.

"I'd like to go in with the idea of we are going to reduce testing, not just have you tell us why you're testing," Johnson said.

Both Pullen and Brenda Pace (Palmyra) said they wanted to find out more about MAP testing. Stewart said she wanted to find out what testing looks like, including how many hours students and teachers spend on tests.

His teacher also called. She said the staff went above and beyond to make sure her son's needs were met.

Becoming a Fluco

I moved to Fluvanna 10 years ago, but it just recently felt like home.

And while I first attributed that only to the kindness of strangers, I realize it was 10 years in the making.

I'll explain.

Beginnings

I spent the first 40-plus years of my life in one city: Akron, Ohio. I was born and raised there.

I met my first friend, Colleen, when I was 5. Her father had just died and her mother worked as a waitress at the Firestone Country Club. It was unusual in those days to have a mother who worked outside the home.

With the trauma of her father's death and starting school, Colleen was nervous. My mother told me to wait for her outside our kindergarten class and walk home with her.

I was not happy.

I don't know what social game I had going on at 5, but somehow I saw Colleen as putting a crimp in it.

But that friendship blossomed and thank the Lord we are still best friends though we live hours apart.

I had my first date in Akron - and my first job, my first apartment, my first heartbreak. It's where I learned to ride a bike and to climb a tree and to dream.

Akron was where I met my first husband and where we raised our three children.

I worked as a medical secretary in Akron hospitals. As our children grew, another woman I knew from the Parent Teacher Association asked me to partner with her in starting a box-lunch delivery business. We ran it successfully for seven years, delivering mainly to public school teachers.

Everywhere I went in that fairly big city it seemed I ran into someone I knew.

When my oldest graduated from high school, I decided to go back to Kent State University to finish my journalism

I wrote for newspapers in Youngstown, Warren and Cleveland.

Then I was laid off.

After months of looking, the only job offer I got was from the Northwest Indiana Times, just outside of Chicago.

I moved to Crown Point, Ind., thinking it would just be a place where I got more reporting experience before coming back to Akron to work at my hometown newspaper, the Beacon Journal.

But life has a way of altering my best laid plans.

I lived there for almost five years and during that time got divorced.

My children were all adults at this point. In fact, my daughter had just given birth to my first grandson. But they did not take it well. I guess no matter how old you are when it happens, it's hard when your parents divorce.

For some reason, Crown Point did feel

I had a job I loved and I became good friends with another single woman who worked at the newspaper. It was a small town of about 15,000 and I lived on the lovely, historic center square. I became a fixture at the library, antique shops and restaurants near my apartment.

During this time I became reacquainted with Jeff, a good friend from my child-

He lived in Fluvanna and he, too, was recently divorced.

Eventually we talked about marriage and I looked for a job in Virginia. He had two elementary school-aged children whom he was determined to live near as he had joint custody.

I was thrilled when the new director at Region Ten CSB in Charlottesville decided to hire me in a job he created handling communications for the agency.

Going South

I found an affordable apartment in Scottsville and moved just before Thanksgiving 2007.

While Jeff wasn't from Virginia, he'd lived here for about 15 years. He had friends here. Those friends were welcoming to me. But they were his friends.

In July 2008 we married and I moved into the house he bought in Fluvanna.

The future looked bright - for about a month.

In August, my father died.

In October, Region Ten cut my position because of the recession.

In December, my mother died.

None of the things I tried to do to become a member of my new community bore much fruit.

I couldn't find a church that fit.

I came to realize that after being raised Catholic and going to Catholic school for 12 years, then becoming a born-again Christian and fully immersing myself in church during my 30-year first marriage, I may have entered the post-church phase of my life.

That added to my feeling unmoored.

I wanted and needed a job.

I searched and searched.

During those first few years no one was hiring.

Well, they weren't hiring me - a newcomer northerner of a certain age.

As someone once explained to me, Charlottesville was full of people with PhDs waiting tables and working in nurseries (the horticulture kind).

I told everyone I was looking for work. Jeff's co-worker told me she saw the Fluvanna Review was looking for reporters and maybe I should apply.

I spent 10 years writing for daily newspapers with circulations much bigger than the Daily Progress and now I'm supposed to write for a local weekly?

Oh how the mighty have fallen.

(I never said I didn't have a bad atti-

So I swallowed my pride and applied. I figured it would get me out of the house and out of my head.

And I'd have the added benefit of learning about my adopted community.

I was even happier when I met the publisher, Carlos Santos. He made a career writing for the Richmond Times Dispatch.

We got each other.

So in 2010 I started covering the Board of Supervisors. Since then I've written about crime, schools, politics and anything else my editor assigns me. I've interviewed incredibly interesting people.

And I enjoy it.

I continued looking for full-time work with benefits.

Then, any other kind of work with steady hours.

And I found plenty of jobs. I was even hired by plenty.

I just couldn't keep them.

I worked as a cashier, a test proctor, and a child-care provider in an afterschool program.

I worked with domestic violence survivors, parents who'd lost custody of their children because of abuse or neglect, and for a school for children and adults with autism.

I voluntarily left a couple of those jobs to move on to a better one.

But I got fired from most of them.

All of this led to much soul-searching. What was wrong with me?



Building rain gardens to save habitats

The Lake Monticello Wildlife Committee sponsored a program on rain gardens on May 6 with the goal to save wildlife habitats and prevent erosion.

The speaker, Mary Eiserman, a biologist with the Thomas Jefferson Soil and Water Conservation District (TJSWCD), discussed ideas for rain gardens with those concerned with erosion and water runoff on their properties.

She explained that the TJSWCD has been around since 1935, and nowadays is concerned about storm water.

"We want to... improve water quality," said Eiserman.

A rain garden is a natural solution compared to the retention ponds and pipes that have been used in the past. A depressed area with slopes, planted with native vegetation, collecting rainwater from hills, roads and roofs is the newest way of looking at a bioretention instead of ponds.

"A rain garden will reduce pollution in our lakes, rivers and streams and help recharge groundwater. It will keep rainwater on your property where it belongs, beautifying your landscape and creating native habitats for birds and butterflies and pollinators," she said.

She discussed the best locations for a rain garden, which include areas with good infiltration, a minimum of 10 feet from a building and 50 feet from a septic field and with a maximum slope of 15

"Make sure it is sized to handle a run off from a one-inch storm." She then talked about the calculations needed to determine this with formulas for both impervious and pervious surfaces. Eiserman gave a complex explanation of the coefficients needed to make the calculations which she and others at TJSWCD would use to help anyone interested in creating a rain garden.

"Limiting clay is very important," she added. She showed a diagram of how the garden is built from the ground up and then maintained with yearly mulching,

weeding, and raking. Key for the wildlife committee were the habitats that could be created for birds and butterflies and other pollinating insects, including berries for birds, flowers for pollinators and milkweed for butterflies.

She suggested using native plants and vegetation that are also deer resistant. Grasses and ferns are good choices, as well as Lobelia, Wild Ginger, False Indigo and Joe Pye weed - named after and Indian healer who used it for fevers.

Eiserman ended by talking about the ways in which the TJSWCD can help property owners with creating their own rain garden and in some cases defraying costs. Property owners can find out more about the Virginia Conservation Assistance Program.

"The average cost of a small to medium rain garden ranges from \$800 to \$3,500," said Eiserman. One audience member asked if filling in a slope with gravel or other rock would be a good idea. Eiserman suggested building a berm with grasses. If it is a concentrated flow, then large rock could be used but gravel would wash away. Others asked what to do with the multitudes of leaves at Lake Monticello.

"Leave them where they are, they are a natural ground cover," she said.


Jack Day, co-chair of the LM Wildlife Committee, stated he always heard oak leaves were good for the soil. Eiserman agreed and another audience member said she mulches her leaves and puts them around as ground cover. Others who lived on the Lake had concerns about the leaves getting into the lake. Eiserman said it creates sediment buildup

Fluvanna Review founder

Gardner receives honorary doctorate

Len Gardner, former Fluvanna County supervisor and founder of the Fluvanna Review, received an honorary Doctor of Public Service degree from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, on May

Gardner, 96, is one of the few remaining survivors of the Dec. 7, 1941, attack on Pearl Harbor. After leaving the Navy in 1946, he earned a bachelor's degree in history from Massachusetts State College and a master's degree in history from Stanford. He and his wife, Doris Gardner, live in Lake Monticello.

An excerpt from the commencement booklet reads:

At 20 years old, Leonard Foster Gardner fought in one of the most significant events in American history, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. A signalman striker - a signalman in training - on board the destroyer USS Reid, Gardner did not stop to consider the magnitude of the events as they unfolded above and around him that Sunday morning. "In a voice at maximum volume, punctuated with jabbing gestures toward the smoke and diving aircraft, Elmer Barkhurst, the supervisor on deck, introduced me to World War II and ordered me below to wake up the crew," Gardner said.

Assigned to carry belts of 50-caliber ammunition from the hold to the deck, as many of the crew were ashore, Gardner staggered under their weight as nearby battleships began going up in flames and oil spread in the harbor. Gardner, the Reid, and her crew made it out of the harbor that day and went on to support the war effort in the Pacific.

The Reid then spent several weeks convoying supplies before being dispatched to the Aleutian Islands. It survived the battle of Midway and went on to support the landings at Guadalcanal and New Guinea. There it underwent four months of continuous action, being strafed, divebombed, high-level bombed, and torpedoed with hair-raising misses. In 1944, Gardner transferred to new construction and returned to the Pacific for the battles for the Philippines and Okinawa.

Gardner saw out the war on the staff of a flotilla of 36 landing-craft gunships, first as a flag signalman and quartermaster and later as chief signalman. During the invasion of Okinawa, his ship, LCI-657, underwent daily kamikaze attacks. It returned to Pearl Harbor and was preparing for the invasion of the Japanese homeland when the war ended.





The lead-off batter for the Charlottesville Black Knights managed a soft single up the middle. That was the only hit given up by Fluco starter Shaun Holyfield in Thursday's (May 10) home baseball

Holyfield struck out eight in six innings, while walking five and hitting one batter. The Black Knights did not get a ball out of the infield after their first hit.


The Fluco baseball team is now 10-5, and Gray said the team is in serious contention for an automatic play-off slot.



Burn building gathers steam

Launches buy-a-brick campaign

What's worse than a house catching fire?

A house catching fire on the day that the firefighters are out of town.

Right now, Fluvanna's volunteer firefighters have to drive themselves and all their equipment out to so-called "burn buildings" in Albemarle or Buckingham when they want to train.

Burn building experience is invaluable for firefighters of all skill levels. But Mike Brent, Fluvanna fire chief, worries about the potential cost.

"It's always been a concern of mine that when we have these burns, we have seasoned firefighters as instructors, and volunteers with them," he said. "We're taking manpower and equipment out of the county. The closer one is an hour away for them to be able to get back if something happens."

To solve this problem, Fluvanna's Fire and Rescue Association (FRA) is working hard to create a burn building right here

"This way, if something happens they can break loose and get there," Brent said

There's another benefit to having a Fluvanna burn building: Fluvanna firefighters get to use it.

Although other counties share their facilities, Fluvanna firefighters receive lower priority - and if another county's firefighters end up needing their building on a day Fluvanna has scheduled, Fluvanna gets bumped.

So the FRA has set its sights on constructing a burn building on the county-owned land behind the Fluvanna Community Center and Fork Union fire station. If all goes well, Fluvanna volunteers will gain real-life firefighting experience in a safe, contained and local environment

Burn building features

Although the FRA is spearheading the effort, the county will own the building. Construction will start in August and needs to be finished within a year.

The metal-clad building will have concrete floors, said Ben Powell, project manager. Half of the roof will be an A-frame and the other half will be flat, so

that firefighters can practice with both kinds of rooftops.

The building will have two burn rooms: one on the first floor and one on the second floor, and will be equipped with a propane gas furnace. The FRA may even purchase a fog machine that spews nontoxic smoke to obscure vision, Powell

The burn building experience "allows firefighters to see flames in those rooms and go in and combat those flames," Powell said. That involves "breathing apparatus, full turn-out gear, learning to pull hoses, flowing water, learning how to fight the stream to fight the fire, ventilation, and how to vent a building." They'll even be able to practice removing victims via rope repelling.

Best of all, it's safe. "You can hit a switch, turn the gas off, and the fire goes out instantly," said Wayne Stephens, director of public works.

The so-called "clean flames" don't tear up the building as badly and are more easily controlled. "You really can't control the heat as well" with a real fire, said Richie Constantino, Lake Monticello fire chief. "With the propane gas we can adjust the temperature with the flames that we want. If we have probationary or young firefighters with relatively little experience, we can control the flames and smoke they'll be exposed to. For a veteran firefighter we can add more heat and smoke."

"And if the firefighter goes down for some reason, you can shut it off," said Brent. "Within a few seconds, everything's cooled down."

Cost

Burn buildings aren't cheap. But the good news is that the county qualified for a nearly half-million dollar grant from the Virginia Department of Fire Programs.

The \$480,000 grant covers a significant chunk of the cost: \$450,000 is earmarked for construction and \$30,000 goes toward engineering services. But that money doesn't cover anything outside of the building's footprint, so the county will need to cover the site preparation costs

Although there is no current estimate

as to what the final total will be, Stephens said that Farmville constructed a burn building two years ago for a little under \$700,000.

"The county is supportive of doing this," said Cyndi Toler, purchasing officer. Supervisors "have indicated that they are going to give us some money, but have not given an exact dollar amount. Until we come back with an estimated construction cost they're not putting anything in stone."

How to help

Fluvanna residents have an opportunity to get involved and give back to the volunteers who put their lives on the line by helping make their training facility into a reality.

The FRA has launched a buy-a-brick campaign to raise money for the burn building. For \$100, \$250, or \$500, people can purchase bricks with art, writing, or a combination of both. The bricks can contain messages, dedications, tributes, business logos and more, and will be used in the burn building or on the premises, depending on how many bricks are sold.

Companies that donate may receive a brick for free, said Debbie Smith, emergency management coordinator. "If a company donates gravel, materials, or labor, the county would buy a brick for them," she said.

"The more money that is raised, the more features and amenities we can afford to include in the project," said Stephens. "We're trying to lay out [the facility] so that maybe later we can have an entire campus." Such a campus could include, for example, space for training rescue workers in vehicle extractions or training firefighters in extinguishing car blazes.







