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

That's what'll be cooking Saturday evening, June 16, on Short Street when the Orange Downtown Alliance presents its 9th Annual Trashy Ribs and Brews Festival.

"It's basically a party for the community that the ODA puts on," said Jeff Curtis, the ODA's executive director. "And everybody loves good dance music.

"We started out doing this as a Blues and Brews Festival, but it was a challenge for us finding good blues bands. They're just not around.

"So we decided to turn it toward more dance-able songs, upbeat, Motown, funk music that people will get up and dance to," Curtis said, "And, it's worked out very well for us."

# Thre Recycling Event set for June 16

hen an old tire ends up in the woods, along the side of a road, or in a stream or river, it can be there for close to a hundred years.

Unless, that is, someone picks it up and takes it somewhere to be recycled into something better than simply an eyesore and environmental hazard.

And yet, hundreds, perhaps thousands of old tires are simply cast aside each year in Orange County.

The Orange County Landfill, StreamSweepers, and the Orange County Litter Control Committee will host a free tire recycling event on Saturday, June 16, (rain or shine) to help alleviate the growing problem of tire accumulation and improper disposal.

The event will run from 8 a.m. to noon at the Orange County Landfill, located at 11350 Porter Road in Orange. This event is an opportunity for Orange County

citizens to responsibly discard unwanted tires without paying the usual fee of \$2.50 per tire.

Accepted items include standard car and truck sized tires. The largest size accepted will be R22.5 tires (standard tractor trailer size). A maximum of 12 tires per drop-off vehicle will be accepted.

No commercial or business drop-offs will be accepted. This event is open to Orange County residents and/or property owners only. Proof of residency or land ownership may be required upon request, and participants should be prepared to provide such proof.

The event will be first come, first served, and will end when trailers are full or the scheduled end time of noon arrives. Staff and volunteers will be onsite to assist with the unloading and loading of tires.

This event is made possible with the support of StreamSweepers and many

These local businesses, the Orange County Landfill, StreamSweepers, and the Orange County Litter Control Committee are dedicated to enhancing the environment in Orange County and hope that residents will stop by to dispose of unwanted tires properly.

StreamSweepers, a non-profit organization that hires and trains young adults to remove refuse from rivers in the region, has received the support of Orange County and the Orange County Landfill, since its inception in 2013. In 2015, Debbie Manzari of StreamSweepers suggested a "tire amnesty day" to the Board of Supervisors, because a great deal of trash that is removed from our rivers is tires.

Since that time the Orange County Litter Control Committee had been considering a similar event. This year StreamSweepers, the Orange County Litter Control Committee, and the Orange County Landfill are partnering together to host the first ever Tire Recycling Amnesty Day. StreamSweepers raised funds through the support of local businesses to cover the costs of removal and disposal.

"This is a community issue and it's great to see the support of local business", said Manzari. "StreamSweepers summer crew will be on hand, June 16, to unload tires from vehicles and load up the recycling trailer. There will be some giveaways and we're just going to try to make it a fun event!"

Brockman is the previous owner of the Charlottesville Music Company and a very accomplished musician in his own right.

In 1988, Billy Brockman started "Billy & the Backbeats" as a side project to other musical ventures. The "Backbeats" involved a rotating cast of great musicians over the years. The newest line up is Brockman, guitar and vocals; Burnette, bass and vocals; and Sappington, drums. The new "Billy & the Backbeats" play an energetic mix of Rock & Roll, R&B, Soul and even Classic Country at a comfortable volume.

If you were at the Uncorked at Orange wine festival in May at Montpelier, you probably heard them there.

They'll open the show at 5 p.m.

Next up will be the Apple Butter Soul band out of Lynchburg. "They were actually recommended to me by my pastor," Curtis said. "They were here last year, and

they really put on a good show for us, and we were really lucky to have them come back for us this year."

Founded in 2010, Apple Butter Soul combines the talents of Kendall Kress, Josh Brinkman, Fred Jackson, Ty Scott, and Charles "C.T." Bailey to offer up Funk, Jazz, Soul, Reggae, Latin, Samba, Oldies but Goodies, and R&B.

"They're getting huge; I've been hearing them advertised around Charlottesville and Richmond all of a sudden. They really filled the street last year with people dancing."

Curtis said he and Sappington had been trying to embrace the whole community in the festival. "Last year was the first time we had a good diverse group out in the street, and a lot of credit for that goes to the Apple Butter Soul band. There were folks out there we hadn't seen in the past, and it was very rewarding to see the entire community come out."

There will be local craft beers for sale from Beer Hound Brewery and Old Trade Brewery, both out of Culpeper. There will be about eight different beers from which people can choose.

There will be three food vendors, all of whom will offer their signature rib plates, although they will also offer other items to satisfy a variety of tastes, like hamburgers, hotdogs and various sides.

The ribbers include Michele Sigler from the Inn at Willow Grove, who has cooked at every festival for the past nine years; Mountainview Barbecue on Route 15 in Orange, and Shawn's Smokehouse from Culpeper. Kona Ice will be there with ice drinks for the kids and their families.

"It would be hard to choose among these three who makes the best ribs," Curtis laughed.

The entire length of Short Street in front of the train station will be closed off. There will be a tent and a stage set up in front of the station for the band and the food vendors. There'll be tables and lights so people can comfortably eat, leaving enough space, of course, for dancing.

Curtis said he brought the idea of a food and music-based festival from his time with a Chamber of Commerce in Texas. There, the culinary hook was almost always chili. "I didn't want to do chili -- everybody does chili -- but who doesn't like ribs, good smoked ribs?" he asked.

"So, I talked to my board. We couldn't do this without the support that the Town of Orange provides us; they block off the street; we have police presence — there has never been an incident," Curtis said.

While it's difficult to judge a crowd when there isn't a fee for attending, Curtis said he thinks last year's festival drew between 600 and 700 people through the evening.

"I'd like to thank the Town of Orange, John Jenkins at Orange County Roasters, Miller Law Firm, Edward Jones, Orange Tire, Mayor Chuck Mason, Somerset Seed and Sod, Rick Aldridge of Wealth Preservers, Piedmont Power, Teel Goodwin, and Round Hill Inn," Curtis said. "Without these people this festival would not be possible.

So, bring an appetite and your dancing shoes, but as much as we love our canine friends it'd be best to leave them at home. The festival runs from 5 to 10 p.m. It is free admission, family-friendly and the ODA's way of thanking the community for all it does to make Orange a better place to live, work and visit.



#### At the Arts Center

The art of Rose Mary Walls is on exhibit in the Morin Gallery at the Arts Center in Orange through July 28. Rose Mary was born in 1934 and grew up on a cattle ranch in Arizona, according to the art center. She attended boarding school and dreamed of being an artist, but, at her mother's urging, she became a teacher. Her marriage to Rex Walls was documented in her daughter Jeanette's book, "The Glass Castle" which later was made into a movie starring Woody Harrelson and Naomi Watts. When the roaming family ran out of money, they were forced to live at Rex's family home in West Virginia, and Jeanette recorded the abuse they suffered in her book. Jeanette broke free and began a successful life in New York City; Rex and Rose Mary followed her there and lived in abandoned properties until Rex died in 1994. Rose Mary now lives in a lovely white shingled cottage on daughter Jeanette's Orange County farm, attends the Orange Senior Center on Mondays, and paints. Rose Mary Walls' paintings witness time and place and tell a story.

### Classes for adults and children are being offered at the Arts Center in Orange, including amazing summer sessions:

**Fundamentals of Wheel-Thrown Pottery** with Janet Adams will be held from 1 to 3 p.m. each Monday through July 16 (session two will continue, July 23-Sept. 3). In this beginning- to intermediate-level class for adults, Janet will share the joy of working with clay. Each session will begin with a demonstration, followed by a hands-on opportunity for students to try what was just shown. One-on-one coach-



Learn what makes making pottery fascinating and satisfying. Jim will teach adults the basics of throwing on the wheel and/or hand-building (or help you brush up on old skills) and then will work with students to finish and glaze their projects. You'll work at your own pace with lots of hands-on instruction. This class is ongoing.


**Wednesday Night Clay Club** with Aimee Hunt will be held from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. Wednesdays through July 25 (Session two will continue Aug. 1-Sept. 5). Aimee offers personal attention to each student learning to throw on the wheel and hand build. Demonstrations and discussion of form and concepts support students of all ages exploring their own clay project goals. This is an informal class and lots of fun. It is ongoing, restarting every six weeks.

**Hand-Forged Ring Workshop** with Trish Schornagel will be held from 10 a.m. to noon Saturday, July 14 (for ages 14 and older). Learn to make three different beautiful and unique rings using copper sheet, sterling silver wire, and copper wire. Students will cut, file, anneal, and texturize metal using tools and a torch. Schornagel also will teach Introduction to Enameling with a Torch for ages 14 and older on the same day from 1 to 3 p.m. Participants will texturize an ordinary copper washer and then embellish it with beautiful fine silver tendrils then enamel with a torch. An ordinary copper washer will become a beautiful piece of jewelry!



# Orange County's Dutch Connection

igns welcoming visitors to Orange County have always noted the probability that the county was named in honor of Prince William of Orange of the Netherlands.

And, that's all it ever was — a probability — until an undaunted Orange County historian named Frank Walker and staff of the Netherlands embassy in Washington found irrefutable proof of the link in the form of a letter misfiled centuries ago in the Library of Congress.

What they found was a sheepskin copy of a handwritten letter from Lt. Gov. William Gooch in 1734 attesting to the fact that Orange County in the Virginia Colony of Great Britain was named for William of Orange on the occasion of his marriage to Princess Anne of England.

The wedding was held on March 25 of that year at St. James Palace in England. Two-hundred and eighty-four years later, Netherlands Ambassador Henne Schuwer stood in a massive Orange County business founded by a Dutch immigrant and confirmed "with certainty that Orange County is named after our Dutch prince. I'm very happy to reconnect historical ties with this beautiful region in Virginia."

It was an occasion to not only fill in a blank in the county's past, but to celebrate and build upon the strong ties that exist today between the Netherlands and the United States.

Although the visit by the ambassador was ostensibly a chance to present a copy of Gooch's letter to Orange County officials, it also was an opportunity "to discuss not only our heritage that bound us together in history, but also binds us together in the future," Schuwer said, "and look what we can do together in the economic field and various other fields."

During the course of two days, Schuwer met with local business and government representatives to discuss areas of common economic interest. The first was a round-table discussion held at James Madison's Montpelier.

Jerry van Hoven, who hosted the welcoming ceremony at Battlefield Farms, came to the United States in 1971 and found his niche in the agricultural market. His business savvy and Dutch work ethic propelled him forward in the US agricultural economy. He founded Battlefield Farms Inc. in 1990 with only six acres of hooped greenhouse. Under his leadership, the massive operation now covers 48 acres under roof and another 23 acres of outside cultivation.

One of his sons, Ed van Hoven established his own Orange County greenhouse business, American Color, in 1998.

In both cases, van Hoven progeny are set to take those two huge businesses well into the 21st Century.

Following the brief ceremony and remarks by the ambassador, Schuwer was guided on a tour of Battlefield Farms' greenhouse operation by Jerry van Hoven,

### who pointed out to those present that while only about the size of the State of Maryland, The Netherlands is the second largest exporter of vegetables in the world after the United States.

Pointing to the flowers surrounding the dais, Schuwer said, "If you look around here, this is us. We are the biggest flower exporter in the world.

"For me, seeing tulips -- this is the time for tulips in the Netherlands -- so I am back at home."

Schuwer has been the Dutch ambassador to the U.S. since September 2015.

He described the strong historical ties between the two countries and the influence of Dutch immigrants on the United States. "There have always been adventurous Dutch people who went abroad and took with them the values they learned and were educated in the Netherlands and found that with those values they could set up a business in the United States.

"I am proud to say that many, many of those businesses were very, very successful."

"We do well in the United States because what we bring with us from our upbringing in the Netherlands is a perfect fit for operating here."

It is the entrepreneurial spirit ingrained in the Dutch that has fostered the several major multinational corporations operating in America with Dutch roots, he said, mentioning Shell, Unilever and Philips as examples.

"We are a trading people. We are probably the fourth or fifth biggest investor in the United States. Thanks to Dutch-owned companies, 740,000 people in the United States have a job," Schuwer said.

"As important is that the United States is the biggest investor in my country," he noted. "Actually, The Netherlands is the favorite destination of all investment from the United States abroad. There is no country in which the U.S. invests more abroad. More than 1800 American companies are incorporated in The Netherlands."

Schuwer said he travels extensively throughout the U.S. as part of his service. "We have a network of roughly 250 people in the United States. We have consulates and business support offices in New York, Chicago, San Francisco and Miami, in addition to business support offices in Boston and Atlanta."

Schuwer's itinerary in Orange County included a meeting with Orange County High School students and a visit to Netherlands Market in Lake of the Woods.

Among those giving remarks during the welcoming ceremonies were James Crozier, vice chairman of the Orange County Board of Supervisors, Gordonsville Mayor Bob Coiner and Orange Mayor Chuck Mason Jr.

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
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
