

Officers honored for professionalism in 2017 standoff

On the night of April 29, 2017, the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office responded to calls of an armed man firing into a neighboring home in a small cul-de-sac near Scottsville.

Seven long hours later, Fluvanna deputies and the Virginia State Police were able to place Joe Kain Roach, Jr. under arrest without further injury.

It was an extraordinary night for the department, and on June 12, the community met to honor the professionalism and bravery of the men and women who helped bring the volatile standoff to a peaceful end.

More than 40 people, including Virginia State Senator Mark Peake, Commonwealth's Attorney Jeff Haislip, and Deputy Secretary of Public Safety (and former Fluvanna County Sheriff) Ryant Washington, assembled at Calvary Chapel to watch deputies and staff

receive their awards.

Supervisor Jo Schull and dispatchers Logan Fielding and Kimberly Constantino received plaques for excellence in communication.

Sgt. Stephen Proffitt, Sgt. Curtis Brandon, Deputy Tyler Thornton, Deputy Paul Sheridan, and Scottsville Police Officer John Layman each received a Medal of Valor.

The event was organized by Lt. Sean Peterson, who served as team leader that night. Peterson, along with Proffitt, found himself in Roach's gunsight as they approached the suspect's home that night.

In his remarks, Peterson vividly recalled Roach yelling: "If you come any closer, I will kill you."

In that moment, Peterson said, they were faced with the choice "to take a life or not," but ultimately made "the correct choice not to shoot," choosing instead to give Roach the chance to, eventually, surrender

On a night when his team had to place their personal safety on the line and faced a high probability of things going wrong, the officers functioned seamlessly as a team to bring the event to a close.

In an email, Peterson said he had seen "the uncommon valor and bravery in our deputies and officers that night. To honor them for going above and beyond was not a thought to me, but a must."

He began formulating plans for the event shortly after it happened, but was deployed to Afghanistan and had to put it aside until he returned in January. "Sheriff Hess, Capt. [David] Wells and Capt. [Von] Hill supported it 100 percent, so I put it all in motion."

FCSO Chaplin Frank Signoretti assisted with the planning and Calvary Chapel and the Dogwood Restaurant donated the venue and funding, while the local VFW supplied an honor guard.

A 22-year veteran of the military, Peterson said he had helped plan over 200 ceremonies and had a clear vision of what he wanted the event to look like. "I like a good presentation and felt these law enforcement officers and dispatchers deserved the best!"

In his remarks, his pride in his team

"Teamwork is a constant," he said. "Teamwork is what allowed us to work together so successfully that night."

Aqua announces **Lake Monticello** system upgrade

Aqua Virginia announced June 8 it plans to spend about \$1.6 million in 2018 for repairs and upgrades to drinking water and wastewater systems and other operational resources to improve service in communities throughout its western region, which comprises parts of Botetourt, Carroll, Cumberland, Fluvanna, Franklin, Montgomery and Nelson counties. This improvement plan will enable Aqua to complete projects that are critical to delivering quality drinking water, providing reliable service and protecting public health and the environment.

A major rehabilitation project in the region will take place in the Lake Monticello community, where Aqua will spend about \$80,000 to repair pipes and manholes to keep storm water out of the wastewater treatment plant. Storm water unnecessarily increases the volume of water treated by the plant, which can increase overall treatment costs.

Aqua also plans to spend about \$400,000 to upgrade the existing biological treatment system at its Lake Monticello wastewater plant to reduce the amount of total nitrogen in the effluent

that's dispersed into the stringently regulated Chesapeake Bay watershed. This project will both improve the quality of the treated wastewater and reduce chemical and energy costs. Aqua also anticipates that improvements at the plant will reduce future commitments to purchase total nitrogen credits from the Virginia Nutrient Credit Exchange Asso-

"Aqua's top priority is to deliver safe, reliable drinking water and wastewater services to our customers," said Aqua Virginia President John Aulbach. "And, as stewards of the environment, we're also dedicated to returning clean water to streams and rivers. Infrastructure across the country is in critical need of upgrades and replacement, and Aqua is proud to address this challenge head-on throughout the communities we serve."

Aqua spent about \$2 million on water and wastewater system improvements in its western region in 2017.

Aqua provides water and wastewater service to about 80,000 people in 38 counties across Virginia.



3,000-year-old artifacts found in water pipeline path

After finding bones, pottery sherds, and fire-cracked quartz dating as far back as 1200 B.C., Circa-Cultural Resource Management (CCRM) recommends further study of the proposed pump station and water line near the confluence of the James and Rivanna

Point of Fork, the land between the two rivers, is long thought to be the "probable location of the historic village of Rassawek, the main settlement of the Monacans," the report states.

While many artifacts were recovered during the cultural resources survey, CCRM states it is unlikely they'll ever be able to prove for certain that Point of Fork is the site of Rassawek.

However, archeologists found enough artifacts to recommend phase III study of four of the seven sites excavated.

The 368-page report, dated May 2018, stated the four sites in which the pipeline and bore pits are scheduled to be constructed are also in areas eligible for National Registry designation.

Besides soil tests, the company used drones to take pictures of sightlines of the proposed pump station. It could barely be seen from 40-100 feet in the

The study was requested by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers upon the recommendation of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (DHR).

As reported earlier in the Fluvanna Review, the James River Water Authority (JRWA) project, a joint venture between Fluvanna and Louisa Counties, consists of a water intake facility on the Point of Fork near Columbia, and a raw water pipeline stretching a little over a mile to Route 6.

From that point, the Louisa County Water Authority will construct its own pipeline at its own expense to funnel water northwest through Fluvanna to Louisa County. Louisa has agreed to "make all reasonable efforts" to provide up to 400,000 gallons of treated water per day to Fluvanna's Zion Crossroads area by the end of 2018. The cultural excavation study will push back that date.

The JRWA project, which will cost Fluvanna between \$4 million and \$5 million, has received its permits from the Virginia Marine Resources Commission and the Department of Environmental Quality.

If the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers agrees with CCRM's report, a plan "will need to be developed that outlines the path forward for mitigating any adverse effects" and fulfilling requirements for dealing with historic properties, according to the report. The Corps will create the plan in consultation with DHR, JRWA, and "several state- and federallyrecognized Indian tribes."

They will also develop treatment plans, which will "outline any agreed-to mitigation, including phase III excavations, the research design, reporting requirements, and curation of artifacts," according to the report.

DHR was unable to answer questions as to how this process will affect the timeframe for the JRWA project, including when or if the final permit can be expected.

"We want to get it resolved as quickly as we can," said Randy Jones, public information officer. "But I don't know what the timeline is.'




Get to know Jennifer Valentine

New director of special education

Last month Fluvanna County School Superintendent Chuck Winkler chose Jennifer Valentine as the division's newest director of special education. Valentine has been a teacher and assistant principal in Fluvanna for 18 years. The Fluvanna Review asked Valentine about her new role, her expectations and the need to provide special education in our schools.

How has your experience prepared you to be director of special education?

Having been both a special education teacher and an assistant principal in Fluvanna County for the last 18 years, I have come to learn about and understand the needs of students, staff, families, and the community. I have also learned to never assume, but to continue to ask and seek input. Having a variety of experience in



special education in both school and non-school settings also have added to my preparation.

What skills or characteristics does a person need to be successful in your new position?

My new role will be an expanded version of my current role as assistant principal and many of the same leadership skills will apply. I will need to be organized and detail-oriented with a vision of the big picture. I will have to continue on my path as a lifelong learner. I will also have to continue to listen to the stakeholders involved to gather information to then make the best possible decisions for students based on the information gathered.

Define a "special needs/education" student.

Webster's dictionary definition of special needs is "any of various difficulties (such as a physical, emotional, behavioral, or learning disability or impairment) that causes an individual to require additional or specialized services

or accommodations (such as in education or recreation)."

How many Fluvanna students fit the special education criteria?

That number fluctuates due to the changing needs of the children; however, a current number would be approximately 575 students.

Is there a continuum of special education needs?

There is definitely a continuum. Each student comes to us with their own unique set of abilities and needs. At FCPS we have a continuum that includes providing interventions and supports for all of our students based on individual student needs

What would you like us to know about special needs students?

I would like our community, students and parents to be understanding and accepting of all people regardless of abilities or disabilities.

What are some common misconcep-

I don't believe I can speak to people's

misconceptions. Those are unique to individuals as well. Many misconceptions can be changed when people look at things from someone else's perspective.

Please describe why public schools must be prepared to teach every student who comes through the door

Our students are the reason that we exist. Each child deserves a free and appropriate public education.

What would you like to accomplish in your new position?

I would like to continue moving forward with our quest for success for all students. I would specifically like to focus on awareness of others and kindness to all.

What do you love about the special education community?

I love that it is a community of students, friends, parents, educators and community members, all striving for a common goal of increasing the quality of life for all children. From the students specifically, I love the joy they bring to each and every day.



Makos set individual records in swim meet

The Jefferson Swim League kicked off a summer of swimming Wednesday (June 13) with a meet between the Fluvanna Aquatic Sports Team (FAST) Makos and the Lake Monticello Swim Team (LMST) Sharks.

Many of the FAST swimmers were away this week, forcing the team to seat swimmers in just 40 of the 63 races. Despite their underdog status, FAST took home 12 first place finishes, seven second places, and eight third places.

Abby Caruso, 7, had two individual firsts: in the girls' age 8 and under 25-meter butterfly, with a time of 25.19 seconds, which was 2.5 seconds ahead of her closest competitor, and in the 25-meter backstroke with a 24.94 time. She also secured a third-place finish in her 25-meter breaststroke.

This is Abby's second summer of swimming with FAST. She has also completed two years as a year-round swimmer for Battlefield Area Star Swimmers (BASS). Her favorite stroke is the backstroke. One day, Abby hopes to beat her 13-year-old brother in the pool, and is looking forward to swimming across Lake Monticello this Fourth of July. Abby is a dedicated athlete and student both in and out of the water. She is a cheerleader, plays the piano and was recently chosen for an all-star softball team of girls aged 5 to 8.

"Abby is a coachable swimmer," said Head Coach Cosmo DiFazio. "She has a good intuition with her strokes, is very receptive to corrections and can quickly integrate corrections into her stroke."

James Johnson, 9, secured firsts in both of his individual races. He finished his boys' age 9-10 50-meter freestyle in 42.84 seconds and the 50-meter breast-stroke in 52.47.

James has been swimming with BASS for the last four winters and this summer is his third with FAST. His favorite stroke is freestyle and he says he became competitive the minute he won his first ribbon. In 2017 he was first in his age group in the Lake Monticello swim across the lake. He is looking forward to making the swim again this year. Outside of swimming, James is an avid reader and is looking forward to learning to play football and taking music lessons in the fall.

DiFazio praised James's competitive and fun nature, saying he's enjoyed having him as part of the team for the last four years. He said he's "really hoping to see James step up as the leader of the 9-10 age group."


Also securing wins for the team were Noah Klipp, 17, Emma DiFazio, 16, Joey Hagan, 14, Jackson Kinsella, 13, and Harrison Williams, 9.

DiFazio and Head Coach Nathan Johnson were pleased with the team's showing and particularly proud of the effort put in by brand new swimmers, Brett Blaha, 16, and Shelby Crawford, 12. Designer talks about love of art

Speaking with designer and artist Jane Skafte, one immediately sees the love and the passion she has for her art. Her devotion shows not only in how she speaks about her work, its meaning, and its process, but also in the joy it has given her throughout her life.

In her teens, Skafte knew that art would be her destiny. After studying fine art at the prestigious School of the Art Institute of Chicago, she became a textile designer. Eventually, she moved to New Jersey and worked in New York as a product designer for textiles in commercial and home furnishings, and later for Lenox China and Syracuse China creating patterns for dinnerware. Many of her early experiences in design are evident in her current abstract work, which is intricate, strong and colorful. Her interlaced geometric designs are reminiscent of many of the early 20th century artists, including Robert and Sonia Delauney.

But while Skafte worked in a commercial field, she never abandoned her fine art skills. "I was a museum rat and was never without my sketchbooks," she said

After her job as a senior designer for Syracuse China ended, she returned to school and got her Master's in Fine Arts at Syracuse University. Teaching also allowed her to keep up with her personal art projects. "It keeps me balanced," she said

After years of cold winters in Syracuse, with snow as high as three-story buildings, she and her artist husband, Peter Allen, moved south to Charlottesville. Like many who migrate to Virginia, she fell in love with the Charlottesville area. She taught at James Madison University, Piedmont Virginia Community College and Blue Ridge Community College, but prefers the casualness of private lessons that do not involve grading or curriculum. Sharing techniques and ideas is liberating for her.

Eventually, they moved to a farm in Kents Store and settled into rural life with the cows and horses. She and her husband do their art work on the farm, and Skafte also works as the editorial designer for the *Fluvanna Review*, and teaches privately. She admitted that for a city girl it was a new experience living in the rural countryside. Rural Fluvanna is the subject of her work currently showing at the McGuffey Art Center in Charlottesville.

She has a variety of subjects she likes to draw and paint. Her landscapes like *Fence* and *Shadow* are peaceful, featuring the gentle flow of the landscape, but *Sycamore Leaves* returns to her stunning abstract designs, showing the strength of her personal style. She shows this in her flower paintings, including the bold and graphic *Tulip* and the softer but still powerful *Pear Blossoms*.

Most of Skafte's work is done in wa-

tercolor, gouache, watercolor pencils and colored pencils. She prefers watercolor as her main medium but also favors colored pencils.

"While teaching I overheard one the professors tell a student that a real artist wouldn't use colored pencils," Skafte said. She thought the attitude was dismissive of a drawing medium that elitist educators considered commercial. It is her "environmental" paintings in colored pencil that feature her illustrative techniques combined with her abstract designs that seem to have an effect on the onlooker. Delicate but strong colored pencil

strokes are used to convey a definitive message about the work.

"They show emotional displacements. In other words, they are like a dysfunctional family: Everything looks good on the surface but is ready to erupt underneath," she said. "People who view them tell me they are pretty because of the soft colors I use, but on closer examination they realize that the birds are dead."

For her *Carbon Footprint*, the idea came in a variety of waves, not as one cohesive idea. The footprint generated the idea of the carbon footprint and the Sistine Chapel with the interaction of Michelangelo's God and man. These became symbolic in her surreal illustration of man's neglectful stewardship of the earth.

"I rely on mythological symbols derived from Hindu and Buddhist cosmology, and Judeo-Christian creation myths, and incorporate these into my drawings," Skafte said. She uses these symbols to help communicate her ideas about climate change.

"The ideas for these illustrations go back to when I was an undergraduate student. It occurred to me when I noticed the two-point perspective geological illustrations in an illustrative dictionary my daughter had," she explained. "I employed the technique of simultaneously seeing the top of the landscape and what is under ground."

One can see her use of this method of geological illustration in her drawings, which express the shape and depth of the subject. Looking at them up close can be deceiving, because at first glance they appear like soft

abstract designs, but from a distance the message is loud and clear. *Mudslide*, for example, features an elephant that appears to be part of the mountainous terrain buried beneath the deteriorating landscape.

Her work is compelling and has urgency and despair juxtaposed with hope. These drawings translate her concern for environmental shifts through the emotional meaning of earthly events. In looking at these illustrations, the viewer becomes aware of something more than just

another pretty landscape. Skafte hopes that her work makes the onlooker think about the consequences of choices society makes and its impact on the environment, motivating change.

Nowadays, Skafte is exploring illustration combined with expressive design and graphic media. She also continues to teach. Member-guest tournament comes off "without a hitch"

Thirty two-man teams teed off Saturday and Sunday (June 9-10) at the Lake Monticello Golf Course in the annual men's member-guest tournament. The teams are divided into five flights of six teams each. After two days of tense competition, the top team from each flight qualifies for a shoot-out to determine the overall champion. Luckily the weather cooperated, and as Mark Marshall's assistant Dan Henry noted, the competition came off "without a hitch."

This year, first time competitors Kyle and Donald Gravitt came out of the lowest handicap flight to capture the championship. Don, who is Kyle's father and his guest, quipped "first time, first win."

This tournament has a fairly complicated format that makes each of the 45 holes played equally important. In each flight of six teams, the teams all play evervone in the flight once in a nine-hole match. In each nine-hole match there is one point awarded to the team with the best gross score and one point for the best net score (i.e. after deducting handicaps) on each hole. The team that wins the nine-hole competition in each category is awarded a bonus point for 10 points per match. If a team wins 6-3 in the gross competition, the winning team gets a bonus point and the recorded score is 7-3. The same applies in the net score competition.

After all the rounds are completed (27 holes on Saturday and 18 holes on Sunday), all the scores are totaled and a winning team is declared for gross score and for net score in each flight. The winning team in the flight with the most overall points goes to the shoot-out to determine the overall champion.

The winning team for gross points in the first flight was the Gravitts with 30 points. The team of Bob Lamb and Bob Valiga won the net points award with 27 points. In the second flight, the team of Bud Nelson and Jim Bunn won the gross points award with 29 points. The top net score team with 31.5 points was Eric Johnson and Jerry Pemberton. In the third flight, the team of Jim and Robert Darlington won the gross competition, scoring 34 points. The net prize went to the team of Craig Lounsbury and Eric Piatrik.

In the fourth flight, the team of Bill

Hardin and Rick Johnson put up the tournament's highest winning score, recording 34.5 points out of a possible 50. The net prize in that flight went to the team of Richard Bowman and Jack Gabriel with a score of 27. In the fifth and highest handicap flight, the team of Larry Wolfe and Don Hoffman netted 29.5 points in the gross score competition, while the team of David Sipe and Jim Banger took the net prize with 28 points.

A couple of these teams won their competitions by tying and winning on a tie breaker. Others won by only a point or a half point. Accordingly, any putt on any hole that just missed, or improbably dropped in, could make a team a winner or a loser.

In the shoot-out for the championship, the players from each of the competing two-man teams first played to the 18th green from 100 yards out. If a player on any team bested all the other players the shoot-out would be over in one round. No one made a two, but the Gravitt team, the Hardin-Johnson team and the Wolfe- Hoffman team all had a player score a three. These teams then played to the 18th green from 150 yards out. The Gravitt team was the only one to make a three and they won the overall title.

Prizes were also awarded for closest to the pin on par three holes and for longest drives on specified holes. Players were fed well during the tournament. The entry fee covered continental breakfasts on Saturday and Sunday, a quality buffet dinner at the Ashlawn Grill on Saturday night, and a barbecue lunch on Sunday, while Marshall was doing the complicated tabulation of the scores.

Obituary Sandra Austin

Sandra "Sandy" Austin lived a life overflowing in appreciation of art, animals, cookies, beaches, cosmopolitans, friends, family, music and travel.

Coming out of her mother's womb on June 28, 1941, Sandra felt the Michigan cold air and knew that instant she would be moving south as soon as life would allow. A natural artist, she pursued an art degree at Wayne State University. But she met a dashing young man on a blind date, fell in love, and married her first husband, Paul Polonsky. They moved to his hometown of Washington, D.C., trading the Michigan winters for swampy D.C. summers.

Putting her art education on hold, she and Paul raised three daughters in the metropolitan suburbs of the nation's capital. Sandra unexpectedly became a widow left to start her life alone and anew at middle age.

A few years later, despondent but determined to get her sugar fix, Sandra went to the local grocery store to wander the cookie aisle in search of her favorite pecan sandies cookies. She found something even more sweet when she ran into her former neighbor, George Austin. Cupid aimed his bow and hit his mark with George falling instantly in love with the beautiful, funny, independent woman who used to live just a few blocks from him and knew the cookie aisle better than anyone else.

Sandy and George fell truly, madly, deeply in love - something neither expected to experience in their 50s.

On Sept. 19, 1995, they wed, with the blessing of Sandra's three children and George's four children. They joined their lives, promising to help fulfill each other's long-held dreams. She took art classes

at the Torpedo Factory in Alexandria, Va. They bought a home on Lake Monticello, making Sandy's dream of living on the water a reality. They built a woodworking shop in the basement where George fulfilled dream of cregifts ating from unique wood thev found along their travels across

country. In their custom, light-filled home, Sandra opened an art studio overlooking the lake.

Sandra began her journey with art tentatively with traditional still lifes using colored pencils. As her talent and confidence grew, she began creating intricate watercolor pencil drawings of carousel animals. Her paintings won awards and were purchased by admirers across the state.

With Andrea Bocelli, Sarah Brightman and the Moody Blues playing in the background, the animals in Sandra's drawings soon lost their restraints, breaking free of the poles and bridles of the carousel. Sandra, too, broke free and her lifelike pencil drawings of bobcats, foxes, hawks and other wild animals exuded a free spirit and intensity lauded by critics, awarded with placements in juried shows and enthusiastically bought by animal and art appreciators.

Never accepting the status quo or resting on her laurels, Sandra bravely put aside her beloved pencils and began venturing into abstract creations using natural elements such as rocks, twigs, bark, sand and paper.

Throughout her two decades of productive artistic creations, George not only inspired and encouraged Sandy, he intensified the beauty of her creations. George, a master woodworker, created custom wood frames for each of Sandra's pieces of art. He carefully designed and crafted the frames to delicately compliment the artwork they encased. Together, George and Sandra were a formidable and impressive artistic team: Their work has been featured in private homes, county libraries, professional offices, local airports and is being considered for placement in a first-responder museum.

George and Sandra led a life full of art and travel but cherished the time they had with their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Sandra, a onetime avid fisherman, proudly taught her grandchildren and great-grandchildren how to find worms, prepare a hook and catch fish.

Diagnosed in 2017 with stage IV breast cancer that had metastasized to the spine, Sandra put aside her art tools and tackled one of her greatest fears - travel by airplane - to accomplish a life-long goal of seeing the Sonoran Desert. She spent nearly three weeks captivated by

one more colored pencil drawing. With that, she put down her art tools for the

Her dreams fulfilled, her creative talents shared, and her soul yearning to be free of a failing body, Sandra let go on June 10, 2018, and started her next journey. She was surrounded by her three daughters and loving husband.

She is preceded in death by her mother, Ann Kraska, her father, Matthew Kraska, her first husband, Paul Polonsky, and her grandson, Michael Tayman. She is survived by her husband, George Austin, her five daughters: Sylvia Gaffney (Jeff),




the giant saguaros and prickly pears as well as the fearless javelinas and coyotes who prowled the grounds beginning at dusk. After downing a delicious cosmopolitan, Sandy would join the coyotes in their evening howls of the hunt. The coyotes weren't as amused as Sandy's family at the imitation.

Upon returning home in April, Sandra's cancer unexpectedly grew at an alarming rate. Within two weeks, she was admitted to hospice with less than six months to live. She fought unsteady hands and blurred vision and completed

Sharks swim strong at season opener

The Sharks of the Lake Monticello Swim Team (LMST) were back in action for the first home opening swim meet of the season.

On June 13 the Sharks participated in an unscored meet against the Fluvanna Aquatics Sports Team (FAST). The Sharks had a strong showing and did extremely

well during the meet. "We had a handful of gold times achieved already in the first meet. It was a great way to start the season!" said Head Coach Carly Csapo.

The meet kicked off with three 100meter freestyle relays, where the Sharks took first place in each race. Events three

through 10 followed, which were 100meter individual medleys (IMs) where swimmers swim four laps of the 25meter pool in four different strokes: butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke and freestyle. LMST took first place in six out of those eight events.

The team also competed in freestyle,

backstroke, breaststroke, and butterfly, swimming various 25-, 50- and 100meter races. Swimmers closed out the meet with eight 200-meter freestyle relays, in which each relay team has four members swim a 50-meter freestyle each. The LMST relay teams took first place in all eight events.

This was the first time for many of the swimmers to experience swimming in a competitive meet and the coaching staff praised their diligence, dedication, and sportsmanship throughout the night. "I can't wait to watch the swimmers continue to improve over the next six weeks," Csapo said.

In addition to the 147 swimmers LMST has registered on the team this season, it also takes approximately 60 parent volunteers to run a home swim meet. These parent volunteers did a great job helping the meet run smoothly and made it fun for all the swimmers on both teams.

The LMST Shark families and coaches are looking forward to an exciting season schedule, which included a meet against City of Charlottesville Swordfish on Wednesday (June 20). LMST swims away again at Farmington Country Club June 27, followed by a home meet July 2, an away meet at Key West Club July 11, and the Sharks close out the season July 18 with a home meet against Glenmore Country Club.
