Town Gets VHDA Grant

Scottsville Town Administrator Matt Lawless recently announced that the town has been awarded a \$23,000 grant from the Virginia Housing Development Authority (VHDA). The authority was created in 1972 to help obtain quality affordable housing for Virginia residents. According to Lawless, "the grant will be used for redevelopment planning at the old (tire) factory site."

VHDA supports healthy communities and mixed usemixed income projects and, according the Lawless, "over the next 4-6 months this grant will support some market research, local outreach and surveys, and project design concepts that connect well with our comprehensive plan process

and our UVA Architecture School partnerships." Planning Commission – Work continues on updating the town's Comprehensive Plan which should be concluded within the next few months.

The Planning Commission is also studying a proposal to expand what is known as the Historic Overlay District. The current district is primarily the town limits before annexation of land by the town in 1994. The Commission recognizes that there are structures outside the current boundaries that are of a historic nature. Another reason behind expanding the district is to ensure that the typography of the land not be altered in a manner that would be inconsistent with the nature of the town's historic typography. The Architectural Review Board has been assisting in this project and members of that body have been meeting with the Planning Commission on a regular basis.

Town Council – At the May 21st meeting of the Town Council a public hearing was held on the 2018-19 budget. No one spoke either for or against the budget as presented although there was some discussion by Council members on the matter. A vote on the budget is scheduled for the June 18th meeting

Thomas Morley is the town's "summer intern" working with Town Administrator Matt Lawless. Morely, a Syracuse University graduate is in his second year of graduate school at UVA working towards a master's degree in urban planning. The ARB announced that long-time head of that commit-

tee, Jeffrey Plank, will be resigning from that post on June

30th. Plank who has headed the ARB for over twenty-five years felt it was time to turn over the reins. The Council recognized his service.

Doug Hurr who recently completed work on the bateau at Canal Basin Square has been hired and given a budget to rebuild a replica of a freight boat for the outdoor museum's exhibit.

Mayor Nancy Gill reported that upgrades to the Rivanna Water and Sewer Authorities water treatment plant on James River Road has been completed and is in operation. This new system is "state of the art" she said, and "uses a process that ensures that our drinking water is top quality.'

At the helm for 26 years Tim Karr loves a parade

lmost everyone loves a parade. Visit Scottsville on July 4th and you will see that statement to be true. For over a hundred years, with few

exceptions (for some reason there was no parade in 1935) there has been a

Fourth of July Parade in Scottsville. The Scottsville Museum has evidence that there was a parade on the 4th in 1913. For the next eighty years organizations such as the Veterans of Foreign War (VFW) the Town of Scottsville, and the Chamber of Commerce either sponsored a parade

commerce either sponsored a parade individually or partnered with one another to see that a parade happened. The Scottsville Fire Department came into being in 1936. In 1942 the fire department became involved in the organizing of the parade. And, in 1993, the fire department became the sole organizer of the event

the sole organizer of the event. Scottsville's Tim Karr has live here since he was a toddler. He wears several different hats. Tim is a professional firefighter. He serves as a Battalion Chief with the Charlottesville City Fire Department. He is also committed to Scottsville. Tim is also a chief with the Scottsville Volunteer Fire Department. He is levee superintendent for the Town of Scottsville, a position that keep him busy every time the river rises, ensuring that the town does not flood. He owns and operates a landscaping company and is a member of Scottsville Baptist Church.

In his "free" time, as has been the case for the past 26-years, Karr has seen that the annual Fourth of July Parade

years, Karr has seen that the annual Fourth of July Parade takes place. This will be the 105th edition of that event! Tim relates that "during the 1980's the parade was some-times a part of Scottsville Day and followed a much different route. The parade used to go all over town, winding its way through neighborhoods until it reached Dorrier Park." The parade had been pretty much a VFW sponsored event for thirty years. The VFW asked the fire department if they would take over the organization. Karr was asked to take over leadership of the parade committee in 1992, following the groundwork laid by John Collins and Mike Johnson. Tim sees himself as a "figurehead" since, as he says, "lots of people are involved to make the parade a success." There a logistics to work out with VDOT. Valley Street has the dis-tinction of being the only state highway that has been given permission to shut down for a parade! There is advertising, trophies to buy and making sure the one hundred units in the

trophies to buy and making sure the one hundred units in the parade know what is expected of them. And then there is the fireworks show.

When Tim's dad Duane Karr was responsible for the fire-

When Tim's dad Duane Karr was responsible for the fire-works show the fireworks were actually on the south side of the river. Tim emphasizes that "the fireworks are communi-ty funded and this year \$9000 is budgeted for the show." Contributions are always welcome. With the dawn of July 5th the previous day's parade and fireworks will be vivid in our memories. Tim Karr should take the day off and rest. But, knowing Tim, he will already be working on the 2019 parade! Volunteers are what make things happen. If you see Tim or any of the many connected with the July 4th celebrations around town take a minute to tell them how much you appreciate what they do for our tell them how much you appreciate what they do for our community both professionally and as volunteers. They deserve our thanks, and they would not mind if you volunteered too!

Dent nodded and added, "But we have to find musicians who understand the thrust of what we're doing. Our singing wouldn't feel as authentic if we don't stick to what we believe in. We don't want to stray from the message." The Sunny Sides see themselves networking with others and performing more in the community. "We'd like to align with the local historic society do to program on
