Rainbow Fluco leak

Will we ever know who is responsible?

Find the leak.

That seemed to be the single concern connecting those for and against the Fluvanna County High School Alliance Club's request to rainbow-ize the Fluco logo.

Everyone wanted to know how blogger and radio host Rob Schilling got hold of the Alliance Club letter that Superintendent Chuck Winkler presented to the School Board in an Oct. 10 closed session.

Bearing Drift, which bills itself as "Virginia's conservative voice" ran a Schilling blog post Nov. 2 entitled "The culture wars come to Fluvanna."

In the article, Schilling posted a picture of a color copy of

the letter to the board. The name and email address of the student making the request were blurred, but not the name of a supporting teacher.

How did Schilling know about the Alliance Club request before it was even on the Nov. 7 School Board agenda?

Lots of people

Four people who were among the first to know of the club's formal request to the administration – Winkler and three School Board members, Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union), Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) and Andrew Pullen (Columbia) – have all said, "I hear a lot of people had that letter."

That is to say, you can't pin the leak on just the School Board or administration.



Promised energy savings fail to materialize

Schools may run out of utility money by March

The good news, as Nichols pointed out, that in the summer of 2019, Trane will begin auditing the system and will pay the difference between expected and actual savings.

Increased costs predicted

Finance Director Eric Dahl gave a brief overview of the draft Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) and some of the items that will need funding in FY20.

One major item is the expected rise in the county's health insurance rates. The final figures won't be in until the county meets with in-

Fluvanna County Public Schools Superintendent Chuck Winkler began his presentation to the Fluvanna Board of Supervisors on the fiscal year 2020 (FY20) budget with an apology.

Earlier this year, he had asked the board for \$150,000 to fix the roof at Carysbrook Elementary with a promise to replace the money with funds due from the state by the end of the year. But in the summer, he said, the state abruptly told schools across Virginia that they would not be receiving that money.

Between that surprise announcement and higher-than-expected utility expenditures, Winkler had \$275,000 less than he had projected.

While both County Administrator Steve Nichols and the supervisors assured him they understood what had happened and it was clearly not his fault, his failure to make good on his promise clearly weighed on Winkler's conscience. "My word is my bond," he said several times.

Looking ahead to FY20, Winkler said he and Brenda Gilliam, executive director for curriculum and finance, were assessing their need for more staff and instructional technology for the county's nearly 3,500 students.

They expect the high school to reach a record 1,500 enrollments in 2019. When the new facility opened, they had 1,250 students. The high school popula-

tion is increasing more quickly than the elementary and middle schools, in part because many local private schools only go to eighth grade.

Right now, Fluvanna spends \$10,500 per student, below the state average of \$12,000.


Each new teacher costs an average of \$65,000, with the state picking up about \$50,000 and the county funding the remaining \$15,000 in salary and benefits. Winkler is considering asking for six new staff positions, mainly for the high school.

Some other items that may be on his final budget proposal are \$80,000 for increased mental health support staff, \$70,000 for a dedicated homebound teacher, and money to increase the daily pay rate for substitute teachers and nurses.

One big item of concern for Winkler is the cost of heating, cooling, and lighting school buildings. "Folks, I got utility bills," he said.

Earlier this year, the schools were outfitted with new, more efficient Trane environmental control systems, with the promise of major savings in utility costs. So far, the savings have not materialized.

Winkler projected a savings of \$142,000. Actual savings have been only \$67,000. He's concerned he's going to run out of money budgeted for utilities in March, well before the end of FY19.

surers early in 2019, but Dahl said they might want to set aside \$300,000 to \$500,000 to cover a potential increase.

Several departments have put in requests for increased staffing and positions, including the sheriff's office, the library, social services, and public works.

Nichols is also looking at modest pay increases for people who serve on

Project support

Chip Boyles from the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) gave a presentation on some potential projects the commission could assist the county in carrying out.

Boyles said TJPDC could help the county win a community block grant for the Fork Union business district revitalization plan, which would help cover the cost of upgrading storefronts and signage

county boards. Most haven't seen a pay raise since 2014.

The budgeting process will go on well into the new year, with both the schools and county departments presenting more formal requests sometime in February.

Gerrymandering

Joe Shaver, a local coordinator with OneVirginia2021, gave a presentation on the organization's work to reform the state's redistricting laws.

Virginia, like many states, put control of drawing the electoral map in the hands of whichever party controls the legislature at the time. Some say this system results in voting districts drawn to all but guarantee the party in power will maintain a majority in that district.

"It's an abuse that's been carried out by Republicans and Democrats," Shaver said. He described the practice as "a democracy-killer," adding that it leads to voter apathy when they sense that the outcome of a local or statewide race is predetermined.

He asked the supervisors to consider passing a resolution in support of redistricting reform.

Boyles was most enthused by the proposed Joint Small Area Zion Crossroads Plan, in which Fluvanna and Louisa would work together to look at the long-term needs that will arise as the Zion Crossroads area continues to expand.

Her term expired at the end of April and she didn't seek reappointment. But in the interim, she's changed her mind. The supervisors noted that it's not every day they appoint someone to be their own replacement.

Fluvanna teacher provides food for hungry students

A Fluvanna teacher who knows what it's like to be hungry is doing what he can to keep his students from having the same experience.

Gary Greenwood has dedicated 43 years of his life to teaching; 38 of those years have been with Fluvanna County Public Schools. In the past, he taught elementary physical education and high school mathematics, and is currently teaching economics and personal finance at the high school as well as running the extended education program.

Before teaching, Greenwood had a number of different jobs ranging from working for a millionaire, flipping burgers, mucking out horse stalls, and working as a sales associ-

ate at a department store.

"I struggled for food, eating scraps from a fast food place that gave me a job. People helped me, so I want to give back," said Greenwood.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture more than 13 million children in the United States live in "food insecure" homes.

"I just can't imagine kids going hungry," Greenwood said. "I knew things would get better for me because I was in control, but to think that students have to come to school hungry really bothers me."

A Food Lion employee notified Greenwood about the company's annual holiday gift boxes program. This opened a new avenue for securing food for middle and high school students in need.

This year Food Lion's holiday boxes have been running since Nov. 14 and will go until Dec. 18. Customers can make a donation or purchase a \$5 food donation box. Food Lion will then deliver the donated boxes directly to the local hunger relief food bank of the customer's choice.

The Food Lion located in Palmyra has donated over 500 boxes to the local community. The holiday boxes provide families in need with the basics for creating a family meal and each box contains essential non-perishable items.

After Greenwood learned about the holiday boxes, he spoke with Bertha Armstrong. Armstrong, the head of rural outreach for the Monticello Area Community Action Agency, is heavily involved with the Fluvanna Christian Services Society food pantry. Armstrong agreed to allow Greenwood to pick up any holiday boxes that he would need for students.

Armstrong also said that she would be willing to work with Greenwood in supplying food when the holiday boxes have run out. This means that any student needing food will have the opportunity to receive it for the entire school year.

Students do not need to fill out any paperwork in order to receive a box. All students need to do is see their counselors, who have boxes in their office, or their case worker. Parents or students can also contact Greenwood at ggreenwood@apps.fluco.org and he will figure out a way to get students the food they need.

"Based on information I have been given through the counselors, Region 10, and the other people involved, we have helped an additional 26 families to the 102 that we already serve," said Sarah Cooke, lead counselor for the high school. "It is a great resource to have for our students and their families who may need extra support."

Greenwood also runs the Backpack Program for the elementary schools.

"Churches, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and other organizations have helped in so many ways by providing special treats and snacks for our children," said Greenwood. "Ron Whatley with the Lions Club and other community volunteers have been instrumental in the success of this program by packing bags and making deliveries to the school. It has truly been a community effort."

The special education department at the high school is also running a food pantry to help stop hunger within the county.

"We have food and there is no reason for our wonderful students to struggle. Our community is a great family," said Greenwood. "We all agree on this: No student should come to school hungry."





Trip to the Galapagos a dream come true for local traveler

for wildlife viewing, including walking, hiking, kayaking, snorkeling and traveling in a boat with a glass bottom. Decked out in his hiking boots, armed with his telescopic walking stick and Nikon camera, Day was ready to tour the islands. Between wet landings on the beach, perilous walks through rocky terrain, kayaking and snorkeling, one has to be in shape and have a significant amount of determination to participate.

Trying to get in and out of the pangas (inflatable boats) or even trying to mount rocks on dry land in a dry landing requires some physical skill, but Day said there was always someone there who would help. Day opted to view the aquatic life through the glass bottom boat instead of snorkeling since it had been a few years since he had been diving.

During a wet landing on the beach, the travelers were greeted by views of sea lions napping in the sun. Day caught one mother and her cub snoozing with his Nikon. As the island was made up of layers of volcanic rock, trekking could be perilous without a stick, particularly when climbing up the steep, rocky path on the side of the volcanic hillside.

Local traveler John Day presented to the Lake Monticello Wildlife Committee Dec. 2 about his trip to the Galapagos Islands.

"I was always interested in zoology and this was a trip that was on my bucket list," said Day.

He began his trip in Ecuador and discussed some of the customs that make up Ecuadorian culture, including making papier mache toys to burn at New Year's instead of fireworks. After his brief visit, he boarded a tour boat with 40 fellow passengers to visit some of the hundreds of islands that make up the Galapagos in the Pacific, a province of Ecuador.

There were a variety of activities

“It had rails,” Day pointed out in his picture. It is clear why the Galapagos are considered one of the world’s best destinations for wildlife viewing. After Charles Darwin visited the Galapagos in 1835 aboard the famous voyage of the Beagle, the species living on the Galapagos became the inspiration for his theory of evolution.

“There were iguanas everywhere,” said Day, adding that they were as abundant as squirrels are in America. They lay on every inch of rocky landscape, underbrush or any other unoccupied space.

“When Charles Darwin arrived here he stated that there were so many iguanas that you couldn’t pitch a tent without hitting one,” Day said.

As the tour proceeded throughout the islands, they walked past nazca booby, red footed and blue footed booby, hawks, flamingos, frigate birds, Galapagos penguins, cactus finches, albatrosses, and

even the rainbow-colored sally lightfoot crabs sunning themselves on the rocks. One photo showed Day squatting in the distance, watching the famous giant tortoise.

One audience member asked if any people inhabit the islands.

“Out of the hundreds of islands only a few have a fresh water source, but most of them will not sustain human settlement,” he said. “UNESCO does a fine job on conservation.” The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) preserves world heritage sites like the Galapagos Islands, which have cultural, historical, scientific and other significance and are legally protected under international treaties. The world heritage sites are judged for their collective interest to mankind. Perhaps Darwin’s theory of evolution fits the criteria for the preservation of the Galapagos.

Restorative self-care through the holidays

Self-care is the things we do for ourselves that allow us to gently prevent health disasters, survive well and thrive. If you look up self-care you may not find a dictionary definition, but I like what Wikipedia has to say, calling self-care the things we can control and initiate for ourselves, and linking self-care with the prevention side of the healthcare equation. Self-care is essentially the ways we can take charge and stay well.

Sometimes self-care practices aren't the indulgent "kindnesses" we think of

when we're tired and coming home to recline in front of the TV. Self-care may rather be doing the things that take a bit of effort, but replenish us and restore energy. Self-care examples include taking a soothing bath, a morning or after dinner walk, getting to bed earlier, going for massage, or just deciding to share moment-to-moment pleasures with a family member.

While these activities may seem small and insignificant, they represent listening to personal needs and being a prior-

ity in our own lives. The alternative isn't just "not finding time for what I need to do," it's actually self-neglect.

What each of us considers beneficial self-care may be different. Consider savoring time for reading, learning, walking in the woods, music, enjoying quiet solo time, taking up dancing or yoga, or taking a bath with Epsom salts and guidance from the app Calm.

When caring for ourselves takes a backseat in the busyness of spring and summer, winter and holiday opportuni-

ties to connect with others may be a good time to assess personal wellbeing and aim to boost healthy self-care pleasures.

Here are some questions to ask yourself:

- Where have I really shown up for myself in this last year? What things have helped me feel more whole? What else have I longed to do but not gotten to?

- When I feel at my best (most healthy or relaxed), what do I enjoy doing or experiencing? This might be music, time with family, bike riding, traveling, volunteering, time at home, or learning something new. Am I making time to do these things?

- Finish this sentence: Looking forward, the biggest difference for me and my wellness in 2019 would be when I... Examples may include finding a walking buddy, learning mindfulness and taking more pauses in the day or week, managing conditions such as sleep apnea, blood sugar, or blood pressure, dealing with pain in a more effective way, finding knowledgeable resources, or planning meals and snacks one or more days in advance.

This is your invitation to remind yourself of what helps you be at your best. This is also your permission slip to take part in both pleasurable and necessary self-care in the next three to four weeks.

Holidays can also bring new opportunities to practice stress resilience as you ready for the holidays, work or family gatherings. Here are a few quick practices I keep close. They're also useful year-round.

4-4-4 breath: Portable stress resilience

Breathe to a 4-4-4 count. Inhale to a count of four, hold for four, then exhale for four. Repeat three or four times. The 4-4-4 breath can quiet and focus the mind, calming a stressful moment and enhancing concentration.

Mindful eating

Aim to single-task while eating, even if just for a few bites. Slow down and savor the delicious in what you're eating. Really notice the crunch, salty bits,



sweetness, flavor, health and creaminess of what you're eating. See if you can tell when you're only medium hungry (like a three to four on a 10-point scale). Do you notice when you're satisfied (a six to seven) and stop before you're stuffed (at nine to 10)? Eating mindfully can help us reach a healthy weight.

Acceptance: "It's like this"


"It's like this" can be repeated with a sort of mindful acceptance in the midst of needing more patience, being irritated, afraid or anxious. It's an aspect of mindfulness practice that allows stepping back and relaxing. Often, when pausing, a sense of perspective returns. With more perspective, a formerly irritating event may become less charged and possibly even humorous. When I notice I've been grabbing or expecting a certain outcome, and the situation is turning out differently than I expected, noting "Hm...it's like this" sometimes shifts the tension to greater ease more quickly than it would otherwise shift.

Restorative yoga: Yoga nidra

Yoga nidra, also called yogic sleep, is the last part of some yoga classes. It can be enjoyed even without the yoga postures. Generally you lie down to fully experience Yoga nidra. It is beneficial for overall health and accomplishes a deep rest with some of the same benefits of actual sleep, but in less time. During yoga nidra body relaxation is deep, which enables the mind and spirit to also rest. Experiencing yoga nidra connects us to the most peaceful inner part of ourselves. Yoga nidra and iRest recordings are available if you don't get to yoga class.

What kind of self-care will you offer yourself this holiday season?



Fluco girls win squeaker in overtime

In a toughly contested, seesaw battle, the Fluco girls, behind junior guard Nevaeh Ivory and freshman post player Khamare Steppe, managed a well-deserved two point win in overtime Tuesday (Dec. 4) over Turner Ashby. The final score was 62-60.

Ivory scored seven of the Flucos' nine points in overtime, including the two deciding free throws.

The game, which was played on the Fluco home court, began with the Flucos running off to an 11-2 lead. Ivory had five points in the period and four other Flucos put up points. A surprise press by Turner Ashby late in the period was successful in creating a couple of turnovers and the Knights closed the gap to 12-8 at the end of the quarter.

In the second quarter, the teams demonstrated how evenly matched they were as each scored 14 points. Steppe had a big quarter coming through with three inside baskets and a free throw for seven. Ivory again had a five point quarter. The Flucos led at half 26-22.

The third quarter was not the Flucos' best. They managed to score only eight points and fell behind 34-37. Ivory and Steppe each had a basket and sophomore and junior wings players NeVaeh Bishop and Mya Wright each had two free throws. In addition, Ivory picked up her fourth foul and had to go to the bench.

Despite the fact that their free throws were not going in (19 for 44 overall), the Flucos rallied strongly in the fourth quarter. Bishop drained two important three point shots and junior guard Jules Shepherd had a standout quarter with seven points and two crucial fierce rebounds at the end of the quarter, despite the fact that she is one of the shortest players on the court. With 15 seconds left in regulation, the Flucos took a 53-50 lead when Wright grabbed a rebound and was fouled. She made one of two for the three point lead. Unfortunately for the Flucos, the Knights' point guard managed to get open and she swished a three pointer to send the game to overtime.

On the first play of the overtime, Shepherd fouled out. The Knights hit a three point shot for a two point lead halfway through the overtime, but Ivory made a strong drive for a tying basket. Turner Ashby went up by two on a driving basket and Ivory responded to tie the game again. The Flucos made one of two



free throws on two occasions to go up 60-58.

But with 15 seconds left, Turner Ashby made two for two from the line to tie the score. Ivory was fouled on the inbound and made one of two from the line for the lead. On the second free throw, Wright made a hard play for the rebound, forcing it off a Knight player and giving the Flucos the ball back. Ivory was immediately fouled again. She made one of two for the 62-60 lead.

The Knights managed to get the ball to their point guard for a desperate three that could have won the game. However, Bishop made a clean block of the shot and the game was over.

Ivory played most of the fourth quarter and all of the overtime with four fouls. After the game, Coach Chad White noted that he left Ivory in because he was confident that his veteran shooting guard knew how to avoid drawing a disqualifying foul.

Ivory led the Flucos in scoring with an impressive 23 points, Steppe had 13 and Shepherd and Bishop nine and eight respectively. Steppe had 14 rebounds for a double-double, Wright had nine rebounds. The Fluco girls are now 2-2 and are about to start their Jefferson District play. On Dec. 7 they hosted Orange



County and Dec. 11 they traveled to Al-bemarle High. On Dec. 12 they are at Madison County. On Dec. 14 they host Powhatan and then travel to Charlottesville Dec. 18.



All four stated unequivocally they did not share the letter with anyone outside of the Oct. 10 closed meeting.

Board member Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) said she did not leak the letter.

Board member Brenda Pace (Palmyra) did not return messages left on her voicemail. However, Winkler said Pace has said she did not share the letter with anyone outside of the closed meeting.

In a telephone interview, Pullen said he knows everyone thinks he's the one who passed on the intel to Schilling, but he did not.

Three days after Schilling posted his column – and before the public airing of the issue at the Nov. 7 School Board meeting – Pullen was on Schilling's radio show talking about the Alliance Club request.

To illustrate his claim that many people had access to the letter, Pullen said a woman asked him about it before the Oct. 10 meeting.

"She supported it and asked if I'd received it," Pullen said.

Pullen did not respond to a text asking him to contact the woman and ask if she'd speak to a reporter.

Pullen said he's suffered harassment

because of the issue.

"People call me Jason Kessler," the right wing activist involved in the 2017 Charlottesville protest in which Heather Heyer was killed. "I honestly have been upset enough to consider resigning from the board," Pullen said. "I couldn't go with my daughter on a field trip because of people calling me Jason Kessler."

When contacted Wednesday (Dec. 5), Schilling said he never comments to other members of the media about a column he's written.

He did not find out about the logo issue via a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request because he never sent one, said Brenda Gilliam, director of finance and instruction, who handles all FOIA requests.

Students and staff

In a series of interviews with staff and students involved, it doesn't appear "lots of people" had access to the letter.

Yes, the letter was created on a school computer in a Google Docs platform.

But that doesn't mean "anyone" could get to it.

Every student has an email address. Each student has a password to get into the school computer system. Teachers have access to that password.

But to create a letter in Google Docs, a student must use his or her personal email password.

Teachers do not have access to that password.

The only way a teacher or parent could see or print that document (stored in the cloud) is if the student who created it gives the teacher or parent access.

The school has not reported problems with hacking.

On Thursday (Dec. 6) Winkler said neither he nor the School Board asked IT to check and see who accessed the letter writer's Google document.

Chris Ramos, a staff sponsor of the Alliance Club, said he was given permission by the student in September to read it and print out a copy.

"I printed one copy," Ramos said.

That copy was put into an inter-office mailing envelope addressed to Principal Margo Bruce and given to a secretary in the main office.

Bruce said she did not share the letter with anyone but Winkler.

The Alliance Club has several co-presidents and a number of them agreed to interviews.

Yes, many of them told their parents about the proposed logo change. But the students said they did not print the letter nor send it as an attachment.

Ramos said students don't have access to a color printer. They have to get permission from a teacher to use one or ask a teacher to print a color copy.

Many teachers and parents may have known about the proposed logo change, but there's no evidence that anyone other than the letter writer, Ramos, Bruce and Winkler saw the copy Ramos printed out. All four said they did not send an electronic copy or print a copy and share it. The only others who had a color-copy of the request are the five School Board members.

Winkler said he printed a color copy of the letter and put it in a folder for each board member at the Oct. 10 closed meeting.

The students involved said,

- "We never intended it to get bigger than the school and the School Board."
- "It's very important we find out how Schilling got the letter or the picture of the letter."
- "It should not have happened."
- "It's important to find out how it happened to prevent it from happening again."
- "I don't know what we can do to prevent it from happening, but I do think they'll take some steps to make sure it doesn't happen again."

Winkler said the School Board is doing its own investigation. If that investigation finds it was one of their own, the only recourse they have is to sanction the member, said Johnson.




