County applies for fixes to dangerous intersections

The Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors agreed Wednesday (July 11) to apply for money to fix four dangerous intersections around the county.

The county will file its applications by Aug. 1 in an attempt to secure funding through the Virginia Department of Transportation's (VDOT) Smart Scale system.

Topping the list is the intersection between Route 53 and Turkeysag Trail at Lake Monticello. That intersection "is the highest safety concern in the county currently," said Chuck Proctor, VDOT engineer. VDOT is proposing a roundabout at that location similar to the roundabouts at Routes 15 and 53, Routes 53 and 600, and the one planned for Routes 53 and 618.

The county also wants a fix for the intersection of Routes 15 and 613 (Bybees Church Road). The plan is to add a left turn lane to "reduce the number of crashes and rear-end collisions," Proctor said.

Next on the list is the intersection of Routes 15 and 631 (Troy Road). Bad sight distance due to a crest curve has led to rear-end collisions, Proctor said. "We're going to add a left turn lane on Route 15 northbound to Troy Road and we're going to fix that curve so you can have better sight distance," Proctor said.

Finally, the county hopes to fix the intersection of Route 250 and 631 (Troy Road). "This one had a lot of crashes in a lot of different directions," Proctor said.

VDOT is recommending a roundabout at that location as well. "We knew there would definitely be some growth and increased traffic" due to economic development, Proctor said, so

a roundabout seemed like the best solution.

All four projects will be submitted to Smart Scale, but likely not all will receive funding.

"We have several different revenue streams that we'll focus on to fund these projects," said Alan Saunders, VDOT residency engineer. "Just because it doesn't get Smart Scale funding doesn't mean it's not a need."

The Commonwealth Transportation Board will review all Smart Scale applications over the next several months. Any Fluvanna projects selected for funding will receive money in fiscal year 2021, Saunders said. The road improvements would get underway in 2023.

"We'll still probably need to do some of those [improvements] in the interim because that funding is going to be way out, if we get funding," said Proctor. "We may have to look at other options if they don't get funded... but if you don't apply, you're not going to get funded."

New social services positions

Medicaid expansion has greatly increased the number of people eligible for Medicaid in Fluvanna, said Kim Mabe, director of social services.

Medicaid was expanded to 138 percent of the federal poverty level, Mabe said, and has created a third category for adults who may or may not have children but who are in low-paying jobs. Medicaid will provide coverage to 33 percent of the uninsured in Fluvanna, which translates to about 829 new cases.

That new work load warrants two fulltime workers, Mabe said. She also anticipates a substantial uptick in applications as people who may or may not be eligible for coverage hear about the expansion and apply. Workers are needed to process those applications.

Mabe requested a new full-time benefit specialist position and an upgrade to full-time of a part-time benefit programs specialist. The state contributed \$78,399 toward this cost and at this point there is no local match, Mabe said. Next year the county will need to supply 15.5 percent of the cost of the positions, or \$12,152.

In other matters:

- Supervisors honored former planner James Newman, who is leaving after three years in Fluvanna to become the zoning administrator for Fredericksburg. "I'm hoping the experience he takes from us will benefit him, and we certainly have benefitted from him being here," said County Administrator Steve Nichols.
- Supervisors reappointed Scott Marshall and Curtis Putnam to the Economic Development Authority. They decided to invite Keith Smith and Rudy Garcia, who are applying for the final slot, to speak to them Aug. 1 about why they would like the position.
- Supervisors reappointed Frank Gallo to the Piedmont Virginia Community College Board.
- Supervisors voted to hire Delta Response Team LLC to run rescue calls in the county. More details are forthcoming.

Former police officer sentenced for speeding, eluding

A former Richmond police officer charged with speeding in excess of 80 mph and eluding police in a late-night incident on Route 600 in January was sentenced in Fluvanna County Circuit Court on Thursday (July 12) after entering into a plea agreement with the Commonwealth's Attorney.

Travis Scott Dooley pleaded guilty to misdemeanor counts of reckless driving and eluding. These charges were reduced from felony counts under the terms of the plea agreement.

According to Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Todd Shockley, on Jan. 7 at around 1 a.m., Sgt. Craig Martin of the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office was manning a radar on Route 600 (South Boston Road) when Dooley passed him at a clocked speed of 77 mph. Martin turned on his lights and pulled onto the road, but rather than pulling over, Dooley sped up to 80 mph as he continued up the road.

Martin momentarily lost sight of Dooley, but was flagged down by an unnamed passenger heading in the opposite direction, who told him Dooley was hiding behind a building somewhere near the CVS and the Dollar General. He was taken into custody moments later.

Dooley's attorney painted a portrait of a man under enormous stress at the time of the incident. Less than a month before his arrest, Dooley was on patrol with the Richmond Police Department (RPD) when he came under fire during the chase of a suspect in a drive-by shooting.

Dooley returned fire, striking the

suspect in the leg. He then gave the suspect emergency aid while waiting for an ambulance.

The attorney asked Judge Melvin R. Hughes to view bodycam footage of the shooting incident "to show what kind of a person the defendant is." After some consideration, Hughes declined.

Dooley was on paid administrative leave when the speeding incident occurred. Shortly after his arrest in Fluvanna, he left the RPD. Today, Dooley is living with his mother in Montgomery County and shuttling vehicles for a transport service.

A letter submitted to the court from his therapist shows he is receiving treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder.

"Travis is my lifeline at the moment," his mother, Susan Smith, said on the witness stand. She testified he has been her primary source of emotional support following the deaths of her father and husband in recent months.

Shockley argued that Dooley's status as a police officer was "a double-edged sword." He deserved credit for his exemplary behavior during the Richmond shooting incident, but his behavior on Jan. 7 had endangered the life of another law enforcement officer, along with anyone else who had been on the road at the time. "He used his government training [in high-speed driving] to endanger other human beings," he said.

"We believe this is a jailable offense," he added, asking for a sentence of no less than 30 days.

Dooley's attorney countered that "because he has special training, it was less dangerous [to drive at high speed] than for other people." She argued that active jail time was not appropriate given the specifics of her client's case.

Hughes sentenced Dooley to three months in jail on each sentence, suspending all but 20 days. He will also have a year of supervised probation and pay \$400 in fines. His driver's license will be suspended for 90 days on each charge, but after some debate on the wording of the applicable law, Hughes ruled that those sentences could run concurrently, or at the same time.

Dooley was ordered to report to jail to begin his sentence July 27.

School Board directs superintendent to pursue unpaid cafeteria tabs

The School Board directed Superintendent Chuck Winkler to get details on having a collection agency or lawyer help retrieve more than \$40,000 owed for food service bills.

At Wednesday's (July 11) regularly scheduled meeting, the Board debated how to collect the money, which reached a record high in the 2017-18 school year.

Winkler said per Virginia code the school can carry the debt for a year, then must pay it off.

Brenda Gilliam, director of instruction and finance, said Virginia does not allow schools to attach the debt to a person's tax liability.

Gilliam said one option suggested was to contract with a lawyer or agency to

collect the money. The school would then get a portion of what was collected.

Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) said she was okay with that as long as it didn't have a "negative impact on staff and schools and the relationship between the staff and students."

Andrew Pullen (Columbia) encouraged Winkler to look into collections because "in every other aspect of life if you don't pay" there are repercussions.

Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) agreed. "It's not fair to taxpayers to pay for others' food," he said.

In other news, Pullen asked Winkler to see if it's possible to set up a central bus pick-up and drop-off point for students. He said many of his constituents whose children have long bus rides suggested the ARC in Kents Store as a site.

Winkler said he'd look into it.

The superintendent shared the full staff survey with the Board, including comments. Any comment naming someone specific was redacted.

Among the comments concerning what can be improved, more than 50 dealt with discipline and the need for more consistent, fair and timely discipline. Other topics frequently mentioned were:

- Better communication;
- More access to technology;
- More support staff;
- Less testing;

- Smaller class size; and
- Concerns about building maintenance, safety and cleanliness.

Winkler said he met with representatives of Trane who made energy improvements throughout the school buildings last year. So far, while there have been savings, they haven't been at the level Trane guaranteed.

Because the 2018-19 budget is so tight and is built on the expected energy savings, Winkler said they are keeping an eye on it. They will continue to talk with Trane representatives to make sure they fulfill the savings goal.

When it came to allocating \$6,943.71 for Virginia School Board Association (VSBA) dues, the Board had a discussion.

Winkler said being a member of VSBA gives the Board a lot of benefits, including use of the Board Docs computer system, legal advice and policy access.

Pullen said he fundamentally does not like using taxpayer money to pay for VSBA lobbying.

When Winkler pointed out another advantage of being a member is reduced conference fees, Rittenhouse said they still have to pay to attend the conference.

Stewart said she supports Fluvanna's "continued use of VSBA." Brenda Pace (Palmyra) concurred.

The Board voted 3-0 to pay the VSBA dues. Pullen abstained. Board Chair Perrie Johnson was not at the meeting.





Hefty Lake fee pushed business to Spring Creek

Life at Lake Monticello is fabulous! The activities that are available to residents are wonderful. There are events and clubs for people of all ages.

Recently, residents began contributing (through a dues increase) to the renovation of the common facilities. I worked on two renovation committees and headed up the sub-committee that designed and facilitated the community survey on the residents' preferences. The results made it clear: Members wanted fine dining and Sunday brunch at Ashlawn (now Lakeside). Final renovations came out beautifully. I'm proud to take guests to the Lakeside Restaurant or the Pub.

Over the weekend of July 7, my husband and I hosted my family reunion for 40 people. I wanted Sunday brunch at Lakeside, just like four years ago at the last reunion. Upon calling, I discovered that at Lakeside I would have to pay a room fee of \$375, in addition to the cost of the 40 meals. I asked about the Pub, but the Pub couldn't accommodate groups that size, unless I paid for a private room. I would have paid a reasonable fee – say \$75 (which is what the county charges for their facilities for an entire day), but not \$375 (for two hours)! That charge is ridiculous for Lake residents. So I couldn't have the event in my own community!

So guess where we had our brunch... Spring Creek, where Skip Alston, our former chef, was happy to get the revenue and have my group in his dining room. Skip provided a fabulous brunch buffet at \$12.95 a person. I thought it was interesting that an employee at Spring Creek was motivated to add revenue to his association's coffers. Our association lost the revenue from 40 meals. How does that help our bottom line?

The Board needs to go back and look at what the residents wanted from the renovations. They wanted fine dining at Ashlawn, not the Pub. The majority didn't want a new golf clubhouse. Some residents didn't even want a golf course at all, since it loses money. Just because several Board members are golfers doesn't mean all activities should be at the golf course. We need to go back to Lakeside being open Thursday through Saturday, plus a reasonable Sunday brunch. If it loses money, so be it. The golf course loses money, but the Board didn't close it down.

Spreading the vote throughout Fluvanna

With a little over three months to go before Virginians return to the voting booth, a new organization dedicated to voter registration and participation is opening a Fluvanna County chapter.

Cristelle Brown, Virginia state director for Spread the Vote, met with about a dozen potential volunteers at Carysbrook Monday (July 16) to explain the organization's mission.

Spread the Vote was established in 2017 to help people in states with strong voter ID laws obtain the documentation they need to vote.

In Virginia, one of five states where Spread the Vote currently has chapters, this means a government-issued photo ID.

Photo ID laws are popular because they theoretically cut down on in-person

voter fraud on election days. However, most studies have shown that in-person fraud is incredibly rare. In 2016, for example, researchers found only four instances of this type of fraud – out of 129 million ballots cast.

Critics say photo ID laws disproportionately impact people of color, people in rural areas, and the elderly. With about 21 million voting-age Americans lacking government IDs, about 11 percent of electorate is essentially disenfranchised.

That's where Spread the Vote comes in, Brown explained. Volunteers are tasked with helping clients obtain whatever they need to get that vital ID card.

Depending on the situation, that can mean helping a client get a copy of their birth certificate or Social Security card, or driving a Fluvanna client into the Charlottesville Department of Motor Vehicles so they can physically apply for an ID.

In 2016, then-Gov. Terry McAuliffe restored voting rights to convicted felons who had completed their sentences and probation. Brown said many people with past felony convictions didn't know they could now register to vote, while others had run into roadblocks in obtaining the paperwork needed to prove they had served their sentences and paid fines.

Volunteers also help people register to vote in their local jurisdictions, and may even drive them to the polls on Election Day.

"We are nonpartisan," Brown said. "We just want everyone to participate in our democracy."

And, she added, photo IDs are useful

for people well beyond the voting booth. "We've found it just helps people lead their lives," said Brown, allowing them to secure jobs, apply for housing, and access services. Chapters often partner with churches, schools, and other social outreach groups to find clients in need.

While the big push at the moment is to get people registered by the Oct. 27 deadline for the 2018 midterm elections, Spread the Vote will continue until every American has what they need to be able to participate. "We're trying to work ourselves out of business," Brown said.

Obituary Peter Almonte




Peter is survived by two sons, Paul and Andrew, and a granddaughter, "Annie."

Painter Peter Almonte remembered

Those who knew Peter Almonte and his work knew that he was more excited by the subjects he painted than the paintings themselves. This was the essence of his work. He had the ability to translate what he saw and felt into images that beckoned the observer to linger and look at the flawless infinite detail in his work. Almonte featured unusual subjects and often used several photos he had taken to create one original work.

A longtime member of the Fluvanna Art Association and the Central Virginia Watercolor Guild, Almonte won numerous awards, and many of his paintings are in private collections. He also exhibited extensively in local galleries. A quiet, thoughtful man, he remained supportive of other artists and mentored them but was always humble in the face of praise for his own work.

Almonte, a former New York City architect, began painting while studying architecture in Cincinnati in the early 1950s. It was his training as an architect that helped him in executing accurate detail within his exquisite watercolors. This is something not easily accomplished by many watercolorists.

A devoted family man, Almonte was married once and even in his 80s would still drive up to New Jersey and visit his son. Then he would return to his studio loft and paint.

Almonte was a resident of Lake Monticello since the 1990s. His house was decorated with various paintings featuring natives working, seaside Asian villages, and churches in Costa Rica. There seemed to be no end to Almonte's love of other cultures and those influences in his work.

His unique house sat on the lake and his studio was a loft in the bedroom reachable only by a ladder. In that loft he created beautiful paintings with depth and meaning, including his famous *Blessing of the Hounds* at Grace Episcopal Church, numerous seascapes and European landmarks, marketplaces, the Middle East, and Africa.

Many of his watercolors were scenes taken from trips with the Charlottesville Friendship Force to such places as England, France, Belgium, Germany and Costa Rica. His scenes of Belgian towns are picturesque. His watercolor of a Nigerian warrior captured the man's ebony skin and the minute details of his headdress with shell beads and braids, along with the firmness and determination in his eye.

He told the story of one picture he painted while on Victoria Island in Lagos, Nigeria, confined to his living quarters during a coup attempt in February 1976 by a group of dissident military men.

"The country's leader was assassinated, but the coup failed. A sidelight to history is that Nigeria's current president, President Obasanjo, was then the lieutenant general who took over from the slain leader," he said in 2007. "On the beach near our quarters, about a dozen of the ringleaders of the failed coup were publicly executed."

In his later years he experimented with symbolism and more emotional subjects, as exhibited in the theatrical award-winning piece *Poetry in Motion*. Almonte was also a master of color, blending his colors to convey a certain feeling. In one landscape he portrayed a muted red roof of an old sea shanty on a dock, showing the brightness worn over time from the salt sea air and sun. Another depicts a rowboat drifting on the shores of Ireland, alone and solitary, looking out onto the seas ahead. Some of his paintings even had a pop of deep, bright color.

Unfortunately, Almonte began to notice the trembling in his hands and was eventually diagnosed with Parkinson's, which over time robbed him of his innate ability to communicate detail in his paintings. Determined, he tried to work around it, but soon gave up painting, much to the disappointment of those who for years had admired his work.

What had always inspired Almonte was what he saw and what he believed would make a good painting. Like other artists, he mixed up images from various travel photos and sometimes came up with a whimsical Shangri La all his own.

Hiking and horseback trails flourish at **Pleasant Grove Park**

Pleasant Grove Park is a wonderful asset that Fluvanna residents should utilize at every opportunity. The main park entrance is located in the center of the county on Route 53 just east of Fluvanna County High School. A second entrance that takes visitors to the dog park and several hiking trails is just west of the Route 53-Route 15 traffic circle.

Pleasant Grove is a very large facility for a county the size of Fluvanna. It boasts 23 trails that extend over approximately 22 miles. Naturally, there are easy flat trails and also some trails that present a change in altitude challenge. Some trails are heavily wooded and others are much more open. A few of the trails take the adventuresome hiker down to the edge of the Rivanna River. Several foot bridges along the trails have been constructed by Fluvanna County Boy Scouts working to achieve Eagle Scout status.

Fluvanna Parks and Recreation has a master naturalist summer guide program with guided hikes once a month. The June and July hikes have already occurred. A birding hike is scheduled for Aug. 11. Hikers will meet at the equestrian parking area by the old oak tree. This area is to the left of the main entrance road just short of the cemetery. This hike will be conducted through the wildlife meadows. It is anticipated that hikers will "experience the variety of birds, plants and animals that inhabit these grasslands, long prized by Native Americans," according to a parks and recreation brochure.

will visit some of the bluebird houses at the park. It is intended that the hike will encourage county residents to establish bluebird houses on their own properties. For details about these hikes contact the parks and recreation office at 434-589-2016.

There are also opportunities for selfguided nature hikes. Parks and recreation has a printed guide to numbered signs that are posted along the trails. The guide can be found at the kiosk behind the butterfly and community garden. Of course, hikers can simply explore the extensive trail system for themselves with the trail map and without any guides.

Naturally, there are some rules that hikers are expected to follow. Bikers are expected to yield to hikers and to horseback riders. All those using the trails should stay on the trails and not cut through from one trail to another as this can lead to damage to native plants and to unwanted erosion. Alcohol is not permitted.

The park and its trails are only open during daylight hours. Accordingly, camping and overnight stays are not allowed. No open fires are allowed. Hunting is prohibited in the park, but fishing in the Rivanna is allowed with a valid fishing license. Dogs must be kept on a leash, except in designated off-leash areas.

Horseback riders are required to complete a standard waiver of rights and assumption of risk of equine activity pursuant to the applicable Virginia code section. Fluvanna residents may ride for free, but must obtain an annual permit and have a sticker on their windshield. Riders from outside the county must pay a daily fee of \$8 per rider.





Aiden Johnson (50-meter butterfly and 100-meter individual medley).





Coveted Snapchat handles turns into cash cow for teen

For those of you who don't know what Snapchat is or the value of having just the right "handle" then you might want to pay close attention to this story.

Darian Jon-Claude Lipscomb, a 16-year-old rising junior at Buckingham County High School, knows the value of the multi-media app, as it has taken him and his family across the world while paying for a large part of his college education.

Let's start at the beginning.

Darian's family enjoys taking cruises. At the age of 12, after returning from a Caribbean cruise, Darian took the Snapchat handle #CarnivalCruise as his user name. "I was young and it was sort of random," said Darian. "I couldn't think of another name to use, so I chose that. I had no idea what would happen."

Carnival Cruise wanted to negotiate with Darian. If he handed over the rights to his Snapchat handle, they would offer him something in return. That's when it got interesting, as what Carnival Cruise was offering seemed to go on and on.

But first, Carnival Cruise wanted to find Darian, so they put on a media blitz that ended up being covered by national and even international new agencies. Sounds like, if things go right, Darian will have quite a bit to do after high school graduation. Although he plans to attend a four-year college, he recognizes the value in an intern relationship with Carnival Cruise and looks forward to the experience.

So, imagine again. A simple Snapchat handle has taken this young man to places he never imagined. It has allowed him to learn the ropes on a cruise liner, get behind the scenes, meet famous people, and have a nest egg of \$20,000 for college.

And, unlike the Snapchat app that is designed for messages to disappear after 24 hours, this handle lives on for this very lucky teen.


