or other gift cards to pay the alleged debt. The sheriff's office does not arrest people for tax debts. The IRS will send you written notice if you owe a tax debt. The best thing to do is simply hang up the phone.

# Supervisors confirm state of emergency

The Sept. 19 meeting of the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors began by formally adjourning its Sept. 5 meeting. With three members unexpectedly absent that day, the meeting had been suspended, but not closed.

After that bit of parliamentary housekeeping was completed, supervisors tackled a super-sized agenda of items from both meetings.

#### **Emergency declaration**

With the county still cleaning up after heavy rainfall associated with Hurricane Florence, the board voted to confirm the decision to declare a local emergency. It was the first such declaration since a winter storm event in February 2015. Declaring a local emergency opens access to state resources and potential reimbursement for cleanup and recovery.

County Administrator Steve Nichols said much of the storm debris had already been cleared. However, the Virginia Department of Transportation expects repairs to washouts on Route 616 (Union Mills Road) to continue for another two weeks. Until then, the road will be closed to all but local traffic from the Route 600 (South Boston Road) intersection to Route 15.

#### Next Gen 911

Melissa Parsons, regional coordinator for Virginia Information Technologies Agency (VITA), gave a lengthy presentation on the state-mandated upgrade of emergency call centers to Next Generation 911.

The current analog 911 system is now 50 years old, and the old technology simply can't keep pace in the digital era. Next Gen 911 uses a shared digital network that will eventually connect every 911 call center in Virginia.

Among its other benefits, it will allow 911 to handle texts and images as well as calls, access and share specific location data from callers, and build more redundancy and resilience into the system.

Parsons stressed that this is a nationwide effort, and communities don't have a choice of whether or not they will participate. "Doing nothing is not an option," she said.

"Because we realize it's not your fault the state's asking you to upgrade," the state will pay the cost of installation and the difference between the current and upgraded maintenance fees for the first two years, Parsons said.

For Fluvanna, Parsons estimates this will come to a little over \$338,000. This includes over \$90,000 for increased monthly maintenance costs.

Each region will roll out the upgrades on a schedule set by VITA. For this region, the switch to Next Gen 911 will happen in 2020.

#### **Money transfer**

Supervisors approved a series of transfers of county dollars to free them up for ongoing projects.

About \$72,000 was shifted from the Unassigned Fund to the fiscal year 2019 (FY19) Fluvanna County Public Schools Capital Reserve Maintenance Fund for work on the middle school campus.

Also approved was a capital improvement budget transfer of around \$120,000 for repairs to the exterior of the Historic Courthouse, and \$138,000 for a set of smaller projects like a hydrological study and replacement of lighting control systems in the main courthouse.

On the telecommunications side, supervisors approved a \$114,000 contract with Fulton Communications for a new VOIP phone system for county offices.

#### **Travel and reimbursement**

"I've been working on this one for six years," Nichols told supervisors as he introduced a policy update covering travel and business reimbursement for county employees.

The old system of using receipts to reimburse employees for expenses will be replaced by a more simple per diem structure, making it faster and easier for staff to process claims.

Supervisor Don Weaver disagreed with a provision in the policy that would allow out-of-state interview candidates to receive a per diem for traveling to Fluvanna County.

Human Resources Manager Jessica Rice explained that it's difficult for rural localities to draw on a wide talent pool if out-of-state applicants are unwilling to travel here for an interview. She said a modest per diem is a "basic recruitment technique."

The policy update passed 4-1.

#### **Employee survey**

Nichols also outlined the results of the 2018 staff opinion survey. About two-

thirds of county employees filled out the survey, for a total of 97 responses.

When it came to overall satisfaction, 79 percent of respondents said they enjoyed being part of the organization and 78 percent said they were happy with their jobs. Another 63 percent said they thought their performance was judged fairly, and 68 percent said the training they received helped them do a better job.

Some areas that employees felt needed work were in recognition for accomplishments (53 percent), equal opportunity (59 percent), communications of new policies and procedures (57 percent), and the opportunity for employees to contribute to changes in policies and procedures (51 percent).

The survey is conducted every two years, and Nichols noted that overall positive responses had increased since the surveys began in 2012.

There was also room for staff comments, which included recommendations, observations and complaints.





# Interpreter seeks to connect with the deaf community

Seán Sopht wants to use his skills as a sign language interpreter to help deaf people in Fluvanna communicate with those around them in educational, medical, business or other situations.

Moving across the country from Orange County, Calif., Seán Sopht and his wife, Carol, came to Virginia in 2012 to establish their new lives. In June 2017 they settled into the Fork Union area.

Sopht brings a different kind of business to the local community. By passing all the requirements for the Virginia Quality Assurance Screening (VAQS), Sopht is a certified American Sign Language (ASL) interpreter for Virginia. Before moving to Fluvanna, he worked out of an agency based in Richmond before he branched off on his own.

"The agency was the middleman. But now I'm more in the driver's seat," said Sopht.

Sopht did not plan on becoming an interpreter. His focus in college was in the automotive industry; however, he and his mother took sign language classes at Saddleback Community College in southern California. Those classes sparked his interest.

"I never wanted to be an interpreter. Growing up I noticed sign language and thought it was cool," said Sopht. "But when I got to college, I saw a class offering and took the opportunity to learn it. I enjoyed it so much that I eventually ran out of sign language classes and took the interpreter classes."

While the classes played a big role, Sopht also attributed some of his success to one of his previous instructors, Jen Stephenson. Once Sopht finished the program at Saddleback Community College, Stephenson brought him on assignments through the agency in which she worked. She also encouraged him to go to the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf (RID) conference, the industry's biggest biannual conference.

"She really helped transition me to a professional field. She exposed me to work as an interpreter and connected me to an agency," said Sopht.

As an independent contractor he now gets to make his own schedule. Sopht has done assignments with all ages. He has worked within public schools through primary and secondary education as well as helping senior citizens, doctors' offices, business meetings, and even job trainings and orientation.

Some might think not having a 9-to-5 schedule makes a job easy, but being an ASL interpreter can bring challenges. Interpreters have standards when they take on a job assignment. They have to make sure they know what they signed up for when taking a job and that they meet the requirements.

Some interpreters joke that their hands get tired after signing for so long, but there is some stress that comes with the job. "The mental stress is something I dislike. It is the stress caused by letting someone down. That is what makes me a little vulnerable," said Sopht. However, the pros of this profession outweigh the cons.

"I do love the access to a rich, linguistic, cultural minority. The language gives me a door into this community and there are groups of people out there that are really fascinating," said Sopht. He described many everyday professions having deaf workers, such as doctors, pharmacists and philanthropists. "The deaf community is often overlooked and it is enjoyable to have that access to it," he said.

Different states have different requirements, but interpreters may take the national certification test through the RID and receive their National Interpreter Certification (NIC). This test is more expensive to take, but it is nationally ranked, opening more opportunities for the interpreter.

Sopht sees himself still interpreting in the years to come, but imagines being better connected to the deaf community around him. While he claims that more work is done within metropolitan areas such as Charlottesville and Richmond, there could be events here in Fluvanna with which he could help.

"Connecting to a community is important to me," said Sopht. "I am new in the area, so that does not mean there is not a deaf community. It just goes back to getting to know the community better."

# Route 616 closed for weeks for pipe replacement

Route 616 (Union Mills Road) will remain closed to through traffic west of Route 15 (James Madison Highway) due to a culvert washout caused by the torrential rains Sept. 17.

A detour is in place using Route 631 (Troy Road), Routes 633 and 600 (North Boston Road).

The large pipe, which measures 16 feet by 10 feet, is located about onequarter mile east of Route 600 (South Boston Road). It was damaged and partially collapsed by the heavy rain and

debris washed downstream on Stigger Creek. Water then flowed over the pipe, undermining and finally collapsing part of the westbound lane on Route 616.


Before the new pipe can be set in place, the damaged pipe must be dug out and removed. That will require excavating the soil above and around the pipe, which sits about 20 feet beneath the roadway. After removing the pipe a Virginia Department of Transportation contractor will put a new culvert in place, backfill the excavation and repave the road.

The entire project, including delivery, assembly and placement of the new culvert and restoring the roadway, is estimated to take four to six weeks. Due to the significant work required to remove the old pipe, it is not feasible to reopen the road before the pipe is replaced.



# Dance instructor starting program for Parkinson's patients

Angell Husted described herself at a young age as a tomboy in frills. She has always loved the arts, particularly dance. During a 10-year span from age 6 to 16, she took ballet lessons while growing up in Pleasant Valley, N.Y. She has been teaching dance and fitness for 36 years with students ranging from toddlers to grandmothers – and even great-grandmothers at age 92.

"Movement and music has always been a love and passion of mine," she said. Prior to realizing her dream of dance and passing it along to others, she graduated from Syracuse University with a dual degree from the School of Education and the School of Speech & Dramatic Arts. She got her graduate degree at the University of Virginia's School of Speech & Language Pathology (now known as U.Va.'s Curry School of Education).

In 1972 she started her career in radio. Then in 1974 she became one of the first female television news directors and anchors in the United States, enjoying positions as anchor, producer and reporter at three NBC-affiliated television stations in Charlottesville. During this time she became involved in volunteering and fundraising for various charities and non-profits. Giving back to the community has been a ritual in her life and many organizations, including the fited from Husted's diligence and enthusiasm for causes she believes in.

> She often finds a way to combine her love of dance and raising money for worthy causes, like she did in 1973 when she held a 48-hour dance marathon for multiple sclerosis. In 2000 she made a Guinness World Record for tap dancing the longest, but in 2003 she broke her own record by tapping two-thirds of a mile and raising \$20,000 for Habitat for Humanity.

Now, she wants to raise money for a

program to help those with Parkinson's Disease enjoy music and movement as much as she does. The program is known as The Dance for PD. Founded in 2001, it offers specialized dance classes to people with Parkinson's Disease, their families, friends and care partners, with ongoing classes now in more than 100 communities and 20 countries around the world.

"Parkinson's is a progressive neurodegenerative movement disorder. Classes empower people with Parkinson's to safely explore movement and music in ways that are stimulating, creative and joyful," said Husted. "Students learn to enhance their aesthetic awareness and grace while addressing such PD-specific concerns as balance, flexibility, coordination, gait and depression."

Husted's interest in the Dance for PD program began when a couple – the husband had Parkinson's –contacted her to teach them how to tango because they had read that dance helps people with Parkinson's. After that Husted began researching while teaching the couple to tango.

"Reaching further back in my history, I think the inspirational seed for my getting involved with something like this germinated over 30 years ago, while my wonderful father-in-law, Harold Bell Wright, was suffering from and then died





intersection by the Crescent Inn. Come by and learn about the local Scout troops. Watch skills demonstrations and enjoy some food, too! Free and open to youth in the community. See you there! Even though Cunningham Elementary is now The Light Academy, it's still the community's school.

Joyce Parr, principal and founder of the academy, said she feels blessed to have the building and grounds. She shows it by letting local teams practice on the baseball field and neighbors park buses and RVs in the parking lot.

Everywhere she goes people tell Parr their memories of attending, teaching at or helping build the low-slung brick building off Route 6.

They thank her for keeping it alive.

To thank the community, Parr is holding a Cunningham Elementary Homecoming at the Light Academy Oct.

#### 14 from 3-5 p.m.

There will be a ribbon-cutting, door prizes, refreshments, tours of the school and an old-fashioned cake walk.

"I want former Cunningham Elementary students, teachers and staff to come with their memories and mementos and see how we're using the building," Parr said.

Parr and her staff teach 50 students

from prekindergarten to 12<sup>th</sup> grade.

When The Light Academy opened in 2014 there were 17 students. Parr rented a building off of Slice Road near Lake Monticello.

The year before, the Fluvanna County School Board voted to close Cunningham and Columbia Elementary Schools for budget reasons. The county took over management of the properties and tried

to sell them, to no avail.

In June 2017 the county lowered the asking price and Parr got the building for \$118,750, she said.

"Most important is we have grass to play on. There is room to run. I love the basketball court and the ballfield for the students to play kickball on," Parr said.

On a recent visit, Parr told many "God stories" in which she saw God's hand in providing needed furniture and equipment.

Like the copier for \$25 that had an error message when she first bought it. Parr called the company to fix it and they asked her to tell them the error code it was showing.

"I went to turn it on and the error code was gone," she said, laughing. "I guess jostling it in the move might have reset it."

Of course another copier she bought worked when she picked it up but didn't when she got it back to the school.

But Parr prefers focusing on her blessings.

Like the lockers lining the halls.

The students needed a place to put their belongings between classes and the lockers that had been there were long gone.

"I was following a place in Richmond selling lockers on an auction site," Parr said. "I put in a bid and watched it for a while. A few days later I checked on it and someone had outbid me. When I got home and tried to start my computer to up my bid, my computer wouldn't work."

The other bidder got the lockers, then put them back up for sale on the same site for quite a bit more money, she said. "I was so upset. I said, 'God, you know we needed those lockers. This guy just wanted them to make money."

But Parr shrugged her shoulders and said she finally let it go.

Shortly after, Parr went to the University of Virginia to check out some of their equipment for sale. She told them she was looking for white boards and lockers.

The man helping her pointed to some workers who were taking down big metal lockers.

"He said, 'Would those do? You can have them. Since they're here now taking them down, they can bring them to your school and set them up, too.'

Parr said she couldn't believe it.

She got more, bigger, nicer lockers for free with free delivery and installation.

Like a game show hostess, Parr showed off the blue lockers. "They're easier to open," she said. "You can clean under them and look! – some of them are double."

Parr said one day the man who used to be the custodian at Cunningham Elementary stopped by. He showed here which keys opened which doors, which was the master key and told her the importance of not buffing the floor that sloped down to the wing with the cafeteria.

"I've had so many people tell me they're happy this is a school again," Parr said. "I'm so grateful to the Lord for giving us this building we want to give back to the community. It's a place for people to have birthday parties or family reunions."

# Absentee voting procedures announced

Absentee voting for the Nov. 6 general election started Friday, Sept. 21. Qualified Virginia voters may vote absentee in-person at their local voter registration office or vote absentee by mail. To vote absentee, registered voters must meet one of the 20 eligibility requirements listed on the Virginia Absentee Ballot Application.

"Absentee voting is a great option for those who can't make it to the polls on Election Day," said Department of Elections Commissioner Christopher Piper. "Whether you vote absentee by mail or in-person, it is important that you exercise your right to vote."

Voters can request an absentee ballot online using the Department's secure online Citizen Portal at vote.virginia.gov.

Important dates to remember include:

• The deadline to register to vote for the November General Election is Oct. 15.

- The deadline to apply for a ballot by mail is Tuesday, Oct. 30 at 5 p.m.
- In-person absentee voting is available Monday through Friday during regular general registrar office hours, and on Saturday, Oct. 27 and Saturday, Nov. 3.
- The deadline to vote absentee inperson is Saturday, Nov. 3.
- The deadline for a general registrar to receive an absentee ballot by mail is Nov. 6 at 7 p.m.

Virginia law requires voters to present an acceptable photo ID when voting inperson. For a list of acceptable forms of photo identification, or to find out how to obtain a free Virginia Voter Photo ID Card, please visit vote.virginia.gov. Voters can also find information about the upcoming election and check their registration status on the site.

Office hours and locations for in-person absentee voting are available at vote. virginia.gov .

To request a ballot by mail, the Department of Elections advises applying as early as possible to account for any potential delays in mail delivery.

with Parkinson's," she said.

Husted explained that the program helps to develop flexibility, instills confidence, breaks isolation, and stimulates cognitive activity that connects the mind to the body. It focuses attention on the senses as tools in assisting with movement and balance.

"It also sparks creativity, reminding us that the essence of dance is joy," she said. "I personally know that music and movement is powerful, healing, joyful medicine for the body, mind, heart and spirit. I tell people all the time that dancing saved my life." When her 17-year-old son, Timo, was killed in an October 2000 car accident, she learned what the strength of music and dance could do in her life."I believe if I hadn't had the healing empowerment of music and movement and such wonderful students. I shudder to think what might have become of me," she said. "It's so true that [music and dance helps] to heal a broken heart."

Her Dance for Parkinson's program, which begins Oct. 24, will include all ages, including those with early-onset Parkinson's.

The most important accomplishment of the program is that it provides a less clinical experience and is instead more creative. "Participants are thought of and referred to as dancers, not patients. PD is

not discussed; dance is," she said.


This has led Husted to have another fundraiser: Coy Roy's Paintings for Parkinson's. Coy Roy was a long-time student and personal training client of Angell's who died in 2008 with Parkinson's. To raise money for her program, Husted is auctioning off 40 of Roy's paintings, donated by her husband Rob.

Roy was also a long-time member of the Fluvanna Art Association (FAA), and Husted recognized Roy's fellow FAA member, Peter Almonte, who recently passed away from Parkinson's. It is because of these people, along with her father in-law, that she feels this program is necessary. And the couple that learned the tango will be back to take her class.

"One needs to help others be happier and healthier, and my plan is to keep doing that as long as I am able," said Husted. "I just entered my eighth decade of life and don't plan to stop any time soon sharing the love and joy of music and movement."

Coy Roy's Paintings for Parkinson's show and reception will be held Saturday, Oct. 13 from 3-5 pm at Angell's School of Dance located at 19 Centre Court near Lake Monticello. The proceeds help provide the free Dance for Parkinson's classes. There will be a pre-show and sale for Angell's current students during regular class times Oct. 2-12.











Monticello fumbled on its second play from scrimmage with the Flucos recovering at the Monticello 22 with 0:38 left in the half. On the Flucos' third snap, which was the final play of the half, Edmonds threw to running back Dametrez Christmas in the end zone. Christmas outfought two defenders to make the catch. Elijah Bullock added the extra point and the Flucos went to the locker room with a 7-3 halftime lead.

The Mustangs were not demoralized by the Fluco touchdown to end the first half. They came out strong, returning the second half kick-off all the way to the Fluco 14-yard line, and scoring three plays later. The extra point was good and the Mustangs were on top 10-7.

The rest of the third quarter was a story of turnovers. First the Flucos turned the ball over on an intercepted halfback pass. Monticello gave the ball back on a fumble and the Flucos returned the compliment with a fumble of their own.

Early in the fourth quarter senior Fluco running back Nathan Smith had a nice run up the middle and the Mustangs were assessed a face mask penalty. As a result, the Flucos had the ball at the Monticello 13-yard line. Edmonds rolled right and found Smith open in the end zone for the Flucos' second touchdown. Bullock again converted on the PAT and the Flucos were back in the lead at 14-10.

The Flucos kicked away from Monticello's dangerous kick returner, and Monticello started at its own 37. The Monticello quarterback dropped back and threw to the right sideline. Harris read the play perfectly and intercepted at full speed. With his speed, there was no chance that any of the Mustangs would stop him before he reached the end zone. The Flucos added a two point conversion and led 22-10, with 11:15 left in the game.

Monticello and Fluvanna traded turnovers on fumbles. Monticello then put together a sustained 75-yard drive for a touchdown. However, the drive ate up a lot of clock time and there was only 3:57 left in the game.

Naturally Monticello tried an onside kick, but it failed as three Flucos covered the ball. The Flucos only need a couple of first downs to run out the clock. But first downs are often hard to come by in these circumstances.

Two off-tackle power runs by Christmas gained 12 and a first down. Unfortunately, the next series did not start well. A one-yard loss, a five-yard penalty and a loss on a fumble that was recovered by Fluco center William Custer left the Flucos with 20 yards to go. The Fluco brain trust then made a brilliant call: a counter play to Harris. The play looks like the power off-tackle run that Christmas had been running successfully. Naturally the Monticello defense, which was determined to get the ball back, flowed toward Christmas. At the last second, Edmonds handed off to Harris going in the opposite direction. The result was a 30-yard gain, and a game-ending first down.

After the game, Coach Mike Morris noted that the counter play was not one that the team had practiced very much, making it an even more daring call.

Morris noted after the game that success breeds confidence and that he is pleased to see his players becoming more and more confident in what the team is doing.

The Flucos play next at Orange County on Sept. 28. On Oct. 5 and Oct. 12 they will host Charlottesville and Powhatan respectively. On Oct.17 they will be at Albemarle High.
