Along for the Ride – A book on family

ne of the first things students learn when studying history is the importance of oral history. Before humans learned to write and put words on paper, everything anyone learned came from stories and tales told by the elders in their tribe or family. That premise – of the stories and events in family's lives – is what drove Elizabeth "Betsy" Samuels to write her first book; *Along for the Ride – Scenes Through a Moving Window.* Just published, Samuels' book encapsulates not only her family's history but also her love for her animals – especially the one and only, Jack Beagle. Samuels, who is known for her

purchased in 1967 and laying gracefully along the James River, has drawn friends and family to annual events over the years. And, where there's family, there are stories. "We've always passed on family tales," said Samuels. "It's a funny family and we've had a good time together. I realized that the stories were like a jig-saw puzzle that needed to be pieced together."

When she started sharing some of the family memories on Facebook, many of her followers suggested that she write a book. "Once I realized that it might be something that I could do something with – I started writing it down," she said. "I knew that this was important for the family and especially for the nephews, nieces and grandchildren."

So write she did. When she realized that she had over 40,000 words she decided that "it was ready to go." Working through Archway Publishing's self-publishing department, she put together a book that is now available for readers. And, to add to the spirit of the book, Samuels has produced her own pencil drawings to the stories. "I've been drawing a lot longer than I've been writing," she said. It certainly adds to the charm of the tales. The book is divided into three parts: Friends and Relations, Housekeeping 101, and Adventures with Other-Legged Folks.

Samuels and her siblings grew up in Virginia Beach area during the 1940\s – before it became a tourist mecca. The family would live in Norfolk during the school year and then spend the sum-mer in Virginia Beach with the grandparents and surrounding family members. Thus, along with the humorous stories, readers can get a sense of what Virginia Beach use to be like before it became a city. In many ways, her stories are a bit of a history lesson of the area. Her mother, who was a single parent and a teacher, was a determined woman who, with the help of her family, provided her children with love and emotional enrichment, often during some hard, economic times. Samuels stories of her childhood and the siblings, cousins, aunts, uncles and other members of her "talented and zany family" provides readers with a collec-tion of stories that are a delight to read.

And, then there's Jack Beagle. Honestly, if you're a dog (especially beagle) lover you'll soon decide that Jack could likely warrant a complete book of his own. Much loved by his owner and, from what you will soon derive, the entire neighborhood, Samuels provides endless fodder on the hound and his life on the farm and in the surrounding properties. Along with Jack, there are stories in the Part Three of her book, about The Hawk of Foxfire (who the family says is her late husband, Robert, keeping an eye on the place), special cats (The Colonel, Sarge,

and Jill), and other distinctive dogs who have come and gone, including Snappy and Gingersnap.

But Jack Beagle reigns and has his own section in the book to let you in on his rambling travels. In fact, Jack has developed such a reputation as being on the move that Samuels now subscribes to Whistle, a software/satellite program that helps her locate him if he's been gone too long. And, to keep things in perspective, Jack has one particular chapter where he attends church (by accident – read about it to find out), perhaps to make amends as his roaming behavior.

It's a good read and comes highly recommended. Along with providing you with some enlightening tales and stories it may also inspire you to start writing down your family's stories and antics. Or, if you don't feel that you

Mother Marie Stanton: At 100, a beacon of light

hen you walk into Mother Stanton's quaint home on a dead-end road in Stanton Town, one of the first things you see is a wood stove. Resting for the summer, it represents a long-ago era when such stoves produced incredible tasting food while heating the home. For Mother Stanton, that era still exists, as she refuses to give it up.

Known as "Mother Stanton" to all in her community, Edith Marie Stanton can do anything she wants because she recently turned 100. She's the boss. No argument.

Born in the Gravel Hill area in 1918, Mother Stanton lives in the same house she and her husband built in 1939. Slim and petite, her head covered in a colorful scarf, and with long elegant hands, Mother Stanton reigns with dignity and grace. And at 100, don't assume she's feeble and forgetful. She has her full faculties, washes and irons her clothes, goes to church every Sunday, and is loved and revered by all in her community.

One of four children born to Martha Francis Lee and John Alger Scruggs, Stanton can share many years of memories. Stanton would walk to school with her siblings and remembers, vividly, her first book -- Baby Ray. Attending what was known as the Jones School until the 6th grade, Stanton began working in the fields for differ-

ent farmers in the area. "I got paid 50 cents a day," she said. "Twenty-five cents if it was a half day." A true beauty, Stanton married Joseph Stanton at the age of 22. "I only wanted one man," she said. "We went to Buckingham Courthouse to get married." After the wedding, they came to Stanton Town where she has been liv-ing ever since. The couple had three children, all at home. No hospital for this lady

ing ever since. The couple had three children, all at home. No hospital for this lady
she's only been in once in her life and the only health issue that bothers her is her legs and a bit of arthritis. "My legs hurt sometimes," she said.
Longevity is not that common in Mother Stanton's family. "My father ran a saw mill and was killed in an accident when he was young," said Stanton. "My mother lived to be 45 and died of a ruptured appendix." And, her husband, who worked at the slate quarry, died at the kitchen table of a massive heart attack 13 years ago. During her adult life, Mother Stanton worked hard. "We raised chickens and hogs," she said. "We also had a milk cow and a big garden."
What has lead Mother Stanton throughout her life is her faith. When asked how she managed to live so long, she immediately responded, "The good Lord. I got my religion when I was 11 years old and I've been 'shouting' ever since. When I say I got religion, I don't mean being religious but filled by the Holy Spirit." A lifelong member of Baptist Union Baptist Church, Mother Stanton has attended every Sunday, sitting in the exact same place - third seat from the front. And, over the many years she has become known as the hat lady for her Sunday apparel, which always includes a spectacular hat. always includes a spectacular hat.

To this day, she has never driven a car. "I ain't a going person," she said. "Been like that all my life." When run-ning her home, Mother Stanton would venture to Dillwyn to Poole's, Davis Store, and Fred William's grocery store. Shore, and Fred Winiam's grocery store. She still has her first and only dryer bought from Poole's. Now, she's con-tent to be at home and let her family and neighbors bring her whatever she prode. That's doesn't mean she's idle needs. That's doesn't mean she's idle. 'As long as I'm on my feet I'm going to do something," she said. That includes fixing dinner, washing the dishes, and cleaning, and staying up until 11:00 p.m. after reading a bit, watching Wheel of Fortune and hopefully some

wheel of Fortune and hopefully some preaching on TV. She's hesitant to offer advice to young people. "If you try to tell people something they'll say I didn't ask you anything. I don't want to hear it," she said. "I try to treat everybody right. I don't care how good you treat some people they just don't want to hear it. I pray for them. Ask God to help them. I don't have anything against anybody. Thank God for that. I see a lot of people sit down and talk about each other. If

I've got something to say about you, I'll tell you. We be sitting around talking. I don't want to hear about what hap-pened the other night. If I've got some-thing to say about you, I'll tell you."

Which brings us back to that wood stove. Seems that Mother Stanton won't let it be removed from the house. "I love it in the winter time," she said. She does have an electric stove but noted its limitations. "When you come in the stove's hot, but you're cold. Can't say that about a wood stove." She also loves chicken wings and salted lake herring, chocolate cake and sweet potato pie.

Along with many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, Mother Stanton is cared for by her son, her neighbors, and her church family. Many consider her a beacon of light and revere her. In June her church family, friends, and relatives celebrated her 100th birthday at Baptist First Baptist. People travelled from all over the country to celebrate her longevity. Hymns were sung and senators and other dignitaries sent her letters of congratulations. It was indeed a great event for a great lady.

Raising Rex Rabbits

She has had multiple best of variety wins in each state and had a variety wins in each state and had a best of opposite breed and 2 best of best of opposite breed and 2 best of breed wins as well, all showing in the open classes! Every year the National Rex rabbit club keeps a points tally for all members as of June 1 Elly is #1 in youth points for Californian and Sable varieties and #2 in Seal.

Elly started showing rabbits in 4H this year. The show requirements are different for 4-H than for the ARBA shows; they are a lot more hands on in

Reconstruction in Buckingham County

In early 1867, Lieut. Col. John W. Jordan of the Freedman's Bureau recommended a dozen men fit for leadership in Buckingham County's new Reconstruction-era government. They represented forward-thinking men in the white and newly freed African-American communities. The first name on Jordan's list was Thomas H. Garnett of Curdsville. In 1877, he served the county as coroner.

According to genealogist Harry S. Holman: "Thomas Henry Garnett lived near "Garnett's Chapel," on Hooper's Mountain. The property adjoined my Grandmother Ellie Hooper Holman's old home where the Hoopers lived since colonial times. This Thomas H. Garnett was born in 1819 and married Ann Elizabeth Eldridge, dughter of Thomas Kidder Eldridge and Mary Ayres Eldridge, the daughter of Rev. John Ayres of "Edgehill," Buckingham County."

Holman, believes that Garnett died on September 7, 1906, at the advanced age of eighty-eight. "At that time he was a member of Smyrna Methodist Church and was buried on the western slope of Willis Mountain. It was said of him that he was one of the best known and beloved citizens of the county.

The second man on Jordon's list was Thomas Leitch of New Canton, the son of Irish immigrant and wealthy planter, William Leitch. Educated at the University of Virginia, Thomas M. Leitch (1826-1886) was a Lieutenant in the 18th Regiment, Virginia Infantry, making him an odd candidate for one who, according to Jordan was "originally opposed to the secession movement and those among them who have in any way given encouragement to the Rebel Cause did it reluctantly and because they were compelled to do it to protect themselves & property." The fami-ly lived at Mt. Ida, near New Canton. In 1880, Thomas Leitch was still living in Buckingham County with his wife, Martha, and nine children.

Harry Holman offered these details about Leitch's life and family: "Thomas Maurice Leitch (1826-1886) was the son of William and Mary Ann Langhorne Leitch. His second wife was Martha G. Spencer (1839-1892), the daughter of Nathan and Martha Meredith Spencer of Buckingham and granddaughter of Judith Ayres Spencer–eldest child of Col. Nathan Ayres (d. 1822). Among the Leitch children uwere Mildred Fontaine Leitch who married John Marta Leitch at "Leavet were Mildred Fontaine Leitch, who married John Ayres (d. 1622). Altiong the Leitch children Hill," on James River across from Columbia. Her brother was a distinguished Methodist missionary (educated at Randolph-Macon and Vanderbilt) and principal of a high school in China. He died young—no descendants." Lieutenant Jordan next named was J. B. Finklin of New Canton. In 1868, Ficklin

served the county as a Superintendent for District No. 5 and, in August of 1879, a brief article in Richmond's *Daily Dispatch* mentioned him as a canvasser in the Sixth Congressional District, specifically the Buckingham Senatorial District. The next name on Jordan's list is very-well known in, and far beyond, Buckingham Senatorial District.

Buckingham County. Alexander J. Bondurant was the son of Thomas Moseley Bondurant, publisher of Richmond's Whig. By 1870, he had removed to Nelson County, thus, did not remain active in politics in Buckingham. Again, his service for

the Confederate States of America, would seem to make him a peculiar selection. In 1868, Alexander J. Bondurant served the county as a Superintendent for District No. 2. In March of 1910, his brief obituary was printed in Lynchburg, Virginia. It reads as follows:

A. J. Bondurant

A. J. Bondurant Lynchburg, Va., March 7. — Alexander J. Bondurant, of Buckingham County, Virginia, aged seventy-four, died here today of appendicitis. He served in the civil war in Malone's brigade, and from 1896 to 1901 was a tobacco expert in Victoria, Australia. Since that time he had been professor of agriculture at the Alabama Polytechnic Institute. Last year he celebrated his golden wedding, and his wife survives. Among the surviving children are A. L. Bondurant, professor of Latin at Mississippi University, and G. P. Bondurant, an attorney-at-law at Birmingham, Ala.
