



Miles runs for Maysville Supervisor

Thomas Jordan Miles III, who has served as a leader in numerous community and civic groups for many years in Buckingham County and the region, is announcing his candidacy for District Four (Maysville) Supervisor on the Buckingham County Board of Supervisors, according to a press release.

The election is Nov. 5.

Miles' campaign motto is "proven

leadership you can trust."

His priorities include maintaining fiscal responsibility to preserve low tax rates, supporting public education, enhancing constituent communication, and promoting economic development while supporting existing small business expansion.

Miles, who lives on U.S. Route 60 in the Court House Village, is a native of Buckingham County, and was raised in Glenmore, where he attends church and serves as a Eucharstic Minister and Senior Warden at Emmanuel Episcopal

Church.

Miles is involved in many activities and organizations in Buckingham County. He is director of nutrition and transportation at Piedmont Senior Resources Area Agency on Aging, a member of the Buckingham Lions Club, chairman of the Commonwealth Regional Council's Comprehensive Economic Development Committee, a member of the board of directors for the Buckingham Village Preservation Group, and was founder and director of Glenmore Day.

Miles formerly served as managing editor and reporter for *The Farmville Herald* and news reporter and announcer for *WFLO Radio* in Farmville.

"I'm blessed to say that my family has lived in Buckingham County for more than 250 years. I was raised in a log cabin my parents built in Glenmore, and I come from a long line of blacksmiths, farmers, merchants, business people and public servants," Miles said in a press release. "My heart is in this community. I am a proud graduate of Buckingham County Public Schools, where I received a great education that prepared me for Longwood University."

Miles said faith, trust and hard work

Miles said faith, trust and hard work are principles which have been instilled in him by his family, notably by his late grandparents, L.L. "Dick" Miles and Hazel Miles, who operated a general store for 40 years in Glenmore.

"They, along with my father and mother, taught me that these three principles can enable you do just about anything you want — and now I want to represent the good people of the Maysville District on the Board of Supervisors."

"Just as my grandfather was, I am a moderate Democrat," Miles said. "Like him, I stand for principled leadership, integrity, and faith in my fellow man and woman. Though being a moderate Democrat who is fiscally conservative may be my heritage, it does not define



Slate River Ramblings

Yeck has been fascinated Buckingham County for over twenty years. Peter Francisco

Those of us connected to Buckingham County never tire of reading (and writing) about our local hero, Peter Francisco. Looking back over the decades, while his now mythologized biography changes in detail and emphasis, he remains ours

In April of 1958, Charlottesville's Daily Progress ran an article recounting the story of the American Revolutionary hero Peter Francisco. Unsigned, it was sent to the newspaper from Ransons, Buckingham County and offers a glimpse of the Francisco legend as it was preserved into the mid-twentieth century. The title, "Unusual History Remains Behind Peter Francisco," prepared the reader for the hero's mysterious beginnings. The article opened: "There is an old home near the Buckingham-Cumberland County line which is fast returning to dust. It was once the home of Peter Francisco, a giant of a man who served as a Revolutionary war soldier and friend of Gen. George Washington and the patriot Lafayette.

The reader was informed about a tall, granite monument in Greensboro, North Carolina which marks the spot where Peter Francisco, "a giant of incredible strength," killed eleven British soldiers, single-handedly. His final resting place, after many adventures, is in the Shockoe Hill Cemetery in Richmond, Virginia.

The article recounts the oft-repeated tale of the orphan Francisco crossing the Atlantic Ocean to be put ashore at City Point, Virginia. The small boy, aged five or six, could not tell the Virginians much about his life somewhere across the sea. According to the article, he had "flashes of memory" of a "splendid home and kind parents." He even recalled a little sister.

Soon, the boy was discovered by Judge Anthony Winston of "Hunting Towers" (Buckingham County). The judge took Peter home with him, reared and educated him, and did not prevent him at the age of sixteen from volunteering in America's fight for freedom.

According to the article, among his friends was Gen. Nathanael Greene, who had a "razor case" made especially for Francisco. In 1958, it was on display in the Hall of History in Raleigh, North Carolina. Gen. George Washington had a five-foot sword made for the giant Francisco, which became the property of the Virginia Historical

Francisco's life following the Revolution was marked with sadness and, according to the unidentified author, his life was often "shrouded by loneliness." His first wife died. Later, he found "comfort and companionship" in a second marriage, living at one of the several plantations in Buckingham County named Locust Grove. The legend continues that this humble house attracted such men as Chief Justice Marshall and Henry Clay, who apparently consulted Francisco on important matters of the day.

Eventually, Peter Francisco moved to Richmond. According to the article, he helped save lives in the 1811 theater fire in Richmond. The article's unnamed author vividly recounts the scene, "When he saw people being crushed by the panic and others being burned, he returned to the blazing building and carried many back to safety. One lady whom he rescued testified that Francisco had saved 30 people to her positive knowledge."

Puzzling historians, Francisco, in his humility, requested that his name be omitted from the list of rescue workers . . . a convenient detail for those who wish to place Peter Francisco and his good deeds in many settings.

Late in life, he became the Sergeant-at-Arms in the Virginia legislature, dying on Sunday, January 16, 1831. The House of Delegates adjourned for the day in respect for the great man.



That event and the Cuban Missile Crisis led to a commercial, economic and financial embargo on the country that began in 1962 and continues as of today.

Guevara, born in Argentina and trained as a physician, joined Castro and the Cuban revoluntary group to overthrow Bastisa's corrupt government in 1959. Serving as a major figure in the revolution, Guevara served in Castro's government but eventually went to Bolivia, where he was killed by their military, with U.S. backing. Guevara's face is the true symbol of the Revolution as Fidel Castro, who died in 2016, decreed that no memorial be built in his honor nor any building or school be named after him.
