





Playing Beautiful Music Again

he haunting strains of Sir Elton John's "Your Song" can be heard from outside the door leading to Comer Piano Studio in a back room of the historic Mineral Baptist Church building adjacent to the newer church. Steve Comer's fingers improvised on the haunting melody as they covered the length of the keyboard.

The playing was all the more impressive because in 2012 Comer, his wife and two of his children, were badly burned when a propane tank in their recreational vehicle exploded while they were camping in Williamsburg during the Memorial Day holiday.

Comer said all four of them suffered second-and third-degree burns to their extremities. However, the musician's hands, as well as other parts of his body, needed extensive skin grafts. While Comer was unconscious for four weeks at the VCU burn unit, his father and wife made a decision. The skin for the grafts for his hands would be thicker than that used on other parts of his body so that it would be more flexible for playing the piano again. By the time he was conscious, "I had recovered to a great extent," he said. "I was surprised that I would be able to play," but he wasn't sure how well. "Thank the Lord," he added. "I regained full strength in my hands, with the full flexibility I needed.'

He was able to return to Elk Creek Church, where he served as the music director, serving as both accompanist and choir director. Then, when a job as accompanist opened up at Mineral Baptist Church, he was hired. For a while he taught piano in the parish hall, but then the church offered to give him studio space in the adjacent historic building.

In June 2018, Comer Piano Studio opened, the only such studio in Mineral or Louisa even though there are other piano teachers in the area. Comer said in November that he has 13 students, about half are adults and the other half, youngsters. Some have had piano lessons in the past, and others are just beginning. One of his most recent students is his son, Christopher, a senior at Louisa High School.

In June 2018, with extensive visible scars on their arms and hands, father and son both participated in a piano master class at the Louisa Arts Center. Classical pianist Lynne Mackey invited pianists to play for her on stage in front of a small audience, and then she offered suggestions for improvement. It would be a daunting experience even for good players. Comer dazzled both





Play Ball!

icky Purcell is most grateful. He is surrounded by Brenda, his wife, three daughters, and two grandchildren. He also considers himself blessed by the numerous families and friends he has met throughout his life and travels. Also at the top of his list are the hundreds, if not thousands, of young men he has had the opportunity to work with. Equally as grateful are the youth and their families who have been fortunate enough to know the kind, caring coach whose knowledge of baseball is only out weighed by his patience and understanding.





The plaque says it all!

But last year's Little League 8 and 9-year-old All-Star team gave Purcell a unique experience. It was his first time coaching a family member, grandson Jonah Brown. His three daughters, Beth (Brown), Penny and Tammy, had chosen cross country and track! Granddaughter Jordan Atwell-Purcell has selected volleyball, softball and horses!

"I tried to treat all my kids equally, but perhaps I tended to lean on Jonah a little harder," he said, with Jonah remembering, "Papa got on me once for not coming in to catch a ball in left field. He keeps telling me I need to work on sliding and catching."

Still, Purcell's memories go back much further. Along with over six decades of coaching experience, Purcell had numerous years participating in the sport.

"I had played in elementary school and we competed against several other Louisa schools," he said. "I played outfield and was not a starter. Johnny Hatter and I managed the high school baseball team in the late 1950s and early1960s. Norman Smith was the coach and I'd chase foul balls, but that was about it. Back then, players and managers drove their personal cars to away games."

Purcell did play guard on the IV and varsity Lions basketball teams. But coaching was his passion and it began with what he termed a "pony league."

"I started coaching as soon as I got my driver's license at 15 and while I was still a sophomore in high school," he said. "I was coaching kids almost as old as I was.

Other teams were from Madison, Greene and Orange, and I literally went around and picked up kids to have enough players for away games."

After graduation, Purcell enrolled at the University of Kentucky with plans to teach history and coach. Not content with college life, Purcell returned to the county to work with his father Dick, in the family's lumber and land business.

Purcell did not give up his love for the sport. The young adult coached, managed and pitched for the Foxes, a softball team that played where the Louisa Major



League field is today. Nelson and Jimmy Talley, Lindsey Woolfolk and George Gordon were among his teammates. Conditions were much different.

'The only fence was beside the fairgrounds and that was covered with honeysuckle. So most of the outfield was wide open and home runs were hard to come by," he said. "Duck Seay was about the only one to put a ball over that left field

Fifty Years of Coaching Little League

Little League came to Louisa in 1965, and Joe Polis convinced Purcell to coach the Dodgers the following year. Main competition was between two Louisa teams and two Gordonsville ones. Purcell was either at a practice or coaching at least six

times a week. Scheduled games sometimes presented a problem.

"I loved it! Occasionally, I'd have a conflict between a softball game and a Little League game, so I'd get Marion Leake, to fill in for me, since his grandson was on the team," he said. "Charlie Chiles took over managing the softball team."

During those years, Purcell admits to one coaching misjudgment. He agreed to

coach a women's softball team mostly composed of wives and girlfriends of the Foxes. He termed that as "a very different experience." His resume also includes two years of coaching Babe Ruth League (1983 and 1984) and a state championship. That he doesn't regret!

In the '70s, Louisa formed its own Little League of four teams. Purcell coached one. Successes follow successes, and over the past 50 years, Purcell has coached All-Star teams in various age groups that have captured numerous district titles as well as four state championships – 1982, 1983, 1993 and 2017.

But, the coach modestly claims that the key to his success was the kids, and just as importantly, the group effort by the men who coached with him, especially Jeff Luck, who Purcell claims has helped him "almost forever." He also has fond memories of coaching with Gary Clark and Doug Straley.

"I love coaching All-Stars. You get to compete against teams from other places, and you have the best, most dedicated kids," he said with Brenda adding, "Sports can be so important in a child's life, and the girls and I have had the opportunity to travel and meet so many good people.'

Wins and Losses

Wins were always sweet. A darkness shortened game gave one All-Star team a lucky victory, as the game reverted to its lead in the previous inning. On another

occasion, a tag up on a deep fly ball led to state championship qualifying. Losses

hang in Purcell's memory, as well. Against Tuckahoe National in 1968, his All-Star team lost 18 to 0. The Louisa players had no hits and only one on base - a walk. "Our only consolation was that Tuckahoe was so good, that it played for the world championship, but was beaten by Japan," he said.

The coach admitted that occasionally after a loss that should have been a win, coming home was "hard on his family," and, sometimes, he just walked the railroad line through town to calm down. Bronda just smiled at that comment line through town to calm down. Brenda just smiled at that comment.

Purcell was not without his own mentors, especially Cecil Luck. The memory of a sound defeat against a Mechanicsville team and the prayer and words that Luck said to the boys after that game resonates in Purcell's recollections.

"He truly knew baseball and I only hope to live up to his style of treating his players," said Purcell. "He was equally generous. He bought a set of uniforms for one team of older boys I was coaching. He'd help me even after he stopped coaching

Cancer treatments kept Purcell out of the dugout in the spring of 2017, so Dino Goodman, Andy Wade and Jeff Luck handled his team with Purcell sitting next to the dugout, keeping score and giving advice. It also gave him the options to leave a practice if he wasn't feeling well or to stay home, if necessary. That summer, Purcell helped coach the 11-year-old All-Star team to state honors.

"When we went to the southeast regionals in North Carolina, I walked around that outfield one morning and couldn't believe how fortunate I was to be there and have a team in the final four," he said.

Always in the back of his mind is Purcell's youthful promise.

'In my 20s, I made a commitment to the Lord and myself to coach. Seeing the kids mature, start families and take part in the community is the real reward," he said. "I've even coached three generations of several families.

But the coach realizes that he has gained so much from the sport.

"When something at work or otherwise was stressing me, I knew when I got out on that ball field in the evening, those worries vanished, as I concentrated on the game or practice," he said. "I am so lucky to have unbelievably talented people and dedicated kids to work with."

As soon as winter cold vanishes and weather get warmer, Purcell eagerly awaits tryouts and that opening day cry of, "Play Ball!" $^{\circ}$

Mackey and listeners with a very difficult Chopin waltz, and Christopher did very well with a jazz piece with a detective theme. The melody captured the idea of a sleuth creeping around to solve a crime. The challenging master class didn't faze either the father or his teen-age son.

"He doesn't get rattled," said Comer.

While on stage, Christopher told Mackey that his father was not his teacher. He was teaching himself.

Comer said that he had given Christopher lessons for two or three years, "but then he had lost interest for a while." After the master class, Christopher wanted to take piano lessons again. In addition to his music, Christopher is also an excellent student at Louisa High School. He was recently honored for having top SAT scores, making him eligible for a National Merit Scholarship. Christopher is applying to college and wants to study physics.

Comer's teaching schedule fits into his other work, which is preparing income tax forms dur-

ing tax season. Despite his musical talents, he didn't take music classes in college. Instead he was a business major at George Mason University in Fairfax. He took piano lessons as a child, and by the time he was 17, he was the official accompanist for Providence Baptist Church in Vienna, Va. He realized he could "make more money with employment in finance, and then in computer programming. When his wife, Christina, who worked for the Defense Department, was transferred to Charlottesville, the family moved in 2009 to Louisa County. He continued both his tax work and music. In 2015 "I seriously started teaching," he said.

One of Comers' daughters, Michelle, is in her second year at Virginia Tech studying computer science. The couple's oldest daughter, Lilah, who wasn't with them during the camping trip, is married and the mother of their only grandchild, Angelina, 2, who is already showing an interest in the piano.

It isn't a coincidence that "Your Song" is one of Comer's favorites. A phrase from the lyrics proclaims "how wonderful life is. . . . " The Comer family, with support of the community after the devastating fire, knows how precious and wonderful life is. "We are blessed," said Comer.



Katy Pistole's Horse Ministry

cooter's chestnut coat glistened in the morning sun as he stood, without a bridle or any restraint and watched Katy Pistole. Scooter moved in any direction Pistole indicated, including spinning, trotting around her a number of times, and then climbing on a wooden box in the center of the ring on the Louisa farm where the horses are boarded.

Their communication and bond are especially remarkable given his background. Pistole rescued him more than 17 years ago when he was three and had been beaten by his owner who didn't understand horses. "Scooter had a lot of fear when I bought him," she said. Pistole only uses a relationship building method of communication called Natural Horsemanship and the results are amazing to watch.

This relationship with Scooter and her other horses is shared through Pistole's ministry called Beautiful Brokenness, which resonates with the many people she has counseled through the years. She demonstrated the trusting relationship with Scooter and said there is so much trust between them that they could walk into the woods together like friends without him needing a halter.

Pistole's horses come when she calls their name, not for a reward, such as a carrot, but to just be with her. It's a bond based on personal interaction.

She shares her faith and bond with horses in her eight books. She wrote her first book at age four and has had six published for kids since 2003 in the Sonrise Farm Series. Her most recent book is "Jubilee: A Love Story," for an older audience.

She serves as the executive director of Beautiful Brokenness, a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit, and provides counseling and Bible study classes online and in person. She describes Beautiful Brokenness as "a horse-themed discipleship ministry that helps God's children see who and whose they are."

Her experiences with horses provide the metaphors for healing and developing a personal relationship with God,

she said.

"Jesus has allowed horses to help me understand His amazing love and passion for me and all His kids. He has used horses to help me experience the heart of The Shepherd." Pistole said.

Her father, Sam Thomsen was named the first American Ambassador to the Marshall Islands from 1987-90. In his career working for the State Department he and the family had lived overseas for most of Pistole's life. She was born in Alexandria, but the family moved to Vietnam in 1963 when she was six weeks old but evacuated in 1965 when the violence escalated. Her father stayed behind and was in the American Embassy in Saigon when it was blown up during an attack. He was initially feared dead, but fortunately survived.

She said she had always loved horses.

With occasional stays in the United States, the family then lived in Laos, then Botswana and Nigeria. When Pistole was 12 and in Botswana, she received her first horse, Black Jack. She had also been part of a church-going family without understanding God's desire for relationship. That changed when Black Jack came down with a fatal disease. Her parents and their friends offered to pray for the horse's recovery. When Pistole went to check on him the next day, he was fully cured. That was a life-altering event, she said, to have such a personal experience with God. "I knew then that there was a God. He was good, powerful and I've belonged to Him ever since," she said. "I started enjoying church," she said.

Beautiful Brokenness is the story or rescue, redemption and reconciliation for both animals and people. It's a story of working with both people and horses.






