Council to Revisit Comprehensive **Plan Vote**

t the September 17th meeting of the Town Council an agenda item called for a vote by that

body to accept or reject the version of the Comprehensive Plan that had been presented to Council by the town's Planning Commission. The

version presented represented almost a year's work by the Planning

One aspect of the Comprehensive Plan was the inclusion of the Van Clief Nature Area (VCNA) Master Plan. That part of the "Comp Plan" was reviewed by Councilman Dan Gritsko's commit-tee and presented with changes prior to

the call for the vote.

Mayor Nancy Gill called for a vote to accept the Van Clief Master Plan and it was approved. She then called for a vote on the Comprehensive Plan and that too was approved. Council has the authority to make amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and they did that. Unfortunately those changes had not been shared with either the Planning Commission or the public. This left the members of the Planning Commission

wondering what had just happened.

Informal discussion of the "what had just happened" moment by Planning Commission members led their chairman, Bill Hyson, to contact the town attorney, James Bowling for his thoughts and comments. thoughts and comments.

Mr. Bowling, after reviewing the situation, replied by saying, "my review has determined that the June 18th joint hearing and the September 17th meeting at which the Town Council and/or

Planning Commission considered amendments to the Comprehensive Plan were not properly advertised by providing a brief description of the amendments to be considered at these meetings, prior to any adoption of the amendments." Mr. Bowling recommended to the Town Council that "they re-advertise a public hearing for amendments to the Comprehensive Plan to be considered at a joint meeting of the Planning Commission and Town

At the regular meeting of the Planning Commission on October 1st, the events of the September 17th Council meeting and the town attorney's thoughts were discussed. Town Administrator Matt Lawless informed the Planning Commission of its options: resubmit the document it had originally submitted or accept the document with the changes Council had made. Since members of the Planning Commission had not had the opportunity to review those changes it was decided to review those at the November meeting of the Planning Commission and hold a public hearing in December after which a document would be presented to Council

Another significant topic that generated much discussion at the meeting

was the question of parking regulations for downtown. As parking has been a problem for some time in Scottsville the need to regulate it arises occasionally and this was one of those

Councilman Eddie Payne, who's Public Safety Committee has been discussing the topic for a while said that, "two problems are abandoned vehicles and the question of how to

enforce regulations with a small police department." Suggestions have ranged from two hour parking zones to parking meters. While Councilman Zack Bullock said he "couldn't support two hour parking because



of the problem of enforcement," Vice-Mayor Laura Mellusi was concerned about events that draw people to town that

would keep them here for more than two hours."

The Planning Commission also discussed this item
October 1st and decided to make informal inquiries with business owners and town residents regarding parking in Scottsville. Those findings will be presented to Council at a future date.

Some people may think that a small town government doesn't do a whole lot. Sit in on any public meeting and






Scottsville Baby Steps **Drop-in Playgroup**





Raising hope for the **Monarch Migration**

got my natural love of flowers from my moth-

got my natural love of flowers from my mother, however, I was never fond of caterpillars until I became interested in the butterfly garden. I am presently a member of the Buckingham/ Dillwyn Garden Club. That was when I started to research as much as I could about butterflies and especially Monarchs. It is more than just planting flowers, it is researching the correct flowers for the benefit of the butterflies, for both spring and fall.

Mother Nature can be brutal to the Monarch caterpillar, they have a long list of predators and a shortage of food supply. If Monarchs are going to stay off the "endangered species list" they need more to eat and we can help, but they only eat milkweed. They used to feast on milkweed in corn and wheat fields, but then the Herbicide Glyphosate was widely used on GMO crop fields, resulting in the lose of most of the milkweed. Now they rely on milkweed from other places.

Their life cycle is not only beautiful, but is mezmorizing! It is awesome to be able to witness the change from the egg to the 5 stages of the caterpillar. Now it's time to climb to a sheltered, safe spot in which to pupate. He makes a simple silk pad on the most unusal places in my enclosure. It uses a hook covered appendage called a "crewmaster" to attach it to this pad. The caterpillar hangs in a "I" position and starts to twist around until it sheds it's skin revealing a soft chrysalis. It takes about 1 hour to for the chrysalis to harden into a beautiful jade green, wearing a crown of gold pearls! In about 7 to 14 days a beautiful Monarch will emerge.

We can help future Monarchs by planting milkweed. There are many species that are native specific per State.

Resources or blogs are helpful before achieving a healthy success. My favorite Blog is Monarchbutterflygarden.net. This Blog is an awesome resource and guide to help with the challenges of raising healthy butterflies.

I collected my first caterpillars toward the end of August. I found 18 caterpillars on my milkweed competing for leaves with Aphids and another 28+ on milkweed found in other places. Caterpillars and eggs can be collected and raised from Spring and thru September and still be released for migration for Fall. Butterfly enclosures are readily available on line along with flower tubes for milkweed stems and flower towater trays are great for catching Caterpillar "frass" droppings. The most important thing I can pass on is to clean your enclosure frequently you will be shocked how much caterpillars can poop!! Not doing this could possibly endanger your cats in case you have some that are compromised with parasites or viruses.

So that means, good hand washing!!! When handeling all aspects of raising, especially

cially
Milkweed. remember, do your research before you jeopardize any caterpillers.
Raising these beautiful creatures and watching their amazing metamorphosis is addictive and enchanting. And for goodness sake do not start unless you have enough to feed them!!! You don't want to have a 911 caterpillar emergency!
We can help the fall migrating Monarchs heading south by planting flowers that bloom longer into late summer, early fall, like lantana, sedum, cone flower, mexican sunflowers etc. So think about planting a butterfly garden! Every backyard can become an oasis for Monarchs and other pollinators, even in cities, schools, youth and community groups. Engage in planting and protecting monarch habitat along roadsides, rights of way, and other public and private lands. 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
