from wearing out and being discarded. Twenty one years ago most of the athletic activities for youth were located twenty miles to the north. A forty mile round trip plus associated costs of participation was a deterrent for many working families with children. And there wasn't much to do around Scottsville other that Little League baseball, which was good, and skateboarding on the public sidewalks, which was not.

Gail Bodine and Lynn Spangler were mothers who thought the area's children needed an outlet for all the energy they seemed to have. Gail and Lynn talked and decided community recre-

ational sports, which included, but not limited to soccer, for all kids was badly needed. The decided to create those opportunities in Scottsville and, from that vision, Scottsville Youth Soccer was born.

Scottsville Organization for Kids Soccer, SOKS, today more commonly referred to as Scottsville Youth Soccer, has grown, according to Tom Green, "from a few dozen kids on two or three fields to a league of over 200 kids, ages 3-15, and achieved all the positive goals that the original vision for SOKS incorporated." A visit to Dorrier Park on any given fall Saturday is testimony to the popularity of soccer and the participation level. There are literally hundreds of kids and adults bringing together a spirit of community.

Just a year old when SOKS was first organized, Josh Peck is the new president of the organization. A graduate of Fluvanna High School, Josh serves on the Scottsville Town Council, the town's Planning Commission, and works full time. He coaches a team of 8, 9 and 10 year old soccer players. He has been coaching eight of the past nine years; he took a break last year but is back at it this year.

Working with youth is something Josh finds rewarding. For almost three years he worked at the local Boys and Girls Club as the Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) coordinator.

Josh explained that there are twenty teams which constitute almost 150 children aged 4-16. He cites "the recreational nature and low costs (\$35 registration fee which includes the team jersey) and the fact that all skill levels are accepted." "If you want to play," he said, "you can play!"

Josh added that, "players not only learn to play soccer, they learn how to be part of a team, a community and always focusing on the positivity and equity." The SOKS mission statement's first line says it all: "The mission of SOKS is to

and a lot of good people out there." As principal of Scottsville Elementary School she wants to add to that good. And that would be a joyful thing!


