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Supervisors put meals tax on November ballot

Voters will decide on 4 percent tax

Fluvanna residents will vote in November on whether to institute a meals tax.

The Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors unanimously decided Wednesday (Aug. 1) to direct county staff to prepare an ordinance that would impose a meals tax. By law, Fluvanna voters need to approve the ordinance before it takes effect.

If voters approve, the meals tax will be set at 4 percent. Virginia code caps county meals taxes at 4 percent and requires voter approval. Cities and towns may set a meals tax of up to 8 percent and do not need a referendum.

Jason Smith, community and economic development director, estimated that the tax may bring in \$300,000 to \$600,000 per year.

A meals tax includes "food and beverages sold for immediate human consumption by a restaurant, dining room, grill, coffee shop, café, snack bar, lunch counter, bakery, ice cream shop, lunch wagon or truck, bar, lounge, or other similar establishments," Smith said. The law allows for certain exceptions.

Grocery stores can sell food for imme-

diate human consumption. A rotisserie chicken, for example, would be subject to the meals tax, Smith said. He estimated that about 21 businesses in Fluvanna would be affected by the tax.

If the food is served or sold in Fluvanna then it would be subject to the meals tax, regardless of whether it was prepared in an outside county.

The money collected from the meals tax would go into the county's general fund. Supervisors can't promise that the money will be spent on certain areas, such as education or public safety, because they don't have the power to prescribe the spending of future Boards. They can, however, declare with truth that the money will go toward education, social welfare and public safety, because an overwhelming amount of Board spending supports those projects.

Of the 95 Virginia counties, 47 have a meals tax, Smith said. Those counties include Louisa, Orange, Albemarle, Greene, Nelson and Madison. Cities and towns with meals taxes include Scottsville, Charlottesville, Louisa, Mineral, Waynesboro, Staunton, Gordonsville,

Madison, Culpeper, Orange, Farmville and Richmond.

Supervisors have long discussed leveraging other forms of taxation in an attempt to reduce the county's reliance on real estate taxes to finance spending.

Businesses would be responsible for submitting monthly tax forms and payment to the treasurer's office.

Drawbacks to the meals tax could include the impact on food prices and family budgets, possible negative perceptions on the part of residents or the business community, and some people's principled stance against taxation, said Smith.

Convincing voters to approve a new tax can be a difficult process. If the referendum is voted down, supervisors cannot bring it up again for three years.

In Louisa, the meals tax came before voters three times before they approved it. Putting this tax into effect in Fluvanna could be "a 10-year process, potentially," said County Administrator Steve Nichols. "In almost every case, people don't want a new tax."

"It really depends on the story you have when you're doing the marketing," said Smith.

Rudy Garcia, president of the Chamber of Commerce, addressed some of the concerns of Fluvanna's business community. "The idea of a meals tax isn't something we're necessarily opposed to, but what I want to see happen is that we have a very open conversation with business owners," he said.

He pointed out that while implementing the meals tax may cost the county a minimal amount, business owners will have to spend money to comply as they tally their receipts and fill out tax forms. He also noted that credit card companies charge fees based on the percentage of the total purchase, which includes tax – so if taxes go up, the fee charged by the company will increase as well.

Garcia asked that supervisors "not pass the administrative cost of carrying the credit card process and fees onto that business owner," and that they "somehow figure out how to write it into the ordinance to give a rebate back to businesses...so they don't have additional costs just for the cost of doing business."

The ordinance contains a provision that gives sellers 3 percent back from the

tax, up to \$100, to cover the associated costs. Supervisors considered whether to increase that percentage if it is within their power.

If approved, the tax could go into effect Jan. 1 or July 1, 2019.

Supervisors discussed the prevalence of meals taxes in the area. "Whenever we go to all the towns, counties, cities that were listed [as having a meals tax], we're helping them pay their taxes," Chairman Mike Sheridan said. He said he regularly chats with people from outside the county buying breakfast at a Fluvanna grocery store. "They're not helping us pay our taxes," he said. "If we're going to help them, by golly they better help us."

Supervisors unanimously agreed to put the meals tax on the Nov. 6 ballot.

"I think the Board is giving voters the opportunity to make a decision," Supervisor Tony O'Brien said.

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County partners with CVEC to bring broadband to Fluvanna even gotten to writing

Fluvanna County is partnering with Central Virginia Electric Cooperative (CVEC) to bring broadband internet service to many of its residents.

Fluvanna's Economic Development Authority has offered CVEC \$500,000 in tax rebates for the portion of the project being completed in the county, said Eric Dahl, deputy county administrator.

CVEC's \$110 million project includes a \$20-\$25 million investment in Fluvanna, said Jason Smith Wednesday (Aug. 1) at the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors meeting. CVEC's goal is to provide all its customers with an option for broadband in the next five years.

CVEC covers about 85 percent of Fluvanna with about 8,600 points of service. Dominion Virginia Power serves the other Fluvanna locations.

Expanding internet access and capacity for Fluvanna residents and businesses is important, Smith said. Some homeowners can't sell their properties because they don't have internet access and prospective buyers aren't interested. The internet has become ubiquitous in today's society and residents without access are significantly hampered. Businesses are also unlikely to locate to areas without internet access.

CVEC's investments in Fluvanna will bring in tax dollars after the \$500,000 rebate has been satisfied. "The sooner we get involved, the sooner we can potentially see some tax revenue," Smith said.

"And service to our residents," said County Administrator Steve Nichols.

Firefly Fiber Broadband, as CVEC's company is called, will offer high-speed internet with unlimited data at 100 megabits per second for \$49.99 per month or one gigabit per second of unlimited data for \$79.99 per month. "Unlike many other internet services, the download and upload speeds will be the same on the Firefly network," according to a CVEC press release. Firefly will also offer voice-over IP phone service with unlimited local and long-distance calling in the continental U.S. for \$29.99 as an add-on to internet service.

The project is expected to create about 10 new jobs in Fluvanna, Smith said.

Gary Wood, president and chief executive officer of CVEC, said that his company is excited to work with Fluvanna. "We're going to get in here and solve some problems," he said.

Wood has likened his company's broadband project to the rural electric cooperative push to provide electricity to rural areas in the 1930s. "Just like in those early days, the cooperative has decided that if no one else will build the infrastructure to serve us all, we will do it ourselves," he wrote in a letter to CVEC customers.

CVEC aims to have service to the Zion Crossroads area by the end of next year. In subsequent years it will expand its network throughout the county, and will finish by the end of 2024 if all goes according to plan.

Supervisor Mozell Booker said she wants to bring the internet to her district, Fork Union, which is served by Dominion.

Although CVEC's internet will not serve Dominion customers, the fact that fiber will be laid much closer to Fork Union homes may induce a company to undertake the project of connecting the area.

County attorney costs

Supervisors unanimously approved a transfer of about \$16,500 from their fiscal year 2018 (FY18) contingency and personnel contingency budgets to cover a shortfall in the county attorney budget.

The amount spent on the county attorney's services has exploded in recent years:

"It seems like we've had a lot of legal problems in the last six months or a year," said Supervisor Don Weaver. He asked if the county attorney budget would shrink in the years to come.

County attorney Fred Payne said he'd like to see that happen but doubts it will. Much of the money covers the cost of drafting and reviewing procurement contracts, he said. There has been a lot of expense in connection with Fluvanna's water projects and, he said, "We haven't even gotten to writing regulations for the water system."

In other matters:

Supervisor Tony O'Brien asked Alan Saunders, Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) residency administrator, whether VDOT is planning any improvements to the dangerous spot on Route 600 (South Boston Road) by Lake Monticello's Riverside Gate. Saunders said his department obtained special permission to install rumble strips on Route 600 – an improvement usually reserved for primary roads. He also said VDOT refreshed Route 600's pavement markings and added reflectors.

- Supervisors approved the charter of the Palmyra Area Revitalization Committee, which will work on a plan to spruce up the downtown Palmyra village area.
- The Board appointed Nadia Manifold Anderson to serve on the Region Ten board and appointed Rudy Garcia to the Economic Development Authority.

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School administrators provide cafeteria debt answers

A story about a \$40,000 school cafeteria debt in the July 19 issue of the *Fluvanna Review* prompted much comment on social media.

At the July 11 School Board meeting the Board directed Superintendent Chuck Winkler to look into the cost of debt collection.

The \$40,000 debt was incurred during the 2017-18 school year. Winkler reported that every year there is an unpaid balance on students' accounts, but the \$40,000 debt was one of the highest. By law, schools can carry the debt for one year before it must be discharged. That means money from the school budget is used to pay off the debt.

Many on Facebook wondered if they could donate money to defray the debt. Others asked how the schools could legally go after parents for a debt their children racked up without their knowledge. Still others wondered if the school notified parents of what is owed.

The *Review* sent those questions and more to the Fluvanna school administration. The answers come from Winkler and Gwendolyn Jones, food service supervisor.

If no snacks may be charged, how can free and reduced lunch students owe money?



At the beginning of each year some students haven't yet been certified as free so they may charge lunch until the paperwork is processed. Once certified, the debt is abolished but it still shows up on the books for a year.

Does the school have a way of informing parents they owe money? How often is it done?

Information below comes from School Board Policy JHCH School Meals and Snacks.

- Emailing notices to parents/guardians weekly if the account balance is \$5 or less, when there is a valid email on file. (Page 2)
- All parents/guardians receive account balance letters quarterly via U.S. mail. (Page 3)
- At the end of every school year a letter will be generated by the food services office and mailed to the parent/guardian requesting payment of any past due accounts. (Page 4)

Parents can add money to their kids' accounts online. Can they also see the balance?

Yes. Parents may check cafeteria balances and purchases, receive low-balance alerts and set up automatic payments through MySchoolBucks. This information and a link to MySchoolBucks is listed on the home page of the food service website. It is also listed on every negative balance letter and email that is sent to the household.

Can the schools send an alert when an account goes into the red?

The school emails notices to parents/ guardians weekly if the account balances is \$5 or less, when there is a valid email on file. (Policy JHCH, Page 2)

The schools do not deny food purchases to children. Is that a law?

It is not a law to refuse to deny a child a meal. This is determined by the school district. Only students approved for free meals legally cannot be denied a meal, even if they have a negative balance (a negative balance may have accrued from a previous year or prior to being approved for free meals).

Parents can write notes at the beginning of the year stating that no extras should be sold to their children. Some parents commented those rules aren't adhered to.

Parents may request that notes regarding snacks be added to their child's account. They are adhered to at all times. We request that parents keep the note as simple as possible to avoid misunderstanding the request. We have not had any parents contact us stating that we did not adhere to their note.

It may be right to hold parents responsible for a debt their child incurred without their knowledge. But if parents direct the schools not to sell to their child, is it right to hold the parent responsible for any debt incurred?

Since every parent receives the uncollectable meals charge policy, I would think that would be enough to allow us to charge them for the meals (of course legally I don't know if it is). If it is decided that parents can request us to deny their child a meal then I think the financial responsibility of the parent would change.

This is what is currently written in regards to denying/charging meals.

Food service website: "We will not tell the student that they need money in their account unless the information is requested. If a student is purchasing lunch then no additional conversation regarding the account needs to be made. All students will receive lunch without question. No alternative meals are presented."

School Board Policy JHCH: "The Fluvanna County School Board recognizes that students who eat breakfast and lunch benefit nutritionally and educationally. The Fluvanna County School Board strives to protect the financial stability of the school nutrition program and the concerns of the child by offering a reimbursable breakfast and lunch daily to any student, regardless of an immediate ability to pay."

Some on Facebook said they would gladly donate to a fund to pay off the debt. Is this possible?

Yes. If a donation is received I ask the giver how they would like to have the money applied. In most cases a lottery system is used to choose a child's account to apply the funds, unless a specific name is given.

When the School Board discusses cafeteria debt it seems as if most of the debt is incurred by those who can pay. Is that true?

There is no way for anyone to know if a family can "afford" to pay for meals. I can only use the free/reduced meal status to determine eligible income as it relates to qualifying for that status. In 2017-18, 112 applications were processed; 21 were denied.

When a child graduates or leaves Fluvanna schools with a positive balance on their cafeteria account are they refunded that money?

I have not reached out to any families regarding a positive balance on an account once the child has left FCPS. Parents typically call to request a refund or they request a transfer of the balance to another account.

There are 114 students inactive with a positive balance totaling \$623.86. The balances range from \$0.01 to \$47.90. I have no problem with trying to locate the parents (this balance is from several years) and refunding the money. I will also be sure to add this to the end-ofyear procedures. The money would be refunded at the beginning of the next school year as we do not hold cash during the summer.

Another school district does not allow students to charge snacks and texts parents when students charge. Can Fluvanna do this?

We also do not allow students to charge snacks, only reimbursable meals.

Email notices are from food services sent to parents/guardians weekly if the account balance is \$5 or less, when there is a valid email on file. MySchool-Bucks allows parent to choose their own notification method and amount.

FAST finishes third in division at Champs

The Jefferson Swim League (JSL) held its 53rd Championship meet July 27-28. The Fluvanna Aquatics Sports Team (FAST) and 16 teams from across the region met at the University of Virginia Aquatics and Fitness Center.

Champs Session 1 kicked off Friday at 11 a.m. with swimmers ages 8 and under. Eleven swimmers from this age group represented FAST. This was the first Champs experience for many of these young swimmers, who arrived with a fair amount of nervousness. The coaching staff quickly set them at ease and had them enthusiastic about the day ahead.

By the end of the first session, all of the FAST swimmers had achieved at least one personal time improvement, for which the FAST coaches rewarded them with rubber ducks. With time improvements were: Reed Williams, who shaved 4.73 seconds off his 25-yard freestyle; Lily O'Neill Gummel who dropped 4.48 seconds from her 25-yard freestyle and 9.39 seconds from her 25-yard backstroke times; Jonah England, with an impressive 17.07 seconds taken off his 25-yard backstroke; and Uriah Marks who lost 1.4 seconds in his 25-yard freestyle and 12.9 seconds in his 25-yard backstroke, where he was a heat winner and finished in 21st place.

Other young swimmers grabbed points for the team with their individual event finishes while achieving their time improvements. Also contributing to points for FAST were both the girls and boys age 8 and under 100-yard freestyle

relay teams.

With the youngest swimmers done, Champs Session 2, for swimmers ages 13-14 and 15-18, began. Thirteen swimmers, including 12-year-old Talan Botkin, who swam up an age group in relay, represented FAST. This session, all FAST swimmers contributed points to the team's standing and had time improvements. Four FAST relay teams garnered 95.5 points.

On Saturday morning at Champ Session 3, 10 FAST swimmers competed as 9-10 year olds, all with time improvements. Amy England had an impressive 8.07 second time improvement in her 25-yard backstroke and Levi Thurston-Wells dropped 1.51 seconds in his 25-yard freestyle. The girls and boys 200-yard freestyle relays grabbed points for the team as well.

Champs wrapped up with

11-12-year-olds in Session 4 on Saturday afternoon. All seven of the swimmers obtained time improvements in at least one of their races and all contributed points to the team. The boys 200-yard freestyle relay added an additional 23 points.

In the end, FAST, with just 40 swimmers participating, finished in third place for Division III of the Jefferson Swim League. They lead the division for the 2018 Spirit Award. As swimmers and families headed home from Champs, there was happy reflection on the funfilled summer that had just come to an end, and high praise for the coaches who had made it possible.

Asked about his thoughts on the season, Head Coach Nathan Johnson said, "The one thing that manages to stand out above the rest is how much the kids have improved. From new to returning swimmers, everyone has truly exceeded my expectations. I'm always blown away by how much kids improve."

Many of the FAST swimmers will be back in the pool come September as members of the Battlefield Area Star Swimmers, and others as swimmers for Fluvanna High School.



Seminar examines school testing

Here's a test question: How many hours does a student spend testing in third and fourth grade?

The Fluvanna County School Board took a deep dive into tests students take during the school year.

The Board held a seminar Tuesday (July 31) in which they spent the bulk of the time learning about testing, how much tests cost, how many there are, how long a student spends taking them and why they're given.

A common concern among students, parents and teachers is the amount of time spent testing.

If you guessed 36 hours, you are right. In the two years spent in third and fourth grades a student spends about 36 hours of that time taking a standardized test, according to Superintendent Chuck Winkler's math.

That works out to be two hours a month spent testing and doesn't include paper tests in subjects their teacher might give.

Virginia mandates students receive

990 hours of instruction per year. That comes to 110 hours of instruction per month.

Does two hours each month taking standardized tests seem too much? Too little?

A couple of times during the seminar Board Chair Perrie Johnson – a former Fluvanna elementary school teacher – pointed out the two hours doesn't include test preparation.

James Mathieson started his presentation by saying testing just to test isn't the goal. "We work hard to make sure the assessments are essential and meaningful and lead to continuous student and school improvement," he said.

When considering testing, Mathieson suggested questions to ask:

- Are they required assessments?
- Are the assessments part of a cohesive process?
- What information are we collecting and why?
- Do you know which assessments can give you the answer?
- Is there unique information from the assessment?

There is just one federally required assessment – the National Assessment of Educational Progress – that's given in grades 4, 8 and 12. The state requires four:

- Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS): At-risk screening, administration depends on grade level (kindergarten through third grade)
- Standards of Learning (SOL): Accountability measure, administered at course completion (third grade through end of course)
- Algebra Readiness: Diagnostic assessment for algebra readiness (fifth through eighth grade)
- Industry Credential: State graduation requirement for one earned industry credential (end of course)

The district requires even more to conform to reporting standards.

Some tests assess a student's ability. Others test comprehension. Still others determine how well a school is meeting students' academic needs.

While Winkler said no Fluvanna teacher he knows of has ever been dismissed because of students' low test scores, the scores can inform if the teacher needs help or is in the right profession, he said.

Johnson said when she was teaching third grade, one of her students said, "I know I'm taking the test so you can keep your job."

It costs \$44,730 in 2018 to administer the tests, Winkler said.

LM Karate turns out top-notch competitors

Local athletes headed to Pan Am games in Brazil

LM Karate Academy, which has been run for past 23 years by Robert Silverman, is now located just outside the Lake Monticello Turkeysag gate on Route 53. Silverman has been turning out championship competitors for all these years. This year, LM Karate took an astonishing 20 competitors to the National competitions in Reno, Nev.

The National competition determines the athletes that will qualify to represent the United States at the Pan Am games, which will be held in Brazil Aug. 19-25. The top three competitors in each category of competition qualify. The top two go as competitors and the third as an alternate.

LM Karate gained three of these coveted slots. Gage Silverman finished first in the country in the 18-20 year old lightweight Kumate competition. This is the fighting competition that fans are most familiar with. The competitors compete before a total of five judges, one in the ring and one at each corner of the ring, who determine the outcome of the match based on strikes by the competitors.

Silverman finished third in his two prior tries at the National level, and although his father and coach wanted him to coach this year rather than compete, he insisted that he wanted one more try, This time he succeeded, and as a result, he will miss his first week of college to compete in Brazil.

Alexa Lewandowski finished second in the country in lightweight 12-13 age group, also in the Kumate discipline. Sara Day gained alternate status, finishing third in the 14-15-year-old middle weight category.

At Nationals, the LM Karate team garnered four gold medals, five silver medals and nine bronze medals.

Silverman joked that at National competitions other coaches from big metropolitan centers of Karate training such as Chicago, Miami and Honolulu ask, "Where is Palmyra, Va.? I can't find it on a map."

Silverman currently has approximately 130 students. These students range in age from Little Dragons, who are 2-4 years of age, to adults. In addition to Kumate, there are classes in Shotokan, Japanese-style karate; Kobodo, which is training with weapons; and Kata, which is training in very precise karate forms of movement. There are also classes in aerobic kick boxing.

Silverman calls his competition-level classes "Team Intense." Clearly, not all students can achieve a level of competence that allows them to compete at the national level. However, Silverman said that karate training can be extremely valuable in teaching students discipline, focus and fitness. All of these are valuable in later life. He does not emphasize winning matches; instead, he emphasizes being as fully prepared as possible. "If you are fully prepared, you are more likely to win than to lose," he said.

Silverman takes a number of his Team Intense students to competitions in Virginia and all over the U.S. In local competitions, against other Virginia-based competitors from the Richmond area and the Virginia Beach area, LM Karate competitors have achieved outstanding results, consistently outshining the Virginia competition. From local competitions LM Karate competitors go on to Regional competition, and from those competitions they proceed to the national competitions.

Silverman said that his Team Intense competitors need to find competitions all around the country to keep their skills sharpened.

The Lake Monticello Swim Team (LMST) competed in the Jefferson Swim League (JSL) Championship Swim Meet July 27-28 at the U.Va. Aquatics and Fitness Center. The JSL is composed of over 2,800 swimmers on 17 teams in three divisions from Charlottesville and surrounding areas. The results from the JSL Championship Swim Meet determine which division a team will swim in the next season.

LMST had their best-ever swim season this year. Their team has a total of 150 swimmers and is led by head coach Carly Csapo, assistant coaches Maria Arroyo, Sito Arroyo, Fefe Nardone, and Emma Strickland, junior coaches Olivia Strickland and Payton Watson, and shadow coaches Jordan Franco and Hunter Strickland. LMST has become extremely competitive and keeps improving year after year. As a team they placed the highest they had ever placed in the JSL Championships this year. With a total of 1,605.25 points, LMST placed ninth out of 17 swim teams and maintained a solid hold on their place in Division II of the JSL for the fourth year in a row. LMST is now ranked third in its division, up from fifth last year.

The weeks before Championships, LMST swimmers worked extra hard on their swim stroke technique, starts, finishes, and turns. Relay teams also had their own practice to perfect timing. This paid off for LMST as they brought home many awards including two first place medals, four third place medals, the JSL High Point Award given to the swimmer earning the most points, and the JSL On Fire Award given to the most improved swimmer. Many LMST swimmers placed in the top five or top 10 in their events. This is quite an accomplishment as there can be as many as 150 swimmers competing in a single event. As a team, LMST also brought home the Division II Team Spirit Award. Coaches Nardone, Csapo, Sito Arroyo and Hunter Strickland were also on fire as they took third place in the 100-yard coaches' medley relay race with a time of 23.56 seconds.

LMST's top swimmer at Championships was Abigayle Harlow, 15, who medaled in every event she swam during Championships and earned many points for LMST. The JSL awarded Abigayle the High Point Award for earning a total of 83 points for her team during Championships, the most points in the girls 15-18 age division.

This team has held a special place in my heart since my family stumbled across the sport of swimming in 2000. LMST has filled my summers with joy for as long as I can remember and I am honored to now play a role in our families summer traditions."
