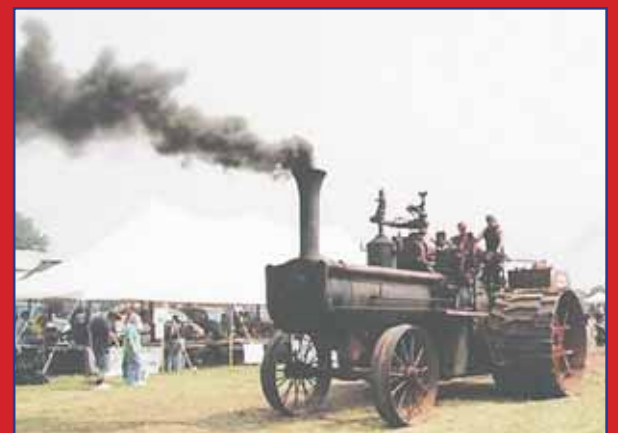

Up to 6,000 people to attend Annual Orange Street Festival

For a town the size of Orange, Virginia, the numbers expected on Sept. 8 are staggering.

Nearly 200 vendors and 5,000 to 6,000 attendees will turn Orange's Main Street into an open-air megamall,

teaming with people filling the street and the aroma of dozens of food vendors filling the air.

The 43rd Annual Orange Street Festival promises to continue a tradition that is ingrained in the culture and the history of the Orange County seat.

The family-friendly event, organized by the Orange County Chamber of Commerce, is the second oldest event of that group, second only to its annual banquet, which has been held for more than 90 years.

It has become a centerpiece of family reunions, where grandparents come to recall its early days, and parents come to instill the tradition in their children, who will, in turn, carry on the tradition into the future.

With that in mind, the Chamber has tried to keep the date for the festival predictable — the second Saturday in September — so people can rely on it as they make plans for the end of summer.

"Typically, the vendors range from everything from artisans and crafts to

Back to School with Backpack Campaign

August 15 will be an exciting day for thousands of children in Orange County -- those who will be returning to school and those who will be going for the first time.

But, for some families, it will be a struggle to provide the tools their children need to do well in the most important endeavor of their lives — learning.

Once again, the Orange Downtown Alliance is asking individuals and businesses in the area to chip in to ease that struggle through the donation of school supplies for children in need throughout the county's school system.

It's called the Kids' Backpack Campaign, and it's one of the community's most successful philanthropic endeavors.

"This started about four years ago," said ODA Executive Director Jeff Curtis.

"I have a dear friend who told about growing up, and they were so embarrassed to go to school," he said. Not only was there not enough food in the house, but little or no money for new clothes or school supplies.

"I have a daughter of my own who's in pre-school, and I thought, 'What a shame kids have to go through all of this dress-up to go back to school, new classmates, to be embarrassed by not having crayons or pencils or notebooks.'"

So, the ODA started the Backpack Campaign, "and it was an immediate success," Curtis said.

Over the last four years hundreds of children throughout Orange County have benefitted from donations of everything from crayons to construction paper, from pencils to pocket folders.

The ODA works closely with the Orange County Public Schools to determine what items are needed most for students.

The schools have provided the following list of the most needed supplies for the children and their classrooms:

- Colored Markers
- Crayons
- Dry-Erase Markers
- Kids Scissors
- Large Glue Sticks
- Loose Leaf Paper
- Marbled Composition Notebooks
- One Inch Binders
- One Subject Notebooks
- Pencils
- Pocket Folders
- Hand Sanitizer
- Disinfectant Wipes
- Tissues

Those items may be dropped off at the ODA's downtown office on Main Street upstairs of the Orange Pharmacy or at the Horton Cellars winery on Route 33 west of Gordonsville, which has volunteered to be a drop-off point.

Monetary donations are also gratefully accepted. Any donation you can make will benefit Orange County students. If you would prefer to donate money, checks can be made payable to "ODA" and mailed to PO Box 283, Orange, VA 22960. Please note in the memo "backpacks".

Those monetary donations provide the funding that purchases more of the above and backpacks as well.

"My wife and I, we go to Walmart — they have tax-free days for going back to

school — and we'll buy everything we need there. We'll buy backpacks, everything on the list that the schools send us.

"We literally bring out shopping carts full of things."

About a week before school starts all the material is collected at the Orange Volunteer Firehall, where volunteers will sort the items and make up the backpacks to be distributed throughout the county. To be included in this summer's campaign, donations need to be dropped off by Aug. 10.

Although the Orange Downtown Alliance spearheads the project, Curtis stresses that it benefits students at all Orange County schools.

And, those wishing to donate shouldn't feel that the effort ends on Aug. 15. The ODA will continue to accept contributions of items and monetary donations throughout the year.

"We've received thousands of dollars in financial contributions and donated items," Curtis said. "We don't see who gets it. Once we deliver it to the schools it's up to them.

"We hear back from the teachers; we get thank yous from the family teachers. 'You've made some kids very happy.'"

The Cube House at James Madison Museum

Built in 1733 by order of Governor Alexander Spotswood for one of his many tenant farms, this "cube" house is one of the oldest surviving dwellings in Orange. The home was originally leased to Charles Spoe of Richmond, until December 22, 1739, when he sub-leased the home on 160 acres to Arjalon Price (Senior). Though he had other properties, Price used this as his primary residence. Here he and his wife, Joyce (Barber, m 1730), raised most of their seven children, including the noted early Baptist preacher John Price. Following the death of John Spotswood (eldest son of Alexander Spotswood) Price purchased the home and its 160 acres from the estate's executor, Bernard Moore; recorded May 28, 1767. Price died in the home in April, 1773. The field stone marking his burial plot is inscribed "AR P 1773 Aged 71 Years." The house, due to be demolished, was preserved by donating it to this museum in April of 1983.

products and services, non-profits, banking institutions, realtors, you name it; if they want to be seen by 5,000 or so people they will be there," said Tammy Collins, executive director of the Orange County Chamber of Commerce.

The festival stretches most of the length of Main Street, east and west, from Byrd Street to Caroline Street, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

As always, there will be live music in Taylor Park throughout the day.

While the festival will be familiar, it doesn't mean it has stagnated. "There are always new vendors," Collins said. "There are usually some new activities for the kids to try to change things up."

"In the past few years, they have had an after-party where the music continues from 4 to 7. We've nixed that idea because we want people to enjoy it while they're there and also because of logistics and volunteer concerns, because it's hard to have people stay even later to clean up," she said.

She added, however, that she would welcome some other group which would like to partner with the Chamber to handle an after-party.

Preparation for the Street Festival, other than the months-long tasks of mapping out the venue and signing up vendors, starts the day before when volunteers will mark off the vendor spaces. The morning of the event, volunteers will usher vendors to their designated positions along the route.

"And then, throughout the day we need volunteers for informational purposes and just to have people on the grounds to address concerns," she said, as well as the more mundane, but necessary, job of keeping trash under control. They'll be easy to pick out from the crowd, since they'll be wearing special volunteer T-shirts that were provided by Jim Roberts of Amos Apparel.

The Chamber needs about a dozen volunteers to make the day a success.

The Town of Orange provides police presence to handle traffic at the intersection of Route 15 and Main Street to ensure festival goers can get from one end of the festival to the other.

"The police and the Department of Public Works do a great job in assisting us for those efforts, making sure the area is safe. The town has always been very accommodating for this event," Collins said.

As in the past, there will be a large children's area on Short Street by the Visitors Center and a beer garden near the music. The Kids Zone will be sponsored this year by Germanna Community College, and the beer garden will be sponsored by Weichart Realtors Lake of the Woods.

Festival-goers will see a new logo for the event this year, displayed prominently

on a new banner created by BigEye Graphics LLC of Orange. While the logo for the festival has changed often over the years, Collins believes this new logo will be a permanent symbol of the event.

Steam Power on Display

A Pasture Party does not run on steam and gas alone. There will be plenty of opportunities to eat during the event.

For three days on the second weekend in September, Somerset will take a step back in time.

It will be a time when the wheezing and chugging of steam engines, the staccato of old gasoline engines and old farm equipment — some more than 100 years old — fills the air.

September 7, 8 and 9 will be punctuated by The Somerset Steam & Gas Pasture Party on the association grounds at the Roberts family farm.

The non-profit show is a chance for those who have never experienced steam power, who think of their daily meals as simply comestibles that come from a supermarket, to discover how machines transformed American farming a century ago.

The show will feature antique tractors, steam and gas engines, a working sawmill, threshing, baling, steam plowing, a shingle mill, a duplicating lathe and corn chopping among other traditional mechanized farming activities.

In addition, there will be live country bands, flea markets, arts and crafts, antique and classic cars and trucks, tractor games, a kiddie tractor pull, food concessions and the show's famous steamed beans.

Although there is a gate donation of \$10 requested, proceeds, after show expenses are paid, are divided among local charitable organizations, volunteer fire companies, rescue squads, scholarships and charitable work within the surrounding communities. Exhibitors and children younger than 12 are admitted free, and there will be free parking and a free shuttle service from the parking lot to the show grounds.

The Pasture Party is a family event. No alcoholic beverages are allowed on the grounds. The use throughout the show grounds of ATV's and other four-wheel conveyances is restricted to handicap persons, senior citizens and show personnel.

Local businesses contribute innumerable to the support of the Pasture Party from free transportation, to logs for the sawmill, and everything in between. Organizers hope those enjoying the party will patronize those businesses.

The Association operates its own version of a yard sale called "Bits 'n' Pieces." You can bring your unwanted items, be they tools, tractor parts, stoves, flower pots, cookware or yard items, along with you, and while you are enjoying the Pasture Party the Bits 'n' Pieces crew will be making money for you.

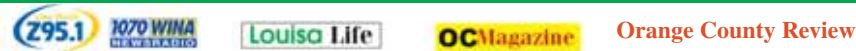

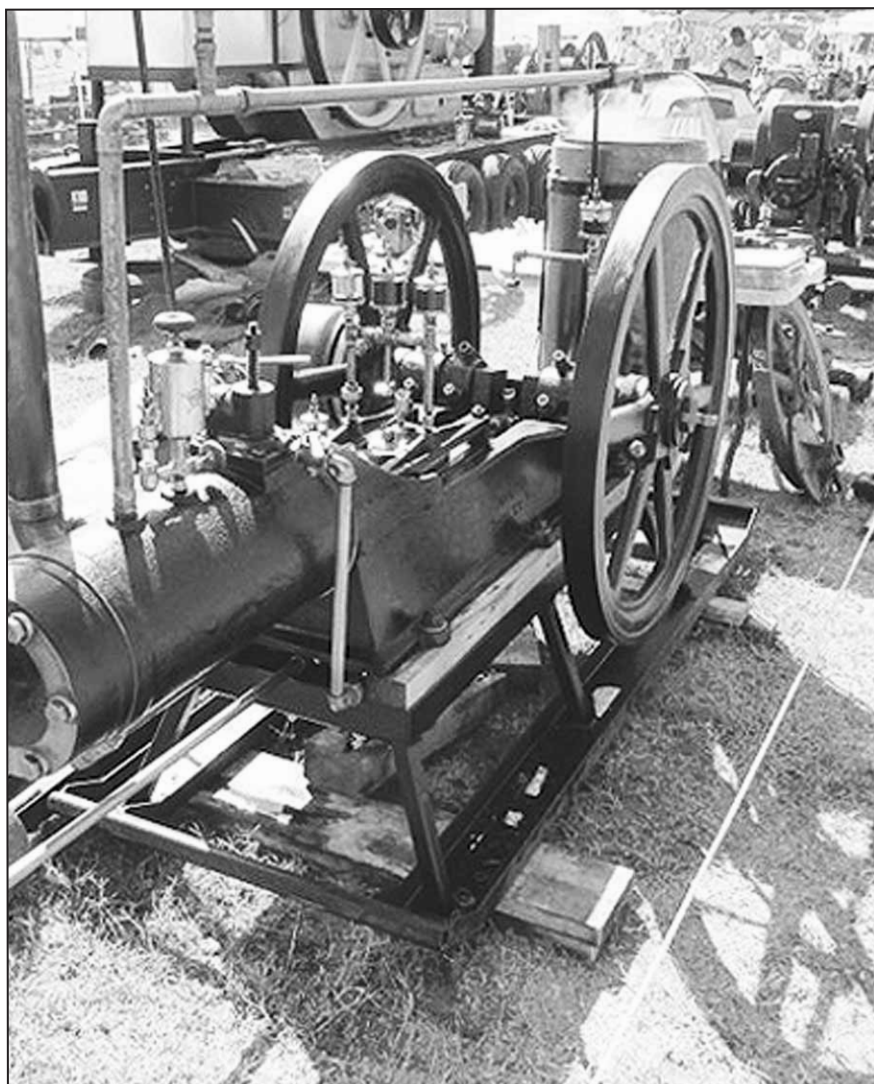
