

Council Begins New Term

aving all been sworn in for a new two year Scottsville term. Mayor Nancy Gill and Town Council wasted no time in getting

down to work at the July 16th regular session of the Scottsville Town Council.

New Council members Stuart Munson and Eddie Payne were present and

Mayor Gill reported that the Rural Health Initiative was "moving forward, and more could be expected on that

next month." She then recognized Scottsville's representative on the County Board of Supervisors, Rick Randolph, asking him to share any news of interest he might have for those present and the people watching at

Taking the podium, Randolph reported on several items of interest relating to the town. He spoke to the upcoming project of replacement of waterlines on both East and West Main Streets. The lines being replaced, he said, "are not only very old, they probably contain an amount of lead and that needs to be corrected." The project, scheduled to begin later this year is expected to take

up to four months to complete.

Other items of interest shared by Randolph included a report that there had been meetings between the county and various volunteer rescue and fire services. There has been a critical shortage of volunteers, particularly with the rescue squads. Randolph noted that if the county went to all professionals, taxes could rise by two cents to fund the option. Along the same line regarding increases in what citizens pay for government services, he stated, "we most likely will soon have a water rate increase.

In Council actions, Laura Mellusi was appointed vice mayor. Having both a female mayor and vice mayor marks a significant era in the history of Scottsville. Mayor Gill noted that appointing council members to chair-

manships of the various committees would be taken up at the August work session (second Monday) with the appointments to be announced at the August council meeting.

Josh Peck reported that the Planning

Commission had sent the revised ver-

sion of the Comprehensive Plan to Council. He also said the work will soon begin on improving sidewalks on Bird, Harrison and Main Streets. Mayor Gill said that "Council will take its time looking at the (Comprehensive) Plan before approving it or sending it back to the Planning Commission for revisions."

Zack Bullock, Council representative on the Architectural Review Board stated that there are two vacancies on the ARB. Persons interested in serving on that Board should contact the town administrator.

Dan Gritsko, who has been instrumental in overseeing the Van Clief Nature Area reported that there will be a meeting in August with DGIF regarding the installation of a dock at the lake.

"Hopefully," he said, "we will have a dock in place before the end of 2018, but realistically that may not happen."

Arts and Culture Chair Laura Mellusi reported that September 8th is the date for Scottsville's "River Town Festival"



ven though Scottsville's history dates from more than 10,000 years ago with the Monacan Indians who lived in the area, the town of Scott's Landing was not founded until 1744 when it was designated Albemarle County's first "county seat.

Although the county seat and its first courthouse were moved in 1762 to Charlottesville, and parts of Albemarle were divided into Buckingham, Fluvanna, Amherst and Nelson counties, the town continued to be a major shipping hub to

areas both east and west. With the James River and the Kanawha Canal, farmers and merchants from as far away as the Shenandoah Valley had a means of moving their goods and produce to distant markets. People also had a means of traveling to ports up and down the river on packet boats and

Then in 1818 the town was incorporated. Over the next 200 years the town would see ups and downs, war, floods, growth and decline. But the town survived! In the mid 1800s there would be six churches built; those building still stand and are used today. After 1850 the railroad became the main means of transporting both people and goods as the canal became less profitable for its shareholders and river travel proved to be slow and unpre-

Following the Civil War, the town

slowly began a rebuilding that would reach a high point in the early 1900s. By 1920 there were "twenty stores, two large flour mills, an ice plant, a theater, three garages, a braid factory, two large oil companies, two restaurants, a boarding house, two drugstores, three doctors, a dentist, two schools, two dairies, a shoe store and two blacksmith shops. 1944 the Scottsville Lions Club was responsible for the "tire plant" deciding to locate their factory in town providing a number of jobs and greatly helping the

local economy.

Flooding still remained a problem. In the late 1980s Mayor A. Raymon Thacker was the force behind seeing that a levee was built to protect the town from the fickle James. Today Scottsville's local economy has rebounded to the point where there are as many businesses today as there was in the 1950s and '60s. It is also a nice place to live.



Van Clief Nature Area Guidelines: ACCESS and PARKING – The closest GPS address for the driveway to the nature area and lake is 253 Hardware Street. (On older maps, you may see that Scottsville Lake was called Mink Creek Reservoir.)

There is a parking area next to the gate. Do not block the road or the gate and do not park in the gravel area near the cell towers.

The nature area includes the area

surrounding the lake, many acres beyond the lake, an area below the dam, and a narrow strip of the land opposite the town businesses along Mink Creek. If you are in the area below the dam, please do not walk up the face

HOURS - The nature area is open during daylight hours only and current ly not open to vehicle traffic inside the gate. In case of emergency dial 911.

TRASH – Please do not leave any trash behind. Either deposit it in a trash can or bring trash out of the nature area with you. NO FIRES are permitted.

NOTE: Please do not walk up the face of the dam located between the lake and downtown. The dam is an engineered structure that is part of the town's flood control plan. Walk around the outlet structure and walk up the billthe outlet structure and walk up the hillside immediately past the outlet struc-

Scottsville Lake Fishing and Trout Fishing


Scottsville Lake is stocked with trout by Virginia's Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. Anyone over age 16 must have a Virginia fishing license. If you fish the lake between October 1 and June 15, you must also have a Virginia trout license. (You do not need the additional trout license if you are fishing between June 15th and September 30th.)

Fishing license information and online purchasing are available on the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries website. Locally, licenses can be purchased at Coleman's Outdoors at 137 Main Street (434.286.2547).

You can keep 6 trout per day. No one can keep trout smaller than 7 inches. Catch limits for all species other than trout are according to State regulation. There are no lure restrictions.

Trout stocking will take place several times between October 1 and June 15. You can look for updates on the DGIF trout stocking website after 4pm the day of stocking.




