



A Sad Farewell to the Woman's Club of Buckingham

Sometimes we simply take good things for granted; like the Woman's Club of Buckingham County. This group, which has enriched the lives of Buckingham citizens for over 64 years, has always been involved with and supported the arts, literacy, conservation, education and scholarships, and public issues of the county's citizens. And, sadly, this article is to report that the existence of this civic and social club is now over. Due to declining membership, the Woman's Club is now officially dissolved. Although the club still has a charter with the international woman's club, the local group is no more.

With the motto "Be rich in good works" (1 Timothy 6:18), over the past 64 years the good works that the Woman's Club members have done has been a true blessing to Buckingham County. The group's history is rich with service and activities. Begun on March 26, 1954, Mrs. M. Cleveland Jones (Liz) is credited as being the founder of the Buckingham Club with much support by Sue West, of the Gravel Hill area. The local group was part of the Alice Kyle Woman's Club District (which has 18 clubs in its jurisdiction) and the General Federation of Woman's Clubs, an international woman's organization dedicated to community improvement.

Throughout its existence, the Woman's Club has been involved with literacy and art contests for area students, has been a strong financial supporter of the Buckingham Arts Council, donated to the county's volunteer fire department, given scholarships for students to attend 4-H camp as well as an annual scholarship for a college bound student, annually supported a Girl's State representative, contributed to Madeline's House and the Patrick Henry Boys and Girls Plantation, and has

been a financial supporter of the annual After-Prom event. All of this mainly through their annual "Curious Corner," a weeklong fundraising event, held every November.

Over the years the Club has also distributed free tree seedlings to Buckingham citizens, funded the local schools art departments, collected and distributed school supplies to the local primary schools, made lap quilts for cancer patients, assisted with the bloodmobile, provided rides to church, doctors and hospitals for senior citizens, and worked to encourage citizens to vote and be engaged in the political forum. The Club has also been recognized many times in district and state competitions.

While the Club is not political and does not engage in political activity, it did have a mandate to educate voters on issues affecting public life. To that end, the Club has provided to its members and the public at large, award-winning programs featuring candidates for offices such as the Board of Supervisors, the School Board, House of Delegates and the U.S House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate. The Club encouraged its members to register and vote, and conducted voter registration drives in election years.

All of that generous activity has been a blessing for Buckingham and its citizens, who have gained much from the good works of the Club members. But, it should also be noted that the club members have also gained from their involvement. Here are some testimonies from the last active members of the Club:

Charlene Snoddy, charter member, first secretary and known throughout the county for her involvement in the arts: "Along with everything else it's done, the Club established the 'Welcome to Buckingham' signs, planted shrubbery and was involved in a Dillwyn clean-up program. We also sponsored the first historic house tour. Along with the numerous scholarships and annual art show, our organization has always encouraged the arts in the county."

Agnes Cramer, corresponding secretary and Art Department: "I've met the most wonderful women that have become family to me which is also one of the best features to me."

Patsy Miessler, recording secretary and Education Department chair: "I joined the Club in 2002. - The fact that I have been able to make an important impact on the lives of some students in several ways is a thrill for me. It's also been a treat to live, participate, and give back in a location where my contributions matter. This club has been able to unite women of different backgrounds and upbringing, and created a cohesive group which has been able to bring so much to the community and to each other. The Art Contest/Show has been wonderful, where the schools are concerned, and also among the residents. It's always such a joy to see the kids showing off their art to parents and grandparents. Other impacts on the County that I see are helping and advising on conservation and gardening. I think Curious Corner gave people a way to find inexpensive, albeit used, clothing and items. There were a lot of people who came in to browse and buy."


Lois Atkinson, who served on the Literacy Committee: "Best that I recall I joined WCBC about fifteen-sixteen years ago. I was newly widowed. I only knew people at my church and have always been grateful to have the club and its great members in my life since then. My special interest was the annual art show for the schools and adult residents. I found much diversity among members, local and, like me, adopted to the place. Interesting, dedicated women."

Jackie Fairbarns, Public Interest Committee: "I joined the club in 2010, shortly after moving to Buckingham County from Fairfax. I had picked up a copy of the Beacon and saw a note about a Woman's Club meeting before we had completed our move, and one of the first things I did was call the contact person. I wanted to support and be involved in the types of causes supported by the National Federation of Women's Clubs. Some 75% of the public libraries in the U.S. are the result of women's club initiatives. The drive for child

labor laws was initiated by clubwomen and pursued until laws were passed to protect children in the workplace. Clubwomen make up an international network that provides direct support to each other in cases of natural disasters and we support initiatives to combat human trafficking and elder abuse. Nearly all the people I know in Buckingham have been met through my Woman's Club and Garden Club connections."

Mary Lohr, most recent president of Club: "I joined the club in 2007. I was blessed with meeting special ladies that have become like family. We have become a sisterhood. The club has made me more aware of local organizations that need either volunteers or financial help. We worked hard with our projects but had a lot of fun and enjoyed doing them. All the money we made from our fundraiser was used for our local charities."

It is a sad farewell to 64 years of caring and giving women. Their impact is long-reaching and much appreciated. And, likely taken for granted. The legacy that the Woman's Club of Buckingham County is profound and impactful. Their many shoes will be very hard to fill. Thanks to all the past and current members of the Woman's Club of Buckingham County. We bid you a fond and sad farewell.







Reconstruction in Buckingham County

In 1867, Lt. Col. John W. Jordan, stationed in Farmville, Virginia, was asked by the Freedmen's Bureau to locate six white men and six African-American men to recommend as potential public servants in post-war Buckingham County. One was named John R. Gilliam. He is probably the John R. Gilliam, age fifty-three, who appeared on the 1860 census, enumerated in Buckingham County's District 1. Gilliam's post office was at Buckingham Court House and he lived with Margarete A. Mathews and what are probably her children, although the census does not indicate the relationship of the individuals living in the household. Gilliam may be a widower and Margarete may be his widowed daughter. He was a prosperous farmer, owning \$11,600 in real estate, consisting of over 1,000 acres, and \$24,755 in personal property, including thirty-three slaves living in six dwellings. These details make Gilliam an incongruous candidate for the post-war government, at least on paper. . . . Did he really resist the Rebel Cause?

According to L. D. Phaup, "John R. Gilliam lived at Osceola, where I was raised. The house is located on State Route 609, in the Francisco District of Buckingham County, and still stands. It is one of the oldest homes in the county going back to the 1740s and was a stage coach stop on the road from Richmond to Lynchburg. The remains of the road can be seen today. I believe John R. Gilliam is buried in the family cemetery located close to the home."

Lt. Col. Jordan also promoted Dr. Charles E. Davidson of Maysville (a.k.a. Buckingham Court House). The 1860 slave census indicates that Dr. Davidson owned no slaves. Not being a planter, he had no need of field labor and, apparently, did not own a domestic servant.

During 1861-1862, Davidson was an Assistant Surgeon for the Confederate States Army, working at the Globe Hospital (a. k. a. General Hospital No. 11) and at General Hospital No. 21, both in Richmond, Virginia. By September of 1865, he served in the medical department of the U.S. Army and became a Freedman's Bureau agent in November of 1865.


Richmond Hospital Map. Courtesy Civil War Richmond.

In 1870, he reported \$1,800 worth of real estate and \$300 worth of personal property. He lived with his wife, Eveline, and four young children in Maysville Township, Post Office: Curdsville. He died later that year.

Of all the white men listed by Jordan, Dr. Davidson appears to have the longest involvement in Buckingham County politics and county government. In 1860, he was named among the county's prominent Whigs. During 1865, he publicly expressed loyalty to the Federal Government and was appointed to join the Overseers of the Poor. Additionally, he was a delegate to a convention held in Fluvanna County for the purpose of nominating a candidate to represent Buckingham's Senatorial District. In 1868, he served the county as a Superintendent, representing District 1.

An obituary for his charming widow, Eveline (Parrack) Davidson, appeared in the March 22, 1905 issue of the *Appomattox and Buckingham Times*:

Buckingham, Va. March 20. —Departed this life on Tuesday night, March 14, 1905, at her late home in this village [Buckingham Court House], Mrs. Eveline Davidson, widow of the late Dr. C. E. Davidson, and sister of Mrs. Mary E. Shaw and the late David A. Parrack, at the ripe old age of eighty years. Mrs. Davidson would have reached her eightieth year had she lived until April 11, 1905. She was possibly one of the most widely known ladies of this section. Of a striking genial and cheerful disposition, with happy expression for every one with whom she came in contact, and was an inspiration to

"look on the bright side." Mrs. Davidson leaves two sons—Mr. D. Elwood Davidson, now of Boydton, Va., and Mr. T. J. Davidson, of this village.




The 2018 Buckingham All- Star Team

Reflecting on the boys of summer from red clay country, manager John Toney offered his highest praises,

"This year's Buckingham majors were made of well rounded young men who loved baseball. They worked hard every practice and played their hearts out every game. I am very proud of these young men and how far we went this year. I also had a great coaching staff, Travis Hicks and Walter "Bug" Edwards by my side. We might not have won the World Series, but in my eyes, we were the champions and actually won the Sportsmanship award showing exactly how respectful, hard working and mannered these boys and coaches are. This team made history for not only Buckingham County but for the State of Virginia as well. I know they will do great things and make major accomplishments in their baseball career." 
