

Budget talk focuses on first responders

Public safety was high on the agenda at the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors' latest work session for the fiscal year 2020 (FY20) budget Wednesday night (March 13). With Chair Mike Sheridan away on vacation for the week, Vice Chair Tony O'Brien led the meeting at the county administration building.

In submitting their budgets, the county's

fire and rescue services asked for significant spending as vehicles and equipment are aging out of their useful lives. Fire chiefs from area departments were on hand to talk with supervisors about where they felt funding needs to go – and potentially where it can be deferred.

Four vehicles are currently scheduled for

replacement: Palmyra's Ambulance 49, Fluvanna's Tanker 10 and Chief 1, and Lake Monticello's Support 56. The total cost to replace all four could total \$1 million.

The most expensive is Tanker 10, which could cost close to \$500,000.

"It's at the end of its 20 years," said Chief Dwayne Mayo. "It's been a good truck for us."

Chief Mike Brent had similar praise for Chief 1, a 2008 Chevy Tahoe with over 100,000 miles on it. "I'm able to operate any incident out of that vehicle," he said. "That's my office on wheels."

"If you can't have everything, what can you do without?" asked Supervisor Trish Eager.

There was general agreement that Chief



1 could wait another year. With representatives from Lake Monticello Water Rescue and Palmyra Rescue not in attendance, the chiefs said they couldn't speak to Support 56 or Ambulance 49.

"Could the tanker be pushed to another year?" O'Brien asked.

Brent voiced concern at pushing scheduled replacements off by too long. "Right now, everything is fine, but you start cascading," he said. "You could end up needing multiple tankers in one year."

New self-contained breathing apparatuses (SCBAs) for county firefighters are a non-negotiable expense.

Replacing existing SCBAs will cost nearly

\$900,000. Fire officials are waiting to hear if they've won a \$100,000 grant.

Underscoring how vital new SCBAs are to the department, Mayo said, "If it really came down to it, and we didn't get [the grant], I'd give up the tanker in return for SCBAs."

"If the grant comes through, it'll get funded," said County Administrator Steve Nichols. "If the grant doesn't come through... you still have to fund it."

Sheriff Eric Hess outlined some of his requests, including two new deputies, security upgrades for the county courthouse, and replacement vehicles.

"If I don't get the deputies, we'll go back to the old way of pulling someone from here

and someone from there," he said. However, with two new judges coming to the county within the next year, the criminal caseload will increase sharply, requiring deputies to spend more time managing defendants.

Throughout the session, supervisors worked to balance the county's needs against the tight budget.

Rather than fund two deputies, they discussed funding one now and deferring another to a later year. After fielding requests for \$100,000 for county department work trucks and \$25,000 for two new cars for social services, they ended up tentatively allocating \$85,000 for work trucks and \$40,000 for social

Next, supervisors will turn their attention to health insurance and the school budget.

They will also begin discussions on setting the real estate tax rate. With such a packed agenda, Nichols was skeptical that they would be able to set the rate and suggested they defer until March 27. If that happens, the final vote on the FY20 budget would be delayed until April 24.

Once supervisors choose a tax rate, a public hearing has to be set and advertised. According to the county's online calendar, depending on when they select the rate, the hearing could be held either April 10 or April 17. The final vote on both the tax rate and the FY20 budget would come on April 17 or April 24.

Business Risk- How to recognize and mitigate it

usiness risk often is associated with thoughts of catastrophic events things like a fire at the office or a customer slipping on a wet floor. However, risk can affect your business in more subtle ways as well. Therefore, it's important that a business manager be prepared to manage all possible risks that threaten their success.

There are many methodologies for risk management, but most can be simplified to the following four steps: Identify, Analyze, Plan, and Manage.

When attempting to identify risks, a manager needs to think about all types of risk relevant to their operation. There are risks associated with liability and loss, missed opportunities, inefficiencies, design mistakes, and lack of process - just to name a few. Each business is different, and no two businesses will have the same risk profile.

Once risks have been identified, the next step is to analyze their probability and impact. The probability of a given risk is the likelihood that it will occur. The impact is how much effect a given risk will have on operations. When the probability of a risk is combined with its impact, a manager has the basic information needed to begin building a plan.

The first steps in building a plan require prioritization of risks based on the probability and impact of these risk and the resources available to address them. For each risk, a mitigation strategy should be developed to either eliminate the risk entirely or reduce the impact on operations in the event it occurs.

Equipped with a plan, the next phase of the process involves controlling risk elements and responding to those issues outside of a manager's control. Most important, the manager must revisit the entire process on a regular basis to make sure new risks are identified, old risks are removed, and all risks have a strategy for mitigation.

Risk is an unavoidable part of doing business. Successfully addressing this risk involves a disciplined approach of identification, analysis, planning and manage-

Top young women golfers head to Lake tournament

The Peggy Kirk Bell Golf Tour (PKBGT) is coming to Lake Monticello for the Commonwealth Classic on the weekend of March 30-31, and will bring top young women golfers to the course.

The PKBGT is in its 13th season, with a series of tournaments staged across Virginia and the Carolinas for elite young golfers. The PKBGT is an initiative of the non-profit Triad Youth Golf Foundation, which is dedicated to the development of girls' golf in partnership with LPGA-USGA girls' golf.

There are four levels of play for girls between 9 and 18 years old. The Commonwealth Classic is for the participants in the top level and the girls who qualify have to establish that they have consistently recorded scores below 80 in tournaments played from the red tees. This is a very high standard of play.

Last year the Commonwealth Classic was a two-round event played over a 6,000+ yard layout at the Birdwood course, which is the home course for the University of Virginia men's and women's teams. However, the Birdwood course is now under reconstruction. Last year, the top five finishers in the Commonwealth Classic all recorded two rounds in the 70s.

The tour is now in full swing. On the weekend of March 17-18, the young golf athletes played The Spring Invitational on the Links at Stoney Point Course in Greenwood, S.C. On the weekend of March 22-23, they will play the Cape Fear Classic over the Country Club of Landfall-Marsh at UNCW.

This year the competitors in the Commonwealth Classic will tee off at the Lake Monticello course at 10 a.m. on both Saturday and Sunday. There will not be a shotgun start. All players will tee off in succession on hole number one. Spectators are encouraged to come out and watch these elite players navigate their way around the challenging Lake Monticello course.



School Board approves next year's calendar

The Fluvanna School Board approved the 2019-20 school calendar at its meeting Wednesday (March 13).

A committee of teachers who worked with the administration presented a draft to the board. One concern with the first draft was nine half days for students, which some thought was too many. The committee brought that number down to five in the version the board unanimously ap-

The first day of school for students is Thursday, Aug. 8. Open house takes place Tuesday, Aug. 6. The last day of school for students is scheduled for Thursday, May 21.

Solar panels

Reviewing SunTribe's offer to put solar panels on and around Fluvanna schools took up much of the meeting.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler brought SunTribe's representatives back to answer questions. The board was ready.

Andrew Pullen (Columbia) asked about the cost of decommissioning the panels after the 25-year contract. SunTribe's Tony Steffens said Fluvanna would have the option to renew a contract. If they choose not to, SunTribe would remove the system on their dime.

Pullen also wanted to know when Sun-

Tribe started its company. Steffens said 2016. SunTribe's Chief Technical Officer Taylor Brown said the combined experience of its officers is 100 years.

When asked about the possibility of SunTribe folding before the contract ends, Brown said one of their partners is Virginia Credit Union.

"The bank wants to see us operate for 25 years so their debt can be paid down,"

Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union) wanted to know what would happen if a roof with solar panels on it needed repairs.

Brown said SunTribe would remove the panels so the roof could be fixed. He said one of SunTribe's partners is GAF Roofing and they could repair the roof. There would be no upfront cost for the work.

SunTribe is offering Fluvanna a set rate of 8.4 cents per kilowatt hours - less then they're paying now. The cost of roof repairs could be covered by the school paying a bit higher rate per kilowatt hours for a certain period of time. Brown suggested a rate of 8.8 cents.

Steffens said they could put a cap on that higher rate in the contract.

Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) asked if installing the panels would nullify any existing roof warranties.

Steffens said before installation they

talk to each company that installed a roof and ask them to sign a letter agreeing to uphold their warranty.

Winkler said the board was only being asked to approve him signing a letter of intent with SunTribe – not a final contract.

Steffens said the letter would allow his company to do further studies of the schools and site possibilities.

The board voted unanimously to approve Winkler signing the document.

Discipline issues

Pullen said he continues to be concerned over discipline issues in the schools.

"I have serious concerns," he said. "Some

staff told officers they'd rather not have sworn officers in the school. Louisa has a Safe Schools Task Force. We need to address some of these issues."

Stewart asked if the schools had to file discipline reports. If so, she said, it would be helpful to have that data.

Pullen didn't think that would help.

"The numbers don't equal what I'm hearing: knives in schools. Fights. I don't think we discipline enough," he said.

Johnson said the matter will be an agenda item at a later meeting.

Murder, mayhem and fun awaits in upcoming show

A seasoned veteran onstage with Persimmon Tree Players, she also performed in productions by Langden Mason. Tom Green is also doing double duty, playing the lead and directing as well. He is teaming up with Micah Byler, whose background is in film and television, to give the show their own interpretation and

Starkey gives credit to Green for being the driving force behind the production, even though he's had to take over the lead role in the play and hand over the majority of the directing to Byler and Starkey while he's onstage. Doing what other past directors and Beth Sherk have been doing singlehandedly for years gives these directors a new perspective from another area of the theater. A director not only has a vision and works with the actors to create that vision, but also has to coordinate all the other elements involved in the production. Even for seasoned pros like Sherk, each show has its challenges.

Starkey recognizes how time consuming directing can be now that she is in the middle of it.

"The time commitment has been the most challenging part," said Starkey, who pointed out that aside from being at every rehearsal, she and Green have spent countless hours searching for costumes, furniture, and props for the set. "I think Tom has visited every Goodwill in a 60-mile radius at least twice, and we've spent more time on Amazon and eBay in the last few months than is good for a person's soul," she said.

Green also handles all of the rehearsal scheduling and communications to the cast, and he's hands-on with every aspect of the production.

"With Micah's background in TV and film, he brings a fresh eye and perspective to the team, and it makes him able to take the lead on designing the lighting and sound for the production. He's also very funny and is the most likely of the three of us to come up with a really comedic bit for the actors," Starkey said.

Out of Sight... Out of Murder revolves around an author trying to write a mystery novel in an old mansion where another author was previously murdered. At first it would seem he is struggling with writer's block when the onset of an electrical storm brings his characters to life, causing him to lose complete control of his story, which cleverly turns inside out as the mystery is unveiled with hilarious results.

Girls' soccer off to a strong start

The Fluco girls' soccer team started the season strong with a 4-1 win over Waynesboro Monday (March 11).

The Flying Fluco girls' soccer team, under second year coach Kat Ditta, was led by sophomore forward Kelsea Herring, who had two goals, and by junior goalie Brooke Nazar, who was especially strong in turning back the Little

In their first regular season game, the

Flucos dominated early, controlling the ball and forcing corner kicks, but not achieving a score. Herring and sophomore Kaitlin Bower had scoring chances but were turned away. It was only after over 32 minutes of play that the Flucos broke through.

Freshman Christina Valladares made a perfect short pass to Herring, who fired an accurate shot into the lower left corner of the goal and with 7:29 remaining in the first half, the Flucos were ahead for good 1-0. Late in the half, freshman mid-fielder Runa Scales almost made it 2-0 with a powerful long shot that sailed just too high.

Very early in the second half, the Little Giants presented the Flucos with a gift that the Flucos were glad to accept. A Little Giants defender trying to clear the ball from in front of her net inadvertently hit the ball on the wrong side of her foot, driving it into the goal, for what is known as an own goal. They happen even at the professional level. The Flucos led 2-0 with 38:17 left in the game.

Nine minutes later, Bower got off a strong shot from in front of the goal and it caromed off the right post into the back of the net for a 3-0 lead.

Just past the halfway point of the second half, the Little Giants finally got on the board, scoring on a breakaway that Nazar had little chance of stopping. This was about the only defensive lapse by the Flucos in the entire 80 minutes of play.

The final score of the game came with 7:57 remaining and iced the game for the Flucos. Herring scored again on a breakaway, set up by a nice pass from Scales. Herring finished


nicely beating the goalie with a left-footed shot from point blank range.

Several Fluco players stood out in this season opener. Brooke Nazar was excellent in goal, making the right decisions all game long on when to come out at a challenging attacker and when to stay back. There were no spectacular saves, but when a goalie is making the right decisions there often are not.

Controlling midfield is always important in soccer and the Flucos were good in this category as well. Scales was especially strong in this regard. Herring was the answer for the Flucos with a couple of impressive scores off a couple of nice assists.

Ditta noted that this is a young team with only two seniors on the roster. Both Madi Nazar and McKenzie Herring were starters in the opener. The season is long with 16 regular season games, but winning the opener is always good.

The Flucos traveled to Waynesboro March 18 for an immediate rematch of their opener. On March 25 the girls will play at Monticello High. They will host Orange County March 28.



NOTICE OF PROPOSED REAL PROPERTY TAX RATE INCREASE FLUVANNA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Per Virginia Code Section 58.1-3321, notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors of Fluvanna County proposes to increase property tax levies.

- (1) Assessment Increase: Total assessed value of real property, excluding additional assessments due to new construction or improvements to property, exceeds last year's total assessed value of real property by 3.36% percent.
- (2) Lowered Rate Necessary to Offset Increased Assessment: The tax rate which would levy the same amount of real estate tax as last year, when multiplied by the new total assessed value of real estate with the exclusions mentioned above would be \$0.893 per \$100 of assessed value. This rate will be known as the "lowered tax rate".
- (3) **Effective Rate Increase:** The County of Fluvanna proposes to adopt a tax rate of \$0.949 per \$100 of assessed value. The difference between the lowered tax rate and the proposed rate would be \$0.056 per \$100 or 6.27 percent. This difference will be known as the "effective tax rate increase".

Individual property taxes may, however, increase at a percentage greater than or less than the above percentage.

(4) Proposed Total Budget Increase: Based on the proposed real property tax rate and changes in other revenues, the total budget of Fluvanna County will exceed last year's by 4.55 percent 1.

A public hearing on the proposed tax rate and increase above will be held on Wednesday, April 10 th, 2019 at 7:00 p.m. in the Circuit Court Room, Fluvanna Courts Building, Palmyra, Virginia. 

Girls' tennis

The girls' tennis team started off strong with an 8-1 victory over Waynesboro March 11. According to senior Adora Gamage, the positive results of this first match of the season "reflected how hard we've been working."

The Lady Flucos singles winners for the match included the following: #1 seed Adora Gamage, #2 seed Sarah White, #3 seed Anja Bajs, #4 seed Lydia Napier, #5 seed Nika Ackenbom, and #6 seed Saige Patchett. Meanwhile, the doubles teams of Gamage and White, as well Ackenbom and Bajs, also secured wins for the night, putting them in a good position for their upcoming rematch against Waynesboro.

Boys' tennis

While the girls' team had a positive beginning to its season, the boys' tennis team kicked off its season with a rough start, enduring a 0-9 away loss against Waynesboro March 11. Woodworker and poet shares his talents

Age hasn't slowed Palmyra resident Fred Lewis, 92, from sharing his passion for woodworking with others.

Lewis was born and raised in Creston, N.C., a town in which the mountains meet North Carolina and Tennessee. In 1943, he and his family moved to Fork Union and started their new life on a farm.

Fast forward to 1992, when Lewis started woodworking and made a hobby out of it. He has a workshop in his backyard formerly his TV repair shop – and creates wooden designs for himself and others.

In 2015 Lewis' Palmyra United Methodist Church pastor asked him to make about 100 small wooden crosses. Since then he has been making them for anyone in the neighborhood.

"When my pastor asked me to make the crosses, I got myself into a job," said Lewis.

He glues together three pieces of cedar and sketches the cross design. Lewis optimizes his space, fitting about 52 outlines of the cross, and gets around 150 from the three boards together. In total, Lewis has made 6,500 crosses and his collection continues to grow.

Some of his crosses have even been as far as the Middle East. The son of a friend and fellow churchgoer, Capt. Kevin Whitney, is in the Air Force. Whitney's father sent a couple of Lewis' crosses overseas to help comfort members of the Armed Forces. Whitey responded by asking for more for his crew, and Lewis gladly made an additional 150 to send over.

Last November Whitney returned to the United States and attended the same church service as Lewis. At the service, Whitney presented Lewis with an American flag that was flown in an F-15E Strike Eagle on a combat sortie over Iraq along with a certificate. His crosses had made such an impact that Whitney wanted to thank Lewis for his work in person.

"Because of his faithfulness we were able to show God's love to lots of people," said Whitney. "This is for your faithfulness to not only God, but your country."

Lewis also enjoys writing poetry and posts his work on Facebook. His first poem was about his wife when they first met in 1947. It is about 15 pages with 10 verses on

After he and his family moved to Fluvanna County, Lewis and his brother took his newly bought Jeep for a drive around town on a Sunday afternoon in August 1947. They went to the country store run by two people named Mary and Elmer. Mary's younger sister, Margaret, was visiting from Baltimore and it was that day when Lewis met his future wife.

The two started dating, but when Lewis was 21 years old, he planned on going to school in Cincinnati, Ohio; however, he still wanted to be with Margaret. After talking, they found an answer to their solution. They got married and moved to Ohio to begin their new journey together. After school, they both got jobs in a factory and had their firstborn son. They eventually

moved back to Fork Union and in 1955 he years later they purchased a home in the town of Palmyra where their business was taking off.

Lewis was and still is an active member in the community. He was the fire chief in Palmyra from 1962 to 1989 and was recognized for his 45 years of service in May poetry on Facebook.

Now with the ability to share his poetry, and Margaret opened a TV repair shop. Two Lewis posts his poetry about himself, family members, and his day online to friends and

> "I started posting one almost every day for no particular reason. People enjoyed them so much and they comment about what they like about them," said Lewis.

About two years ago, Lewis made a 2001. He continues to attend services at wooden clock for one of his granddaughters Palmyra United Methodist Church and post in the U.S. Air Force. He posted a photo of the detailed clock along with this poem:

> She was enlisting in the Air Force that day. An enlistment for a six-year stay. You might want to know who this lady would be. She is my granddaughter, Pa is what she calls me. Very soon she went to South Korea, for a one-year stay. Should be coming home this March, if everything goes the right way. Of all the clocks in the last few years, that I have done This most certainly is the very best one. I am now making one like it, and when I am all through It will be going to someone in the Air Force too. A very short story tonight I would say. That is all I have to write today. Good night now to everyone out there Nothing more at all to share. Bye now **God bless**


