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## **Charlotte Patterson's School Career Shows Work Ethic, Dedication**

here's something to say about longevity in our jobs, our relationships, and in our lives as it often times represents contentment and dedication to something we believe in. That dedication can be displayed in this story about a very special individual who has been part of the Buckingham County School system for

Charlotte Booker Patterson began working with the county school system in 1966. "My first job was as a teacher's aide at the Carter G. Woodson High School with the Title 1 program," said Patterson. "Mr. Frank Harris was the director and it was the first such program

in the county."

Although Patterson was born in Prince
Edward, she attended school in
Buckingham after her parents moved to the county when she was three. After graduation she had considered working for the Craddock Terry Shoe Factory. "I got the job offer with Craddock Terry the same day that the school system offered me the aide job," she said. "I've never regretted my decision or my career

Throughout Patterson's 50+ year time with Buckingham, she has experienced a variety of work positions. "I was a substitute teacher at Carter G. Woodson. I then worked in the cafeteria as a cashier, assisted in the office and later became school secretary for what was then

known as Buckingham Junior High School," said Patterson, as she mentally reviewed her work history. In 1974 Patterson moved to the School Board Office as secretary to the Director of Instruction, administered by Mr. Frank Harris. She was the first African-American secretary to work at the office. She has remained at the Office until her retirement in 2014. But, that is not the end of the story, as after one month of retirement, she

they ever needed me I would come in to assist," said Patterson. As of December, 2018, she is now serving as their current front desk receptionist.

graciously agreed to return and fill in as needed.. "I had promised them that if

Patterson obviously found her niche working for the School District. "I've always liked being a secretary and greeting people," she said. "You've got to be open to receiving the public. I like that. The office staff has always been so nice to me. I've always enjoyed working with them and feel I've gained so much from my work here." Patterson laughs as she talks about her 50 year career of going from manual typewriters to computers, from rotary phones, ditto machines to the current technology. "When I was Deputy Clerk of the School Board I had to take notes of the monthly board meetings by hand and then type them up for the records. It's so interesting how things have changed over the past 50 years but I love the challenge and enjoy learning new things. I've always tried to improve throughout the years."

When you consider just a few of the individuals who Patterson has worked with over the past 50 years it becomes a type of archival history of the educational system: Mr. Driscoll, Mr. Kay, Dr. Gold, Dr. Coonan, Dr. Massie, Dr. Blair, Dr. Snead, Dr. Hicks, Frank Harris, Carol P. Lebes, Charles of the Archival Lebes (her first godd tools). Jones (her first grade teacher), John Morgan, John Brown, Mary Etta Brown Shelton, Jose Baldwin, Ossie Harris, Spencer Adams, Joan Staton, and Thelma

Llewellyn are just a few of the individuals who she's worked with. "Over the past 50 years the staff has come and gone," she said. "It's naturally an adjustment to work with a new superintendent as they often come in with different ideas. I'm happy to say that I've never had any problem working with any of the staff. I'm grateful and thankful for all those years.

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

When the Beacon recently visited a rehearsal at the elementary school it was full of joy, laughter, and a whole lot of energy. Student actors and production crew were very happy to talk about their involvement in the Club and why they are willing to take a break from homework to memorize their lines, and to stay after school to rehearse and rehearse.

Elementary office aide Stacie Pierce is joined by music teacher Charlotte Trant, art teacher Maddie Faw (who leads the stage crew), and starting this year, office staffer Angela Kitchen, as part of the adult team who works with the students.

But, it's obviously the kids and their enthusiasm that make the production a success. Fourth grader, Trinity Mitchell, who will be the witch in Macbeth, said, "I like it because I get to say stuff. We get to dress up and everything. I don't get nervous because I remember all my lines and when to say it." Katie Dodson, who is in the third grade and will play Malcolm, has actually participated in community theatre with Farmville's Waterworks Theatre. "I was on the stage crew in Shrek at Waterworks and played a rabbit and a child in Star Trek. I like acting." Three year veteran, Abigail Bryant, joined in. "I played the lead last year in Stone in the Road. I practiced a lot so it wasn't that hard. Sometimes getting to know the character can really be tricky."

Ariel Foster, who is also a three-year veteran, shared her thoughts about being involved in the Club. "A lot of my friends are involved so it's more fun. It's not hard to learn lines. I get stage fright but I just imagine the audience isn't there and it works for the most part"

Fifth grader, Kylah Austin, who will play Lady Macduff and Siward, is in her second year with the theatre. "I really love drama and when I was in fourth grade I was so nervous. But then I got used to it. I think it helps me focus and be a better student."

Along with the actors, the very important stage crew is involved. Belle Bryant, who is a fifth grader, has done some small acting parts but prefers working in the background. "I like painting and setting up the stage. It's fun and making sure all the props are in the right place."

Buckingham Elementary principal, Bryan Jackson, is one of the Club's biggest fans. "I love what they have done with this program. It is entirely home grown and on a limited budget. I did my best to support them with funds in the past and now the PTO also helps out. The performances they have put on the past two years were incredible!"

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

### Who doesn't love Bluebirds!?

Briefly, in 2012 Central Piedmont Virginia Master Naturalists developed a Stewardship project to help increase populations of the Eastern Bluebird. The project has morphed a bit over the past eight years, but the end result has been the same.....each February twelve to twenty-five Bluebird boxes have been assembled in a community workshop and participants take their boxes home to be mounted on their proper-

For the past three years, our Master Naturalist chapter has worked with Morgan Smith's Carpentry class at Buckingham County's Career and Technical Center. We purchase red cedar from Cumberland Building Supply, who works with us to make the supplies a bit more affordable. Supplies are delivered to the school and students follow the Virginia Bluebia and the cut out the pieces product to put Society's birdhouse plan to cut out the pieces needed to put together the box. Bear Creek Lake State Park provides the site for the workshop, which is scheduled annually in mid-February. Master Naturalist volunteers provide a brief introduction about bluebirds and then assist with box assembly.

Each box that is mounted early in the season has the potential for three broods.....each brood generally 4 eggs. If mother nature allows each bird to hatch and fledge successfully, there is potential for 12 bluebirds to be added to the population on a given site! And to take that one step further, each

year our workshop sends at least 15 boxes home with participants....a potential for 180 new beautiful, sky-blue songbirds in the areal

Buckingham Notables: Mrs. Owen John Williams

In 1959, Mrs. R. J. Wojnicki's lengthy article in Charlottesville's *Daily Progress*, "Welch Quarrymen Organized Church In Buckingham," reported that Mrs. Owen John Williams was at that time the oldest member of Arvon Presbyterian Church. Mrs. Williams had been a member for almost fifty-two years, joining the church when Rev. Plummer F. Jones was pastor. For over forty years, Mrs. Williams taught junior classes in the Sunday School, only taking a break when her sons were born, and remembered when the adult Sunday School classes were taught in Welsh. In 1959, Welsh hymnals were still kept in the church.

Born Sarah Louisa File, on December 26, 1872, at Ransons, Buckingham County, Mrs. Williams was a first generation American on her father's side. Her father came to Virginia from England and her husband, Owen John Williams, emigrated from Wales in 1891. Mr. Williams first worked in Vermont as a slate maker, later moving to Arvonia. The couple was married in 1907 and, from 1928 to 1934, Mr. Williams served as Treasurer of the church. When he died in 1934, Mrs. Williams took over as Treasurer, serving until 1958. Mrs. Wojnicki also noted that while Mrs. Williams was the oldest member of Arvon Presbyterian Church, her ten-year-old granddaugh-

ter, Anne File Williams, was the youngest.

#### **Buckingham Female Collegiate Institute**

Buckingham History: William G. Shepard

Over the twentieth century, several individuals contributed significantly to chronicling the history of Buckingham County. Each had their special interests. Some, including Lulie Patteson and Mrs. R. J. Wojnicki, wrote for daily newspapers. Others, including Rosa Williams and Elizabeth McCraw, focused on places in Buckingham and created surveys for the Depression-Era Virginia Historical Inventory.

Another Buckingham historican, William Gamalel Shepard, published numerous

articles in William and Mary Quarterly. Keenly aware of losses due to the Buckingham Courthouse fire, he was particularly interested in preserving the contents of original documents, many of which had survived in his family papers. His multipart article tracing the history of Buckingham Female Collegiate Institute is invaluable. During 1937, Shepard also served as an informant for several Virginia Historical Inventory surveys, again providing details about his family homes and

Like so many other aspects of Buckingham County's history, the works of these historians are scattered far and wide, and many are destroyed. But all is not lost! A biographical essay of William Gamaliel Shepard can now be found in my book, "At a Place Called Buckingham," Volume Two.

**Buckingham County Weddings** 

One hundred years ago, December weddings were extremely popular. On January 4, 1905, the *Appomattox and Buckingham Times printed the following about* a Buckingham County union:

#### Alcoma. Davison-Rosin

Miss Anne B. Rosin and Mr. R. T. Davidson, were quietly married at the bride's home, "Oakland," on December 18, [1904]. Rev. W. E. Bullard officiated. Mrs. R. I. Morgan was matron of honor and Mr. R. I. Morgan was best man. The parlor was beautifully decorated with holly, ferns and juniper. Mr. and Mrs. Davidson took the C. & O. train at Dillwyn for their new home in Ashland. Attendants were as follows: Miss Bessie Rosin and Mr. Humphrey Steger, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Morgan, Mr. Charles Rosin, Mr. D. M. Word, Mrs. Shellie Saunders and Mr. Irby Saunders. Mr. C. R. Rosin has just returned from the Valley of Virginia where he received a good price for his cattle and his old friends were very glad to see him.

### Timmy Vadasz: **Helping Student Apply to College**

n this day and time applying for college is not for the weak of heart. The process, which is quite competitive and time consuming, actually begins years before applying as students develop their transcripts for strong GPAs, become involved in clubs and other activities to add to a resume, and pre-

involved in clubs and other activities to add to a resume, and prepare for the SAT and ACT tests, all in hopes that the college of their choice will accept them when they graduate.

This process has gotten much easier for students at Buckingham County High School thanks to the Americorps College Advisor program. In its fifth year at Buckingham High and staffed by University of Virginia graduate Timmy Vadasz the College Advisor program gives students one-on-one assistance on the college application and financial aid process. Vadesz, who will be at the high school for a total of two years, provides expert guidance and advice to seniors as they wade through the many different levels of applying for college. they wade through the many different levels of applying for college. One specific mission of the program is to provide such services to rural schools where the rate of college attendance is likely low.

Vadasz's position is currently funded through a grant administrated by LIVO.

tered by UVA. He received intense training during this past summer

before beginning his job in August, 2018.

"We had three weeks of summer training on the UVA campus," he said. "I learned more than I ever thought I'd know about college admissions and the ins and outs of financial aid. During the fourth week of training we toured difference college campuses to see what they were like in order to share our experiences with the students." Vadesz also got to hear from admissions staff. "I got to hear from the Tech counselor who gave insight on when to apply as they were revamping their application process this year. Being there and being able to hear this saved a lot of confusion when working with students."

Senior Colton Morris, who has been accepted to Radford, Longwood, ODU, and

Senior Colton Morris, who has been accepted to Radford, Longwood, ODU, and Virginia Wesleyan, and was working on additional application projects in Vadasz's office, had many good things to say about the College Advisor program. "I think that without Mr. Vadasz the process that I've gone through would be a lot more difficult. Some of the things that I've gone through I didn't have a clue what to do. He's made it much less difficult to go through the process of applying and attending college. It's a long, tedious process. We walk in not knowing what we're doing. It's a lot easier to have someone help us with what we're doing and to know what colleges are looking for in a prospective student."

Vadasz, in conjunction with the school's Counseling Department, also coordi-


Vadasz, in conjunction with the school's Counseling Department, also coordinates events to assist both students and parents. "We have a FAFSA Night in the fall, allowing parents of seniors the opportunity to complete their financial aid form with the help of experts," he said. Vadasz also coordinates College Application Week in the fall, allowing seniors to use the computer lab to complete applications, again with expert help. "I also had several college admission counselors come in that week to do on-site admissions. That's always helpful for students and certainly makes them feel better when they are accepted on the spot," said Vadasz.

Charmaine Battle, who has been accepted to Mary Baldwin, Longwood, and Radford walked in to Vadasz's office to have him review one of her financial aid letters.

program offers have made a big difference in my process of applying for college."

Vadasz's purpose in working with the Americorps program was very personal "When I was a high school senior I had no idea about the process. I didn't even fill out the FAFSA until late April which meant my financial packet was thousands of dollars less than it could have been. I didn't have easy access to an individual person who could help me with the process. Having a College Advisor who is solely dedicated to focusing on the college process for students gives them much more opportunity for success.

Vadasz noted that the current complicated digital application and financial aid process often makes it difficult for parents to assist their children. Morris nodded and said, "Even with my brothers attending college just ten years ago the process is so different. We went to FAFSA night and Mr. Vadasz and the counseling staff stayed with us the whole time and helped us get through it."

Vadasz, who hails from Mechanicsville, was an Economics and Education major, but is now considering getting a masters in school counseling after his College.

but is now considering getting a masters in school counseling after his College Advisor job ends. "I knew that college was important and that going can change your life. One thing that specifically drew me to this job was my experiences with financial aid. My family's education history is very diversified thus I have a bigger picture of what happens with the process."

Although the four-year application process is Vadasz's main focus, he also assists students who consider a different academic path. "I do focus on four-year colleges more than two year but I understand the value of a two-year college track. There are some career paths that community colleges are a better fit for. In some cases it's the perfect fit for individual students and what they want to major in."

Vadasz reviews student acceptance letters and SAT scores, discusses the financial

aid award letters and helps student understand how to compare the award letters to

determine which is a better financial fit.

Typical with teens, there are some hurdles that he has encountered. "The biggest hurdle is the gap in expectations," he said. "A lot of students aren't aware of the grade point average or SAT/ACT requirements that certain schools have. Those can be hard conversations to have with some students. Another challenge is the lack of preparedness. They don't have a college list, they wait until their senior year to take the SAT, or they may not have chosen to take the classes that would help them get into college.

In order to work on that problem, Vadasz and the counselors are currently working on a March Madness program for juniors to encourage them to set goals, build a list of colleges that they want to apply to and to register for the spring SAT. They recently held a College Night for sophomores and juniors and their parents to discuss the aspects of the college process. "I personally led a workshop in the library specifically devoted to getting juniors ready for college," he said. And, as the May 1 date approaches, Vadasz is preparing for the big Decision Day event where students who have finalized their decision celebrate with food, prizes, music, and

In anticipation for his second year at Buckingham High, Vadasz noted, "I'm more comfortable now in knowing how to approach students, how to better prepare students with a year under my belt, especially with the junior class. When the current juniors return as seniors this fall, I hope that I'll be able to start them on the process sooner, especially with the SAT assessment. Some students don't want to take the SAT for whatever reason. If you don't take it, you can miss out on some scholarship opportunities. It's an important test.

Vadasz obviously enjoys his work with the students. "A few weeks ago, I was helping a low-income student with her financial aid letter. As we reviewed the awards I could see that she was realizing that college is actually possible for her. The



With the other responsibilities we have as counselors, it would be very difficult to give each senior the attention that he or she does. He is an invaluable member of our team!
