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

Man found dead in Lake house fire No suspects sought

Firefighters combating a blaze at 4 Roadview Terrace in Lake Monticello discovered the body of a man inside, according to the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office.

Lake Monticello Fire and Rescue and other area fire departments responded to the scene at around 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday (April 3) after the blaze was reported at 3:17 p.m.

The body was discovered by firefighters and was later transported to the Chief Medical Examiner's Office in Richmond. Authorities believe the man is one of the homeowners, but it may take several weeks to make a positive identification through DNA analysis, according to the sheriff's office.

Crews from multiple agencies worked to extinguish the fire, but the house was

severely damaged.

No suspects are sought in connection with fire or the death, and there is no threat to public safety, according to the sheriff's office.

The Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office and the Virginia State Police are investigating the scene. It will take several weeks to obtain lab results and finalize the fire cause and origin investigation, according to the sheriff's office.


Lake Monticello Fire and Rescue declined to comment, citing the ongoing investigation.

"The family requests privacy during this tragic time in their lives," wrote Capt. David Wells of the sheriff's office in a press release. "They also request that members of the media and the general public please stay off their property."

Fluvanna County's premier community festival will celebrate its 23rd Anniversary. Held at Pleasant Grove Park, Old Farm Day has become a family tradition in Central Virginia. Old Farm Day started 23 years ago when several local farmers and members of the Fluvanna Historical Society wanted to educate the public about Fluvanna's agricultural heritage, and particularly farming's evolution over the past 100+ years.

Old Farm Day has evolved into one of the largest community events in Fluvanna County. It features displays of vintage farm equipment and other antique vehicles, demonstrations by heritage crafters, 4-H demonstrations, educational activities and games for kids, a tater hunt, pie baking contest, toetapping music, great food and wine tasting, and numerous vendors from crafters to local businesses from around Central Virginia. We also have some modern-day equipment on display that typically replaces several farming practices, both old-time 'automated' and manual labor. Proceeds benefit the Fluvanna Historical Society and the fund to support the Farm Heritage Museum.

Old Farm Day attracts over 4,500 visitors from the Central Virginia region to this one-day event. The event is an all-volunteer affair. In addition to the 20-person committee that organizes and executes the event, volunteers come from all generations;

n Saturday, May 4, 2019, Old Farm Day - girl scouts, football players, FUMA Cadets, Moms, Dads, grandparents and retirees. Some of us even have recruited our grandkids. All told, it takes over 100 volunteers starting days before the event to transport the equipment to the park, mark vendor spaces, put up fencing, distribute advertisements and banners, and much more! It's great to 'work' on this wonderful event that brings the whole community together to celebrate Fluvanna's heritage.

Our promotion and advertising reaches beyond Fluvanna County to the broader region, and really helps drives tourism to the county. Every year we have exhibitors and vendors from Richmond, Goochland, Culpeper, Waynesboro, etc. and they have their 'following.' We also have a listing on the Virginia Tourism site, Virginia.org; they provide information on all sorts of things to do and see in Virginia, including Old Farm Day!

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Supervisors Crime victims honored for perseverance

The Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors opened its Wednesday (April 3) meeting with a special award presentation in honor of National Crime Victims' Rights Week.

For victims, the crime itself is often just the start of a long journey – one that can require them to relive their trauma again and again as cases work their way through the justice system.

To recognize the sheer grit involved in seeing cases through to the end, Commonwealth's Attorney Jeff Haislip and Victim Witness Coordinator Sherri Stader handed out the Lisa Black Victim Perseverance Award to survivors of two shootings that have taken place in Fluvanna in recent years.

"I absolutely love my job," said Stader in her opening remarks. "I get to meet the most incredible, strong people in the world."

Haislip first introduced Jackie Gillespie, a retired 33-year veteran of the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office and former Fluvanna sheriff who found himself in the middle of a gunfight one afternoon in November 2016.

Gillespie was helping his friends Garnette and Scott Bourne transport an old bus engine to the garage on Garnette Bourne's property off Route 618 (Lake Monticello Road) when they were confronted by armed gunman Gary Blowe, who had been attempting to rob the apartment above the garage.

Blowe suddenly started firing at them. Showing "courage I don't think I could summon," Gillespie began returning fire, Haislip said, leaving several bullet holes in Blowe's car as he fled the scene. If not for Gillespie's actions, "Gary Blowe would have left three dead people."

Haislip said Gillespie had worked closely with law enforcement and prosecutors as the case against Blowe and three other defendants moved through the system.

"The only thing I can say is: It was a rough day," said Gillespie.

The second set of recipients included the survivors of an April 2017 incident on Hard-ware Hills Circle in Scottsville.

On the night of April 30, 2017, Michael Townsend was talking with his neighbor, Kimberly Clements, and her young son, Caleb. Suddenly, their neighbor Joe Roach began screaming obscenities and firing his rifle in their direction.

As Roach continued to fire, Townsend and Clements shielded 6-year-old Caleb with

their own bodies to get him safely into the Clements' home. Townsend returned to his home, where his wife, Judy Townsend, had alerted their daughter, Sarah Williams, who rushed to the house.

Williams was hit near the eye by a piece of shrapnel. Doctors later said she came within millimeters of sustaining a potentially fatal wound.

Sarah Williams, Kimberly Clements, and the Townsends persevered through multiple hearings, long delays, and a grueling day-long trial, but as a result, Roach "won't be back in their neighborhood again," Haislip said.

Gary Blowe was sentenced to 42 years in prison in May 2018; Joe Roach was given 58 years in November 2018.

The awards were handed out by Lisa Black, the survivor of a near-fatal crash caused by a drunk driver in October 2014. She was the first recipient of the award in 2017, and the award was then named in her honor.

Island Hill

Following the awards ceremony, supervisors moved through a light agenda. Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia) and Supervisor Mozell Booker (Fork Union) were not in attendance. Supervisor Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) chaired the meeting.

Supervisors Trish Eager (Palmyra) and O'Brien attended a community meeting held by residents of Broken Island and Lake Monticello's Riverside section over the proposed 49-unit Island Hill housing development near the intersection of Broken Island Road and South Boston Road (Route 600).

"I think the yield plan for Island Hill should be looked at very, very carefully," said Eager, citing concerns over the parcel's steep slopes and the small buffers between the proposed development and the existing neighborhoods. "These are things we should look at before we give it a seal of approval," she added.

"I don't think you have a seal of approv-

al," said County Administrator Steve Nichols. Approval of housing developments is an administrative decision.

Jason Stewart, director of community development, and County Attorney Fred Payne told the board that the developer had resolved several issues that came up in the initial application.

While the board may not be able to revisit Island Hill, Eager argued that "it's time to take a fresh look at our ordinances."

Nichols said there were potential tweaks the Planning Commission or the supervisors might be able to make to existing zoning ordinances in the short term while planning a comprehensive look in the future.

O'Brien said that most of the audience at the community meeting had seemed resigned to the idea that Island Hill was going to be built, but said the issues they raised might benefit the county in the future. "We'll make better rural subdivisions going forward," he said.

Obituary Lt. Col. William F. Henson



Our father, Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) William Frank Henson, died Saturday, April 6, 2019, at Westminster Canterbury of the Blue Ridge at the age of 91. He was the beloved husband of the late Jane Henson. Born in Knoxville, Tenn., son of the late Manley and Louise Henson, Bill lived in Lake Monticello and Charlottesville for the past five years, and previously, was a longtime resident of Heathsville in the Northern Neck of Virginia.

Bill entered the Army in 1950 and shortly thereafter deployed to his first assignment to the Philippines as a young second lieutenant, beginning a career that spanned almost 26 years and assignments across four continents, and multiple command and staff positions. During his Army career, he graduated from Texas A&M with a bachelor of science in civil engineering and later, earned a master of science in engineering from Michigan State University. His service as a commissioned officer with the U.S. Corps of Engineers included participation in and leadership of many dramatic projects around the world. From the Philippines, to geodesic engineering and mapping of the Republic of Korea, to bridging the Rhine River in Germany in the 1950s, to officer in charge of the U.S. Army Joint Mapping Program in Honduras in the 1960s, to Project Engineer, Far East District, Korea, to assistant engineer commissioner of the District of Columbia, he was the epitome of selfless service.

Bill married the former Jane Surface in 1951 and together they raised three children: Bill (Linda) Henson, Jr., of Olney, Md.; Marion "Lou" (Bob) Lamb of Palmyra, Va.; and John (Kimberlee) Henson of Carlisle, Penn. As an Army family, they were experienced at moving from assignment to assignment, including a 3,500 mile car trip up the Pan American highway in an 8-year-old station wagon, from Tegucigalpa, Honduras to McLean, Va. When asked why he would undertake such a journey, Bill simply said, "I really liked that car."

He was a loving grandfather of Robert (Maria), Andrew (Jennifer) and Christopher Lamb; Sharon, Susan, and Sarah Henson; and Lauren (Ericka) and Ryan (Olivia) Henson and was the beloved great-grandfather of Isabella, Charlotte, Violet and Arianna.

Following his service to our nation, he worked as the Washington office executive director of the American Public Works Association and in 1977 he and Jane retired to Heathsville and together made their home at Sunnyside (circa 1820). During these wonderful years together, they indulged in his passion for sailing, restoring old cars, and the challenges of managing a home built in 1820. It included leadership at St. Stephens Episcopal Church as senior warden as well as service on various community projects, including the board of the Northumberland Library and important historical preservation work at Rice's Hotel-Hughlett's Tavern. Bill served his nation, his community, and his church. He was a quiet, kind, and graceful man of faith, loved by his friends and cherished by his family.

Funeral services will be conducted Sunday, April 14, 2019, at 1 p.m. at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Simeon, 1333 Thomas Jefferson Parkway, Charlottesville, Va.

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James Kelley announces School Board run

Weeks ago before the University of Virginia (U.Va.) men's basketball team made it to the Final Four, James Kelley chose 6 p.m. Saturday to hold a party at his house to announce his run for the Palmyra District School Board seat. Game day Saturday, April 6; tip-off time 6:05 p.m.

Kelley made it work.

With the game on multiple big-screen TVs, meat on the grill and drinks on ice, Kelley welcomed about 50 guests. After the game, Kelley announced his student-centered candidacy.

"If I'm lucky enough to sit behind that table the only metric I'll use to make decisions is how it will affect the children," Kelley said.

The Fluvanna Review asked Kelley several questions about himself and his run for School Board.

Tell us about yourself.

I'm a business consultant and data analyst. Most of my life has revolved around education – I'm the product of a public school system in a county with a great deal of similarities to Fluvanna. I graduated from St. Mary's College, a public honors college in Maryland, I received my Ph.D. in political science a few months ago from Temple University, and I've taught about a dozen classes at the graduate and undergraduate level.

Some of my professional experience includes conducting research for universities. Most of my opportunities and success have been possible because of my education – because of teachers and professors who mentored me, who saw talent and encouraged me to want more. I hope to be an advocate for the students of Fluvanna so that they have similar opportunities.

Why are you running for School Board?

I'm running because I've been the beneficiary of a strong community, amazing teachers, and encouraging mentors. Now that I'm finished with my Ph.D., it's time to give back. This is one way I can positively impact others' lives.

Why now? [Current Palmyra representative] Brenda Pace has served on the School Board faithfully for eight years. I've seen firsthand the importance of the decisions she's made and the compassion with which she approaches them. As she retires, it's time for someone to step forward and serve. I'm running because I think my personal, professional and educational experiences make me a strong advocate for students.

Do you have children and if so, where are they schooled?

We do not have children yet. There were a lot of things we wanted to accomplish before starting our family. First, we wanted to be embedded in a community we cared about. Second, we wanted to own our own home. Third, we wanted to be finished with school. We feel like we're there now, as I just completed my Ph.D. in January. My wife, Sharon Kelley, finished a few years ago. We're excited for the next chapter of our lives that includes things like a family and increased community service.

By statute, candidates for School Board are to run independent of party affiliation. Why do you think that is?

I think this may be one of the smartest statutes in the Virginia code. I don't believe political parties serve any purpose with regards to School Boards. A School Board member's focus should be on those who will ultimately be impacted by their policies, including students, parents, teachers, staff and administration. When politics become an issue, these groups suffer. Frankly, I believe if School Board members consider their (D) or (R) identification before casting a vote, they are doing a great disservice to the community.

How do you feel about party politics and how they should or shouldn't affect how a School Board member votes?

I believe every School Board decision should be evaluated based on its impact on students. If proposals are not in the students' best interest then they should not be adopted. How much time per month do you feel a School Board member should be willing to put into the job?

The business of the School Board ebbs and flows throughout the year depending on where we are in the budgetary cycle. ... I think an elected member should be willing to put as much time as is required for them to contribute meaningfully to the community. I'm fortunate that I work at home and feel like I have a large amount of time to dedicate to the School Board. I can tell you that I'm spending about 20 hours a week now attending school-related meetings and talking to parents. If I'm lucky enough to serve the Palmyra district I don't see that time commitment changing.

How do you think the School Board should approach the annual budget? In the most recent budget building sessions, a board member didn't want to just start with last year's budget

as a base, but build it from the ground up. Others expressed frustration that the budget goes up every year.

I'm not shocked that budgets rise over time – the cost of labor and materials rise globally each year. School systems are not immune to these factors. That said, I'm a data analyst and business consultant and I believe that strategic planning is critical to any organization's success.

I believe budgets should be based on the previous year's planned and actual expenditures. It's helpful to start with the previous year's budget as a base case, because most of the changes that happen year to year are likely to happen on the margins. For instance, salaries and infrastructural costs are unlikely to change greatly. But within discretionary and programmatic spending, we should be eager to reassess our priorities. Specifically, line by line: What are we spending the money on, what outcomes did we expect or anticipate from spending the money, and is it working? Are there new ideas that merit funding at the expense of these other things? Ultimately it's the School Board's responsibility to spend the budget wisely and, as the old adage says, "do more with less." It's my hope to bring metric-driven decision making to the budget process.

What do you see as budget priorities?

My biggest priorities, in no particular order, are:

Career and technical education

Regardless of where students are headed after high school, Fluvanna graduates must have the skills necessary to be successful. ... Right now we have about 12 strong CTE programs which are doing great things to prepare students for both college and the workforce.

... I'm committed to protecting, funding and expanding our offerings as we can afford to do so. Specifically, we don't have classes for students who want to become welders, electricians or auto mechanics. I'd love to start a partnership with local businesses so we can prepare students for careers in these fields, among others.

Competitive, reliable teacher pay

Teachers are some of the most undervalued professionals in the workforce. Fluvanna has a responsibility to provide teachers with competitive and reliable pay. I believe we need to compare what we pay with those counties we compete against, and close those gaps so we can attract the best and brightest teachers. I believe we should smooth the scale over time so teachers can anticipate and receive reliable increases in pay. The existing steps, which offer small increases followed by larger increases at particular years of service, make it difficult for Fluvanna to honor their commitment in years when a large teacher cohort hits those milestones. I will work hard to provide a competitive starting salary and provide reliable increases so that teachers receive what we promise them.

Low student-teacher ratio

Gaps in academic achievement between students appear early in education and do not narrow over time. In other words, these performance gaps are real and they are often permanent. One tool we have in our arsenal to prevent them from occurring is individualized attention. Students learn at different paces, and respond to teaching techniques differently, but the smaller the class sizes, especially in grades K-2, the more time a teacher has to focus on each student and discover how they learn best.

Mental and behavioral health

According to a national study, one in five children has a diagnosable emotional, behavioral or mental health disorder. These disorders require specialized treatment by qualified mental health professionals. Public schools can't provide all the services that students require, but we must have the specialized staff to help teachers identify students with needs, assist in treatment planning, and advocate for students and parents to receive services.

Fluvanna County Public Schools has one social worker for 3,500 students spread across

six buildings. The National Association of Social Workers recommends one social worker for every 250 students (and 1:150 for students with intensive needs). That means Fluvanna has about 13 fewer social workers than is recommended. We can't make up that difference overnight, but having more mental and behavioral health professionals will leader to better outcomes for students and provide teachers with additional support.

School safety

Comprehensive care from infancy to young adulthood.

School safety is an issue I've been hearing a lot about as I knock on doors and have conversations with parents. Specifically, I hear a lot about bullying and physical safety. In order to learn, students must be rested, well-nourished, and feel safe in their environment. When these basic needs aren't met, students aren't at their best. I will fight to ensure that students are safe in our buildings and that we continue to identify bullying early and prevent it. I know the current board is having conversations about this and that the administration is working on bullying prevention. I'm eager to join these conversations and help produce thoughtful solutions.

Students of color are disproportionately represented in discipline issues. Do you think that's a problem, and if so, what solutions do you propose?

A 2013-14 non-partisan study by the Government Accountability Office revealed that students of color, boys, and students with disabilities are statistically overrepresented in all discipline categories nationwide. According to a 2017 presentation by Dr. James Mathieson, the Fluvanna director of testing and accountability, Fluvanna's discipline data reveals a similar trend for students of color and for those students who come from less wealthy families (as defined by free and reduced lunch qualification). Fluvanna is not alone; this is a nationwide problem.

I believe the solution to most behavioral-discipline issues lies in smaller class sizes and adequate staffing of social workers and guidance counselors. Then, our great teachers and staff have more opportunities to work with their students, and when behavioral problems can't be addressed in the classroom, social workers or guidance counselors can intervene ahead of formal disciplinary processes. If we give students and school personnel an opportunity to work through why the behavior problems exist, we have a better chance at keeping students in school and learning, as opposed to out of school and falling behind.

There's a growing concern that students are tested too often. What are your thoughts?

Most of our testing is state or federally mandated. Even if the School Board wanted to halt all testing, they legally couldn't without losing vital sources of funding. Standardized testing is helpful in a lot of a ways: It gives us the metrics we need to measure ourselves; it can help us track changes in performance across time and between demographic groups. However, I believe the burden for any non-mandated testing must be outweighed by the benefits our students will see from these evaluations.



Teaching elementary music a joyful experience

I am the music teacher at Central Elementary and West Central Elementary. I live at Lake Monticello with my beautiful wife and three cats. As I finish out my 30th year as a teacher with Fluvanna County schools, I want to share some of my thoughts and precious memories of the amazing years that I have been a proud Fluco educator.

I was born in Richmond. I attended schools in Henrico County where my love of music started. I fell in love with music in the fourth grade. One day in music class, our music teacher asked the class to listen to a recording of a musical story titled Peter and the Wolf. The teacher displayed seven posters of different musical instruments. As we listened to the music, we were asked to match the instruments we were hearing with the poster that represented each instrument. As I sat at my desk that day, I fell in love with music.

As I grew older, my parents bought me a trumpet and I slowly learned to play. In high school, marching band was my life. Being able to be outside on a large field and blow that trumpet was like being in heaven for me.

vanna County. One thing I love the most about teaching in Fluvanna is that my coworkers are also my family. We share a common love of children and education and strive every single day to make a positive difference in the lives of all of our students. I am grateful to Amy Barnabei and Clint Estes for being the best school principals any school could have. They love and care about the children in our school just as if they were their own children. Our children and staff are lucky to have them in our school system.

The past 30 years have gone by so fast for me. I can still remember that first back to school meeting we had in the cafeteria of the old high school. There were so many people I did not know and I was so intimidated. After an hour I began to feel right at home with my new Fluco friends. I am so grateful for all the love and encouragement the Fluvanna staff has given me over the years.

I am excited about our kindergarten spring concert. We have a total of 12 kindergarten classes at West Central Elementary. Kindergarten classes from Pod 1 will be performing in our school's auditorium Tuesday (April 16) at 6:30 p.m. Kindergarten classes from Pod 2 will be performing Wednesday (April 17) at 6:30 p.m.

The children have been working hard memorizing the words to all their songs. The concert is open to the public and you will be in for a treat when you hear them sing. Two of their songs will be from popular movies and one song will be sung in sign language.
