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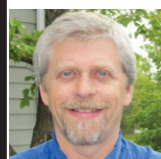


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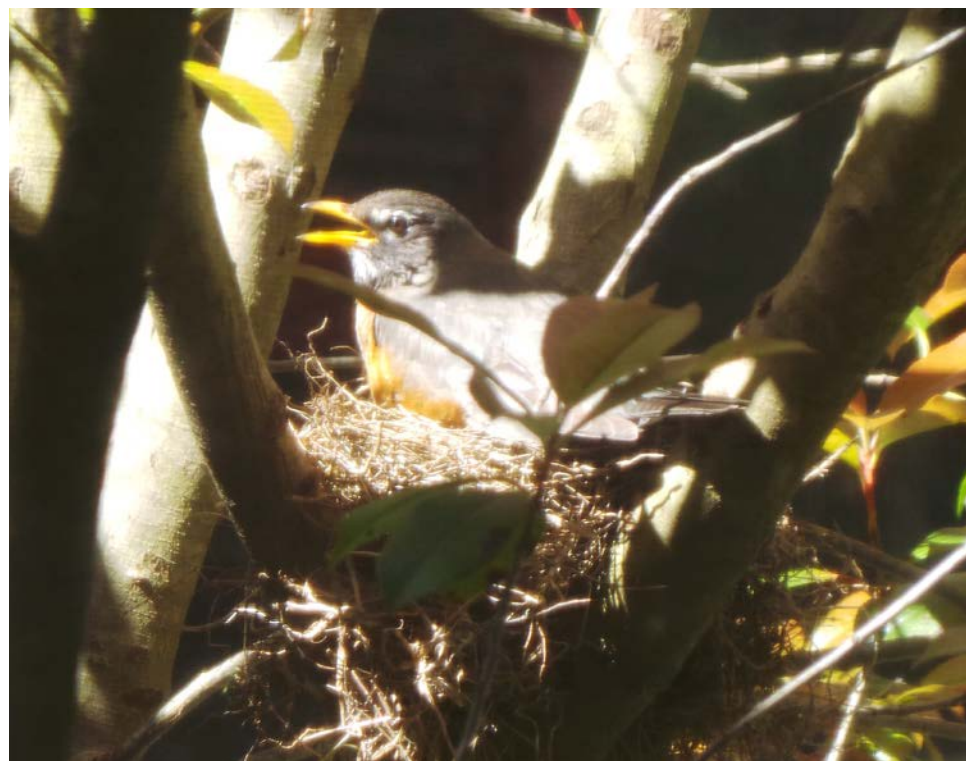

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# High school seniors celebrate Decision Day

For some Fluvanna County residents, May 1 is the beginning of a new month with warmer weather, while for others it begins the countdown to summer vacation. For Fluvanna County High School (FCHS) seniors, and seniors all around the world, it marked a day for a final decision about their next adventure after high school.

Decision Day is a celebratory event sponsored by the National College Advising Corps (NCAC), which was founded at the University of Virginia. Now the organization and event is nationally recognized. The goal of Decision Day is to recognize not only those who are planning on going to college, but rather all high school seniors for their post-graduation plans.

At the end of the school day Wednesday (May 1), 165 seniors gathered on the football field to celebrate FCHS's 10<sup>th</sup> annual Decision Day with food, refreshments, music and fun activities. Students enjoyed a bounce house, a Velcro wall, a two-person bungee run, and an inflatable basketball game. Signs containing college names, military branches, and workforce occupations were hung on the fence around the field to

showcase the students' next steps in their journey.

"I love being back here working with students who were eighth graders when I was a senior," said Haden Parrish, FCHS's college advisor. "I love working with my former teachers and administrators. It's been such a rewarding experience to be able to come back to the community that raised me and give a little bit back."

While most of the planning and execution came together last month, it was a year-long project for Parrish. VCAC gives each advisor a budget at the beginning of the year to use on various supplies and projects. Parrish was fortunate to receive about equal funding from both VCAC and FCHS this year, and also benefitted from a lot of community donations. VCAC also gives Decision Day shirts to students to wear to the event.

In previous years, students would gather for a celebration in the high school cafeteria with cake and other refreshments, but this year Parrish wanted to make it a special event.

"I think this year definitely looked different than it has in the past. There was a lot

of student and administrative support to make the event a little bigger," said Parrish. "I want to thank everyone that helped me with this event, from the administration, to teachers, to my parents."

Some in the FCHS class of 2019 are choosing to go to an institution of higher education for the purpose of furthering their education, while others are going to college to pursue their love of sports and have signed to play at the college level. Some are joining a branch of military while others are entering the workforce.

"It's over the top just to see them make a decision that's going to change their life," said Principal Margo Bruce. "Whether it's college, work or the military, I'm just excited for them and I'm happy to be able to help them celebrate."

Virginia's secretary of education, Atif Qarni, was there to congratulate students on their success and inquire about their plans and experiences in high school. Before being appointed as secretary of education, Qarni taught courses in civics, economics, U.S. history and mathematics at Beville Middle School in Prince William County.

This year's graduating class will travel as far as 2,174 miles away from Fluvanna to the University of Arizona, with Utah State University coming in second at 2,118 miles away. Piedmont Virginia Community College received the highest matriculation rate from FCHS with upwards of 70 students attending, and the leading four-year school is Radford with 10 Flucos. These numbers may change due to financial aid packages and waitlist decisions.

Parrish is already setting goals for next year's Decision Day. He hopes to complete the tie-dye shirts before the event to cut down on the lines at the station and give the students the opportunity to wear the shirts to the actual event. He also wants to have a station for students who make their decisions at the last minute.

"I am so proud of my seniors for going out into the adult world to start or continue their jobs, in joining the Armed Forces or attending an institution of higher education," said Parrish. "I was in their position only five years ago, but their resiliency and passion continue to impress and inspire me."

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## Fluvanna Business Corner

### What is a Brownfield? How can brownfield redevelopment help Fluvanna County?

**What are brownfields?** Brownfields are idled, underutilized, or abandoned industrial or commercial properties where expansion or redevelopment is complicated by real or perceived environmental contamination. Examples include factories, railyards, landfills, dry cleaners, gas stations, etc.

**How does brownfield redevelopment help communities?** Communities benefit greatly from brownfield redevelopment projects through the assessment and possible clean-up of impacted natural resources, increased employment opportunities, increased tax revenues, increase in surrounding property values, reduced green space development, community pride, and improved community potential.

**What are the benefits to a participant?** Many brownfield participants recognize the inherent benefits of reusing existing sites and/or properties. Often the sites are located on or near rail lines and major transportation routes. The existing buildings, infrastructure, and utilities can often accommodate a quicker start up schedule and significantly lessen the need for permits and inspections associated with the construction of a new facility. Brownfield participants often reap the benefits and rewards in good public relations and are sometimes eligible for special tax incentives offered by the host community. The positive public relations associated

with brownfield redevelopment projects are a benefit noted by many participants.

**What about the cost to assess the property?** Currently, the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is offering site screening services made available through a Cooperative Agreement with Environmental Protection Agency. This service is free and can be easily applied for. The free service is available to local communities, Industrial Development Authorities, and economic development agencies and can be applied to private industry provided they allow the local public entity to apply for the funds on their behalf.

EPA's Brownfields Program provides direct funding for brownfields assessment, cleanup, revolving loans, environmental job training, technical assistance, training, and research. <https://www.epa.gov/brownfields/types-brownfields-grant-funding>

Virginia DEQ assists property owners in turning contaminated properties back to productive use through its Brownfield/Land Renewal program and the Voluntary Remediation Program. All of the DEQ's remediation programs use risk assessment to determine whether cleanup is necessary and to ensure that the cleanup protects human health and the environment. <https://www.deq.virginia.gov/Programs/LandProtection-Revitalization/RemediationProgram.aspx>

# Supervisors raise salaries \$100 per month

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Members of the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors decided Wednesday (May 1) to raise their salaries for the first time since 2008. Each supervisor will see a pay increase of \$100 per month when the new rates take effect Jan. 1, 2020.

Chair Mike Sheridan, who currently makes \$9,000 per year, will make \$10,200 beginning next January. Vice chair Tony O'Brien will see a salary increase to \$9,600 per year from his current pay of \$8,400. The remaining supervisors will go from \$7,800 to \$9,000 per year.

State code requires that two of Fluvanna's five supervisors undergo an election before a pay raise can take effect. While this provision does not eliminate supervisors' ability to vote themselves a higher salary, it does create some additional accountability to voters.

The county's other boards, commissions and committees have received pay increases twice or three times since 2008, according to County Administrator Steve Nichols. He examined 22 counties near Fluvanna or of similar size and found that they paid an average of \$10,151 to their chairs and \$8,814 to their regular members.

"It can be a controversial issue," said Supervisor Don Weaver as the board discussed whether to approve the pay raise. "I'm going to vote against it because of my philosophy. I've been pretty hard on the budgets in the

past, so I can be hard on myself. That [pay level] doesn't mean that much to me."

Weaver made it clear that, though he would not support the pay increase, he believed it was warranted. "You all deserve it," he said. "I think you probably deserve more."

Supervisor Mozell Booker made the point that those board members who don't feel financial need for their salaries can donate them to charity.

"It is a lot of hours," said Sheridan. "We have people calling us at all times and it's our job to make sure that we listen."

"You all put in plenty of hours, so I think this is reasonable and well-deserved," said Nichols. The pay increase passed by a vote of 3-2 (Weaver and Supervisor Trish Eager dissenting).

### James River water pipeline

Nichols said after the meeting that construction on the James River water pipeline will hopefully begin by the end of 2019.

The James River water project, a joint venture between Fluvanna and Louisa counties, consists of a water intake facility on the Point of Fork where the James and Rivanna Rivers meet near Columbia, and a raw water pipeline stretching a little over a mile to Route 6.

From that point, the Louisa County Water Authority will construct its own pipeline at its own expense to funnel water northwest through Fluvanna to Louisa County. Louisa



agreed to “make all reasonable efforts” to provide up to 400,000 gallons of treated water per day to Fluvanna’s Zion Crossroads area by the end of 2018, but this timeframe has been delayed.

In January 2018, Nichols said the expected completion date of the James River water project was the end of this year. Now he is saying he hopes construction will begin by the end of this year.

A necessary permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has not arrived. The historic nature of Point of Fork, on which the intake facility will be built, has complicated the issue and delayed the issuance of a permit necessary for construction.

Point of Fork housed Rassawek, the capital city of the Monacan Indians, and a Revolutionary War arsenal. Several Fluvanna residents have expressed the belief that Native American artifacts will be disturbed or destroyed by construction on the site.

Point of Fork’s history has necessitated a review by the Department of Historic Resources.

When asked if the lengthy delay indicated problems with the project, Nichols said, “There’s nothing typical about a big public works project, but the more complicated ones, in which the Department of Historic Resources gets involved – and because ours is along a river where everyone lives – it’s

just the endless delay of everyone else has a comment.”

The county now has possession of all of the land parcels necessary for pipeline construction. Assistant County Attorney Kristina Hofmann succeeded in procuring all 85 parcels, owned by 60 residents, for the county.

“She worked closely with staff, owners, and legal counsel for owners to successfully acquire all areas needed for the project, and helped negotiate prices and any special conditions while diligently protecting the interests of the county,” Nichols said while presenting Hofmann with an award of appreciation. “By her dedication, hard work and professionalism, Ms. Hofmann advanced an important project for our county.”

### Staff changes

Nichols will retire as county administrator July 5. Eric Dahl, the current deputy county administrator and finance director, will take over as county administrator at that time.

Mary Anna Twisdale replaced Dahl as finance director May 1. Kelly Belanger Harris, the current clerk to the Board of Supervisors, will become assistant county administrator June 10. Caitlin Solis will then take over Harris’ former position.

# Sheriff: Firearm brandished on school bus

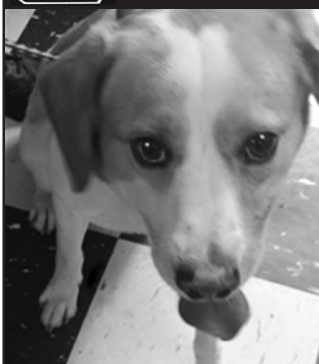

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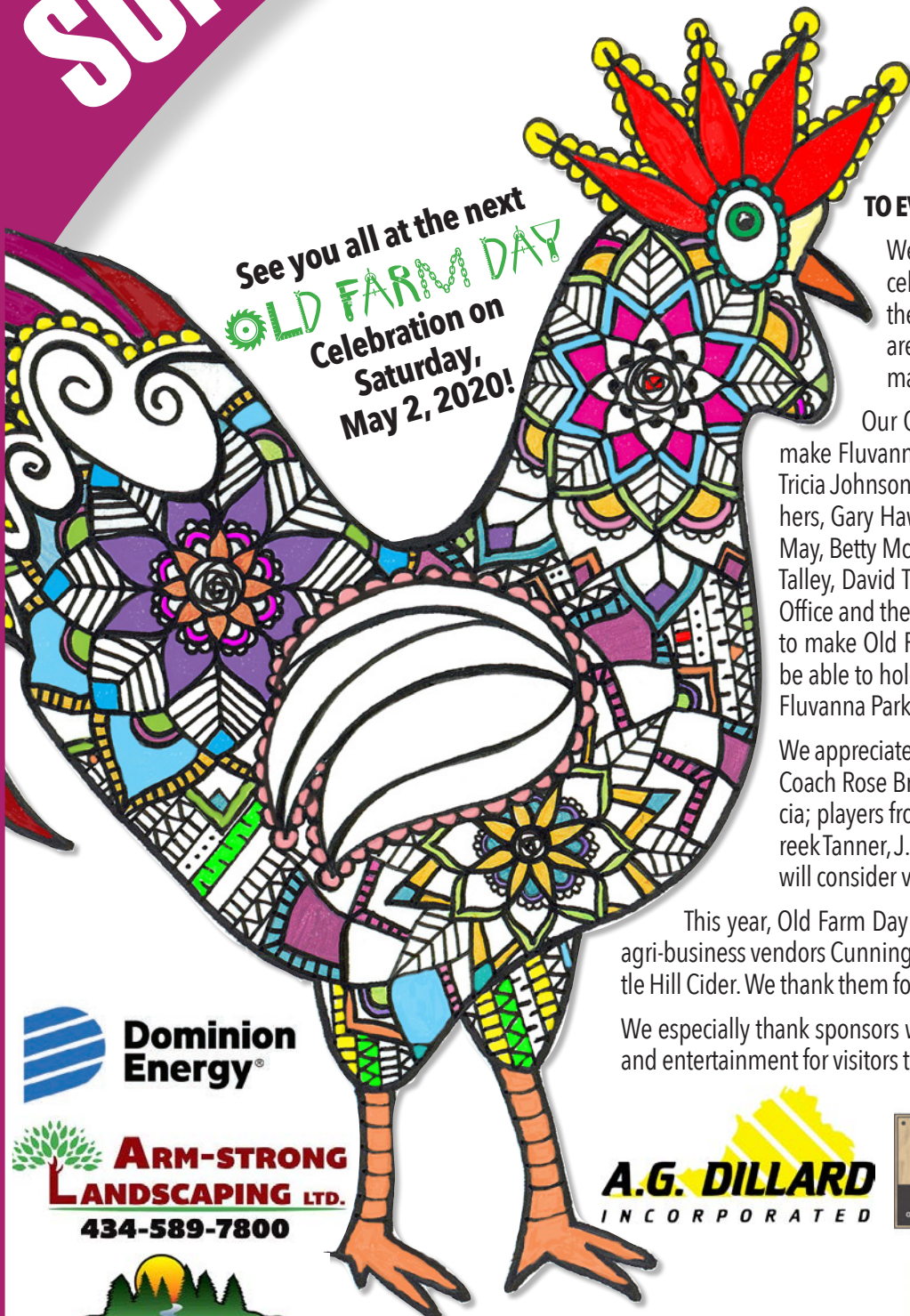

Thousands of visitors enjoyed Old Farm Day Saturday (May 4) under sunny skies at Pleasant Grove Park in Palmyra.

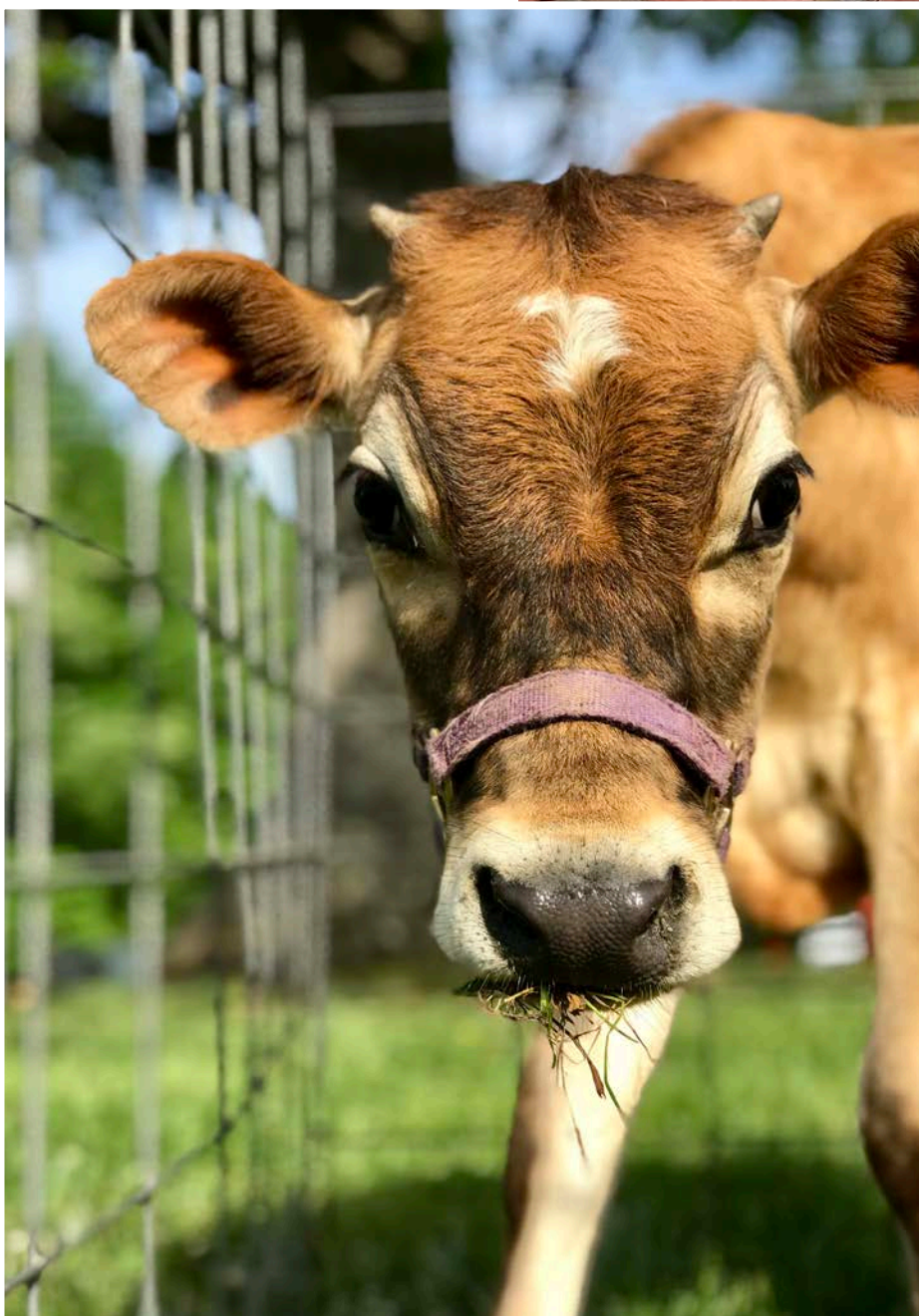

# Middle school art show features promising work

This year's crop of middle school art students produced some outstanding work for the annual Arts Festival held Saturday (May 4).

The students showed skill in execution and imagination in their projects. Many of the 3D pieces demonstrated the students' abilities to construct complex forms and learn precision in drawing and painting.

"This year's group demonstrates great skill and talent," said art teacher Margie Kritzer. "In fact, there were many different winners among fifth and sixth graders, suggesting that the talent runs deep in those grades." The judges from the Fluvanna Art Association noted several striking seventh grade students who won multiple awards, showing consistency and promise.

Sydney Derrickson's *Fruity* won first in the seventh grade 3D category. She took on a classic subject, a bowl of fruit, emulating a French impressionist painting come to life with bright bold colors.

"Sydney will enjoy the title of 'biggest winner' with four blue ribbons and one red ribbon. Her second-place *Contrast-O* design does not disappoint with clean lines and clever composition," said Kritzer.

Taylor Webber showed humor with her chicken nuggets made out of brown paper, tumbling out of her hand-painted *Chick-Fil-A* box. Brooke Christian's *Carmex* tube hanging from the ceiling was an eye-catching bright yellow. Brooke Gowans showed skill in her assembly of *Patrick*.

"Taylor's *Chick-Fil-A* replica is excellently executed and bound to start conversations. Hannah Hunt's *Snapcode* is a large 3D replica of her own Snapchat avatar, and it features a mask cast of her own face," Kritzer said.

"Brooke Gowan's 3D *Patrick* construction includes a variety of 3D building techniques, many of which Brooke figured on her own," said Kritzer. The masks the kids create are always interesting, but judges agreed that Karissa Baber's *Wonx* was exceptionally well

done with good attention to detail in the construction of the wolf's features and her painting techniques.

"Karissa Baber's mask is a perfect example of the way Karissa has always sought to use skills above and beyond the classroom experience to present solutions that are far more sophisticated than most students her age," her teacher said. Kritzer likes to recognize when students give extra effort, execution and creativity.

Many showed exceptional style in their

drawings and nailed the concepts they were taught.

"Ivan Becerra's two winning projects, his 3D word drawing and *Hidden Word* print, show exceptional craftsmanship, which is typical of his style," Kritzer said.

The students' art exhibited a departure from the same look of years past. Kritzer attributed this to her push to put more home-made step-by-step tutorials online in Google classroom. She said not all students are able to attend class on demonstration days, but



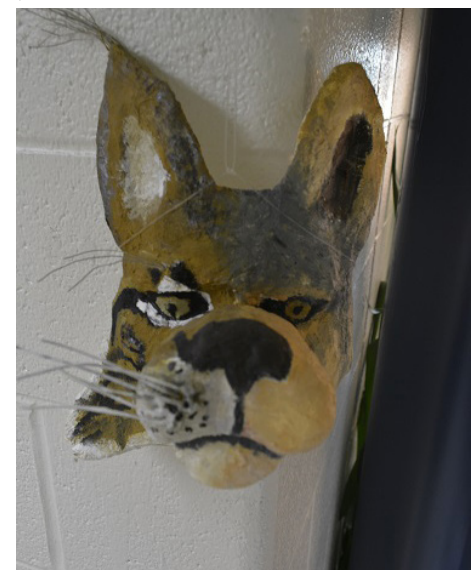

felt those students deserved to enjoy the benefit that live demonstrations offer.

This year's daily access to Chromebooks has assisted Kritzer in her goal of upgrading the seventh grade program to a project-based independent study, offering many options beyond the required projects where students work at their own pace and ability level. This helps them to build on the specific skills learned in fifth and sixth grade.

"I created slideshows for each project, featuring middle school student art projects dating back as far back as 2004," she said. "These images scroll before and during the project's creation, inviting students to see

solutions of the past for inspiration and evaluation."

Every art teacher hopes their students leave the classroom with skills that can be applied to creating art as well as other areas of life.

"I hope that any student who attends an art class at Fluvanna Middle School leaves with the confidence needed to successfully master the skills on which we focus," Kritzer said. "I truly believe that all of my students can succeed – they need only to 'just do it,' as the banner in the front of my classroom has encouraged since I printed it in 1996."

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# Attorney general supports bill for D.C. statehood

Virginia Attorney General Mark Herring is urging support for federal legislation to make Washington, D.C., the 51<sup>st</sup> state.

Herring joined 19 other state attorneys general – all Democrats – in issuing a “first of a kind” statement in favor of the idea.

The statement was issued April 15 just ahead of D.C.’s April 16 Emancipation Day celebration. It cited the holiday as a reminder of limits on the District’s freedom and autonomy.

“The District’s over 700,000 residents work hard, raise families and pay the highest federal taxes per capita, and yet they are deprived of the fundamental right to participate meaningfully in our representative democracy,” the statement read.

U.S. Rep. Eleanor Holmes Norton, the nonvoting delegate representing D.C. in Congress, introduced H.R. 51 in January. More than 200 House members are co-sponsoring the proposal.

Holmes has previously introduced legislation to make D.C. a state; however, this marks the first time that state attorneys general across the country have united to support the idea.

“The District’s residents deserve equal voting rights and autonomy under the law. We support statehood for the District of Columbia and urge passage of H.R. 51 to accomplish this goal,” the statement reads.

“Washington, D.C., already acts as an important state in so many ways, and it is well past time that their contributions to our country are reflected in statehood,” Herring said. “District residents are

hardworking, taxpaying Americans who deserve to have their voices heard and their votes counted.”

Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi has also expressed support for Holmes’ proposal.

“Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton has been a tireless voice on this important issue, and her introduction of H.R. 51 is a critical step in righting this historic wrong,” Pelosi said.

U.S. Rep. Elijah Cummings, head of the House Committee on Oversight and Reform, has pledged to hold a hearing on the bill later this year. If it passes, D.C.’s addition as a state would add two senators and one representative with full voting rights to Congress.

Those who oppose D.C. statehood argue that it would inherently create a conflict of interest for legislators who serve in D.C. to represent constituents back home in their respective states. In the Federalist Papers, James Madison stated that if D.C. were to become a state, its voting members would wield higher power than other states through its proximity to Congress.

In 1971, passage of the 23rd Amendment gave members of the District votes in the electoral college. If renewed support fails to pass H.R. 51 when it comes up for a hearing later this year, the federal government will continue to maintain jurisdiction over the capital city, just as it has since its founding in 1790.

### Lake must live within its means

Recently Lake Monticello owners were told by the Board of Directors that “we are living beyond our means.” So here are a few principles to abide by to live within our means: economize, prioritize, maximize, sacrifice, trade off, pay off, switch off, spigot off, frugality, reality, necessity, practicality.

Discussion around the proposed dues increase of \$180 over a three-year period has brought into focus the economic diversity in our community. Drive around our neighborhoods and you’ll find spacious lake houses alongside modest ranchers and bungalows. Income diversity is equally wide. According to city-data.com, about 200 households have annual incomes under \$20,000 while an equal number have incomes above \$200,000. The Board of Directors believes requiring us all to buy a \$50 dinner at the Lakeside Restaurant is a reasonable way to subsidize a failing business, while some households will use the \$50 to buy groceries.

Ask anyone about the dues increase and you’ll hear concern about property values. Many with higher-end houses believe amenities such as fine dining and spiffy new clubhouses will attract well-heeled buyers while those with lower-end houses are concerned higher dues will discourage buyers seeking affordable housing. How will the LMOA board members balance these legitimate yet opposing concerns?

Increasing income by raising dues, issuing special assessments and raising dues some more to sustain amenities that many in our community do not require and cannot afford to use, is to disregard the economic reality of many working families and fixed-income seniors. The board, which represents the entire community, will look for other ways to raise income while lowering costs by following the steps we all must follow to live within our means.

If any license fee owed pursuant to this article is not paid on or before its due date, then the treasurer may add the cost of any fee incurred by the county pursuant to section 46.2-752(J) of the Virginia Code to the license fee due and owing to the county. The treasurer shall, after the due date of any license fee required by this section, collect such license fee in accordance with the provisions of section 58.1-3919 of the Virginia Code and any other applicable law. Additionally, the treasurer shall have the authority to take action as authorized by section 46.2-752(J) of the Virginia Code. The foregoing notwithstanding, the license fee provided for by this Chapter shall not be assessed on vehicles owned by active members of volunteer rescue squads and active members of volunteer fire companies located in the county (at one vehicle per such member); and for the following who served at least ten (10) years in the county: former members of volunteer rescue squads and former members of volunteer fire companies located in the county (at one vehicle per such former member). *In addition to the foregoing, effective January 1, 2020, the license fee provided for this this Chapter shall not be assessed on vehicles owned by volunteer reserve deputies of the Sheriff (at one vehicle per such member) during the continuation of their volunteer service.*
