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

Caring For Creatures' Birkholz recognized as Hometown Hero

Mary Birkholz, president of Caring For Creatures, had no idea she had been nominated for Allen & Allen's annual Hometown Hero honor and was shocked when Allen & Allen called to give her the news.

"It was a huge surprise," said Birkholz. "I am very honored to receive such an award. My biggest hope is that any recognition I receive will put more spotlight on homeless animals and how many are still at risk and in need of help."

Allen & Allen has been honoring Hometown Heroes for 10 years.

"We are thrilled to have such a wonderful group of heroes to add to the almost 450 who have been honored over the past 10 years," said Elizabeth Kerns, a publicist with Allen & Allen. "We want to celebrate those individuals, like Mary, who motivate positive change and acts of selflessness in Virginia to make our communities better places to live."

Kerns explained that the criteria for Hometown Heroes are that honorees are members of their community in Virginia who represent the core values of Allen & Allen: service, care, compassion, community and family.

"These local heroes improve our communities with service and action," Kerns said. "From her nomination, it was clear Mary has dedicated her life to caring for animals through Caring For Creatures. Not only does she care about the animals, but she is also passionate about the people and finding companionship for these cats and dogs. Through her work, Mary demonstrates the core values of Allen & Allen, and that is what makes her a Hometown Hero."

Birkholz has managed the first no-kill sanctuary in Fluvanna for 30 years. Early in her life she was inspired by animals, particularly those that were abused and neglected.

"It was through the years of volunteering I did with shelters where I lived that I felt compelled to provide a safe refuge for dogs and cats - a place where they could heal from their physical, mental and emotional wounds in a natural and peaceful environment," said Birkholz. "A place where time was not their enemy - meaning the animals were safe no matter how long it took to find a loving, responsible and compatible home."

Though being nominated and recognized for her hard work is gratifying, Birkholz said that while she has seen some positive improvements over the past 30 years as it relates to the number of dogs and cats being euthanized in the U.S., there is still a long way to go.

"To a large degree, the issues of neglect and abuse relate to humans' perception of animals as things rather than sentient beings," she said. "When more humans can begin to shift how they perceive animals and, in turn, relate to them differently, there will be, in my opinion, a reduction of conscious neglect and abuse. Respect for the planet and all who reside on it is huge – and we humans are falling short in this area."

There is good news in Virginia: The laws have changed somewhat to more appropriately punish those who

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harm an animal, Birkholz said.

Birkholz is proud of what she and others have created so far, but she still has many goals and improvements she wishes to accomplish. The issues affecting the animals coming through her door seem to have changed in the past five to 10 years, compared to 25 years ago. While some of the medical needs are the same, she has witnessed more anxiety, stress and behavior issues than she recalled dealing with in the past. As a result, she sees how Caring For Creatures needs to shift its care and assistance to match the current needs. "I learn something new every day and seek to evolve and change as needed to help homeless animals," she said.

Even though she is now a Hometown Hero and appreciates the honor, she credits the community for its support and generosity through all these years.

"Caring For Creatures is unable to help these animals without this assistance," she said. "I hope folks will continue to help CFC and other responsible rescues. The need continues and it takes resources of all kinds to restore health and wellbeing to animals who have experienced neglect and abuse at the hands of a human. Those of us in rescue willingly subject ourselves to frustration, sadness, and long hours of work; our reward is seeing an animal transform to become the best dog or cat he or she can be and then find a great forever home. And, of course, the best gift is the love we receive from these animals – given freely and without judgment."

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Barresi and Dillman win Independence Day contests

The Fourth of July brings out a significant number of contestants for Lake Monticello's annual Spirit 5K run and the Swim across the Lake. Each event has competitors who are seriously competing for the overall title or seriously contesting to finish in the top three in their age group. There are also always a large number of contestants who just trying to show themselves that they can do it – or that they can still do it.

The Spirit 5K kicks off the Fourth of July activities at the Lake with a 7 a.m. start time. Men, women, boys and girls gather at the Bunker ballfield starting around 6:15 a.m. Race organizer John Platt said that over 300 runners signed up for the Spirit 5K this year – the largest number ever. The weather this year was good. The temperature might have been a few degrees above ideal and the humidity might also have been a smidge higher than runners prefer, but the combination was really not all that daunting.

The course takes the runners, walkers and participants pushing strollers over a portion of the Lake Monticello Golf Course, with a small part of the course on the roads of Lake Monticello. The serious runners finish far ahead of the bulk of the participants. This year the winner on the men's side was Matt Barresi – again. Barresi has won the men's side of the race virtually every time it has been run over the past 18 years.

Barresi ran in college at American University and is a serious runner of marathons, which are 26.2 miles. This year he finished with an impressive time of 16.32, considerably faster than his winning time in 2018 of 17:06. Perhaps his time was a little faster this year because he was somewhat challenged by Joshua Fard and Nicolas Gardella, both out of Virginia Tech, who finished second and third. Fard's time was 17:33. Barresi always wins with no one else in sight. Fard still would have been well behind if Barresi had run his 2018 time again, but he might have been visible when Barresi crossed the line.

On the women's side of the Spirit 5K, it seems that there is a new winner every year. This year was no exception. Last year, the second place finisher in the women's event was 13-year-old Kylie Wild of Tucson, Ariz., who was visiting with her grandparents, Bill and Barb Scanlon. A rising high school freshman, Wild was the winner this year. She finished in 21:01 and looked no worse for wear. Regina Ronan, running in the 41-50 age group, took second, with Hannah Scheren, running in the 18-30 age group, right behind.

By 3 p.m. the temperature had climbed substantially, but that was more of a problem for the spectators than it was for the swimmers. An especially large crowd was on hand to watch the swimmers. The race, and it is a race only for the elite swimmers, was tightly contested this year, but the bulk of the swimmers were climbing out of the water at the main beach well after the top-notch swimmers were done.

For the second year in a row, the fastest swimmer was a young woman. Shannon Dillman was first out of the water, followed by her sister Carleigh Dillman. The fastest male swimmer was also a young swimmer. Joshua Hodges took the men's crown. The Lake swim is an open water untimed event. The Lake water patrol and the Lake police monitor the event very carefully to ensure that there is no one left behind.

What's the Lake's next move?

The French have an old saying, "The more things change, the more they remain the same," which, until the most recent election at the Lake, seemed to characterize the indifference of both the membership and the leadership at Lake Monticello.

Some 14 years ago, the membership proposed and, by a healthy majority, voted to dramatically upgrade the ancient sheet-metal firehouse that served as the marina but the Lake board, deciding that there weren't funds for the project, declined – and instead, a short time later, chose, without a membership vote, to build us a 4,000-square-foot office building at some twice the cost of the marina.

At about the same time, the association was losing tens of thousands of dollars trying to operate our own food service at two locations and as partial remedies chose to shutdown the Ashlawn Pub and contract out the food service. Initially a moderate success, we then chose to shoot ourselves in the foot by denying essential upgrades to the Eagle's Nest and Ashlawn kitchens.

Now comes the inescapable need to significantly upgrade our amenities. With funny numbers, irrational rationales and minimal input from the membership, a variety of plans were proposed, the funniest of which was the combination cart barn and ballroom. Ain't seen a dance there yet - quess my invitation got lost in the mail. The first of two polls, with a 35 percent response, indicated that half those voting wanted a fitness center with nearly as many wanting a pub, and many wanted a teen activity room. The board decided a fitness center was inappropriate because it would compete with similar businesses in the area. The teen center just never became part of the plan. But we did get our pub – with some six large-screen TVs, and two restaurants, one open only eight hours a week - never mind the competition with eight other restaurants in the area - and a lot more office space.

And now we're only losing \$1.2 million a year. What's our next move?



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
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

4-H Livestock Club to host Hog Jog

The 4-H Livestock Club will be hosting its first annual 5K Aug. 3 to raise money for its animal show and sale at the Fluvanna County fair that is held every year in mid-August.

The race will take place at Pleasant Grove at the pole barns and is on the same route that the high school cross-country team uses for practice and races. The course is not stroller-friendly and will be roped off with ribbon to ensure the route is accessible for runners. Registration starts at 8 a.m. sharp and the race begins at 8:30 a.m.

The 4-H Livestock Club's programs are all volunteer-run and the group tends to keep its programs at low- to no-cost to allow as many kids as possible to participate. But as the club has continued to grow, so has the need for community support through fundraising and sponsorship. This encouraged the club to up its fundraising goals and put on the race.

"The Hog Job is a way for us to raise money for the fair," said Danielle McPherson, 4-H parent and one of the hosts of the race. "The tent is expensive and as the club grows, we are trying to become more independent and not rely on our extension agent for help."

In 2012, Sara Hernandez started the Fluvanna County 4-H Livestock Club. This club focuses on providing kids within the community with leadership development, community service, and hands-on experience through a "learning by doing" approach to set them up for the future. This project-based club gives its members the opportunity to raise project animals, and at the end, members will show and sell their animals at the Fluvanna County fair. In preparation for the fair, youth members are taught how to raise animals in a humane way. They also learn how to make a profitable business by keeping track of expenses, such as the purchasing the animals, food, and any medication. At the end of their project, the children have to sell their animal at the county fair, which also teaches the members the life skill of parting with a farm animal and watching the cycle come full circle.

"With 4-H, it involves the family as a whole," said McPherson. "Yes, the kids take care of their animals on their own, but the parents are helping them with things that they can't do on their own, such as fencing, building shelters for the animals, trimming hooves, working with Excel to create a spreadsheet that tracks expenses, vaccinations, and other things. 4-H brings families together and teaches them the importance of working together."

Members of the club range from ages 5 to 18 and commit to raising livestock projects. Animals include rabbits, chickens, lambs, cattle and pigs. In addition to leadership and business skills, youths learn valuable lessons in responsibility, commitment, ethical behavior and critical thinking.

The club also receives help from an extension agent, Kim Mayo, who participated in 4-H growing up. In an earlier interview this year, Mayo expressed that "the leadership, citizenship, and life skills I learned from participating in 4-H as a youth have helped me become successful in my career as an extension agent." Now, as an extension agent, she can give back by recruiting and managing a

network of volunteers to develop and implement youth programs, such as volunteers for the 4-H Livestock Club.

For the Hog Jog event, the club has set up a Go Fund Me page to facilitate donations for runners participating in the event, but will also accept donations at the time of the race. Water and light snacks will be provided and there will be giveaways and prizes for all participants, as well as age group prizes for the top male and female finishers for ages 11 and under, 12-17, and 18 and over.

Get on the bus: Packed for Success returns

To many people, volunteering means finding an organization that is doing something for the community they think is important and then stepping forward to offer whatever time and energy they can afford. But what if you see a need you'd like to address but no such organization exists? Andre-A'Bryanna "Bree" Key can answer that question.

Back in her high school days, Bree noticed that some students couldn't afford all the tools they needed to have a successful school year, such as notebooks, backpacks, markers and pens. With the help of her parents, Bree founded Packed for Success, an organization which aims to provide students with the tools they need in order to have a successful school year. Its main event is the annual Packed for Success project, in which a school bus is made available to the public where they can drop off the kind of materials that are commonly found on the supply lists provided at the beginning of each school year. Walmart has been a generous partner in this project, permitting the bus to sit in its parking lot for several days so people can easily drop off their donations.

Initially Bree started this project by collecting and purchasing items herself. In following years, students, parents, staff, and other community members offered to volunteer, helping to make the project a bigger success.

Bree, a senior at Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU), is pursuing degrees in criminal justice, homeland security and emergency preparedness and hopes to obtain a master's of public health to pursue a career of emergency management in a hospital. While attending VCU, Bree has obtained a certification of leadership studies and become the treasurer of the NAACP, Black Awakening Choir, and the Epsilon Zeta Chapter of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority.

This year's Packed for Success event will take place July 26-28 at Walmart. A Fluvanna school bus will sit in the parking lot ready to receive donations. New and gently used backpacks, school supplies, shoes, clothing, sports and art equipment, instruments and hygiene items will be accepted. Cash donations are also welcomed. Checks should be made out to the Fluvanna County Education Foundation, but they must be earmarked as "Donation for Packed for Success" on the notes section of the check.

"Everyone involved with this program greatly appreciates the Fluvanna County Education Foundation's support and assistance with this program," said Bree.

Families are encouraged to bring their children, especially those who have never

before been on a school bus. This event needs plenty of volunteers for a number of tasks that can last from an hour to as much time as you'd like to give. Volunteers are needed to stay at the bus and accept donations. After the collection, volunteers are needed to help sort out the materials so that an equitable amount is given to each school, and then to transport them to the schools.

In advance of the event, Bree is planning to send letters to local businesses and organizations to ask for donations; a few hours of office help printing and mailing out letters would also be helpful. Donations of food for the bus attendants would also be a quick and easy way to participate.

4-H youths break records with state wins

Six members from several Fluvanna 4-H Clubs attended Virginia 4-H State Congress June 22-27 on the campus of Virginia Tech.

4-H Congress provides competitive and non-competitive educational experiences to Virginia teens, helping them to develop life skills and leadership abilities in order give back to their communities.

The week began with two-day Google computer science workshop where members learned how to use a variety of gadgets such as drones, MakeyMakeys, Ozobots and Spheros, as well as the program GameChangineers to teach coding skills. Members will be hosting youth computer science workshops in Fluvanna this fall.

In a record-breaking performance, all four Fluvanna youth that competed during the week earned state championships in their respective competitions. Amy Glowatch, Teen Leader club president, earned the blue ribbon in extemporaneous speaking, a contest that allows competitors 15 minutes to prepare a five-minute speech on a designated topic. Amy was also elected to the position of Northern District ambassador to the Virginia State 4-H Cabinet. This prestigious position allows Amy the opportunity to work with 4-H leaders across the state to develop 4-H opportunities for youth.

Josiah Kerley, Livestock and Homeschool Club member, delivered a presentation on Flemish Giant rabbits, earning the state championship in the extremely competitive animal science: dairy, livestock, poultry and horse category.

Brayden Jones from the Horse 'N Around 4-H Club was the state winner in table setting. His Super Bowlthemed table setting with a menu incorporating Virginia agriculture products such as soybeans, chicken and tomatoes was the overwhelming favorite among the judges.

Khai Davis from the Teen Leaders 4-H Club rounded out the Fluvanna competition winners at Congress. As a first-time competitor, Khai earned the state championship in the instrumental division of the Share-the-Fun talent contest. His win also gave him the opportunity to play in the evening awards program. Khai played "Never Enough" from the movie The Greatest Showman to earn his blue ribbon.

Eighty 4-H members and volunteers from across the state were recognized for their volunteer and leadership efforts in the Virginia 4-H All Star Initiation Ceremony. Sara Hernandez, Fluvanna 4-H Livestock Club leader, was welcomed into the organization for her efforts to promote 4-H on the local, district and state level. Hernandez has given over five years of service to Fluvanna 4-H and was the only Fluvanna 4-H member initiated as a Virginia 4-H All Star in 2019.

Potential legal action threatened over yard signs Supervisors pause sign rule enforcement

County Attorney Fred Payne addressed a potential First Amendment legal challenge to Fluvanna County's ordinances on the display of yard signs at Tuesday's (July 2) Board of Supervisors meeting.

The ordinance allows yard signs to be displayed for up to 60 days before an event and 10 days after an event, such as an election.

Douglas R. McKusick, a senior staff attorney for The Rutherford Institute in Charlottesville, sent a four-page letter to the county June 26, saying the Institute had been asked by Dr. Elizabeth Alcorn "to review the constitutionality of Fluvanna's sign regulations, which make content-based distinctions that result in limiting political speech in support of candidates."

Alcorn, the Democratic challenger to incumbent Del. Rob Bell (R-Albemarle) in Virginia's 58th District, believes that Fluvanna's ordinances are impairing her ability "to promote her candidacy and establish name recognition in her campaign."

The letter, made available to the public

on The Rutherford Institute's website, went on to state that "in order to dispel the chilling effect imposed by the 60-day limit on the political speech of all candidates and their supporters," they requested that the county not enforce the provisions ahead of the upcoming November election.

Payne did not mention either Alcorn or The Rutherford Institute in his comments. He said he believed "the case on which the argument is based is an exceptionally unusual case" and it was open for "fair discussion" as to whether it was applicable to Fluvanna's current ordinance.

"On the other hand, it impresses me that the county has more to lose than it has to gain from litigating it_i " he added.

In his assessment, the county's options were to enforce the current ordinance, to repeal time limits on yard signs altogether, or to amend the existing ordinance to strike the specific 60-day language and say only that signs were permitted within "a reasonable time" prior to an event.

His recommendation was for the board to initiate the process of amending the

ordinance, which would involve the Planning Commission soliciting staff recommendations and public hearings on any changes before coming back to the Board of Supervisors for a final public hearing and vote.

"In the meantime, I would suggest you authorize me and the zoning administrator to tell the person who is objecting that the provision in question is not going to be enforced against them while this proposal is pending," he said. "I think that is only fair."

Supervisors agreed to suspend enforcement of time limitations for temporary signs. They passed the motion to initiate an amendment to the ordinance on a vote of 5-0.

End of an era

"One last time," Chair Mike Sheridan said as outgoing County Administrator Steve Nichols began his final county administrator's report at the start of the meeting.

When the board reconvened after a dinner break, incoming County Administrator Eric Dahl took Nichols' seat at the table. He read the lengthy certificate of commendation for Nichols' seven years in office, listing his efforts "to improve service, efficiency and effectiveness" of county government.

"He continually reminded staff to be better tomorrow than we were today," according to the commendation. The certificate also highlighted Nichols' efforts to create opportunities for promotion and career advancement for staff.

Nichols was praised for his work on the James River and Zion Crossroads water projects, the E911 system, the Columbia Area Renewal Effort task force, and his work on increasing tourism, business and broadband within the county.

"Thank you for this opportunity," Nichols said after rounds of handshakes, hugs and photographs with supervisors. "It has been amazing."

Nichols' last day was July 3 and he officially retired July 5, but the county isn't done with him yet. In the final act of the evening, supervisors appointed him as project consultant for the James River water project to tap what Dahl called his "vast institutional knowledge" in meetings scheduled for later this year. The unpaid appointment runs through Dec. 31.

Other matters

Board members voted 5-0 on a number of agenda items during the meeting, including:

- Revisions to the charter of the Economic Development and Tourism Advisory Council and the appointment of five new members.
- New pay plan for the Department of Social Services for targeted pay increases not to exceed 10 percent per employee, with the county contributing \$28,799 and accepting \$29,977 in state and federal funds.
- Two contracts totaling approximately \$270,000 for the implementation of a new supervisory control and data acquisition computer system for the Zion Crossroads water and sewer project.
- Multiple contracts totaling around \$289,000 to Dewberry Engineering for the creation of a water and sewer master plan, an updated utility standards manual, an asset management plan, and a water and wastewater master plan.





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
