## Schools prep for solar power switch

The Fluvanna School Board decided to take advantage of the sun and voted unanimously on May 8 to harness solar energy.

Soon Sun Tribe Solar will begin putting solar panels on and around the county's school buildings – at no cost to the schools.

Besides no upfront expense, the move is predicted to save between \$4-6 million over the 35-year contract, according to Sun Tribe estimates.

As part of the power purchase agreement, the schools locked in a flat rate for electricity that is lower than the 10 cents per kilowatt hour it pays Dominion Virginia Power.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler began researching ways for the schools to be more environmentally friendly last October.

"This endeavor had a money savings aspect for the taxpayers," Winkler said. "A few school divisions around Virginia were exploring it. I

went to a few sites that had it in place and talked with a number of individuals. When we ran the numbers, it just made sense."

When Winkler first suggested the project to the School Board, members were skeptical.

Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) asked how Sun Tribe made money. "This looks too good to be true," he

Sun Tribe representative Tony Stephan explained the company makes money on the licensing agreements and the agreement with banks that loan it the money for the project.

Sun Tribe will use its in-house engineering and construction teams to design, permit and build the panels. It will own and operate the system for the life of the 35-year contract.

Andrew Pullen (Columbia) had several questions about roof-mounted panels and the effect they'd have on warranties.

After long periods of questions and answers - and a trip to visit Middlesex County Schools, which signed a similar agreement with Sun Tribe two years ago - the board was convinced it was the right way to go.

Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) was particularly impressed with the grant Sun Tribe gives for teachers to learn about solar energy and teach it in the classroom.

Winkler enumerated the benefits he sees, which include money savings back to the school budget, a large educational component and tie-in to the Standards of Learning tests, professional development and resources for continued education offered by Sun Tribe, and possible career and technical education benefits and future employment opportunities for Fluvanna graduates.

Taylor Brown, Sun Tribe solar chief technical officer, said the company was impressed by the amount of study Fluvanna schools put into the decision.

"From the start, Superintendent Winkler and the School Board have been laser-focused on ensuring that this has been a community-focused process - asking tough questions and fighting for real savings of taxpayer dollars. We look forward to continuing to work closely with Superintendent Winkler and his team to power Fluvanna's schools through renewable energy today and for years to come," Brown said. "We're excited by the opportunity to partner with Fluvanna County Public Schools, who are embracing a cleaner energy future while also saving millions that can be used to support educators, facility modernization and classroom instruction throughout the district."

Sun Tribe estimates that 100 percent of the energy needs of Carysbrook Elementary, West Central Primary, Central Elementary, and Fluvanna Middle School will be met. It will also provide 61 percent of the energy needed to power Fluvanna County High School.


Winkler said the schools hope to have Central and Carysbrook operational by next January or February, with the middle and high schools to follow about a year later.

Fluvanna joins other Virginia school districts going solar, including: Arlington, Augusta, King William, Middlesex, Powhatan, Richmond City and Westmoreland.

"I'm certainly a fan of alternative energy sources, especially solar, and I was aware of other schools systems that were installing solar panels through various articles and publications, but until Sun Tribe made its presentation, I had no idea that we could save so much money in the coming years and that they could provide such an offset from the grid," Pullen

"Sun Tribe did an excellent job explaining everything to the board and answering our questions. I admittedly was hesitant, mainly because we were mistakenly told that we'd save so much money through the contract with Trane that the county entered into, but after much research, I was excited to make the motion to enter into a contract with Sun Tribe," Pullen continued. "I also excited to see the

career and technical education opportunities that will be extended to our students through this project. Self-sufficiency, protecting the environment and saving taxpayers millions of dollars is a win on all fronts in my opinion."

Winkler addressed the Trane contract in an email, saying: "Trane installed all new HVAC equipment in Central and Fluvanna Middle School. They installed new LED lighting in all of our buildings. They installed new HVAC controls that are digitally webbased in all of our schools to help increase energy efficiencies.

"Trane's original projections showed significant savings over a five-year period, but they indicated their savings in fuel gallons and kilowatts," Winkler continued. "The county calculated those rates into dollars using a formula that wasn't entirely accurate given our current reduced fuel rates. Therefore, over a five-year period we have not seen the actual dollars in savings. However, we have seen the gallons and kilowatt savings as projected."

### Never Take on the IRS Alone

Sleuthing your way through a tax audit proper support and concise, smart anby yourself is not the same as fixing a leaky faucet or changing your oil. Here are reasons you should seek professional help as soon as you receive a letter from the IRS:

IRS auditors do this for a living - you don't. Seasoned IRS agents have seen your situation many times and know the rules better than you. Missing an audit deadline can lead to trouble. When you receive the original audit request, it will include a response deadline (typically 30 days). If you miss the deadline, the IRS will change your tax return using their interpretation of findings, not yours. This typically means assessing new taxes, interest and penalties. If you wish your point of view to be heard – get help right away to prepare a plan and manage the IRS deadlines.

# Pickleball emphasizes fun, friendship and fitness

The United States of America Pickleball Association (USAPA) website claims that pickleball is the fastest growing game in America. The site reports that pickleball was invented in a backyard on a badminton court in 1965, and that there are now over 3 million players in the U.S.

Pickleball is a game that resembles tennis and badminton. Paddles are used to hit a plastic whiffle ball back and forth over a tennis net. The court is lined off like a tennis court, but is considerably more compact. Accordingly, there is far less side-to-side action required to play at a reasonable level. Singles play is allowed but the vast majority of pickleball games are doubles play, with mixed doubles play extremely common.

This sport is very popular in retirement communities, but it is decidedly not just for retirees. There are professional tournaments for men and women as well as for senior professionals. On a recent Saturday there were teens and 20-somethings playing at the Lake Monticello courts.

At Lake Monticello and in Fluvanna County, the game has a solid core of adherents. Warren McIvor said that his email list of interested players includes about 50 individuals. There are three places to play in the county. All

# Governor celebrates Fluvanna broadband expansion

The sun came out just long enough on Thursday afternoon (July 11) to greet Gov. Ralph Northam, Central Virginia Electric Cooperative (CVEC) President Gary Wood, and county officials as they celebrated the next step in Fluvanna's technological evolution through CVEC's new subsidiary, Firefly Fiber Broadband.

About 60 people gathered under the pavilion at Lyles Baptist Church.

Board of Supervisors Chair Mike Sheridan noted that the 245-year old church didn't have electricity until 1939. Today, they're waiting for reliable wifi.

They aren't alone. A 2017 survey conducted by the county found 15 percent of residents didn't have an internet connection at home, and 22 percent rely on inadequate or expensive services. Fork Union, Columbia and Cunningham Districts, in particular, lack service.

The survey also found that 19 percent of K-12 students don't have

internet in the home.

Sheridan, a long-time educator, said increased internet service would help students excel. "With this, these students will be able to come home, do the work, and take care of getting that education...so that hopefully, one day, they can take care of me," he joked.

"It's not uncommon to drive by our library in the evenings and see families and kids sitting in the parking lot using the free wifi we have there," said County Administrator Eric Dahl.

Northam has made rural broadband expansion a priority of his administration. In March, he announced \$4.9 million in grants for almost a dozen projects statewide. CVEC received \$641,967 for Fluvanna County, some of which will be used to extend service from its Columbia substation to 450 homes in Fluvanna and Cumberland counties.

In his remarks on Thursday, Northam said that increasing broadband would keep state and local economies thriving. "If you're going to have a business come to you in Virginia, invest in rural Virginia, and if you're going to help a business

grow, there is no way you're going to do it without access to the internet," he said. "Businesses are not going to come to parts of this country where they don't have access, in 2019, to broadband. It's just that simple."

Wood thanked Northam for the grant, which is a part of the company's \$110 million investment in fiber lines that will connect all 37,000 customers across 14 counties over the next five years.

"Rural people are very patient," he said. "They've been waiting here to stream sermons and events for a long time."

Wood praised the county for its support of the project's development over the past two years. When CVEC approached the county early on, Wood said, the county "stepped up and said, 'We'll help."

When the project is complete, Wood said Fluvanna County won't just have internet, but rather internet "as good you'll find anywhere in the world, right here in these woods."





# July 4 holiday proves deadly on Virginia highways

PRESS RELEASE

Unfortunately, thousands of drunk, speeding and reckless drivers kept Virginia State Police busy and put countless lives at risk during the 2019 July 4 holiday weekend across the Commonwealth. Preliminary reports indicate seven people died in six traffic crashes during the holiday statistical counting period that began July 3 at 12:01 a.m. and concluded July 5 at midnight.

The six fatal crashes occurred in the counties of Highland, Loudoun, Lunenburg, Nelson, Pittsylvania and Spotsylvania. The Spotsylvania County crash on July 5 resulted in two deaths. Altogether, the crashes claimed the lives of four drivers and three passengers. Four of the deceased were not wearing seat belts.

"Recognizing the potential for more holiday travelers and festivities with July 4 falling on a Thursday this year, we made certain to have every available trooper working Virginia's highways during the holiday weekend," said Colonel Gary T. Settle, Virginia State Police superintendent. "Even though state police did its part to enhance its response times and traffic safety enforcement efforts, too many motorists still put their lives and others at risk during the holiday weekend by failing to drive smart, safe or sober."

During the Operation Combined Accident Reduction Effort's (CARE) three-day statistical counting period, Virginia troopers arrested 79 drunk drivers. In addition, state troopers cited 5,389 speeders and 1,752 reckless drivers, and issued 723 citations to individuals for failing to obey the law and buckle up. During the holiday statistical counting period, Virginia State Police responded to a total of 548 traffic crashes statewide and assisted 1,791 disabled or stranded motorists. Operation CARE is a state-sponsored, national program intended to reduce crashes, fatalities and injuries due to impaired driving, speed and failure to wear a seat belt.



## School Board hits brakes on testing discussions

In many ways the Fluvanna School Board meeting Wednesday (July 10) was a study in frustration.

After lengthy discussions on testing, the cost of getting audiotapes of meetings and the fiscal year 2019 (FY19) budget, no action was taken on those topics.

Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union) brought up her concerns about testing for what seemed like the umpteenth time.

"I agree with Virginia's secretary of education who went on record this spring saying he wants to move away from what he called toxic standardized tests," Johnson said. "I agree with Ted Dintersmith, an author we brought in to speak to our students, who included in his book five pages of negative comments about standardized tests and test preparation. I agree with parents who've contacted me about testing, every one of them concerned about the negative effect a high level of testing has on their children."

Johnson then said Andrew Pullen (Columbia) early on made a motion to eliminate the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test because it's not required by the state.

"I understand that we're required to measure student growth, but after hearing from the testing committee about the assessments they prefer, I agree with Mr. Pullen and propose we reduce testing by discontinuing MAP and follow the example of the high school, which uses existing pre- and post-tests tied directly to classroom instruction to determine student growth," she said.

Pullen said he still felt eliminating the MAP test was a step in the right direction, but that he considers it "just a start."

Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) said she was uncomfortable zeroing in on testing without a clear instructional aim. "We need to make sure the tests we're giving are measuring what we want to measure and what we want them to learn," she said.

Stewart also said people complain about the use of technology and she'd rather look at that than eliminating a piece of testing.

Brenda Pace (Palmyra) said she noticed in the staff survey comments many said they preferred MAP testing.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler said the testing committee suggested cutting back on testing.

"I know we're testing too much and the recommendations of the testing committee do reduce testing," Winkler said. "We have to listen to parents, yes. We are the experts and we have to trust the experts."

In the end, there was no consensus, so Johnson said she'd quit bringing up the issue during the unfinished business section of meetings.

Meeting recordings

A year ago the board asked Winker to audiotape the meetings and make the recording available to the public. He discussed it with the school's legal team who advised him posting the recording on the school website would open the board up to a possible lawsuit for violating the American with Disabilities Act.

At that time, he told the board it would take up clerk Brandi Critzer's time to copy the recording onto a CD because she'd have to sit and watch the recording to make sure it didn't stop and if it did, she would need to start it back up at the right place.

Winkler suggested a cost of \$75 for a request for a CD meeting recording. In the fall, the board approved that.

People are free to come in at no cost and listen to the meeting recording at the School Board office.

Johnson opened the discussion Wednesday by saying she was in favor of lowering the cost.

Pullen said he'd rather see recordings more accessible. "I'd like to eliminate the cost altogether and post them online and not charge anything," he said, noting that's what the county does with its Board of Supervisors meetings.

Winkler said if someone wanted them posted in Spanish or Braille, they'd have to do that to be equitable. Satisfying that requirement could be costly.

He didn't explain why a sight-impaired person couldn't listen to the recording.

County Administrator Eric Dahl told the *Fluvanna Review* that the county has been posting recordings of the Board of Supervisors meetings online since 2010, and that there has been no request to have the recordings translated since at least 2015.

At one time high school media students videotaped the meetings, but it became too time-consuming.

Stewart asked Winkler to research what it would cost to make the recordings available online. Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) agreed

#### Year-end budget

Talking about the year-end FY19 budget, Winkler and Brenda Gilliam, executive director of finance and curriculum, said June's bills were higher than expected.

At the June meeting, Winkler said he felt comfortable they would end the year with a \$1.4 million surplus.

However, on Wednesday he said the surplus will be \$851,607, in part because of \$1,125,000 more spent in June than budgeted.

Gilliam said there is still unrealized revenue coming in from state, federal and other local money that amounts to a little more than \$1.2 million.

That anticipated revenue should balance out the amount overspent in June, leaving the anticipated FY19 surplus to be \$851,607.

Pullen and Johnson both questioned the amount spent on technology in June.


Winkler said they bought Chrome books for students and laptops and other equipment for teachers. Johnson said she still didn't understand the numbers and how it appears what was spent came close to \$3 million.

If the carryover in June was projected to be \$1.4 million, Johnson asked, how did they get the \$3 million it appears was spent in June?

No one else on the Board expressed similar concern.

Gilliam didn't have the same numbers Johnson was looking at and promised to go over her records to find the discrepancy.

Johnson said she eventually wanted a better explanation of the technolo-

# Saving horses a passion for local woman

Those who have owned, ridden and loved horses may not be aware of what happens to these beautiful animals when they have outlived their usefulness.

Lori Brown, a former horse show mom who traveled the circuit with her three daughters, devotes her time and love to horses in a different way now that her daughters no longer show. Her mission nowadays is to use her horse farm as a halfway house for rescued horses, and a sanctuary for those put out to pasture until their last days.

Her farm sits on 245 acres in the Cunningham area of Fluvanna. Brown bought the farm in 1999 and initially owned hunters and jumpers, but in 2012 when her daughters went to college and moved away, she found a new purpose. Her farmis not a rescue but is rather a private farm that cares for retired and rescued horses for a nonprofit organization in New Jersey. She currently houses 96 horses, but her numbers can change as horses find their forever homes or pass away.

Since Brown had the facility and the experience, she was able to help when she was contacted by the Standardbred Retirement Foundation, looking to board horses in Virginia.

"Our weather is nice, not too hot and not too cold. It's easier for horses to grow old without extreme temperatures so I agreed to take in a few of their retired horses and that's how it began," said Brown. All these horses have been Standardbred racers,

meaning they pull sulkies or carts and are pacers or trotters as opposed to thoroughbred racing. Most have had second and third jobs in life, primarily as riding horses, and then they come to Brown to retire.

Brown began rescuing horses a year ago when another nonprofit organization, Save Our Standardbreds from Slaughter (SOSS), contacted her to take in a couple horses that had been saved from a kill buyer in Louisa. SOSS's mission is to rescue these horses, rehab them and find forever homes.

"Unfortunately they are not always able to do that," Brown said. "The kill buyers keep getting in horses, good people keep paying their bail money to save them, but without a home offer they have no place to go and the retirement foundation is forced to retire them in their program. At this time the foundation is full to capacity so unfortunately, unless a horse has a home offer, he cannot be saved."

Most of the rescued horses Brown has at her farm come from auctions in New Holland, Penn. "Every one of my horses has a story," she said. "There are stories of hard work, stories of abandonment, love stories, stories of life – just like people."

She then told the story of Luna. "One horse was a little different than the usual horse coming from New Holland, and seemed to have been cared for by somebody before she ended up in the horse auction and then to me by way of the kill buyer." The horse was pregnant and gave birth to a little filly born on the full moon before Easter. Brown named

her Luna.

Grumpy Jake, his registered name, was nothing like his name but was instead what Brown calls an absolute sweetheart. Jake's is a love story. Brown was contacted by a man from Ontario, Canada, desperately trying to find a place for his horse to stay until it was well enough to make the trip home. This man gave his horse away to a friend several years ago, who promised to keep him forever. That was not the case and the friend sold the horse. The original owner then found the horse in a sale in Canada but he needed \$5,000 to buy the horse back and didn't have the money. He lost the horse again. For the next five years he searched for

"He told me there wasn't a day that went by that he didn't think about him," Brown said. "He contacted every rescue organization to please look for his horse, Grumpy Jake. Well, he [finally] got his phone call...that Jake had been found at a kill buyer in Virginia." He paid for Jake immediately, but Jake was not healthy enough to travel to Canada. Brown was contacted and Jake is with her, rehabilitating. He will eventually be reunited with his owner, who was crying so hard on the phone at the good news that his wife had to take the call.

"My goal is to give each horse the best quality of life for its remaining years," Brown said. "The key to that is not only medications and feedings, but grouping them with others by needs and personality. But we have to be their voice and tell their stories."
