

Sipping Through Orange County – Part Two: *The Romance of Wine*

*T*hirsty for more knowledge about wineries? In Orange County, you can find a castle, historic ruins, gorgeous vistas, and delicious wines that take you away to a setting of a novel or a movie set, a trip to France or Italy, or the bucolic Virginia countryside. This month, I visited two more vineyards and wineries in Orange County and found that they have unique offerings, but also a lot in com-

mon – including elements of romance. Every season is a wonderful time to enjoy an outing to a winery, but a summer picnic with a glass of chilled wine at one of these sublime settings inspires poetry – “A jug of wine, a loaf of bread, and Thou.” Ahh, how romantic.

Part of the Monticello Wine Trail, Reynard Florence Vineyard & Winery is located in Barboursville on the very western tip of Orange County. While driving down the long road to this winery, I eagerly anticipated what I would see. And as soon as I pulled into the property, I had to stop immediately and take a picture of the breathtaking view of the vineyards and the mountains. Roe and Dee Allison, the owners, chose this location 39 years ago, built a house, and raised their family on this property. And now, on the hillside where their children sledded lies their beautiful vineyard.

Dee and Roe met when they were in college. Originally from Charlotte, North Carolina, Dee came to Virginia to attend Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, where she studied French literature. Her studies included a semester in Paris. Roe, a native of Somerset, was a student at UVA. They married in 1976.

Dee taught high school French in Orange, Louisa, and Green Counties for 35 years, retiring in 2015. During her career, she took several trips to France with her students and in 2001, spent a month in Angers, France, as the scholar in residence – the result of an award from UVA. Dee's impeccable French pronunciation is useful in the French wine business. Throughout her career, she accumulated quite a collection of French-themed memorabilia that she used in her classrooms and now displays in the tasting room. Dee has at least 15 Eiffel Towers!

Roe owns and runs a construction company, Allison Construction, which he balances with their wine business. He put a lot of thought and care into the planning of the vineyard and used his skills as a carpenter and a builder in the design and layout of both the vineyard

and the very attractive tasting room. Roe is proud of their “ballerina” trellis design, where the vines are meticulously trained and pruned to curve upwards as well as curl downwards – like a ballerina’s skirt. This system allows the vines to benefit from more sun exposure, resulting in more sugar produced in the grape. It especially helps with their Grenache grape, because it is so susceptible to mildew from the humid Virginia growing season.

Roe explained to me that the Blue Ridge foothills’ topography and climate are similar to that of the foothills of the Pyrenees in southwest France, and the grapes that originate from that region “flourish here.” Petit Manseng, the first grape they planted in 2005, is their featured grape and flagship wine, and the only white that they grow. After my Reynard Florence tasting experience, I found this varietal to be one of my favorites.

Why start a vineyard and winery? Dee said that they wondered what to do with their empty field. She eventually put the question to Roe “Wouldn’t it be romantic to make wine for ourselves and to share with our friends?” As noted on their website, they believe that “The Truth is Romantic.” Operating a vineyard and winery has become their life and passion.

Roe explained to me that they started as consumers and had a curiosity about wine – especially French wines. They believe that “great wines aren’t exactly made; they are grown. It all starts in the vineyard.” Both Roe and Dee took classes in enology and viticulture at Piedmont Virginia Community College and were among the first graduates from that program. They planted their first vines in 2006 and had their first vintage in 2009. They are proud to say that this fall’s harvest will be their tenth vintage, and they will be celebrating with special events throughout the year.

Two and a half of their five acres are in vines, growing Merlot, Petit Manseng, Petit Verdot, Cabernet Franc, and Grenache. They also grow Cabernet Sauvignon and Chardonnay offsite. They bottle their own wine at the production facility that adjoins the tasting room. Eighty percent of the grapes they use in their wines are their own, and they produce 1,000 cases of wine annually. The grapes they source are from the Monticello AVA (American Viticultural Area), which, as members of the Monticello Wine Trail, is a priority for them.

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Running a vineyard is not all romance. They both work hard at the vineyard planting, pulling leaves, hedging, cutting clusters, pruning, harvesting, bottling, putting up bird netting, and trapping raccoons. Roe recently trapped 16 raccoons in a six-week period!

They do make time for fun. Roe plays the guitar and sings as a member of a musical trio, "Vern Fischer & His Can't Hardly Playboys." This band of friends, which includes Carl Prober in addition to Roe and Vern, entertains guests on the tasting room's deck with live jazz, standards, and old timey music every Sunday. Roe is a multi-talented Renaissance man!

In 2011, Roe and Dee opened their tasting room, becoming the third one in Orange County after Horton and Barboursville Vineyards. Their sweet seven-year-old Corgi, named Ti Rey (for "Petit Reynard"), is the official greeter. He even has a

Rosé wine named for him! But the fox is the prevalent motif. They named their winery for Reynard, the sly red fox character from Medieval folk tales. (Because of the popularity of the Reynard stories, the word "renard" became the French word for fox.) Florence is Dee's first name – thus the name Reynard Florence. Adding to the foxy décor and the charm of the French-inspired tasting room, local artists show their paintings and photography, and the curtains in the tasting room illustrate the history of wine-making.

Reynard Florence celebrates *à la française* on Bastille Day, when guests enjoy Dee's delicious crepes, enter a Bastille Day trivia contest for prizes, play *boules* (lawn bowling), listen to live music, sing along to *The Marseilles*, and sample newly released Reynard Florence wines. Mardi Gras is also a popular event at Reynard Florence, with participants celebrating with Dee's beignets and beads. *Laissez les bon temps rouler!*





On the other side of Orange County, there is another charming family-owned boutique-style vineyard and winery. Hammerstone Cellars, owned by Bill and Sue Robson, is located two miles from Chateaux MerrillAnne Vineyards. One of the newest wineries in the county, it is part of the Montpelier Wine Trail.

Bill and Sue bought their 100-acre property 18 years ago as a real estate investment and an escape from Northern Virginia. Their family, which includes two daughters and three sons, enjoys the outdoors, and they have camped and hunted on their property, and enjoyed the stream that runs through their farm. They timbered some of the forest and planted fruit trees, including pear. Last season, they yielded 10 gallons of pear juice that Coyote Ciderworks in Mineral made into cider for them.

They also grew grapes – as a hobby – and had thoughts of having a winery one day. In 2011, they began their experiment to determine which grapes would grow best on their property. The entire family, including Bill's 90-year-old mother, helped with the initial planting of the vines. In fact, the entire winery has been a real family affair, as all have participated and contributed in one way or the other. Their oldest, Elise, planted the roses at the tasting room; Alexandra and her daughter Kyleigh helped plant the vines; Chase helped dig holes and run wire; Logan worked on the irrigation system that uses solar power and made the tables for the tasting room and deck; and Ethan designed the logo and also did a lot of planting and digging.

During the process of converting the timberland to vineyards, they unearthed Native American artifacts, including arrowheads, stone hand axes, and spears. A reputable archeologist estimated that their artifacts were from the Archaic period – 2,000 to 8,000 BC – and identified one as a hammerstone. (A hammerstone was used to strike off stone flakes to make sharp edges. It is one of the oldest and simplest stone tools.) The archeologist believes that, because of all the artifacts found,

the land may have been a Native American trading site.

After discussing possibilities for the name of their future winery, the family decided on hammerstone. It is displayed on a wall in the tasting room along with other artifacts found on the property. The logo Ethan designed features the hammerstone in the ground surrounded by roots symbolizing "from the earth." They note on their wine bottle labels that "Much like our predecessors who crafted rocks from the ground, we have crafted our wines from the mineral rich soils of our land."

They opened their tasting room in 2016. The family did most of the construction, including laying the concrete. They used the wood harvested from the trees on their property to build the bar, tables, and trim in the tasting room. The tasting room deck they built overlooks the picturesque vineyards, and cards and games are set out on the tables for guests to play while enjoying their wine.

Bill is from Williamston, North Carolina, where his family has been farming since the 1740s. While growing up, he spent every summer living on his relatives' farm and picking tobacco. He was taught the value of land and learned to invest in it as opposed to stocks.

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In addition to farming, Bill is an architect specializing in churches, while Sue is a sales manager at a hotel. The couple met in high school and married after college. They celebrated their 35th anniversary in March by exploring the wineries in Southern California. Owing a vineyard is labor-intensive, and they both work hard mowing, tying up the vines, trimming, pruning, testing and charting the sugar content of the grapes, and harvesting. They also bottle their wines in the production room that adjoins the tasting room.

Bill learned about the wine business from volunteering in vineyards and attending educational programs and conferences. He joined the Virginia Vineyards Association and the Virginia Wine Association and found them to be very supportive and great resources. The late Dennis Horton of Horton Vineyards was generous with his time helping and advising him. David King, who also passed away last year, taught him the "do's and don'ts" of the business.

They have more than five acres of grapes in vine growing Norton, Cabernet Franc, Petit Verdot, Chardonnay, Petit Manseng, Gros Manseng, and Triaminette. They also grow grapes offsite at other vineyards. At some point, they may expand and cultivate another five acres in their back field.

They don't rely on one winemaker to produce their wines. Rather, to get the best product, they use four notable winemakers from throughout Virginia who each excel in a certain type of wine. Their Norton '17 won a major award at the *San Francisco Chronicle* wine competition. There were over 6,200 entries, including more than 40 Nortons, in the competition. This flavorful limited release wine was aged in bourbon barrels.

Visitors come mostly from Fredericksburg, Richmond, and Lake Anna to taste and buy their wines. While I was there, friends and enthusiastic wine drinkers Sherrie Shaw from Fredericksburg and Angela Jones from North Carolina enjoyed a wine tasting wearing "Sip Happens" shirts. They said that they like visiting wineries and collecting fun wine-related t-shirts to wear. A regular patron they call "Norm" after the "Cheers" television show character stopped by for a chat and glass of wine. The tasting room is open weekends, but they close after they take in the harvest in late October. They reopen for a few days during the holidays and for private tastings.

Many visitors have commented on feeling a certain peace and serenity at Hammerstone. Some call it cathartic.

There is always a breeze on the site that is good for both the vines and the visitors. Could it be the ancient indigenous people whispering through the vineyard?

For delicious wine, good company, a peaceful setting, and spectacular sunsets, enjoy "wine among the vines" with Bill and Sue at Hammerstone Cellars.



Off to the Louisa Ag Fair

Harley and Davidson are going to the Louisa County Agricultural Fair and Tyler Gibson hopes one of the two will reward his efforts with a championship in the market lamb division. Since mid-May, the Louisa County High School senior has been caring for the pair as his 4-H Livestock project and plans to show them in weight, pairs and senior showmanship classes at the late July event.

"Lambs are hard to show because you can't use a harness or halter, but just your hands to control them," he said. "I'm also raising a doe goat for the breeding classes which allows you to use a collar."

The 4-H projects require that Tyler keep accurate digital records of his care and expenses including feed and medications. He handles them so they will stand correctly for judging and walks them to increase their muscle tone. Before the show, Tyler will shear and bathe the market lambs.

"I'm hoping to have one in the heavy weight class and the other in the middle weight class," he said. "I'll sell them at the fair's livestock auction and any profit will go into a savings account for college."

His father Chris, the 2019 ag fair



president and, who along with his wife Natalie, has been a previous livestock club leader, added, "It is through the generosity of the businesses and individuals in the community that the kids can enjoy a profit from their projects."

To be eligible for the county fair, Tyler had to meet the yearly requirements of the club which includes attending at least seven meetings, making a presentation to the members, participating in two group community service projects and helping with fund raisers. The young man combines those efforts with helping on the family farm.

The Gibsons live east of Mineral on a 65 acres family farm which Chris returned to after college. His focus has always been beef cattle. Today, the family keeps small herds of beef cattle, goats and sheep as well as, at a nearby location, contracts with Tysons Food to raise chickens. While Chris works as an IT specialist for Virginia Community Bank, Natalie handles the poultry operation.

When ten years old, Tyler became interested in 4-H after attending the weeklong Camp Holiday and then joining the Louisa County 4-H Livestock Club, it was natural for his parents to consider his raising a heifer.

"I was always a cow man," said Chris. "But others recommended that for younger members lambs or goats were much easier, so we purchased two lambs."

The next year the Gibsons purchased a flock of seven ewes from John

Purcell, a 4-H club member who was leaving for college. Over the years, the herd has expanded to 35, and it is from among those that Tyler selects his project lambs.


"I look for ones that have good structure and muscle. You learn what the judges are looking for," he said. "I've had success at the fair with champions and reserve championships" with Natalie adding, "He has won the showmanship class every year but one and then he was second."

Tyler's resume includes wins on livestock judging teams which require knowledge of the conformation of goats, lambs, hogs and steers. The senior is president of the high school chapter of Future Farmers of America. In

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
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Kids are Free This Summer at Montpelier

Not to be outdone, the younger Gibsons – eight-year-old Stella and six-year-old twins Eli and Bella – will participate at the ag fair with other Cloverbuds, a pre-4-H group for children eight and younger. The twins work with kid goats, Peewee and Coco, while Stella has a lamb, Cookie Dough. The three have attended youth judging camps to learn skills, as did Tyler in previous summers.

"We even got to help pick out our animals," said Stella. "I picked a friendly one."

For Friday's Bottle Babies class, Stella and Bella will each select a piglet from the litter the Gibsons' sow carried. Eli will show a calf from the family's herd.

"We encourage participation for younger kids to increase their interest in 4-H and FFA activities," said Chris. "Their activities are not competitive, but give them a chance to show off their skills and hard work."

The Gibson youth also show on the Virginia Showmasters Circuit which provides youngsters the opportunity to exhibit lambs and goats. The organization offers nine competitions during the spring and summer, with the top ten finishers awarded prizes at the Virginia State Fair in October.

"The circuit has events from Virginia Beach to Abington. Tyler can accumulate points on how well he does in showmanship and animal management classes. The first show of the year had 42 youth in his 15 – 19 age bracket, so the competition is tough," said Chris then with a smile added, "We take most of our vacations pulling a livestock trailer."

A bonus for the Gibsons is that some shows offer a peewee division so Stella, Bella and Eli can show young lambs and goat kids. They especially enjoy the costume classes and Natalie's creativity becomes obvious. One year the three youngsters were the Three Little Pigs and a lamb was the Big Bad Wolf, of course. Last year Stella and Bella were Virginia Tech cheerleaders, Eli was a football player and the lamb was the referee.

This fall, Tyler will exhibit at the 4-H show at the state fair and if successful on the VSC will compete in those events as well. The three youngsters will take their projects for a costume class. Another family road trip pulling a stock trailer!
