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

Tell us about your proudest moment.



"If you don't know if you should do it, don't do it."



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

Expert teaches Fluvanna about snakes

There is no doubt that people cringe when one mentions snakes and upon seeing one slithering away in the grass, their first instinct is to kill it. Biologist and snake expert Larry Mendoza, spoke to a packed audience at a program Saturday, Aug. 24, sponsored by the Lake Monticello Wildlife Committee. Mendoza was straightforward regarding the misconceptions about snakes. By the end of the program, no one wanted to particularly embrace the reptiles he brought with him but many of the children stood in awe and fascination of these creatures and managed to touch them without fear. And even a few adults joined in as well.

A volunteer and former president of the Virginia Herpetological Society, he has had experience with a variety of snakes and used humor and facts to set the record straight on snakes; especially the dreaded copperhead and timber rattlesnake.

"Snakes are the most misunderstood animal and it is because of fear that people are bent on killing them," he said. "I want to acquaint people with snakes without shovel or shotgun." It was clear by their questions, that a majority of the people in the room were not only terrified of what they didn't know but admitted killing snakes. Their goal was to eradicate them from their yards by any means possible.

However, Mendoza noted that, "it is illegal in the state of Virginia to kill any snake unless they are posing a threat to you or your family."

He began by discussing snakes by different categories and species.

"Some lay eggs and some develop a way to live bear but not as an egg but in a membrane but not like other animals with a placenta and a passage of nutrients," he said. "There are ectothermic animals, and cannot regulate their body temperature,

so their temperature fluctuates according to their surroundings. For example, if they get overheated they will go off to a cooler environment and if they get too cold they will search for a place to get warm." The common informal term "cold-blooded" associated with snakes, is deceptive because ectotherms blood isn't cold.

"There are 24 families of snakes on all continents except Antarctica. They are highly evolved tetrapods," he said. "They have an inner ear and hear through vibrations from the ground. They lack eyelids and sleep with their eyes open. They smell with their forked tongues, which is their nasal passages. Their fangs are used for more than biting but to manipulate prey to eat."

There are five families of snakes in Virginia. Among them are the egg-laying snakes, which are harmless and include the common corn, rat, and king snakes. There is also the category of live-bearing, slender and robust rear-fanged snakes which are also harmless. The snakes in the pit-viper family are dangerous and venomous, including the copperhead.

"There are five areas of Virginia where these snakes are found. Knowing your area and where certain snakes come from rules out certain species. "He added that we are unlikely to see a canebreak rattler in our area and they are endangered. He then discussed the snakes that might be seen in central Virginia or the Piedmont region. One of the most common is the rat snake, which can grow to 80 inches in length. "Most snakes in Virginia are usually one foot or over two feet."

"A baby rat snake resembles a copperhead with its gray and black markings but they turn all black as adults. They are climbers and swimmers and keep the rodent population down and like birds and bird eggs." He said it was not uncommon to see rat snake sheddings in attics since they are climbers and get access through the vents and get the rodents who are up in these areas. "Black racers look similar but have white under their chins and they eat mostly frogs, lizards and will go after copperheads. They are one of the good guys."

"The eastern garter snake is common and often seen around gardens. Sometimes they may puff out their jaw and hiss a bit but is all show, they are harmless." He mentioned the northern water snake, often mistaken for a water moccasin, which does not exist in our area and can only be found in south east Virginia. "They are often confused with a copperhead as well but you can tell them apart because

they float and copperheads don't. The northern water snake is harmless."

The northern rough green snake eats bugs and lizards and is harmless. It turns blue when it dies. Worm snakes live up to their name, looking like worms and can be found under logs and rocks. He mentioned snakes with apparent markings such as the red-bellied snake, Dekay's brown snake, the northern ring-necked snake (yellow ring around its neck), and the uncommon eastern smooth earth snake, a taupe colored with dots. The most familiar snakes often seen are the ribbon-snakes, related to the garter snake. It has ribbons flowing down its back and is seen near water, rivers and, streams.

The most beautiful and vibrant colored snakes were the red corn snake (related to the rat snake) and the eastern king-snake, who specializes in eating other snakes. He did add that it is not unusual to find to separate species living together like a black snake with a copperhead.

"One of the funniest snakes is the hognosed, which if it feels threatened it will rear up and puff out its jaw and hiss. But when you won't go away, it suddenly plays dead and flips over on its back. If you flip it right side up, it will flip back over on its back and not move. Then if you walk away, once it sees the coast is clear, it will slither away." He added there are other snakes, including the queen-snake, often seen in the area of Natural Bridge, the northern mole snake, the eastern milk-snake, and the scarlet king-snake, only found in a few counties. All of these snakes are harmless.

"There are 20 species of non-venomous snakes and three of venomous pit-vipers, among them the infamous copperhead.

When they are young, they have a yellow tail and the adults have markings similar to Hershey kisses, hourglasses or bow ties," he said. "A timber rattler has sig-sag markings." He said you can tell the difference between non-venomous and venomous snakes by looking at a couple of features for each species. Non-venomous will have round eyes and pupils, two rows of scales no pit sensor (holes on their faces used to detect prey) and nostrils. Venomous snakes have elliptical eyes and pupils, a heat-sensing pit and one row of scales.

After describing the variety of snake in Virginia, he talked about the role snakes play in nature and contribute to mankind in invaluable ways.

"Their venom is used in medical research for cancer, Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, and blood pressure." He followed by giving tips to interact properly with snakes. "Most people get bitten by interacting aggressively. If you see one running toward you, it is not an aggressive act, they are going toward a safe habitat and you are in the way of their path."


He added, to properly remove a snake, get a broom, brush, rake, and sweep it into a trash can and release it into the woods. To snake-proof your house, add chicken wire to crawl spaces and attic vents. Remove wood and brush piles and keep grass mowed. They will reduce bug and rodent populations.

Aqua Virginia upgrading water infrastructure

Aqua Virginia has announced water and wastewater infrastructure upgrades designed to improve service, protect local waterways and operate more efficiently in the Lake Monticello community in Fluvanna County.

Aqua is installing a third raw-water pump at its Lake Monticello water treatment plant, which conveys water from the Rivanna River to the treatment process. The new pump will enable operators to rotate the pumps in use, which can help extend the useful lives of all of them. The

addition of a third pump will also provide a spare unit that can be placed into service in the event of a pump failure and ensure adequate water supply to the community.

Aqua is also in the planning stages for the installation of a larger water main to connect the water treatment plant to its main distribution loop on Jefferson Drive. This new main will help stabilize pressure in the areas surrounding the water treatment plant. The new water main will also reduce stress on existing pipes, which will improve service reliability.


The project is expected to be completed in 2020.

Aqua has nearly completed improvements to the Lake Monticello wastewater treatment plant that will reduce energy and chemical use while improving the quality of the treated wastewater discharged to local waterways.

"Aqua's top priority is to deliver safe, reliable drinking water and wastewater services to our customers," said Aqua Virginia President John Aulbach. "These upgrades by Aqua in Lake Monticello will strengthen our infrastructure, improve service and help protect the environment."

Agua plans to invest about \$5.4 million in water and wastewater system improvements statewide in Virginia in 2019.

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

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Fencing installed at historic Haden cemetery

The Haden family, which owned the Pleasant Grove House and buried their loved ones in the cemetery in front of the house, had wanted for many years to protect the cemetery while at the same time drawing attention to it and their distinguished ancestors. At the dedication of the Pleasant Grove House Museum in 2015, Haden family members gathered from all over the country and subsequently contributed generously to restoring the cemetery and providing an appropriate wrought iron fence around it. They then asked the Fluvanna Historical Society to join them and assist them in the project. The Society readily agreed.

The first priority for the Haden family was restoring the many burial monuments, many of which had fallen over or were in disrepair. The family raised \$2,800 for this purpose and hired a contractor to carry out the work. The cemetery itself is now in excellent condition thanks to the family's efforts. The Historical Society, spearheaded by its president Marvin Moss, began its own fundraising effort including local donors and several area non-profit foundations. Eventually the Society raised over \$15,000. The Society also worked with Wade Parrish and other local Haden family members to select an appropriate design for the fence and

to ensure that the Fluvanna County staff concurred with it.

The fence was manufactured in Illinois in the spring and shipped to Fluvanna in early July to David Haden of Troy, a member of the Haden family. He also installed the fence after coordinating that effort with the manufacturer. The family members paid for the outstanding balance for the fence as well as financing its installation.

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Lending a helping hand in Guatemala

While many Flucos stayed close to home this past summer, senior MaryAnn Chittenden and junior Amelie Shifflett traveled thousands of miles away on a mission trip with their church, Beautiful Gate. They traveled to Tiquisate, Guatemala, where they were able to teach and cheer up a small community in need.

It took two long plane rides to reach their destination, the first to Panama City, and the second to Guatemala City. Their layover in Panama City was a particularly long and hard one. "We were there for about three hours and there was no food there, which made it pretty miserable," said Chittenden. Once they got on the plane they were told to get off again because there had been a malfunction on the plane, resulting in a 90-minute delay.

Finally, they were able to board the plane and head to Guatemala City where they landed at 1 a.m., then boarded a bus for a four-hour, bumpy bus ride to get to their hotel in Tiquisate.

They arrived to learn that the government had turned off all the electricity in the village. This was not an uncommon experience, as everyday living situations are poor in Guatemala. Many residents live in badly made wooden houses, bathe in clay tubs, and drink water that is far from clean. Such conditions lead to many illnesses, and that is what the church group was there to help with.

The girls learned that in addition to poor living conditions, the villagers also

don't have much money since all the places to work are in a city about seven miles away. This means they aren't able to buy as many materials as they need. Still, said Chittenden, "They appreciate all the things they have, and they thank the Lord every day. They are just the sweetest and most grateful people you will ever meet," said Chittenden.

Not only are the living situations in Guatemala different from the US, but so is the food. In the US, most food is processed or canned. But in Guatemala they don't have much access to canned and processed foods, meaning everything they eat there is fresh. "You would see mango trees, and pineapple trees, and fresh fruit all over. And they had miles and miles of banana farms everywhere."

Chittenden and Shifflett stayed in Guatemala for about a week and a half. While they were there, they got to work in a medical clinic. Because much of the water in Guatemala is contaminated and villagers spend most of their time working with livestock, Shifflett and Chittenden mainly gave out medication for worms and scabies. The very first day they arrived at the medical clinic, there was a huge line of people outside the building waiting to be helped. "There was this little boy there who was running a 107.8 degree fever, and everyone was trying to help. It was really hard because I could see how much pain the little boy was in," said Chittenden.


Their group also did a CPR class so they could teach the local teachers, Shifflett said, adding that they "got to go to a

school and work with kids one day." While they were at the school, they did a Vacation Bible School where they would put on little skits for the children and have Bible studies with them. They would also play basketball and soccer games with them in the afternoons.

Unlike in Virginia, the heat in Guatemala is almost unbearable. Chittenden and Shifflett went to Guatemala in June, which is the rainy season, so not only was it hot, but the humidity was off the charts. The girls said that they could just step outside and they would already be sweating because of the heat. "I think our hottest day was 105 degrees, but with the humidity it felt like 110 degrees," said Shifflett.

Chittenden has been on a Guatemala mission trip with her church the last three years, while Shifflett has done it for two. They have both done around 12 to 13 mission trips in total, and both agree that they are planning on doing many more. They also agree that they will keep going back to Guatemala. "I am definitely passionate about mission trips. I love seeing the Lord work in a week or just in one day," said Chittenden.

The girls said they love helping others and encouraging many more people to get involved in mission trips too. "My big takeaway from the trip would be gratitude. It's amazing because we have all this stuff that we are so accustomed to, and they don't have much of anything. They get so excited to get a simple gift like a soccer ball, and we could just go to Walmart and buy it for five dollars," said Shifflett.







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

The restaurant with the big rooster out front has become, over the years, a Scottsville landmark. People coming to town and asking directions are often told "when you see the big chicken you need to go another couple of miles, turn right, keep straight or stop and eat!"

Construction on the building which was to be Lumpkin's Restaurant and Motel began in 1969 and opened for business in 1970. So, while the business will celebrate its 50th anniversary in a few months, there has been a Lumpkin "in the business" for just short of sixty years!

With the exception of those who have moved here within the past few years, many people know Virginia Lumpkin or at least have heard of her.

Virginia was born in 1924 in Buckingham County and raised on a farm. She had four sisters and a twin brother. Like most children in a farming family, there was work to do. She tended to the livestock and helped with the tobacco and wheat

crops her father planted. She "learned a lot about how to run a farm," she said, an education that would benefit her no matter what career path she followed.

As a young woman Virginia knew she didn't want to spend her adult life on the farm. She wanted a job. That opportunity came after she moved to Scottsville in 1947 to take care of an aunt who was recovering from eye surgery. There was an opening at Beal's Grocery on Valley Street. So, in 1950 she had her first "real" job!

The Travelers Rest Inn at the corner of Valley and Main Streets had 17 rooms and offered three meals a day. The Inn's primary customers were men who worked for the power company, the railroad, and traveling salesmen. One salesman who sold sausage had the Inn as a customer so that was where he stayed when he was in town. His name: Nelson Lumpkin.

Virginia was working at the Inn. Nelson and Virginia became friends. In 1955 they began their married life as husband and

wife; a union that would last until Nelson's passing in 1980. They had two children, Hollis and Marlean.

Amici's Restaurant on Valley Street has been the home to several restaurants. In 1955 it was Lee's Restaurant. Nelson helped Mr. Lee with the restaurant. In 1962 Mr. Lee wanted to sell his business. Nelson and Virginia made a deal and became the new owners. This was the beginning of successful career as a restaurant owner. She has been quoted as saying, "We just worked at it, (and) it was hard. The restaurant is hard work but it made a living for me."

In 1969 Nelson and Virginia decided to build a restaurant/motel combination on an acre of land just north of town. With some money she had from selling timber she owned in Buckingham, and money saved, construction began that year. Lumpkin's Restaurant and Motel opened the business in 1970 and the rest, as they say, is history.

In a 2015 Scottsville Monthly article by Ruth Klippstein, Virginia lamented the fact that when she moved to Scottsville there "were a lot of drunks." "Moonshine, and its effects were everywhere," she said, but Mr. Lee had told her "if there were drunk men in the restaurant not to do anything as long as they acted decently." In that article she also spoke of a "lot of segregation" but she was respected by those she served and she respected them." In the same article she thought "the loss of the high school and the tire plant damaged the essence of the town."

With some health issues, and nearing 100 years of age, Virginia doesn't get to go to the restaurant much anymore. But her son Hollis has carried on her tradition of good home cooked food, a friendly atmosphere, and trust. The restaurant is closed Wednesdays and Sundays and takes cash and personal checks; no credit cards! And Hollis, in his own right, is known for his desserts.



What a valuable gap year

The Virginia FFA 2018-2019 State Officer Team included Newlin Humphrey, Claire Seibel, Matthew Myers, Nathan McDonald, Ethan Jackson, Katherine Thompson, Ruth Fitzgerald, and Kendall Knicely.

Although Clemson University welcomed her to join other incoming freshman, Newlin Humphrey accepted another challenge that will defer her enrollment until the fall semester of 2019. After completing a detailed application and several interviews, she was selected as a Future Farmers of America state representative.

The 2018 graduate of Fluvanna County High School, who lives near Kents Store and has close ties with Louisa County, joined FFA when the high school's chapter was re-chartered after Russell Jennings, a former LCHS ag science teacher and FFA chapter sponsor, transferred to Fluvanna.

"I was in eighth grade," she said. "I was chapter president my junior year and student advisor as a senior which was a hands-on mentoring role. I also took the three agricultural-related classes offered at Fluvanna and did an independent study in floriculture."

Throughout high school, Newlin worked on her Supervised Agricultural Experience, an FFA requirement. She chose the field of equine placement. She signed on as an unpaid intern with Sally and David Lamb at Oakland Heights Farm, north of Gordonsville.

"I helped with everyday barn tasks including feeding and caring for the horses mostly after school and on weekends until my senior year when I had early dismissal and clocked over 1,400 hours." she said. "I worked with younger riders and had the opportunity to ride some of the more experienced horses as well as some green ones. I had to complete proficiency

As an FFA member, Newlin also attended leadership conferences and the state convention. But it was the summer leadership camps at Graves Mountain Lodge that motivated her to pursue FFA after graduation.

"I met other members throughout the state, and I decided to try to become a state level officer because of the opportunities it offered," she said. "I had to wait until the last event of the state convention last June to see if the nominating committee had chosen me. They selected me as reporter, one of eight 2018-2019 state officers."

One of her duties throughout last year was to visit FFA chapters from Tidewater and inter-city Richmond to Northern Virginia and southwestern counties. Newlin remarked that because of the whirlwind of activities she has put about 30,000 miles on her car.

"We wrote the curriculum and facilitated daylong workshops to students in middle and high school agricultural classes. We had four varying presentations such as Team Dynamics or Opportunities in Agriculture. The teachers could request the topic," she said. "During the year, I visited 42 schools with a partner which was one of the other state officers."

More rural schools had campuses that allowed extensive agricultural projects which included livestock, while those in urban areas might be limited to a greenhouse. One Richmond school offered a vet science program.

A highlight of the year was two weeks in South Africa last fall. From among hundreds of applications, Newlin was select-

ed to be one of 83 officers from across the United States to attend an international leadership seminar.

"We spent one week in Pretoria focusing on agro-tourism and seeing how the climate affects livestock and grain production," she said. "We visited a game preserve and learned how environmental concerns affect population control of animals such as elephants who can deforest areas and lions that have no natural predators."

In South Africa, the group also attended college lectures and visited historical sites and museums. They experienced the beauty of the ocean at the Cape of Good Hope.

Since FFA is a member-led organization, the eight officers with help from several alumni officers planned and organized the state convention held last month at Virginia Tech.

"We spent over a month prepping from ordering award and degree plaques to creating slide show presentations," she said. "We had to line up the keynote speakers and plan the sessions. It was a lot of detail work." At the convention, the officers gave their retirement addresses and were recognized for their dedication. But her responsibilities were not over. She helped facilitate last month's leadership camp at Graves Mountain with 200 participants anticipated.


Her only regret was that the demands of a state officer limited her involvement with horses. But, at Clemson she plans to try out for the equestrian team and resume her SAE project. She hopes to join Agriculture Future for America and Farm Bureau Young Farmers. Clemson has an FFA alumni chapter.

"I plan to receive a bachelor's degree in agricultural education with a teaching emphasis and minor in horticulture and non-profit leadership. Clemson is one of only a few colleges that have this program," she said. "I will probably continue to earn a master's and then teach high school agricultural classes."

If all goes as planned, Newlin will also earn the prestigious American Star award which would be presented at the 2020 National FFA Convention in Indianapolis.

Another Lions fundraiser, White Cane Day, will take place on Friday, Oct. 1,1 and Saturday, Oct. 12, when donations are solicited from the




