

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School Board differs on 2019 surplus

School Board members disagreed about what to do with the Fiscal Year 2019 budget surplus at its meeting held Wednesday (Oct. 9).

Executive Director for Finance, Curriculum and Instruction Brenda Gilliam said the FY2019 carryover will be \$932,000.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler told the Board the agreement with the county is that money would be given back to the county.

Winkler suggested asking the county Board of Supervisors to let the schools keep \$460,000 of the carryover to buy two new buses and to equip all buses that are less than fiveyears-old with air conditioning.

"We'll have half our fleet air conditioned. Those buses would be assigned to the longer routes with the youngest students," Winkler said.

Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) made a motion to vote on the carryover question on the night's action agenda.

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Brenda Pace (Palmyra) seconded the motion.

During discussion on the motion, Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union) said she wanted to give the entire amount back to the Board of Supervisors.

Johnson said after last year's budget presentation to the county, one of the supervisors privately expressed concern about School Board transparency. In light of that, Johnson suggested returning the whole carryover would help rebuild a "good relationship" with the Board of Supervisors.

Johnson also had reservations about voting on such an important issue with one member, Andrew Pullen (Columbia), not present.

Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) agreed they should wait for the whole board to vote.

Pace said kids can get sick on buses that are too hot.

"We can ask (the county) but that doesn't mean we'll get it. I think the



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quicker we can do it, the better," Pace said.

The Board voted 2-2 to add the vote to the night's agenda. Because it was a tie, the matter will be put on the next meeting's agenda. Stewart and Pace voted for; Johnson and Rittenhouse against.

In other business, Winkler said Fluvanna Public Schools are fully accredited for the sixth year in a row. Only 19 other schools in the Commonwealth share that achievement.

Special Education instructor Nick Ward stood in front of the Board with students Peter Mance, Shantika Hawkins and Victoria Harris as they held up blankets they made.

"The students love making the blankets - it's great for teaching math, cutting, tying and job readiness skills", Ward said.

Both Shantika and Peter have jobs: he works at MACCA and she works at Hudson Henry Granola.

Fluvanna SPED students also play basketball in the Medford League.

"It's the best basketball you'll ever see," Ward said.

They are adding a bowling league that will start later in the winter.

During public comments Jessica Jackson, a teacher at West Central Primary, said she was concerned about a statement made at last month's meeting on Measures of Academic Progress assessments.

"What bothered me was the comment that the MAP test is a 'strong predictor of future academic success," Jackson said. "I'm concerned that students and parents may think if they don't do well on the test, they won't do well in school."

Jackson said she remembered that after her young daughter took the MAP test in grade school, she was placed in a different reading group a lower one.

It bothered her daughter.

However, Jackson said in high school her daughter was always in advanced classes.

"So in her case, it was not predictive. You need some research to back up that statement."

High School Principal Margo Bruce said soon all high school students will have a ID badges they must carry with them at all times.

Bruce said if the student forgot it at home, they would have to wear a temporary name badge for the day.

If they weren't wearing it because they lost it, they get made with software supplied to the school by Lifetouch.

"If the student refuses to wear a badge – and there has only been one or two who didn't want their picture taken for the badge and we had a discussion with them - it would be considered a minor infraction," Bruce said.

A Blue Ridge Virtual Governor's School student Jason Deck is interning with the technology department.

Winkler said the intern suggested an alternate use for about 20 computers that will be declared "surplus."

If they "e-waste" the computers the school would recoup about \$170.

Deck said he'd like to re-use them by giving them to The Light Academy, a private Christian school in Fluvanna. "They don't have access to technology like we do," he said.

Fluvanna Public Schools would retain the hardware. After scrubbing the computer, Deck would refurbish them with the help of some Light Academy students. The Light Academy will pay a small fee for each computer.

The Board voted unanimously to back the intern's plan.

On Oct. 31 the School Board will have a seminar to focus on 2021 budget priorities.

I've even discussed issues Fluvanna business are facing with lawmakers from local up to the national level.

Economic development is working with the Economic Development and Tourism Advisory Council on fostering additional tourism through a LOVE sign and 101+ things to do in Fluvanna. In the last 10 years we have added so many assets. We need to make sure they are advertised to our region.

"What's economic development? Economic development is helping a highgrowth business find new space within the county to grow to a multimilion-dollar company. We have several in this category! Those same businesses probably need assistance finding additional workers and we have regional resources available. I have also created programs to expand the Fluvanna workforce.

> Economic development is marketing our county to companies looking to relocate to our region. These are projects looking to invest millions of dollars in construction and hundreds of jobs to our region. It is an ultracompetitive process, but we have worked to polish our marketing material, update information to state organizations and network with site selectors.

> Of course, there are other aspects of the Fluvanna Economic Development Office, but this is a good overview. For Fluvanna businesses, I am your resource between the private and public sectors. For Fluvanna residents, I am working hard to grow our economy while keeping Fluvanna as naturally beautiful as it is today.

Schools with the best and worst graduation rates

Three small rural school districts had 100% graduation rates this year, and the Brunswick County, Manassas and Richmond school systems had the state's lowest graduation rates, according to data released by the Virginia Department of Education

Fluvanna County's graduate rate in 2018, based on the 2014-18 cohort of 293 students, was 95.6 percent. Its dropout rate was 2 percent. In 2019 the graduation rate, based on the 2015-19 cohort of 274 students, was 93.4 percent with a 1.8 percent dropout rate.

Colonial Beach and Charles City, which each had fewer than 50 students in their 2019 graduation classes, and Highland County, which had just 14, graduated all of their seniors. Twenty-seven school districts had rates of at least 95%, including such larger districts as York, Montgomery and Hanover counties.

The proportion of Virginia high school students graduating on time dipped from 91.6% in 2018 to 91.5% in 2019, the data showed.

Superintendent of Public Instruction James Lane said Virginia's on-time graduation rate has risen by more than 10 percentage points in the decade since the department began reporting graduation rates that account for every student who enters the ninth grade.

"I believe this long-term, upward trend will continue as school divisions and the commonwealth adopt equitable policies and practices that provide instructional and support services tailored to the unique needs of every learner," Lane said.

During the past school year, 74 of the state's 131 districts had graduation rates above the statewide average. That was true of 197 of Virginia's 327 high schools.

Eleven high schools — most of them with 50 or fewer students — had 100% graduation rates in 2019. Six of those schools achieved perfect rates the previous year as well: Chincoteague High in Accomack County; Highland High in Highland County; Achievable Dream Academy in Newport News; Open High and Franklin Military Academy in Richmond; and Chilhowie High in Smyth County.

Among high schools with at least 400 seniors, three had graduation rates of 99% or higher: Thomas Jefferson High for School for Science and Technology in Fairfax County; Cosby High in Chesterfield County; and Rock Ridge High in Loudoun County.

Analysis of the data also showed that:

- The Lunenburg County, Colonial Beach and Charles City County school divisions registered the most improvement in their graduation rates in 2019. Each district's rate jumped by more than 10 percentage points from 2018.
- •The Brunswick, Amherst and Sussex County school divisions saw the biggest drops in graduation rates — at least 7 percentage points.
- Many of the students who did not graduate on time are still pursu-

ing their high school diploma or a GED. Other students, however, have quit school and are considered dropouts.

- Statewide, the dropout rate rose from 5.5 in 2018 to 5.6 this past year. The dropout rates varied among demographic and socioeconomic groups. The rate was:
- •4% for female students and 7% for male students
- •2% for Asian students, 3% for white students, 6% for African American students and 17% for Hispanic students
- •8% for economically disadvantaged students, 9% for students with disabilities, 22% for homeless students and 26% for English language learners

The Richmond Public Schools had the highest dropout rate in 2019 — more than 24%.

"We are of course deeply disappointed by the latest graduation numbers, but as we shared last spring, we knew a decline was possible — if not likely — as we stopped a number of inappropriate adult practices that were artificially inflating our rate," Jason Kamras, superintendent of the Richmond school district, said in a statement.

"We clearly have more work to do, but I'm confident we are now heading in the right direction."

Chesterfield County, which had a dropout rate of 7%, planned to do a "complete audit" of every student who had quit school, said Superintendent Merv Daugherty.

"This involves making personal contacts with each family with a

goal of having the student re-enroll," Daugherty said. "Additional student support services are also being incorporated to work with students who may be vulnerable to dropping out."

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Health District offers free flu shots

Thomas Jefferson Health District (TJHD) staff will once again test their capacity to respond to a major public health event by providing free seasonal influenza ("flu") shots in Fluvanna County on Thursday, October 17.


The exercise will be held at the Central Elementary School, 3340 Central Plains Rd., Palmyra from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. Flu shots are available at no cost to people who live in Fluvanna County. The seasonal flu shots being offered are preservative free, but only for people ages three years and older. Vaccines will be administered on a first come first served basis.

"We are happy to provide residents of Fluvanna County with access to free flu shots. This point-of-dispensing exercise is a great opportunity for the health department to test our ability to respond to public health emergencies while providing community members with free shots to protect against the flu," said Jessica Salah, TJHD emergency coordinator. The point-of-dispensing exercise, including the flu vaccine, is funded through the Virginia Department of Health's Office of Emergency Preparedness and Response, which is responsible for responding to any emergency impacting public health through preparation, collaboration, education and rapid intervention. Exercises such as this contribute to the local health department's ability to provide widespread access to vaccine during public health emergencies.

The point-of-dispensing exercise will help TJHD test three public health emergency response capabilities:

- 1. Coordinate emergency
- Operations
- 2. Dispense vaccine in an effi-
- cient and timely manner 3. Issue public information
- alerts, warnings, and notifications

Where do you live?

"Route 640 in Palmyra."

"Books! C'mon, what else would an educator and librarian say? Books give me a sense or imagery of being part of the story being told. Kind of like being whisked away to another time or place. Movies based on books are enjoyable, if casting is spot on and it follows the story line as close as possible. But it does not really elicit the same inner feeling."

Favorite book/series? Favorite movie?

"I've got a list two miles long and in two genres. In children's literature it is the *Junie B. Jones* series. She is sassy, she is bold, and she is a funny girl after my own heart. As for adult books, I read mostly best seller list nominees, which is surprisingly not as long a list as the children's literature section- job related I guess.

But a favorite book (and movie) is Gone with the Wind. It was the first big girl book my mother had me read one summer. I devoured it. Some part of me thinks I may have lived in that century or something-crazy thought- And then of course the movie. And yes, I do watch it repeatedly. The last time was on a flight to Greece.

What pivotal decision helped to shape your life?

"I was floundering in college, not grade wise, just trying to decide a path or career. After multiple conferences with my college advisor, she suggested I spend some time in the early childhood classroom on campus. I was hooked. After several weeks of interning the lead teacher commented I was a natural. I guess that was all I needed and I have enjoyed second of it-since 1975 (give or take a few years out here and there)."

Tell us about a way you have changed over the years.

"I'd like to believe I have become more patient and tuned into people, reacting positively to interactions, even if it is varying of my beliefs and opinions."

What has surprised you about your life?

My life is very blessed and I am extremely grateful and thankful for every second of every day. What's one thing you hope to accomplish before you die?

"I hope to accomplish a life of continued graciousness and gusto for living."

Tell us about one of your regrets.

"Not having recordings of my father's piano playing. We have his baby grand piano and all his music books and my lesion books, but no recordings. I miss it every day. He was an accomplished pianist trained by his uncle who graduated from Julliard. It was his hope to continue in that path."

Tell us about your proudest moment.

"Proud moments are being a mother, a grandmother of course, and being interviewed by a former student, who astounded me with her love of academics at the ripe age of five. It tugs at my heart when I see former students, now young adults out in the world that remember me by name and engage in conversation, ending with a hug. And, yes, I most always remember their name. Just recently, I helped 19 seniors at FCHS with their preregistration forms for the SAT, which I will proctor in a week. Upon completion of the session, a student mentioned to me that now he was okay with taking the SAT and it was going to be fun. 'Fun?' I asked. He said 'Yeah, you are going to be with us.' He was a student from my elementary years as his librarian as well as his high school librarian. I think this is best, most proud moment an educator can aspire-to have a relationship with your students from kindergarten to high school is just the best!"

Favorite spot in Fluvanna County?

"My home!"

What is the craziest thing you have ever done in Fluvanna?

"Some things must remain untold."

What quote or saying do you connect with most? Why do you like it?

"There are only two days in the year that nothing can be done. One is called yesterday and the other I called tomorrow. So today is the right day to love, believe, do, and mostly live." - Dalai Lama.

Fluco football team loses 35-21

It was homecoming weekend and the Fluco football squad was looking to up its record to 5-1. Unfortunately, the Warriors from Western Albemarle had other ideas.

The Warriors scored the only touchdown of the first quarter, but the Flucos responded early in the second quarter to tie the score at 7-7. Late in second quarter, disaster struck for the Flucos. The Warriors put up three touchdowns, the last on a pass to the end zone, as time expired. As a result, the Warriors took a substantial 27-7 lead into the locker room. Fluvanna Coach Mike Morris commented after the game that his squad must realize that sometimes it just isn't possible to come all the way back. Last season, the Flucos scored 50 points in the second half of a game in which they trailed at half-time. Not this time though.

Coach Morris noted that this game was a story of two halves, as the Flucos dominated in the second half, but only put up 14 points to trail 27-21, with time running out. With less than three minutes remaining and the Flucos deep in their own territory, the Warriors picked off a pass that set up the Warriors only score of the half and made the final score 35-21.

The first quarter of the game was a defensive struggle, with the Warriors coming out on top, as they scored on a short run with 1:23 left in the quarter. In the second quarter, the teams exchanged punts, with the Flucos taking over for the second time at their own 33-yard line. Sophomore guarterback Kobe Edmonds handed to junior running back Keontae Hearns, and he swept right, broke into the clear, and outran the Warrior defenders for a 67-yard touchdown run. The PAT was good and the score was 7-7 with 8:29 left in the half.

The Warriors responded with a touchdown drive that was aided



by an interference in the end zone call against Fluvanna. The PAT attempt was no good and the Warriors led 13-7 with 5:25 left in the half. The Flucos went three and out and Western Albemarle again marched down the field on the ground, scoring their third touchdown on a thirty-yard run. The PAT was good and the Warriors led 20-7 with only 53 seconds on the clock. On their first play the Flucos threw an interception. Western started at the 50 with 34 seconds remaining. An incomplete pass and a run for minus 3 yards were followed by a Warrior time out. After another run for f yards, the Warriors launched a desperation last play of the half pass to the end zone, and their 6-3 receiver outfought the shorter Fluco defenders for the catch and the crushing TD. The PAT was good and the Warriors went to the locker room with a 27-7 lead.

The Warriors started the second half with a short drive that resulted in a long field goal attempt that was no good. On their second possession of the half, the Flucos got another long run. This time, Edmonds ran up the middle, broke a couple of tackles and carried the ball from the Fluco 19 to the Western Albemarle 16-yard line, a run of 65 yards. On fourth down and three, Edmonds again ran up the middle and he broke out of a huge pile-up to take the ball into the end zone. The PAT was good and Fluvanna trailed 27-14.

On their first possession of the fourth quarter, the Flucos started on their own 17-yard line. On the second play of the possession senior running back Keshawn Fisher ripped off the Flucos third long run of the game, going 49 yards to the Warrior 35. A short pass from Edmonds to freshman wide reliever Jaden Ferguson took the ball to the Warrior 11. A tenyard run took the ball to the one and Edmonds scored on a quarterback sneak. The PAT was good and the Flucos were within six points 27-21, with 8:18 left in the game.

The Flucos tried an onside kick but Western covered it at the 50. Western quickly took the ball into the red zone, but an interception by junior corner back A.J. Wyche returned the ball to the Flucos at their own three-yard line. Three runs resulted in a first down for the Flucos with only 2:53 left in the game. Edmunds scrambled for six yards, but he was then intercepted to effectively end the game. The Warriors punched in another touchdown and added a two-point conversion to take their score to 35 points. The Flucos did not quit despite the two touchdown deficit and moved the ball in the last minute all the way to the Warriors thirteen yard line.

The Flucos are now 4-2 on the season and the next three Fridays they are on the road, playing at Albemarle, Louisa County and Orange County. In the final game of the regular season, the Flucos host Monticello High on Nov. 8.

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
