Historical Society celebrates a successful year at Melrose house event

The rain did not stop the Fluvanna Historical Society from gathering and hosting their annual fall membership meeting held Sunday (Oct. 20) at the historic Melrose house in Palmyra.

President Marvin Moss welcomed members and visitors before recapping recent elections and updating everyone on the society's work in the community. The meeting also went into detail about current projects and hosted speaker, Andy Sorrell, who shared the history of the Seven Islands and the Shores Family.

Moss started out by saying that, "the Fluvanna Historical Society is one of the largest historical societies in a rural county."

The first project that Moss went over was the memorial that was dedicated in recognizing the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation and end of the Civil War. In an interview with CBS 19 News, director of the Fluvanna County Historical Society, Tricia Johnson, said "that 5,000 people were freed in Fluvanna County by the Emancipation Proclamation."

The next project that Moss praised was the opening of the new Farm Heritage Museum at Pleasant Grove. On May 4, 2019, the museum was opened to the public to showcase farm equipment dating back to the Civil War and up to the 19060s. The Fluvanna Historical Society raised over \$287,000 for this project and worked alongside the county to bring the museum to life. Along with the museum, the restroom facilities were also opened.

The Haden family cemetery, also located at Pleasant Grove, just completed fencing around it. Wired fences used to surround the graves, but the Fluvanna Historical Society helped raised \$15,600 with the remaining from the Haden family, for a new fence to surround the cemetery.

Moss then told the audience about a plaque for the last operating blacksmith shop in Fluvanna County. The



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shop is located on Rt. 53.

As for current projects, Johnson explained a joint project with One Shared Story on digital historical mapping. These digital maps will show mills, infrastructure, and bridges throughout the county. Johnson also made sure to tell guests that the Fluvanna Historical Society will be the first ever in the entire country to do this. Volunteers are still needed and can help with the mapping process and finding locations throughout the county.

After going over projects, Sorrell took over. He became a resident of Fluvanna County in 2004 thanks to his father who acquired land near the James River and was bitten ever since. Sorrell talked about the history of the Seven Islands/ Isles, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1991. The Seven Islands stretch over four miles of river and the seven comes from a biblical reference to "many."

"The land is privately owned and was very good for farming and hunting," said Sorrell. "It was rich in plant life, with trees such as oak, chestnut, maple and much more, as well as animals like bears, mountain lions, elk, deer, and turkeys."

The land had been owned by Fluvanna ancestors from families that include: Buggs, Miles, Seay, Shores, Thomas, Tutwiler, and Ware. Sorrell also explained that the Monacan Tribe might have been there for a little bit since it was right on the James River. Today, the land is not suitable for building houses due to flooding, although, there is a tree house.

He then went into the history of the Abraham Childers, who was the first person to live near the Seven Isles, as well as how it connected to the Shores and Tutwiler family and how they connected to the Melrose house. At the end of the meeting, after Sorrell answered questions from the audience, guests enjoyed refreshments and food and were also encouraged to tour the Melrose house. Jefferson (Jeff) Strider moved into the home in July of this year.

Don Weaver gets Longevity Award

Cunningham Supervisor Donald Weaver was presented with the Virginia Association of Counties (VACO)'s Longevity Award at the top of the Board of Supervisors meeting on Wednesday (Oct. 16).

Weaver was elected as a supervisor in November 1989 and was sworn in January 1990. "Someone asked me if it was 1890," he quipped.

Representatives from the Lake Monticello Homeowners Association (LMOA) were also rewarded for longevity during the meeting: supervisors presented them with a framed proclamation celebrating the community's 50th anniversary.

Drought watch

Noting the irony of bringing it up on the first day in weeks to see any substantial rainfall, County Administrator Eric Dahl asked the board if it wanted to take initial steps towards a county-wide burn prohibition or burn ban. Gov. Ralph Northam issued a statewide drought watch advisory last week and almost 40 localities across the state have already issued bans. After some discussion, and with more rain in the forecast, supervisors decided to hold on any formal action at this time.

Sycamore Square

Back in 2002, a small piece of land in the Sycamore Square development on South Boston Road was donated to the county "for a future branch library or additional uses as determined necessary." With no need for a library branch, supervisors were presented with an ordinance to vacate the donation and release it back as common area for the Sycamore Square Property Owners Association. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the proposal by a vote of 3-1 at its Oct. 8 meeting.

Supervisor Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) asked Community Development Director Douglas Miles if there had any consideration of using the lot for something like a boys' and girls club or other public use. Given that the area in and around Sycamore Square is arguably the most densely populated in the county, O'Brien questioned giving up the property if it could be used. "It's your determination," said County Attorney Fred Payne. "You don't have to vacate it if you don't want to."

During the public hearing phase of the discussion, Dr. Linda Staiger said the 1.25-acre parcel might make an ideal place for a farmer and artisans' market, saying the current farmer's market at Pleasant Grove is too remote for many residents. "If you have the opportunity to use the property for the community, you should do that." Residents Kathy Swenson Miller and James Kelley also spoke in favor of, in Kelley's words, "holding on to the public good for the public good."

O'Brien suggested the Fluvanna Leadership Development program or the Parks and Recreation department look at the property and see if there was a way to utilize it. Miles cautioned that "from a site design perspective," the plot was very small, particularly if it was used for anything that required parking.

Supervisors ultimately voted to defer a decision on the ordinance pending an analysis of the site.

Burn building

Members also deferred a supplemental appropriation for the proposed Fork Union Fire Training Building.

Purchasing Officer Cyndi Toler said the design firm Crabtree, Rohrbaugh & Associates had just submitted their initial design for the construction of the "burn building" at an initial cost estimate of \$954,544. Site preparation would likely add another \$10,000 to \$15,000 to that total.

The original estimate for the project was \$675,000, but Toler explained that an increase in the cost of steel and a 20 percent increase construction costs over the last year, combined with the request of the burn building committee for a concrete roof, had driven up the cost. Some of this will be offset by a \$450,000 grant from the state.

Supervisor Weaver balked at the increased price tag. "We're already in debt \$96 million. Where does it end?"

He argued that local fire companies are able to train at burn buildings in Albemarle, Goochland, and other nearby localities without much cost to Fluvanna. Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia), himself a first responder, said the problem was that every time a crew had to leave the area to train, it stretched the county's already limited emergency response even tighter.

Supervisors voted to defer action on the appropriation for the and asked Toler to approach the design firm for an estimate for a structure with either a smaller footprint or a different configuration that might lower the overall cost.

Love

Fluvanna Historical Society Director Tricia Johnson gave the semi-annual report for the Economic Development and Tourism Advisory Council (EDTAC). She outlined some of the projects currently underway, including a list of "101+ Things to Do in Fluvanna" and the construction of a LOVE installation at Pleasant Grove. With grants from the state tourism board, around 180 LOVE signs have been erected statewide, supporting the "Virginia Is For Lovers" campaign. Johnson said students from the Career and Technical Education (CTE) program at FCHS were taking the lead on designing and installing the sign.

Horizon blue

Given a choice between Clear Sky, Baby Blue, Heavenly Blue, Spring Water, and Horizon Blue, supervisors selected Horizon Blue for the new Zion Crossroads water tower. A final decision on the logo will come during a November meeting.

The game then seesawed back and forth with ties at 8-8, 11-11, 13-13 and 19-19. The Albemarle coach and Fluco Coach Christi Harlow-Garrett both called late time-outs to try to rally their squads. Unfortunately for the Flucos, the Patriots net play was

flawless and they scored the last five points of the game for a competitive 25-20 win.

In the second game, freshman Faith Shields served first for the Flucos and the Flucos won the first two points. The Warriors scored on Shields' third serve to make it 2-1. The Flucos scored on the following Albemarle serve and recorded the fifth point of the game on senior McKenzie Moore's serve for a 4-1 lead. Unfortunately, from that point on it was all Albemarle. The Patriots guickly tied the score at 4-4, after trading points for a 5-5 score, the Patriots put the game away by running off 12 consecutive points to make the score 5-17. Twelve points is a virtually insurmountable lead in high school volleyball. 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LM Film Group picks top films of 1969

In celebration of Lake Monticello's 50th Anniversary, some lake film aficionados had a special presentation on Tuesday (Oct. 15), on the top 20 films of 1969.

Scott Mein, Carol Kinsey, and Joe Grubb, talked about those films that were groundbreaking and why.

The list included some off-beat, thought-provoking, and even some X-rated films of that era. Topping the list was "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid," "Midnight Cowboy," and "Easy Rider," and down the list at number seven was "True Grit." These were the films that were discussed as to why they were so popular as well as original.

Scott Mein talked about the films of 1969 as groundbreaking, mostly for questioning the social norms that had governed society for decades and were now being challenged by a new generation and sub-culture. These films changed for years to come how we looked not only at society but ourselves.

Many viewed 1969 as having subversive ideas that people saw as anti-establishment but flocked to see these films anyway; making them not only a memorable part of the American culture but making an indelible statement about the era in which they were filmed.

"There were a lot of interesting trends in 1969," said Mein. "It marked the beginning of violence in films." He discussed number one on the list which was "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid." He cited some interesting facts aside from the fact it won four Oscars; one of them for the award-winning song "Raindrops Keep Falling on My Head." Mein called it a "buddy film" because of the relationship between Butch and Sundance. William Goldman's humorous dialogue enhanced the bond between them and delighted audiences.

In the film, Etta Place, played by Katherine Ross, was a school teacher; in real life she was a prostitute. He showed highlights from the film and photos of the real Butch Cassidy, Sundance Kid, and Etta Place, adding some historical references.

Following Mein was Carol Kinsey

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talking about "Midnight Cowboy," which was X-rated in those days before the rating system was changed and today it would be R-rated. He told the story about how Dustin Hoffman secured the role of Ratso Rizzo.

"He had just finished "The Graduate" and was viewed as a clean-cut boy in that and not the type to play Ratso Rizzo in 'Midnight Cowboy.' So, to prove that he could do it, he dressed up as a homeless man and met with the director, who he convinced to give him the role. Hoffman being a method actor, he was able to pull it off," said Kinsey. "Voight was an unknown but this picture launched his career and in 1978 he won Best Actor for "Coming Home." He added that both men were very competitive during the filming of the movie but both had onscreen chemistry which worked well for this film about deep connections and friendship. It was viewed by some critics to be raw and gritty for its time but audiences embraced the new concept in film-making. It was the first X-rated film to win Best Picture.

"The word scuzzy originally came from this film," said Kinsey. A sidenote, in 1994, the film was considered to be "culturally, historically or aesthetically significant" by the Library of Congress and selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry.

Mein discussed the third top movie of 1969, which continued the buddy theme with Dennis Hopper and Peter Fonda touring the U.S. on their motorcycles. A lot of clips showed the two traveling down highways with the wind in their hair but it was struggling actor Jack Nicholson that shined in his 17 minutes onscreen.

"The film was made for \$400,000 and another \$1million to buy the rights to the music but it made \$60 million," said Mein. "It was one of the first to use soundtracks of popular music." He added that this film was a reflection of the counter-culture taking place and gaining momentum. This is highlighted in the film's ending with both of them being killed, perpetuating the theme of violence.

He told one tidbit about Nicholson and Fonda.

"When Nicholson was riding on the back of Peter Fonda's motorcycle, he was holding Peter so tight he broke his ribs." He added that Hopper was known to be difficult to work with and he and Fonda fought constantly during filming.

The last film was discussed by Joe Grubb. "True Grit" was seventh on the list and one of John Wayne's best performances. Grubb discussed the irony of screenwriter Margurite Roberts, who had been black-listed in the '50s working with Wayne, who had been the strongest advocate of black-listing, believing the liberal writers were taking over the film industry.

Rounding out the cast was Kim Darby as Mattie, a role that Sally Field had been looked at as a possible candidate, and Elvis Presley as the Texas Ranger LeBoeuf, which Glen Campbell ended up playing.

"True Grit" referred to Wayne's character Rooster Cogburn but Mattie showed true grit as well," said Grubb. The dynamics between Rooster and Mattie showed their tenacity knew no limits. "It was revolutionary in movie-making because he got an Oscar for playing the anti-hero."

There were many other films on the list that were notable, including "They Shoot Horses Don't They," with a stellar cast. Anyone who loves classic films as much as these film lovers should revisit some of the top 20 of 1969. They are gems worth watching.



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

DMV increases staffing as Real ID deadline approaches

After noticing his driver's license was set to expire, Loudoun County resident John Akins paid a visit to the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles Friday. This time he'll obtain a Real ID-compliant driver's license — a new requirement for many Americans.

Virginians have until Oct. 1, 2020 to acquire a Real ID-compliant driver's license or ID if they would like to travel by plane or access certain federal facilities. As the deadline approaches, the Virginia DMV has increased staffing at customer service centers.

"We've had more than 700,000 Virginians already receive a Real ID," said Matthew Butner, a spokesman for the Virginia DMV. "The main driver I think is the air travel piece."

It is optional to acquire a Real ID, but federal agencies will not be able to accept non-Real ID licenses or IDs after next year's deadline. Access to Transportation Security Administration security checkpoints will require either a Real ID or a passport for domestic and international flights. Some military bases already require a Real ID for access.

The Real ID Act, which was passed

by Congress in 2005 at the recommendation of the 9/11 Commission, establishes minimum security standards for state-issued IDs, such as driver's licenses. According to the Department of Homeland Security, the security standards required for the Real ID itself and the process of obtaining it include: "Information and security features that must be incorporated into each card; application information to establish the identity and immigration status of an applicant before a card can be issued; and physical security standards

for facilities where driver's licenses and applicable identification cards are produced."

Akins, a computer engineer, said he knew Real ID is intended to provide an increased level of security when traveling, but he noted that the look of his new driver's license and the process for obtaining it wasn't drastically different than the previous procedure.

"This process wasn't unlike any other time I've renewed my license, although obtaining a Real ID-compliant license required an in-person visit to the DMV," Akins said. "I was surprised to see that the only discernible difference between my original driver's license and the Real ID license was a small solid black circle with a star in the center, in the upper right corner of the license."

To meet demand for the new IDs, DMV has increased staffing at service centers. The organization also has expanded its mobile outreach program, which travels throughout the state providing Real IDs.

"We also have added DMV Connect teams, which are doing a ton of work for us," Butner said. "These are two-tothree person teams, they have a laptop, a camera, and a signature pad and they can go out and do any DMV transaction other than testing and vital records."

DMV Connect teams typically go to places that lack easy access to DMV customer service centers, such as rural areas. Recently, teams have been working in densely populated areas where customer service centers are already busy.

Earlier this month, Gov. Ralph Northam announced that the state has been issuing Real IDs at all Virginia Department of Corrections facilities to formerly incarcerated people.


"We are fully committed to ensuring returning citizens have access to the support they need to successfully reintegrate into society," Northam said in a press release. "Having identification that is Real ID-compliant will be a valuable tool in reducing recidivism and helping them start out on a positive path upon release."

Butner encourages Virginians who still need to obtain a Real ID to do it sooner than later.

"We are seeing increased wait times, and that's just simply due to the volume of customers that are taking advantage of Real ID," he said. "It's only going to get more crowded as we head towards Oct. 1, 2020 ... don't wait until the last minute."

Obtaining a Real ID requires the following:

- One proof of identity and legal presence
- Two proofs of Virginia residency
- One proof of social security number
 Current driver's license, if seeking to obtain a Virginia driver's license for the first time.





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
