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Supervisors hear about high priority needs

"We have a lot of expensive things on the agenda tonight," Finance Director Mary Anna Twisdale told the Board of Supervisors at the top of her presentation on Wednesday (Nov. 6) evening.

While it will increase after the completion of the annual audit and as some department return unused funds at the end of the budget year, at the moment, the county has an unassigned fund balance of just under \$2.5 million.

Supervisors had to decide how—or if—to allocate about \$750,000 out of that fund to several high-priority items on the fire and rescue wish list.

The biggest and most crucial item on that list is a replacement set of self-contained breathing apparatus, or SCBAs, the air tanks and masks firefighters wear to protect them from smoke and toxic chemicals.

The current set has reached end-of-life. A new set will cost an estimated \$818,000.

Over the last two fiscal years, the county had put aside \$100,000 a year to fund replacements and applied for a grant to fund the remaining \$618,000.

However, the grant did not come through.

Twisdale told the supervisors that in terms of "wants and needs," this was a definite need, critical safety equipment that cannot be deferred much longer.

Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia), a volunteer with the Kents Store Volunteer Fire Department said some of the units had already malfunctioned, "and if they malfunctioned at the wrong place at the wrong time, you could have a catastrophic event."

The motion passed 5-0.

Next up was a request for \$83,000 to replace Lake Monticello Water Rescue's support vehicle.

John Lye of the Fluvanna Fire and Rescue Association (FRA) said the current vehicle is 28 years old and leaking fluids from most of its major systems. For a replacement, they are looking at a fully outfitted 2020 Silverado.

Supervisors approved up to \$95,000 in debt funding for a replacement vehicle earlier in the year. Lye and Twisdale explained that they were changing the request to \$83,000 in cash funding so Lake Monticello Volunteer Fire & Rescue (LMVFR) can hold the title and insurance as the currently do with the rest of their fleet. If the vehicle is purchased by the county, the county would hold the title and insurance.

County Administrator Eric Dahl argued that it was best to stay consistent, even if it meant dipping into the cash funds. "To me, it's either you do all vehicles in the county's name or Lake Monticello keeps them in their name, instead of these oddball onesies and twosies."

The supervisors finally approved cash funding by a vote of 4-1, with Supervisor Trish Eager (Palmyra) voting no.

Engine 20

Chris Aley of the Fork Union Volunteer Fire Department asked for an additional allocation of \$55,000 for the replacement of Engine 20.

Earlier this year, supervisors allocated \$600,000 in debt funding for the vehicle, without having had the opportunity to cost out the potential cost.

Aley said they first thought it might cost up to \$740,000, but by looking at every possible component, they managed to get it down to \$655,000. "There are no extras on this truck," he said. Given the increased costs of steel and aluminum, he didn't think it would be possible to get the price much lower.

The proposed truck includes a modest custom cab with additional airbags for crew safety. After heart attacks, vehicle crashes and rollovers are the leading cause of firefighter fatalities. The only two Fluvanna County firefighters to die in the line of duty were killed in a rollover in the 1980s. Aley said he felt they'd be "sacrificing safety" to go with a less robust cab design.

Supervisor Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) commented with costs only going up, deferring big-ticket items isn't

going to reduce the burden to the county over the long term. "The reality is that we're still years away from capturing other sources of revenue, so we're either debt funding or raising taxes, and that's just the reality."

The board approved the \$55,000 increase on a 4-1 vote, this time with Mr. Sheridan voting no.

Lever Of Funding

"Let me ask Tony something," said Supervisors Don Weaver (Cunningham). "He said we don't have any more means to capture money. What did you mean by that?"

O'Brien explained: "The levers we have are the same levers we've always had," primarily real estate and personal property taxes. Without new sources, like the meal tax that failed last year, or a business tax, or some other form of revenue capture, there's no avenue for growth.

That will change when the Zion Crossroads water project is complete and commercial growth increases the tax base, "but even once that happens, it's still going to take a period of time, so I can't see where we're going to have huge amounts of extra money over the next 4-5 years that are going to meet the needs we have. So we're going to have to take on debt," he continued.

"I know it's disappointing to take on more debt. I know you're focused on that, and I appreciate that," he said. "If we continue to postpone things, at some point and time, we're still going to debt finance things."

O'Brien also noted that there was a time when the county's debt was \$110 million, and it's now down to about \$95 million, and they continue to pay it off at a rate of \$5-6 million per year. Dahl added that all outstanding debt was currently at "rock-bottom" interest rates.

Other Matters

Supervisors approved updates to the inclement weather policy for employees, a new contract for security upgrades at the courthouse, and a renewal of mandatory environmental monitoring program at the County Landfill.

They also heard reports from VDOT, the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission, and Children's Services.

Arts make the difference in the life of student with Asperger's

Logan Anne Davis is an eighth grader at Fluvanna County High School but what sets her apart from other students is she has Asperger's, a form of autism. Her grandmother, Billie Davis saw the difference in Logan after performing with Empowered Players. Usually shy and having difficulty interacting with others, Logan began to blossom, breaking out of her shell.

"Empowered Players has made a phenomenal difference in Logan," said Davis. "Many children and adults with Asperger's have a lot of problems with tonal inflections in the speaking voice not just for reading something aloud, but also when carrying on a conversation or expressing an emotion of anger, sadness, or surprise," said Davis. "Being a part of a theatrical group allows the person an opportunity to learn to express themselves in an appropriate inflection, indicating the correct emotion. In a play or improvisation, the person can hide behind a mask of the imagination, interpret the work, analyze the character until they can become the character with their perceived qualities and attributes in a performance."

Davis adds that interactions with people can be very difficult for a child or an adult who has Asperger's. Empowered Players helped Logan with positive interactions through team building, relationships, and learning some life skills as a functioning person.

"Logan didn't always mix well with other children even as a toddler. Her ability now to mingle and make friends is something that she has developed through Empowered Players and Virginia Repertory," she said. When comparing the two theater camps, Empowered Players provided a smaller number of students and small group work areas that made the difference.

Davis sees the role of the arts in shaping how many of us view the world and have proven to be beneficial and therapeutic in many areas of human existence.

"The arts have become a hot topic over the last decade or so." The therapeutic community values the arts through music, dance, art, and theater and it has verified its benefits with the results in less stress and anxiety in children and adults.

Logan's Asperger's was identified when she was three years old. She had always had difficulty with math and computation but since participating in Empowered Players, it has become easier for her. Davis says she sees a visible change in Logan. Last year, Logan took piano lessons and chorus and is now taking guitar lessons.

"The same area of the brain that does math computation also does music. When she was tested this year at the Curry School of Education, regarding her Asperger's, they were amazed at where she is now versus where she was 18 months ago and determined that the gap was closing between language skills and math skills because of the introduction of music. But the magic ingredient was music."

Davis believes public education could do more to promote the arts but is grateful for what is offered and what is available throughout the community, including Persimmon Tree Players and the Fluvanna Art Association. These organizations along with Empowered Players have provided artistic opportunities to young people.

Director of Empowered Players Jessica Harris weighed in with her

comments about the influence of the arts in shaping young minds and spirits.

"While studies show that engaging in the performing arts improves reading, writing, and math outcomes, I find that the increase in confidence, self-awareness, and self-expression are even more powerful. Through working together to create a show, students learn teamwork. By challenging themselves to learn new performance skills and hone their craft, they learn discipline and gain confidence," said Harris. "The non-cognitive skills that students learn from the arts are remarkable, and they grant students invaluable life lessons. Opportunities for creative expression give everyone a chance to explore, learn, grow, and connect - and the performing arts provide a safe space for students to dive deeply into these outlets."

Davis points out that someone with Asperger's or other autism disorders is prone to having a lot of anxiety issues and frustration. When their environment is overwhelming as it is for Logan, who suffers from severe anxiety, music is comforting. She will also pull out a sketchbook and draw to relieve anxiety.

"The arts are a great panacea for anxiety," said Davis, who said Logan likes the classics. "One of her teachers from last year wanted to know what kind of music Logan liked when they were having a study and quiet time and allowed to listen to music on their cell phones. Logan let her listen. The teacher wanted to know who the singer was, and Logan told her it was Frank Sinatra. The teacher was a bit shaken as she was not familiar with "old blue eyes."

Davis added that scientists have proven that the classics are known to

set into motion the production of endorphins in the brain which reduces anxiety. Music, art, and writing are key to reducing anxiety. The arts can give respite from the daily wear and tear of life.

"I know what theater and music, has done for Logan in finding out who she is, in learning how to not be so shy, and preparing her for meeting people and the future with joy and understanding," said Davis. "Perhaps, if all people could experience the arts that now permeate Fluvanna County and the schools, we would have a gentler, more honest, open, and understanding society. The goal of this journey is for Logan to be a successful, structured, caring adult."

Davis says many of those with Asperger's don't make short term nor long term goals; but Logan, now 14, does have goals and is leaning toward nursing.

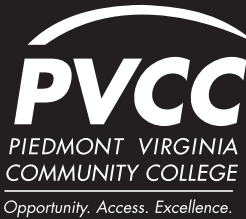
"We know that could change on a whim." Davis credits Logan's interest in music and theater experience in motivating Logan to find answers to her questions and answers and doing research to attain her future goals. But Davis believes that without theater and music, the goals would not be there nor would Logan have been motivated to find those answers.

"Some days the frustration and anxiety can be atrocious and almost crippling but after participating in Empowered Players, she is calm, relaxed, reassured, and no sign of any Asperger's traits." She credits Jessica Harris, for facilitating such a positive change in one young teenager. Logan understands fully where she started on this journey and where she is now, even though she's still living with anxiety issues.



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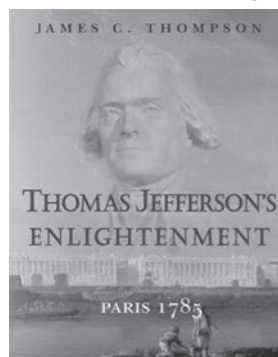

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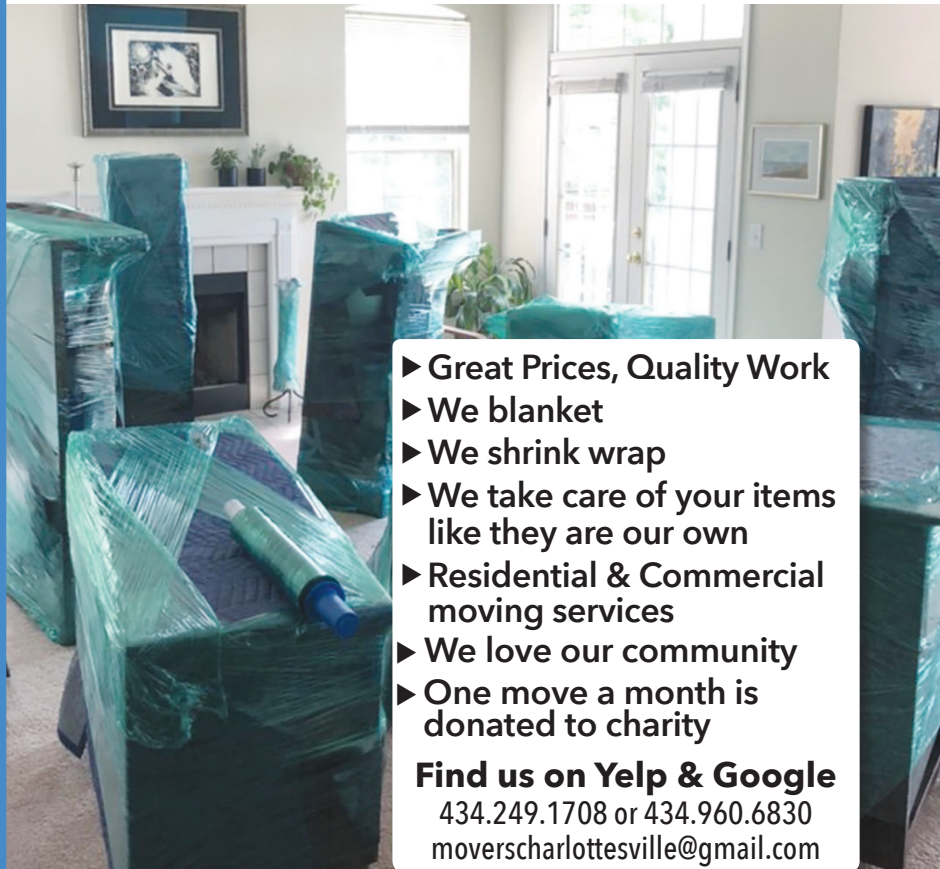

Black children more likely to live in 'concentrated poverty'

African American children are more than seven times as likely as white children in Virginia to live in "concentrated poverty" — neighborhoods where at least 30% of the residents are poor, according to census data compiled by a children's advocacy group.

Growing up in high-poverty neighborhoods is "one of the greatest risks to child development," say officials at the nonprofit organization Voices for Virginia's Children.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation recently released a report showing that 91,000 children in Virginia live in concentrated poverty. That figure includes 2% of white children in the commonwealth but 4% of Latino children and 15% of black children.

Overall, 5% of Virginia's children live in concentrated poverty. That is below the national average of 12%. But while concentrated poverty rates have fallen in most states in recent years, Virginia hasn't seen any improvement, the study said.

"Children deserve to grow up in neighborhoods where they have the opportunity to thrive. This report shows us that current policies in Virginia are not benefitting all children equitably, and informs where we need to focus our efforts," said Margaret Nimmo Holland, executive director of Voices for Virginia's Children.

"One might think a strong economy would have a positive impact on all families, but we can see from the data that is not the case. Certain groups of children and their families are disproportionately left behind, so we need to target policies that will reach these children specifically."

According to a news release issued by Voices for Virginia's Children, children in high-poverty neighborhoods tend to lack access to healthy food and quality medical care, and they often face greater exposure to environmental hazards, such as poor air quality and toxins such as lead. When these children grow up, they are more likely to have lower incomes than children who have moved away from communities of concentrated poverty.

The report issued by the Annie E. Casey Foundation is titled "Children Living in High Poverty, Low-Opportunities Neighborhoods."

The report is part of a project called KIDS COUNT.

Children in concentrated poverty are a subset of all children living in poverty. In connection with the report, KIDS COUNT released data on the overall poverty rates for children in each state. The data was drawn from the American Community Survey conducted annually by the U.S. Census Bureau.

In Virginia, 28% of African American children and 9% of white children live in poverty, the data showed. For children of all races, the state's poverty rate is 14%.

Nationwide, 33% of African American children and 11% of white children live in poverty. For children of all races, the national poverty rate is 18%. The rate had been decreasing since 2014 but stalled from 2017 to 2018.

The poverty level is based on income and family size. The poverty threshold for a family of four was \$24,858 in 2017, the most recent year in the KIDS COUNT data set.

The states with the highest overall child poverty rates in 2017 were Louisiana (28%) and Mississippi and New Mexico (both 27%). Then came the District of Columbia and West Virginia at 26%.

The states with the highest rates of African American children in poverty were Louisiana (47%) and Mississippi (42%). Then came Ohio at 42% and Alabama, Michigan and Nevada at 41%.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation report said it is important to tackle the problem of concentrated poverty. The problem is especially prevalent in urban areas. About 23% of children in cities live in high-poverty neighborhoods, compared with 5% of children in suburban communities.

Getting children out of concentrated poverty pays off.

"Children under age 13 who moved from low-income neighborhoods to more affluent communities had higher incomes as adults compared to peers who remained in impoverished areas," the report stated. It urged governments to:

- End housing discrimination against people who have been incarcerated.
- Support subsidies and other incentives for developers to expand the number of affordable housing units.
- Provide incentives to large community institutions, such as hospitals and universities, that hire and purchase locally and contract with businesses owned by women and people of color.

Philip Tegeler, executive director of the Poverty and Race Research Action Council, said public education also is part of the solution.

"Ensuring that children are in a safe community with access to a high-quality school — these are important goals to help children escape from poverty," Tegeler said. "The educational disadvantage that is associated with high-poverty neighborhoods is possible to overcome, but very difficult."

Tegeler said concentrated poverty resulted from "a long history of intentional segregation." He blamed "municipal fragmentation" and the way land use, schools and taxation were used to separate communities by income.

Nationwide, 13 million children live in poverty, with 8.5 million in concentrated poverty.

"It's important to recognize that children are only young once, and there's only a few pressing years."

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Flucos trample Monticello Mustangs on Senior Night

It was run the ball, run the ball, and run some more on Nov. 8 as the Flying Fluco stuck to the ground to top the Monticello Mustangs. All four Fluco touchdowns in a 28-0 win came on runs. At the beginning of the season, Fluco second year Coach Mike Morris advised that his team would probably feature "running back by committee." Usually you might expect that one running back would eventually take over the bulk of the offense as the season progresses. However, in the final regular season game, running back by committee is exactly what the Flucos featured.

After the game, Morris noted that his offensive run game was "very balanced." Running behind a powerful offensive line, sophomore quarterback Kobe Edmonds, senior running backs Gabe Stoy, Justin Sullivan and Malachi Hill and junior running back Keontae Hearn, blasted through and ran around the Mustangs defense. Morris noted that he felt this was his team's "best game overall." Obviously, the defense was also strong as it shutout a Mustang offense that was led by a highly talented and dangerous quarterback. The Fluco defense gave up yardage as it bent but did not break. Two turnovers by the Mustangs helped to ensure a shutout.

On the opening possession of the game, the Flucos drove 80 yards on the ground for a touchdown. Hill did most of the damage with two runs of over ten yards. The coup de grace was delivered by Stoy on an eight-yard blast up the middle. The extra point was good

and the Flucos had a 7-0 lead with 7:43 left in the first quarter. After a couple of good gains, the Mustangs flubbed a pitch-out and Fluco senior defensive tackle Aden Custer recovered the fumble for a first and ten at the Fluco 42.

In three runs by Edmonds, Hearn and Hill the Flucos were at the Mustang 15, but a Fluco fumble turned the ball back to Monticello. The Mustangs managed a couple of first downs, but the Fluco defense stiffened and fourth down try by the Mustangs failed giving the ball back to Fluvanna as the first quarter ended. Sullivan ripped off a powerful 28-yard run to the Monticello 15. Hill Stoy and Edmonds combined to take the ball to the one and Edmonds scored on a quarterback sneak. Elijah Bullock slammed through the PAT and the Flucos were up 14-0 with 8:02 left in the half.

Monticello went three and out, with senior linebacker Tyler Stoy getting his first of two pass knockdowns at the line of scrimmage. On the Mustang punt, Bullock made an excellent return all the way to the Mustang 20-yard line. Coach Morris pointed to this run back as a turning point in the game. Runs by Hearn and Hill gained only four, but Edmonds took the ball to the 12-yard line for a first down. On a counter play, Hill nearly scored, but was stopped at the one. Edmonds scored again on a quarterback sneak. The PAT was good. The Mustangs managed one first down but an interception by Fluco junior Ryan Hicks on a desperation throw, due to pressure from senior Walt Stribling gave the ball back to the Flucos

with less than a minute left. The Flucos took a 21-0 lead to the locker room at the half.

The Mustangs moved the ball effectively on their first possession of the second half gaining a first and goal at the three. The Fluco defense held on

three plays and the Mustangs fumbled on fourth and one. The Mustangs drive took up half of the third quarter, so that the Flucos took over with only 6:03 left. The Flucos made one first down and were halted on their second series and punted. The Mustangs made a couple of first downs but the Flucos forced two losses and an incompleteness for a fourth and 16. A holding penalty on the Mustangs made it fourth and forever. Down by three touchdowns, the Mustangs had to go for it. An incomplete pass gave the ball back to the Flucos. Edmonds and Stoy made good gains and Stoy had another strong run up the middle all the way to the one. Hill scored easily on sweep and the PAT was good for a final score of 28-0.

The Fluco ended their regular season with a 5-5 record, with 4-1 at home and 1-4 on the road. Three of the Flucos five losses were on the road against teams from higher classes (i.e. larger enrollments) in the Virginia High School League classification system

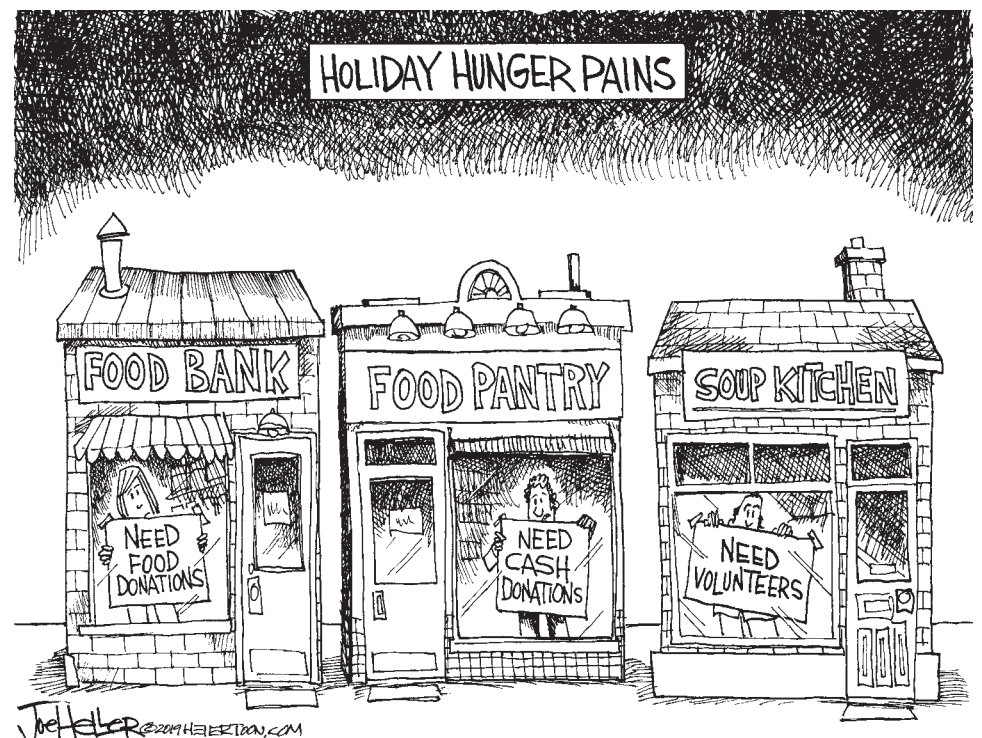

It's nearly time for some table talk—about turkeys



Here's a topic for table talk this Thanksgiving: Americans consume about 16.5 pounds of turkey per person annually.

That's the finding of the National Turkey Federation, which reports on its website that both turkey consumption and production in the U.S. have doubled since 1970.

Total U.S. turkeys raised last year numbered about 240 million. The top turkey-producing state is Minnesota, followed by North Carolina, Arkansas, Indiana, Missouri and Virginia.

"Virginia has always been a major turkey-producing state, even ranking among the top four states before turkey production expanded in other states," noted Tony Banks, a commodity marketing specialist for Virginia Farm Bureau Federation.

Production in Virginia last year was about 16.8 million birds. Most Virginia turkey farms are in the Shenandoah Valley.

Turkeys have scratched themselves a significant role in U.S. history. Colonial statesman Benjamin Franklin wanted the turkey to be the United States' official bird. Unhappy about the choice of the bald eagle, Franklin wrote, "For the Truth the Turkey is in Comparison a much more respectable Bird, and withal a true original Native of America."

Domesticated turkeys cannot fly, but at least one bird had a special role in the nation's space program. Neil Armstrong's and Buzz Aldrin's first meal on the moon was foil packets of roasted turkey with all the trimmings.

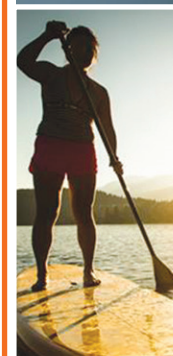

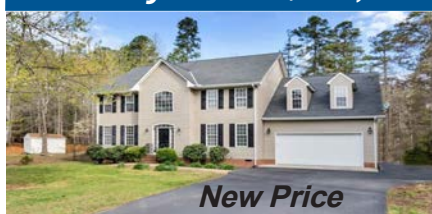
