

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF AN APPLICATION BY COLUMBIA GAS OF VIRGINIA, INC FOR APPROVAL TO AMEND AND EXTEND ITS SAVE PLAN PURSUANT TO VIRGINIA CODE § 56-604, AND FOR APPROVAL TO IMPLEMENT A 2021 SAVE PLAN RIDER IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 20 OF ITS GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS CASE NO. PUR-2020-00138

On July 24, 2020, Columbia Gas of Virginia, Inc. ("CVA" or the "Company") filed an application ("Application") pursuant to Chapter 26 of Title 56 of the Code of Virginia, known as the Steps to Advance Virginia's Energy ("SAVE") Plan Act (the "SAVE Act"), for (1) approval to amend and extend its SAVE Plan pursuant of the SAVE Act; and (2) for approval to implement a Steps to Advance Virginia's Energy Plan Rider ("SAVE Rider") for calendar year 2021.

The Company requests to extend its SAVE Plan for one year (calendar year 2021), during which time the Company would be authorized to spend up to \$60.4 million on SAVE-eligible natural gas infrastructure and recover such costs through its SAVE Rider ("Phase 3 SAVE Plan"). CVA is not proposing to modify the scope of eligible infrastructure replacements to be performed under the SAVE Plan and is not proposing any other substantive changes to the terms and conditions of the SAVE Plan. The Company also requests approval to implement its 2021 SAVE Rider, which is comprised of a 2019 True-Up Factor and a 2021 Projected Factor, to be effective with the first billing unit of January 2021 through the last billing unit of December 2021.

In its Application, CVA states that its SAVE Plan is designed to accelerate the replacement of certain components of its gas distribution system infrastructure to enhance system safety and reliability. The Company proposes to amend and extend its SAVE Plan for one year to undertake additional identified projects the Company expects to complete in 2021 under the proposed Phase 3 SAVE Plan. The Company states such projects will enhance safety and reliability and positively impact the environment. The Company is requesting authorization to spend up to \$60.4 million (CVA's currently approved 2021 capital budget) on SAVE-eligible infrastructure during calendar year 2021. However, due to budget uncertainty, the Company proposes to limit investment included in the SAVE Rider to \$46.4 million. In light of CVA's 2021 capital budget uncertainty, the Company identified approximately \$16 million of SAVE-eligible projects that could be deferred beyond 2021, where funding levels are limited. Per CVA, if those projects are deferred, the Company would allocate an additional \$1.7 million toward replacement of service lines and risers, resulting in a total capital investment of \$46.4 million on SAVE-eligible projects in 2021.

The Company has proposed a total SAVE revenue requirement of \$12,850,153. As proposed, the 2021 SAVE Rider would increase residential customers' bills by \$1.60 per month, for a total proposed monthly rate of \$3.10.

On August 5, 2020, Columbia Gas of Virginia, Inc. ("CVA" or the "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission"), pursuant to § 56-610 et seq. of the Code of Virginia ("Code"), an application ("Application to Amend") to amend its System Expansion Plan (or "Plan") approved by the Commission in February 2016.

CVA provides natural gas service to over 270,000 customers in Central and Southern Virginia, the Piedmont region, and most of the Shenandoah Valley, as well as portions of Northern and Western Virginia and the Hampton Roads region. The Plan is an infrastructure expansion plan designed to deliver natural gas service to customers in unserved areas within the Company's service territory by providing an alternative method of collecting the uneconomic portion of the investment related to infrastructure expansion projects ("eligible expansion investment" or "EEI"). The Company seeks to amend its Plan as needed to complete 71 existing projects contributing EEI to the Plan and to recover the related costs from the beneficiaries of these investments ("Affected Customers").

In its Application to Amend, CVA explains that, in Case No. PUE-2015-00056, the Commission approved a maximum level of Plan investment of approximately \$3.57 million with the ability to exceed this amount by no more than 10% over the Plan's five-year investment period and established a fixed monthly rider (the "MAIN Rider") at \$6.63 per month to recover the eligible system expansion infrastructure costs ("Plan Cost of Service") associated with the EEI. CVA states that 71 projects contributing EEI to the Plan that have been placed under contract resulted in a total of approximately \$3.81 million in estimated EEI based on the economic analysis completed at the time each project was placed under contract. While the estimated EEI for these projects in the Plan falls within the authorized maximum level of investment, the actual costs for the projects, and thus the actual EEI for the projects, are expected to be higher than the estimates. CVA is requesting the approvals necessary to complete the 71 existing projects contributing EEI to the System Expansion Plan and recover the associated costs from Affected Customers. Plan and recover the associated costs from Affected Customers

Specifically, the Company is requesting:
(1) An increase in the maximum level of investment under the Plan from \$3.57 million plus 10% to \$5.1 million;
(2) An increase in estimated Plan Cost of Service from \$8,476,655 to \$9,503,506;
(3) A two-step increase in the MAIN Rider from \$6.63 to \$8.63 effective January 1, 2021, and to \$10.63 effective January 1, 2022;
(4) A decrease in projected Affected Customers from 5,319 to 3,301.

The Company is requesting a modified maximum level of investment of \$5.1 million to complete the 71 projects contributing EEI to the System Expansion Plan. CVA calculated this amount based on the projects contributing EEI to the Plan that are near completion. According to CVA, as of May 31, 2020, MAIN Rider revenues have been less than Plan costs, and the \$6.63 MAIN Rider is not sufficient to recover eligible system expansion infrastructure costs. Accordingly, CVA proposes to increase the MAIN Rider gradually over the next two years for the Affected Customers.

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DePaul lends a helping hand

Chris Tompkins, a recruiter for DePaul Community Resources, describes the private non-profit human services as a "social impact" organization because of the wide variety of positive ways in which they help impact the lives of the most vulnerable members of the communities they serve.

The agency serves families and individuals across Central and Southwest Virginia.

Their largest and best-known program is their Treatment Foster Care (TFC) program.

"In our TFC program, we recruit, train, and approve new families that can open their hearts and homes to children in need of a safe and loving home environment. We have several programs and services though that work to help other vulnerable populations across the Commonwealth of Virginia," said Tompkins. The programs include sponsored residential placements for individuals with developmental disabilities, group home and day support services, adoption services for children in the foster care system, independent living services for teens aging out of foster

care, and community based services that offer support including supervised visitations and outpatient counseling, as well as other community outreach programs.

"At their core though, each of these services is intended to help provide hope and belonging to those whom the work is impacting, and those who need it most, which is why our agency prides itself on our vision of "Opening Doors to Hope and Belonging."

DePaul as an independent helper. State and local social services in some sectors may not always be able to provide a community with all the necessary resources it needs. Though DePaul is a private entity, they are contracted to provide case management services by local DSS agencies. They work with them to accept or take referrals including those from Fluvanna County. However, the foster homes they open and license have to be about one hour. or close to a 60-mile radius, from each of their locations that houses their TFC program staff.

Tompkins explained that when they take a referral from a DSS agency for a child in need of placement, they check for an appropriate match for that child with one of their foster families, then plan and coordinate placement with them. As a contract provider with DSS, DePaul not only serves by providing the case management services, but it also provides direct client support to the child or children placed in its foster homes, to the foster families, and the biological families involved in any of the cases they are supporting.

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The number of children needing homes in Virginia is staggering: a little over 5,000 need foster care at any given time. Currently, there are 2,206 children in foster care just in the Central and Piedmont regions.

"A good way of quantifying the local need is that it's not unusual for our Charlottesville office to receive a dozen or a couple of dozen referrals in a given month, and while it depends on the individual referrals we receive in a given month, at times we may only have appropriate matches for a half a dozen or fewer of the children referred to our local Charlottesville office," said Tompkins. "For a prospective foster family in Fluvanna that we approve, any one of those referrals could be a potential match and an opportunity to serve that child (or children if it's a sibling group). The greatest needs that we see are for foster families that are willing to open their homes and hearts to working with teenagers in need of a placement and can accept sibling groups."

The coronavirus has been challenging for Tompkins and other staff members when their work requires a uniquely personalized approach to helping each child and family overcome the obstacles they face as a result of the trauma they've experienced.

"I would say that the same hardships most organizations are facing when it comes to how remote work and social distancing impact collaborative and face-to-face elements of our work has been the biggest challenge."

No one expected the coronavirus to put a

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hold on everyone's lives including families and children in need of support. Tompkins recognizes the unique circumstances and said they have adapted to the new normal but regardless of the pandemic's influence the work they do is essential and must continue. They have implemented policies and procedures to protect everyone involved. They have utilized remote work where possible for staff and implemented appropriate CDC recommended safety measures and hygiene practices.

"I'm happy to share that at this time, we can complete an entire home study process for new and prospective foster families and accept new placements into our program while adhering to the strict safety guidelines we've created. We anticipate the COVID-19 pandemic will lead to a significant increase in the need for new foster families and now is the time for families interested in getting involved to start the process and help our agency make a difference in the lives of foster children that we anticipate will increase in need before this pandemic is over"

While their clients are experiencing many of the same hardships everyone is facing during this pandemic, he said that while working in this field he has witnessed and been inspired by the unusual and amazing resilience that they possess. "They may not have as many of the same supports in life as others do, or it can be hard to focus on healing from their trauma




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
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TJHD warns of potentially fatal batch of heroin

PRESS RELEASE

The Virginia Department of Health's Thomas Jefferson Health District, which includes Fluvanna County, warned the public of a batch of heroin in the greater-Charlottesville area that could be laced with fentanyl, or fentanyl derivatives, and could be potentially fatal to people who use it.

Over the past 24 hours, UVA Health reported treating six patients with heroin overdoses. To protect patient confidentiality, no other information will be provided. The Thomas Jefferson Health District (TJHD) does not know where the heroin originated, was purchased, nor what the batch was cut with, but TJHD is concerned that it may have fentanyl derivatives and could be fatal for people using it.

"Opioid overdoses are on the rise throughout the country and we want to help keep our communities safe." said Dr. Denise Bonds, TJHD Director. "We are issuing this alert to notify individuals who may be using substances of a potentially contaminated batch of heroin."

In an effort to help community members prevent fatal opioid overdoses, TJHD will host events during the week of August 31st to distribute free Naloxone. Naloxone (also known as NARCAN) is a fast-acting, safe and easy-to-administer nasal spray that can restore breathing and reduce potentially fatal effects of opioid overdoses. Naloxone should be given to any person who shows signs of an opioid overdose or when an overdose is suspected. A family member, bystander, first responder, or medical provider can administer naloxone to save lives. As a reminder, if you come across someone who has overdosed, vou should call 911.

Naloxone will be distributed free to the public and do not require registration. The events are all drive-through at each health department listed below. Individuals who attend will learn how to use Naloxone and receive a free box with two doses of Naloxone. Please note: TJHD does not ask to see identification when distributing Naloxone.
