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

Leonard "Len" F. Gardner

An Appreciation

Leonard "Len" Gardner, a distinguished Fluvanna citizen who contributed so much to the lives of everyone in our community. died Sunday, August 30, 2020 at the age of 98. Just six months ago or so he appeared before the Board of Supervisors at its regular meeting to honor our county's veterans and to give a vivid and stirring account of his service at Pearl Harbor during the attack and after on the USS Reid.

After the war he pursued higher education receiving degrees from the University of Massachusetts and Stanford University. Most of his adult career was spent in public service working in various departments of the federal government in Washington, DC. When he retired in 1978, he and his wife, Doris, moved to Lake Monticello. Almost immediately he began a long and productive period of involvement in the life of Lake Monticello and Fluvanna County. He began publishing a short newsletter for residents at the Lake, an innovation which ultimately led to our present weekly newspaper, the Fluvanna Review.

He sought elective office and served three terms on the Board of Supervisors, where he was a leader in the effort to deal with the rapid growth of Fluvanna's population. One of his proudest moments was supporting the purchase of the 969-acre Pleasant Grove for a new government center. As the Fluvanna Historical Society and the nascent Fluvanna Heritage Trail began seeking grants to assist the county

in an active public/private partnership, Len was an enthusiastic supporter. He later served for many years as an active member of the Heritage Trail's Board of Directors.

I would like to recount a personal experience I had with Len when he was on the Board of Supervisors. VDOT had indicated that it was going to build a replacement for the old steel truss bridge over the Rivanna in Palmyra. The BOS appointed a three-person advisory group to advise VDOT on the new span. They appointed Buck Pace and Len and me as a citizen representative. With the active support of the late Del. V. Earl Dickinson, VDOT agreed to design the bridge in house and to respect its location in the midst of an historic district. Len was involved in every aspect of the design including many trips to VDOT's headquarters in Louisa. At the last moment he came up with an inspired idea. He suggested we put three overlooks on the upriver side of the bridge with historic plaques discussing the history of the area and the river. VDOT concurred, and Len's idea is to be seen today on the beautiful replacement bridge.

To my mind, Len Gardner represents the very best in American life – a decorated veteran, a committed civil servant, an elected official, and an advocate for the efforts of our non-profit organizations as they strove to improve Pleasant Grove and other amenities in Fluvanna. We will miss him greatly.

Fluvanna schools most unusual start

With two days of virtual education under their belt, administrators reported the start to the new school year as being "very successful."

Fluvanna School Superintendent Chuck Winkler thanked teachers and students for the adjustments they had to make so the virtual teaching/learning experience was positive.

However, not everyone described it that way during Wednesday's (Sept. 9) School Board meeting.

During public comments, two parents decried virtual school for their children with learning differ-

Brian Alther said the virtual platform works well for one of his children, but not the other.

That the Board made the decision to forego the hybrid/partial in-person model just three weeks prior to the start of school made it worse.

"In my case you've fallen short and my kid is suffering," he said.

Jennifer Scopelliti said she attended several different schools growing up and didn't know what "community was until I moved here. I am a true Fluco. Teachers are the true heroes - the teachers, administrators and staff. I'm here today because of you. The school board of our community has failed

Scopelliti said the Board's decision wasn't "about the safety of our children" when announcing where all the hotspots are in the county because it alerts every "pedophile and sex trafficker where our children will be, from what times and what location in the parking lot to best find them."

Alther also said it was unfair that teachers have day care provided for their children.

Teachers and administration are able to have their children taken care of for a mere fraction of what I would pay a worker to supervise my child... That seems unfair," he said.

Winkler said teachers are charged \$25 per week

to have their child supervised in school.

Under the CARE's Act, teachers deciding to stay home to care for a minor child would have to be paid full salary for two weeks and two-thirds of their salary for 10 weeks. Not only would the school pay their salary, but would have to hire a substitute

Winkler said it was a sound fiscal decision to offer child care for teachers.

The money the school receives from child care will be used to pay down the 2020 school year lunch debt of \$28,000.

Winkler said during the next few weeks he and his staff will be trying to contact about 140 students who they "haven't heard from." It could be the students moved or are attending another school.

They will also be looking at what students' needs aren't being met by the virtual platform. Once they are identified, Winkler said he will determine how to best provide for them.

The Board decided to vote at the October meeting about whether to continue full virtual learning or to begin a hybrid schedule after Nov. 2.

The amount of local carryover funds from Fiscal Year 2020 is \$1.38 million.

Winkler listed what needs the schools still have:

- \$150,000 \$200,000 for Abrams upgrades- bathrooms, windows, ADA accessibility;
- \$150,000 for technology hot spots, Chrome Books and other hardware:
- \$100,000 \$200,000 for school buses;
- \$200,000 for PP contingent upon re-opening plans.

The Board voted 3-2 to ask the county for \$750,000 of the carryover money. Board Chair Perry Johnson (Fork Union), Vice Chair Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) and James Kelley (Palmyra) voted for; Andrew Pullen (Columbia) and Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) voted against.

Fifth District candidates face off in virtual forum

With the November elections now just seven weeks away, candidates for Virginia's Fifth Congressional District participated in their first joint virtual forum on Wednesday (Sept. 9).

The event, sponsored by the Senior Statesmen of Virginia, drew nearly 1,000 people.

During the hour-long conversation, Democrat Cameron Webb and Republican Bob Good talked about their backgrounds and their individual visions for the District.

Webb, who attended the University of Virginia for both medical and law school, said his upbringing had led him to a life of

public service. He said his medical practice has shown him "that being a healer is more than just being a doctor, being a physician--it means leaning into the issues that make our patients sick."

Good, a graduate of Liberty University who also served as the school's athletic director, said that growing up in a lower-income family had instilled him with a strong work ethic, along with "a real sense of comparison and a generous spirit to those who are less fortu-

Both candidates agreed that residents of the Fifth District--which stretches from Fau-

quier County in Northern Virginia down to the North Carolina border--have varying ideologies, yet still want many of the same things: jobs, education, security, access to broadband.

But the candidates differed widely in their approach, with Webb positioning himself as a "consensus-builder" who would work across the aisle to come up with bipartisan solutions to the issues facing society, and Good describing himself as a "limited-government guy--a deficit hawk if you will," who believed that competition was the solution to many issues.

Throughout the hour, Good sought to cast Webb as part of the "radical socialist left," claiming Webb had been endorsed by Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders, Vice Presidential candidate Senator Kamala Harris, and Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez.

. "If [Webb] is elected, he would do everything in his power to stop President Trump's agenda, or, God forbid, to enact the Biden/ Harris agenda, if President Trump is not reelected," said Good in his opening statement.

"He and I have a very different view for the future of America and the direction of our

Webb repeatedly pushed back against Good, saying he had not been endorsed by Senator Sanders or others, and rebuffing Good's insistence that he supported the Green New Deal and Medicare For All.

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Fluvanna businesses received \$346,820 in grants

PRESS RELEASE

Fluvanna County awarded \$346,820 to businesses from Fluvanna through the first round of small business grants.

The Funds for Recovery and Operations Management (FROM): Fluvanna Small Business Grants was created to offset costs and revenue lost because of the COVID-19 health crisis. The first round had \$450,000 allocated from the county's CARES Act funding.

On Aug. 5, the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors allocated an additional \$450,000 from the county's CARES Act funding for a second round of FROM: Fluvanna grants. In total, \$553,180 remains to help businesses affected by the pandemic who have not yet applied. The final round of the grant program ends on Sept. 18.

FROM: Fluvanna is structured to assist both for-profit companies and non-profit entities based in Fluvanna County.

For-profit businesses and private schools are eligible for grants ranging from \$2,500 up to \$20,000:

- · O Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) employees: up to \$2,500;
- 1 FTE employees: up to \$5,000;
- 21-50 FTE employees: up to \$15,000;
- 51+ FTE employees: up to \$20,000.

Non-profit organizations that have provided an ongoing community need throughout the pandemic are eligible for up to \$15,000. A "community need" could be providing food, childcare, or other household needs. Other non-profits are eligible for up to \$5,000.

Political signs vandalized in Fluvanna

With the general election now less than two months away, political yard signs are going up all over Fluvanna County.

And in some cases, they are being met with vandalism.

Darrell Beyers, head of the Fluvanna Republicans, says he's now heard multiple reports of Republican yard signs being damaged or destroyed.

Sign damage is something that happens every election cycle, said Beyers, although never at "this level or this magnitude."

Major David Wells of the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office said their office has received 19 complaints for sign damage and four reports of sign theft. Wells also said that it seems earlier and more frequent than previous years.

Beyers said that some of the signs have been "slashed, maybe by a boxcutter" or similar implement. Others have had the "T" cut out of the word "Trump." In one incident, a supporter had a row of ten-yard signs and a flag damaged by vandals.

Beyers said there might be some coordination at play. "There were some social media posts by some individuals about destroying signs," he said.

Wells confirmed that there was a video circulating that appeared to show a number of young offenders damaging Trump yard signs. "We are currently investigating those offenses and attempting to identify the involved parties."

Two political signs were destroyed at Crofton Plaza, said Greg Sclater, part owner of the plaza. One was a 4x8 foot Trump/Pence sign, the other a 4x4 foot Trump, Gade, Good sign. "It saddens me to think this kind of violence and hatred could happen in our county. These actions need to stop and will not be condoned. If you are not sure how to vote this November, then just look around you at the differences between the two parties. If you are still not sure then pray to our Almighty God for the wisdom, knowledge, and clarity on who to vote for. Only one side is willing to put a stop to the hatred

and violence. As it has been said many times, an ignorant vote is worse than no vote at all!

Fluvanna Democrat Su Wolff, president of the Lefty Lunch Ladies, said that the day after she learned that Trump signs had been damaged, "an equal number of [Democratic] signs were taken away or vandalized," including one of the large road signs.

She stressed that this kind of behavior was not condoned by local Democrats, and that everyone in the community should work to respect each other's political viewpoints and their property.

"Signs are private property," said Wells. "Given that the value of the signs is under \$1,000 -- the new felony threshold -stealing a sign would be misdemeanor larceny, damaging one would be misdemeanor property damage. Depending on the property, there could also be trespassing charges. All would be Class 1 misdemeanors."

The penalty for a Class 1 misdemeanor includes up to 12 months in jail and a fine of up to \$2,500.
