

High School Sports Scheduled to Resume

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Equity statement adopted – rancor continues

The Fluvanna County School Board voted 4-1 to adopt an Antiracism and Equity Statement drafted by an Equity Task Force made up of community members, school staff and administra-

Voting for the measure at the meeting Wed. (Nov. 11) was James Kelley (Palmyra), Perrie Johnson (Fork Union), Andrew Pullen (Columbia) and Shirley Stewart (Rivanna). Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) voted no.

During public comments Mozell Booker, who is part of the task force, said racism in the schools is a fact and it must be acknowledged and addressed by the school.

"These issues are well-documented and they're not new..... Black students are under-represented in advanced classes and over-represented in discipline," she said. "Students and teachers tell us of a school climate that tolerates bias and racism. We have been presented with reports from both white and black students that racist comments are clearly made and go unchecked by teachers. I'm not here to indict any teacher..... Our statement was meant to send a clear message that racial bias has no place and will not be tolerated in our school system. If you do not believe there is racism in our school system, we want you to vote 'no' on the statement."

Jessica Jackson, who is a teacher and has a daughter in Fluvanna schools, also spoke.

"It appears some of you don't believe or will not admit that systemic racism exists in Fluvanna schools, and it does," she said.

Jackson said when then-President Barack Obama planned to speak to students in a television address about the importance of education, Fluvanna schools sent home a letter telling

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parents about the event. In the letter, the administration offered to let parents opt out their child, so their child didn't have to listen to the president.

"Prior to President Obama, I was not aware of Fluvanna schools ever sending parents a letter asking them if they wanted to allow their students to hear words of encouragement from an elected official," Jackson said.

However, year after year Rob Bell, a member of the Virginia House of Delegates who is white, came to several graduations and spoke to the students, lackson said

"Never did I receive a letter asking if I wanted my daughter to listen to Rob Bell," she said. "It was just assumed he would bring value to the students' lives. Yet with an African American president there was no assumption he could bring value to the students."

Melissa Irvin wrote a letter and mentioned her biracial daughter who graduated from Fluvanna schools in 2019.

Irvin said her daughter was traumatized by the bullying and racism she experienced. So much so, she's getting counseling and fears coming back to Fluvanna because of it.

Andrea Overweg also sent a letter citing what she referred to as "deeply offensive, thoroughly inaccurate and racially insensitive statements," made by Pullen at the Oct. 14 meeting.

Both Irvin and Overweg requested the Board rebuke or censure Pullen and make him enroll in racial sensitivity training.

Before the vote, Rittenhouse reiterated comments he made at the Oct. 14 meeting.

"We already have multiple policies that address racism, antidiscrimination," Rittenhouse said. "I don't know why we're doing this statement at all... I'll vote no."

Stewart said she was excited about the statement and the work that will go forward.

Don Stribling, executive director for human resources, operations and student services also represents the administration on the task force.

Stribling said the next step is for the eight "action committees" led by teachers and members of the community to continue the work addressing racism and disparities in curriculum, discipline, etc.

Pullen said he was never against the statement, he just asked questions.

Many of the questions he asked were not just his, but provided to him - some, he said, "by members of the committee."

He said people could make up whatever they want to make up about him,

"and you already have, but I never said there wasn't discrimination, I just asked if there had been any reports of discrimination."

"If these things are happening, in the school system, how come they're not making it to the Board...I never said these things don't exist. I asked questions," Pullen said.

He said he had a hard time using the term "systemic racism."

If the system is racist, why would you give more policies to that system, he

"My point is, if there are people now who are perpetuating this, then who do we get rid of? If these things are happening now, with or without a statement, give it to the School Board and let us get rid of these people."

Hybrid schooling

In other business Superintendent Chuck Winkler said the hybrid start has been going well with very few problems with mask compliance.

There are fewer students on Schedule B (those attending Thursday and Friday), but it hasn't yet posed a problem.

The school continues to serve the county's children 10,000 meals weekly. Of those, they are delivering 600 to those who can't pick up the meals.

The Board of Supervisors agreed with the school's request to keep \$400,000 from the Fiscal Year 2020 \$1.4 million surplus.

Winkler said the money will be used for bathroom repairs and other work needed done at the Abrams building. The rest, added to CARE's Act money, will pay for six new school buses.

Winter sports

Board discussed the Virginia High School League's decision to allow winter sports to take place. Winter sports at Fluvanna consist of basketball, sideline cheer, swimming and diving, indoor track and wrestling.

Athletic Director Scott Morris said athletes have been training, but have not yet started to practice. He explained the mitigation strategies for participants and fans and answered questions.

Morris said track would be held outdoors, and all basketball players, coaches and fans would have to wear masks. Only athletes playing on the court would be maskless.

The Board had many questions about the safety of having students wrestle because of the close contact and potential for disease spread.

Morris said they were still talking about how wrestling can be done safely.

Tips to Organize Your Tax Records

Creating order out of chaos

Tick Tock. Tick Tock. Hard to believe that 2020 D. Credit Information is almost over! What a year! I suspect that many of you have been spending your time doing something other than thinking about your 2020 taxes. But no worries. There are still six weeks left to get ORGANIZED! To help you accomplish that, I have prepared a short checklist of documents and forms you need to have available when we get together in January or February.

Keep it all in one place. It seems obvious, but how often have you found yourself going through piles of paper looking for that elusive 1099 tax form or charitable deduction receipt? If you only do one thing, this is it.

Time to sort. Now that everything is all together, best practice is to sort your information into the same buckets used in your tax return. At a minimum, sort the information into the basic categories below. If you have a lot of one category, sort that stack into the following sub-

A. Income

- Wages (W-2s)
- Alimony
- Business income (1099's, K-1s)
- Interest income (1000-INT)
- Dividends (1099-DIV) • Winnings (W-2G, 1099-G)
- Social SecurityInvestments (1099-B)
- Other Income Items

B. Income Adjustments

- Student loan interest
- Tuition & fees deductions
- Alimony paid
- Educator expenses
- Other education expenses
- IRA contributions
- HSA/MSA contributions

C. Itemized Deductions

- Taxes paid
- Charitable contributions
- Interest expense (mortgages) • Medical/Dental expenses
- Investor/Other expenses
- Casualty/Theft losses

- Child & dependent care expenses
- Other credit-related expenses
- Adoption expenses
- Education expenses

E. Business/Rental

 Sort income and expenses for each business activity or hobby activity or rental unit

Note: Remember this list is not all-inclusive, it is here to help you sort your information into a usable form to make tax filing easier. Not sure bucket. There may be things you

receive that you are not certain about needing

for tax filing purposes. These items should be gathered in one place for review. **Sum it up.** Once the information has been categorized, create a summary of the information.

This summary can be a printed copy of an organizer or it could be a simple recap you create. **Is something missing?** Pull out last year's tax return and create a list of things you needed last

year. Use this as a checklist against this year's information. While this process will not identify new items, it will help identify missing items that qualified in prior years. Finalize required documentation. Certain

deductions require substantiation and/or logs to qualify your expense. Common areas that require this are: business mileage, charitable mileage, medical mileage, moving mileage, non-cash charitable contributions, and certain business expenses. These logs should be maintained throughout the year, but now is a good time to make sure they are complete and ready to go for tax filing.

It is very easy to overlook something given the lengthy list of taxable income items, deductions and credits. By following these tips you can greatly reduce that risk.

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High school sports scheduled to resume

The Virginia High School League (VHSL) has issued a 39-page compilation of protocols to be followed in the scheduled resumption of high school sports.

There are rules for all sports that all public high schools in Virginia must follow. The rules are intended to minimize close contacts between athletes. coaches, officials and fans. Obviously, not all close contact can be avoided in sports like wrestling and football, for instance. An example of a rule to minimize close contacts is that a baseball player or softball player who has hit a home run, may no longer be mobbed by teammates at home plate after circling the bases. Another example is that there will be no captain's meeting at mid-field before a football game.

Fluco athletic director Scott Morris said that the plan is still to play abbreviated seasons starting with the winter sports, followed by the fall sports and winding up with spring sports. Under the current plan, practices will start for girls' and boys' basketball on Dec.7, with practices

for swim, indoor track, wrestling and cheer starting on Dec. 14.

Morris said that attendance will be limited probably to 250 people including team members, coaches and officials. Accordingly, for sports like basketball there may be as few as 75 tickets available for spectators for each team. Parents will have priority, but the number of members of a family that can attend may have to be limited. Social distancing will be highly encouraged, and masks will be required.

For sports like basketball, there will be major set-up changes. Benches and the score table will be distanced. Only one side of the gym may have stands. It is expected that there will still be concessions, but only pre-packaged merchandise will be offered for sale.

Morris said that the seasons will consist of 60 percent of the normal number of contests. So, for basketball that means a 14-game schedule. Morris also said that some sports will be live streamed so that Fluco fans may be able to watch sports like basketball and football at home.

Building on the online success of the play "The Niceties," the Fluvanna County Arts Council continues its virtual season with world-class jazz musician Victor Haskins. The FCAC is excited to bring back jazz after its absence in the last few years.

Jazz is unique to the African-American culture and experience and musicians like Haskins not only delve into the roots and the history to

extract tones and sounds but also the emotion. It is the emotion, the movement of music itself that drives Haskins' unique musical style, and what he teaches to his students.

Haskins is a professor of jazz trumpet and the director of the Jazz Ensemble at the College of William and Mary. He is also an outstanding electronic wind instrument player. He is known as an improvisational musician, composer, and arranger. He has taught master classes at many prestigious colleges and universities and is the director of Jazz Outreach for the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Haskins grew up in a variety of places overseas while his mother was in the Air Force in Hong Kong, Kuala Lumpur, Lusaka, New Delhi. His mother retired from the Air Force when he was in seventh grade and the family settled in Stafford, Va. In some of the areas Haskins lived in, the cul-

tural aspects of the native music can be heard in some of his original jazz compositions. "Touch" from his album "Showing Up" has an Asian flavor cleverly blended with mellow jazz. "Grey" is reminiscent of the style of Chuck Mangione, rhythmical, flowing, easy and contemporary. Some may view Haskins as progressive but his music is light and breezy, easy on the mind, and lifts the spirit.

"Research sometimes plays a large role in the creation and performance of a work. Having real knowledge that comes from a variety of sources can be vital to reinforce one's instinct to make the right or best choice," he said. This could be said of his original works which have an Asian or African influence. "This is especially true in an improvisational context. This might mean researching a technique or studying history. It could also mean looking within and gaining a deeper understanding of some aspect of the self. Or perhaps, some mixture of these parts."

"I became interested in music when I started playing the cornet in a band during my last year in New Delhi in the 6th grade. I simply fell in love with practicing and playing the instrument," he said. He adds that Woody Shaw, Wayne Shorter, Bunky Green, Greg Osby were jazz musicians who influenced him.

He is the master of improvisational jazz. It is a spontaneous process. Haskins creates new melodies while continuously repeating a cycle of chord changes of a tune. Those that are melody purists often find progressive or improvisational jazz jarring. For some listeners, it can be an acguired taste but Haskins like many of his predecessors have their niche and those who are willing to listen.

"Improvisation is at the heart of my practice as an artist and creator. Improvisation is the most authentic manner of connecting with other people and transmitting ideas and emotions," he said. "In my definition of improvisation, one must have a high level of ability in executing actions guided by emotions, intellect, and spirituality, and an even higher level of ability in perceiving, processing, and responding to stimuli, both internal and external. The synthesis of these factors results in consistently inspired, intentional improvisational experiences."

His auditory interplay is deep and complex but so is most art whether it is seeing or listening. Haskins' improvisations create energy and intricate infrastructure with sound and emotion resulting in unique soundscapes.

"Whether I am composing music for an improvising ensemble, or designing an improvisational, multidisciplinary presentation, he focuses on form as it relates to content."

Haskins knows that any form of art takes on a life of its own and he passes this on to his students.

"I hope my students understand the power of studying a creative endeavor such as music. There are a variety of benefits to be reaped by engaging with this creative outlet, depending on one's proclivities and how deep they wish to dive," he said. "The practice of music serves to raise our capacity for attention. This makes us think more deeply and absorb ideas and emotions more sensitively."

As for his virtual performance for Carysbrook Performing Arts Center, he says, "I look forward to creating the experience." The concert is a free event streaming live on Facebook on Nov. 21, at 5 pm. 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

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
