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Author draws on locals for inspiration

Author Susan Pepper Robbins loves writing so much she even has socks with a Jane Austin motif. A prolific writer of novels, short stories, and the trendy flash fiction, she teaches at Hampton-Sydney College and is married to novelist and playwright Roy Robbins.

Her newest books, titled *Nothing But The Weather* and *The Tin Can House* feature dramatic stories about the lives of ordinary people. She said that after growing up in Cumberland County and living in Fluvanna, she drew on the people around her for inspiration in creating her characters. Robbins writes her short stories as a series of vignettes featuring various families and townspeople, focusing on life's emotional complexities.

"My characters are not real in the sense that they can be named or identified, but are impressions, even layered impressions of real people. I have known people for four or more generations living in these areas, and I have heard many stories about them," she said. "A story should be, as Jane Austen told her niece, a young writer, 'about two or three country families.' I'm no Jane Austen certainly, but I set these same limits because they are my natural ones. I have friends who have

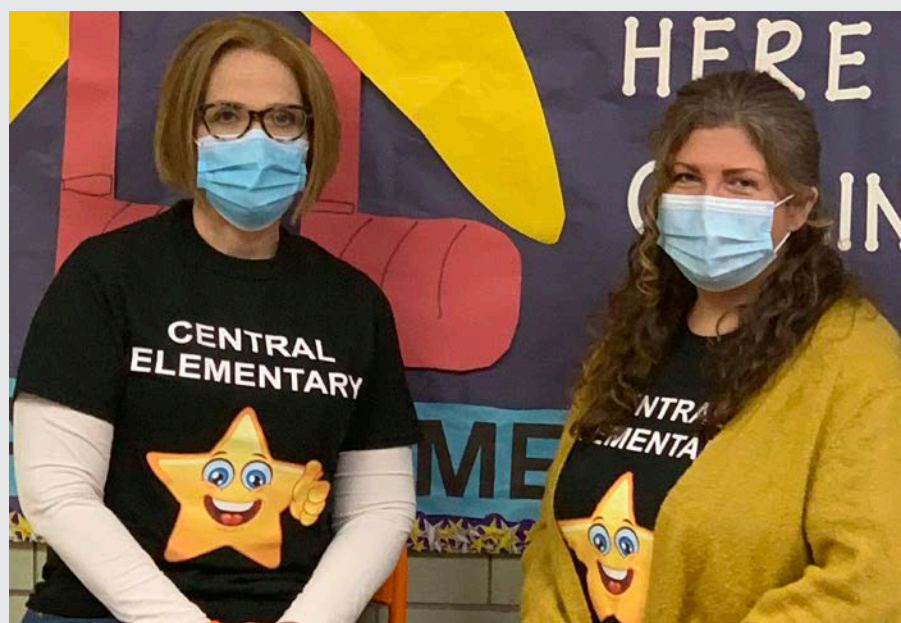

lived in Paris, taught in India and Mexico, and visited Ukraine and Russia. They have brought home wonderful stories which I envy. However, I believe that there is also gold in ordinary lives, but no life is ordinary."

Robbins makes an honest appraisal of the people she knew well. Her characters reflect these ordinary people, flaws and all. Individuals, like her character Lynn, who is bi-polar and half starts every career that ever was or a mother in denial about her son's death. The families keep secrets, and love despite the distortion of those around them. She said that many of the centerpieces of her stories are actual experiences.

"I have experienced some of the same things my characters have. I have made potato salad for the meeting after which I was fired, I have joined the Cremation Society, and there is a tin can house on my nephews' property, but I did not have a friend who came home from the beach in a wheelchair."

Short stories are making a comeback and often in a collection of stories in a book like Robbins. Flash Fiction is a new, trendy writing medium that younger writers are flirting with and one that Robbins herself uses in her collec-

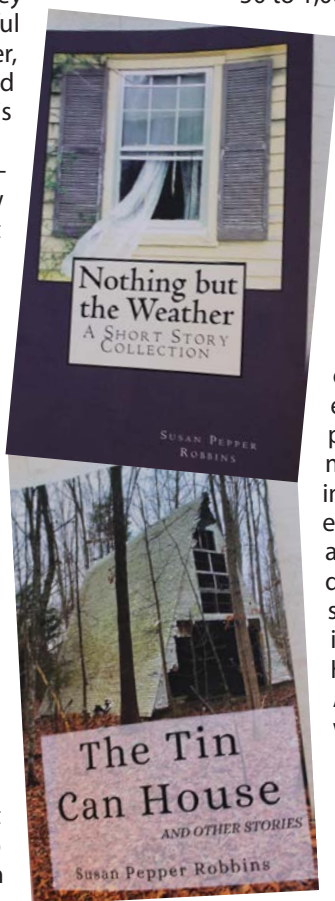
tions. Flash Fictions isn't new and is based on the age-old parable or fable. It can be 50 to 1,000 words in length.

"It has seemed to me that Flash Fiction suits the way many of us experience modern life--in sudden glimpses, jumps and starts," she said. "Of course, these recorded moments can be found in long works like *The Iliad* and *The Odyssey*, *War and Peace*, and *Moby Dick*."

Robbins also has a way of stringing words together by turning a mundane phrase into something more provocative. She is an intriguing storyteller using eclectic imagery to convey a deeper and sometimes darker meaning through symbolism. One example is the haunting "Tin Can House," which was a hollow A-frame with broken windows, left decaying in the woods.

In each story, the raw realism is seen through the eyes of the narrator, peppered with stark and somber tones that pull the reader into the lives of her characters. Her view is a little bit of truth goes a long way in fiction.

ALERT! Late Tax Legislation Creating Havoc

Individual tax return deadline moved to May 17

Congress' recent move to retroactively make a portion of 2020 unemployment income tax-free is creating havoc during this year's tax filing season. Here is what you need to know.

Unemployment compensation was received by millions of Americans during 2020 because of the pandemic. • **If you've already filed your 2020 tax return:** Wait for further instructions. The IRS is trying to figure out a way to automatically apply this tax break for taxpayers who have already filed their 2020 tax return. This will avoid the need to file an amended tax return. • **If you HAVE NOT filed your 2020 tax return:** The IRS has issued guidance on how to report this tax break on your 2020 tax return if you have not already filed. You will be notified once your tax return has been prepared.

• **Tax deadline moved to May 17.** Because of all this havoc, the April 15 deadline for individual tax returns is now May 17. This extension applies only to Form 1040s. First quarter estimated tax payments for the 2021 tax year are still due by April 15. Also, the State of Virginia expects you to make any outstanding payments by May 1st!

The Fluco field hockey team under Coach Karen Sible suffered a 9-0 defeat in their final home game of the season on March 30. In the post-game interview, Sible noted that she felt that her team played with a lot of heart.

Field hockey is a skill sport. Like lacrosse, it helps if a player is strong and fit and fast. However, stick handling skills

and passing skills do not pop up overnight. It is not easy to stop and intercept a fast-moving pass with your stick on the ground, while running at full speed. Precision passing is also often required to set up a goal. Just legally advancing the ball is a learned skill, as the ball must stay on the ground and not pop up into an opponent's body or face.

The Flucos disadvantage was clear against the much more experienced Black Knights from Charlottesville. The Fluco field hockey program is only in its second year. Most, if not all, the Fluco athletes have been handling a field hockey stick for only two years. Charlottesville high athletes have probably all been playing the sport since 8th grade or earlier. In the next few years, the Fluco athletes will undoubtedly close or eliminate the skills gap, but on this night, it was clear that the Flucos were no match for the Black Knights.

It was senior night for the Flucos, and seven seniors were honored. Midfielder Anna Snoddy, defender Caroline McCall, midfielder Cassie Wagner, midfielder Elle Dudzik, midfielder Sarah Proffitt, midfielder Hannah Hilliard and defender Cheyanne Stone will all be graduating this year and most are moving on to a four-year school or to community college. Several of these athletes have competed for the Flucos in other sports as well. Coach Sible will have seven juniors and three sophomores returning and will have the pick of the up-and-coming JV team to work with next season.

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Artisan market becomes annual event

The art-centered businesses in Palmyra village are hosting an outdoor art market to celebrate spring on April 11. The outdoor art market will be located on the green behind the Old Courthouse in the village of Palmyra. Its main feature will be local artisans and crafters but will also include raffles for door prizes donated by the vendors, games, arts and crafts, and a self-guided historic walking tour of the village.

"We had one back in December that was attended by about 200 people and expect this one to be significantly bigger," said Erika Mitchell of Sweet Art Emporium. This is an effort to get people to come to downtown Palmyra and see what artists and artisans are creating. Palmyra is the perfect setting for a growing arts community in Fluvanna. "For the events in the Village, we are also trying to get Fluvanna residents to recognize that there are local art businesses to support and to get folks to experience the village as a place to shop, learn local history, and walk the Rail Trail."

Mitchell has been proactive when it comes to the art community and garnering support for local artists and crafters. Many local arts organizations see potential in Fluvanna's arts as a draw for visitors. The Fluvanna County Arts Council would like to see an "Arts in the Park" event in Pleasant Grove

"I am super excited about an Arts in the Park event," said Mitchell. For a long time, artists were seen on the fringes of local events and scattered and hidden throughout the county. With Mitchell and others like Linda Staiger, who has been pushing for an Artisans Trail, the FCAC, and the Fluvanna Art Association, artists, artisans and

crafters are now at the forefront of defining a new era in Fluvanna. By building the community, it will be a draw for those who love art in all forms. Some may envision something akin to Crozet's two-day arts festival in the spring and fall.

Artists and designers like Amy Shawley Paquette, who was at last year's market, make jewelry and wall art blocks made from acrylic paint that looks like wood. The area has many jewelry designers with unique styles and fiber artists, weavers, and those who make ceramics among the multitude of artisans in the area.

Staiger anticipates that maybe by late summer/early fall the Artisans Trail may become a reality. She is also working with Mitchell on the April 11 event.

"This is a juried craft show and we will build it from there," said Staiger. The biggest hurdle for Staiger in creating the Artisans Trail is getting a GPS account for the Fluvanna Leadership Alumni Group and plotting locations of individual studios. Participants would need to be able to host visitors, collect sales tax, allow photographs, and have a web site or Facebook page to link to. She would also need to set up a website/FB page for events. She is also working with Lake Monticello, which has expressed interest in allowing visitors to studios during an event.

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Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women earns mammography accreditation

The Virginia Department of Corrections has announced that the Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women in Troy has been awarded a three-year term of accreditation in mammography as the result of a recent review by the American College of Radiology.

The American College of Radiology (ACR) gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting ACR practice parameters and technical standards after a peer-review evaluation by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field.

"By receiving the ACR gold seal of accred-

itation, our facility's personnel qualifications, equipment requirements, and quality control procedures have met specific standards," said Dr. Paul Targonski, Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women (FCCW) Medical Director and University of Virginia Health System faculty. "For our patients needing a breast exam, it means receiving the highest level of patient safety and imaging quality."

A new mammogram machine for the women's prison, a Fujifilm Aspire Cristalle, was installed in October 2020 to aid in the early detection and diagnosis of breast diseases. The Cristalle is a 3-D, state of the art tomosynthesis machine. Tomosynthesis is an advanced type of mammography.

"The 3-D tomosynthesis allows us to visualize more minute findings that we were unable to see clearly on the 2-D machine we had previously," said Dr. Carrie Rochman MD, the Lead Interpreting Physician for FCCW and Associate Professor of Breast Imaging at the University of Virginia (UVA). "I think it is a huge improvement in image quality for our patients."

"We want the women at our facility to have the highest quality care available and the best clinical outcomes," said Rebecca Peters R.T. (R)(M)(ARRT), Fluvanna's mammography technologist, who spearheaded the acquisition and operation of the 3-D mammography machine.

VDOT to rehabilitate two bridges on Bremono Road

Road closed to through traffic near Bremono Bluff Road from April 5 until July 5

The Virginia Department of Transportation will rehabilitate two bridges on Rt. 656 (Bremono Road) in Fluvanna County.

Beginning April 5, Rt. 656 will be closed to through traffic. Weather permitting, the road will reopen on July 5 when work on both bridges is complete.

Crews will first rehabilitate the bridge over Holman Creek, located about 0.3-mile east of Rt. 657 (Bremono Bluff Road). This bridge was built in 1932 and has a posted weight limit of 15 tons.

Once work on the Holman Creek bridge is complete, crews will begin work on the second structure, located approximate-

ly 150-feet east of the first bridge. This bridge, which carries traffic over a branch of Holman Creek, was built in 1952 and has a posted weight limit of 18 tons.

When construction is complete in July, both bridges will be able to carry all legal weight vehicles.

Motorists are advised to use alternate routes during the closure.

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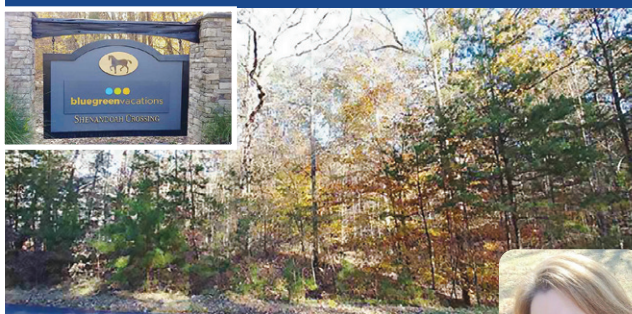

Pursuant to Virginia Code Sec. 15.2-1427, the Board of Supervisors of Fluvanna County, Virginia (the "County") will hold a public hearing at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, April 21, 2021 in the Fluvanna County Library in Palmyra, Virginia, located at 214 Commons Blvd, Palmyra, Virginia, 22963 for residents of the County to have the opportunity to be heard by the Board of Supervisors for the following items:

A TEMPORARY ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR CERTAIN RELIEF FROM PENALTY AND INTEREST FOR LATE PAYMENT OF TAXES FOR THE FIRST HALF OF 2021

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FLUVANNA BOARD OF SUPERVISORS as follows:

WHEREAS the Commonwealth of Virginia and the County of Fluvanna are currently subject to a pandemic infection of the virus commonly known as COVID 19; and

WHEREAS the citizens of Fluvanna County have been greatly inconvenienced by the consequences of the said pandemic, including a significant disruption of their lives and economic activities; and

WHEREAS it is anticipated that such inconveniences will not be remedied prior to the date due for payment of real and tangible personal property taxes on June 5, 2021, as required by County Code Section 20-1-2; and

WHEREAS the Board of Supervisors has determined that, it is appropriate to postpone the imposition of penalty and interest for late payment of such taxes until June 30, 2021;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED

(1) that the penalty and interest provisions for failing to pay real estate and tangible personal property taxes on June 5, 2021, as set out in Chapter 20, Article 1, Sec. 2.1, of the Fluvanna County Code shall not apply to the payment of such taxes made after June 5, 2021, but not later than June 30, 2021: provided that payment of such taxes after June 30, 2021, shall thereafter be subject to the penalty and interest provisions as set out in Chapter 20, Article 1, Sec. 2.1.

(2) The foregoing amendment shall expire and shall be of no further effect after June 30, 2021.

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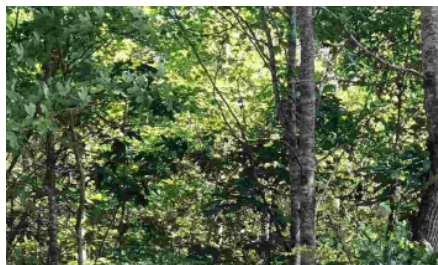
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
