Carbon emission fee

It used to be that as Earth Day (April 22) rolled around each year you'd find me cowardly hiding my head under a pillow. The thought of facing a day that highlights what feels like our hopeless dependence upon fossil fuels left me paralyzed.

Why, I would ask myself, couldn't someone figure out a commonsense approach to slowing down and alleviating our carbon pollution, one that was market-based, that didn't take money out of the pockets of ordinary Americans, and that held the major polluters accountable? Put simply, that didn't stiff the little guy (gal) like me?

Someone could, and someone did. Earlier this month, in Congress, Representative Ted Deutch introduced his Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2021 (HR 2307.)

In it, a fee is placed on carbon pollution, but being a revenue neutral plan, all the money collected will be paid back into the pockets of every American, by way of a monthly dividend check to be spent however we'd like. Low to middle-income Americans should come out ahead, or at least even, while major polluters not so much, as they will shoulder the larger price tag for their larger share of responsibility.

The Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act is a thing of beauty; simple, effective, fair and forward-looking. It will save lives (currently, in the U.S., air pollution causes 1 out of 10 deaths) and help incentivize Virginia's industries to move toward a more sustainable future. Many highly respected economists project that HR 2307 will create over two million new, good-paying jobs. Plus, individuals and corporations will be at liberty to exercise personal choice, without additional regulation or growth of the government -- our free-enterprise system working at its best.

So this year, I'm celebrating Earth Day – not under the covers – but by picking up my cell phone and calling Representative Bob Good to urge him to support a carbon fee and dividend by cosponsoring HR 2307. Why don't you come on out from behind that pillow and consider doing the same?

Supervisors eye budget and tax rates

The Board of Supervisors met on Wednesday night (April 14) for public hearings on the FY21 budget and the tax rates.

Public hearings

"This year was a pretty amazing year for reassessments," said management analyst Liz McIver. Real estate assessments rose 6.87 percent.

The real estate tax rate in the adopted FY21 budget was \$0.925 per \$100 in assessed value. For FY22, the proposed rate was \$0.92 and supervisors have advertised a rate of \$0.884. McIver calculated the equalized tax rate at \$0.865.

Under state law, the county was required to hold a public hearing because the reassessment resulted in an increase of one percent or greater in the total property tax levied.

No members of the public signed up to speak during the hearing.

The second public hearing focused on the FY22-26 capital improvement plan (CIP) and the FY22 budget and tax rates.

The proposed budget for capital projects over the next five years is \$43,258,162, with the bulk of that coming in FY22. Supervisors recently decided to look at a CIP of \$25.5 million to tackle large building and repair projects and for new vehicles and equipment for a range of county departments and the school system. They plan to take advantage of current low-interest rates to secure debt funding much of that budget.

If approved, the FY22 CIP budget would increase 22,112.4 percent over FY21. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, supervisors decided to lock the CIP funding at a bare-bones \$113,000 for 2021.

Between 2023 and 2026, the county projects they will need much smaller CIP budgets, averaging \$4.4 million per year.

Overall, the county expects revenues to rise by 8.8 percent, or about \$6.8 million, over FY21 revenues. Expenditures are expected to rise 8.7 percent.

"The board has put forth a pretty robust budget at this point," said County Administrator Eric Dahl. "It accomplishes a lot of things." Not only will the budget invest in CIP, he noted that it also addresses salary and compensation for staff, an increase in public safety, and funds some needed new staff positions.

In the public comment phase of the hearing, Dahl read a letter from School Board president Perrie Johnson, who wrote as a private citizen to thank them for their consideration of the school budget and asked "just a little more fervently" to pass the budget as it stands now. "[A]s we finally bring students back full-time next year, we have a lot of work to do, and we need your help."

The final vote on the budget will likely be held on Wednesday, April 21 at 7 p.m., although if they were to decide they needed more time, it could be pushed to a special session on April 28.

Firefly project

Supervisors unanimously approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the county, Central Virginia Electric Cooperative's Firefly Broadband, and Dominion Energy to undertake a study of broadband access in underserved areas of the county.

Underserved areas are defined by the government as having access to less than 25 megabits per second. In Fluvanna, that includes areas south of Carybrook to Bremo Bluff and some areas along the Fluvanna/Albemarle line.

There is no cost to the county for agreeing to the study. If they all decided to go forward with the project, CVEC president Gary Wood said grant funding from the government would help defray most of the costs of construction.

Dominion Energy informational meeting

In his opening report to the supervisors, Dahl said Dominion Energy has filed a rezoning application for a parcel near the Bremo Power Station. The company has been ordered by the state to remove 6.2 million cubic yards of toxic coal from unlined holding ponds to a lined landfill.

If their rezoning request is granted, it would not have to use public roads to move the ash. The company has proffered around \$50 million to the county for future mitigation measures in the Fork Union Sanitary District.

Dominion is holding an informational meeting for members of the public on April 29 from 6-7:30 p.m. at the Fork Union Community Center. The company set up a website for the project at www.DominionEnergy.com/ BremoCCR for more information.

Do a good deed daily. This is a great way to create the habit of undertaking



Staff gets bonus; Students return to classroom

The Fluvanna School Board voted unanimously in its Wednesday (April 14) meeting to give staff bonuses.

Full-time employees will get \$500; permanent part-time employees will get \$250. The bonuses will be issued as a separate check on April 22.

Superintendent Chuck Winkler advocated for the bonuses, saying, "The money is there."

Winkler also suggested giving staff a 5 percent raise in the Fiscal Year 2022 budget.

The Board will vote on that change at the May 12 meeting.

Winkler said Fluvanna schools are getting \$2.7 million in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds as part of federal coronavirus relief.

"We want to use this money to reduce class sizes," he said. "We'll also look at additional needs (social and emotional)."

Winkler said the ESSER funds must be spent by September 2024.

The goal of the cash infusion is to help students affected by changes to education due to the COVID-19 epidemic.

Winkler said students began attending school in-person four days per week on Monday, April 12, and so far, everything was going smoothly.

"I got one positive comment from one parent," he said.

Letters inviting students to summer school will go out by the end of April.

The four-week program is invitation only. Winkler said his team is lobbying to contin-

ue the "feed-all" program beyond June 30. Talk at the state-level expects school re-

turning to in-person education, five days per week, Winkler said.

There will be a virtual component, but whether it is provided by Virtual Virginia or Virtual Fluvanna is open-ended.

Winkler recommended the Board stay with Benefit Plan Administrators for health insurance. The Board will vote on that at an upcoming meeting.

Winkler will retire on June 30.

There's been no word yet on who his replacement will be.

A total of 500 triathletes will be motivated to take the plunge into Lake Monticello early Sunday morning, May 2. Fluvanna County will welcome back the 2021 Cal Tri Lake Monticello Triathlon to the area again after two years due to COVID-19. Athletes from 20 states, the District of Columbia and U.S. Armed Forces Europe will be competing in 18 separate events throughout the day ranging from a 5K to a 70.3 mile triathlon.

Triathletes are legendary for having some of the best physiques in the fitness world. That is because cross-training shapes the body in many. Running develops long, lean muscles; cycling builds strength and tones the lower body, and swimming increases flexibility and sculpts the upper body. Spectators are welcome to watch along the triathlon course.

I know from personal experience that training for a triathlon or marathon event can totally transform one's life. It was 1979, when I decided to train for my first triathlon while stationed at Camp Lejeune. The extent of my exercise was strictly running long distances, limited swimming and no biking. Months of cross training with running, swimming, and biking led me and my 12 year old son, Christopher, to the nearby inaugural Pepsi/YMCA Wrightsville Beach, NC Triathlon. This annual fundraiser for the YMCA would become the first and longest running triathlon on the East coast of the United States that September 1979. The distances were 1/2 mile swim, 42 miles on the bike, followed by the 10 mile run. All 99 triathletes finished that first year. The world's first triathlon event was held at Mission Bay, San Diego, California on September, 25, 1974. Everyone that crosses the finish line is a winner!

With safety a top priority, the World Triathlon COVID-19 prevention guidelines for the event will be utilized along with guidance from local and state agencies. Athlete precautions include:

- Expanded transition areas;
- Modified race schedule;
- Temperature screening;

- Streamlined race packet pickup;
 Rolling swim starts;
- Mask usage before the race as at the finish line:
- Sparse aid stations with only bottled water.

Cal Tri events produced successful social distance races in 2020 and will bring that experience to the Lake Monticello Triathlon.



Dogs are local artist's favorite subject

Growing up in Minnesota, Susan Edginton started drawing horses and flowers on the sidewalk with chalk. Like many budding young artists, her parents got her a watercolor set and later she bought herself an oil painting set and canvases and made a creative studio under the stairs in the basement.

In high school, she was drawn to art, music, and theater. After graduating, she and her family took a three-week family trip to Germany, Italy, France, and England, which piqued her interest in art history. While attending college in Northern Minnesota, she spent one year living in Denmark, taking classes, traveling, and living with a Danish family. These enriching experiences furthered her passion for art and photography.

While in Denmark, her fascination with photogra-

phy grew after borrowing her father's Pentax K-1000 camera. She returned home and to college, enrolling in photography classes. Nowadays, everything is digital and manipulated through computer software like Photoshop. Back then, Edginton learned the old ways of processing and printing from black and white negatives in the darkroom, on light-sensitive photographic paper.

"Watching the image appear on the paper in the chemical bath under the red lights is magical," she recalled. She graduated with a B.A. in fine arts with a commercial art minor. Afterward, she moved to Houston, Texas, and worked for a large oil-related company, illustrating, typesetting, and taking photographs. She furthered her art studies at the Art Institute of Houston, then worked as a freelancer for a year. After six-years in Texas, she relocated to Northern California. For a girl who loved the outdoors, it was the ideal setting.

"The Bay area was inspiring with all the beautiful water views, the huge redwoods, the colors, and the beautiful architecture." She soon married and moved to Northern Virginia. They spent as much time as they could on the northern neck fishing and enjoying the Chesapeake. During the 12 years she lived in Northern Virginia, she attended NOVA and received an A.A. in Photography.

Settling in California and Virginia reminded her of the happy moments as a child growing up around the Great Lakes of Minnesota. Vastly different from California and Virginia in some ways but ruggedly familiar. It brought her back to a moment as a child when she happily created in solitude and something she continues to indulge in many years later.

"In my happy place I spent hours painting and drawing - mostly animals," she said. Dogs are among her favorite subjects. Not only does she



capture their inner character but she defines them with exquisite details.

"During the winter and summer, much time was also spent outdoors. The thousands of lakes in Minnesota, time on the water, fishing, and wildlife were my earliest sources of inspiration," she said. "Some people read books for an escape, I lose myself in painting and illustrating. Anything creative is a stress reliever for me, and I find it peaceful and I do it with headphones on, jazz or classical music, I just get into a quiet zone, losing all track of time."

They returned to Northern California, locating between Tahoe and San Francisco. Wherever she was she did a lot of sketching, with pencil, pen, and ink, preferring its portability and with a camera by her side. One would have thought with such a passion for the outdoors that much of her work would embody nature. Yet, her favorite subjects are animals, mostly dogs and a variety of breeds. There are some humans as well.

She focused once again on mastering watercolor and was not alone in her admitted frustration with the challenging medium.

"I wanted to find my style and also learn from others in the class. I joined two galleries and had a few art shows, and met some very interesting fellow artists." Her use of watercolor in her animal and human portraits is flawless and unique. Brilliant and bold color is incorporated into the softer muted shades makes it striking.

Photography remained a huge part of her life, and she finally switched to digital, taking trips to Alaska and Costa Rica, fishing, sightseeing, and joining an African photo safari.

Her focus on dogs as one of her subjects traces back to the many interactions with them while on photographic shoots.

"I volunteered with the Iditarod and the Yukon Quest dogsled races and that was a different challenge dealing with the 30 below zero conditions and camera gear. More action shots with dogs and mushers. Photographing animals does require patience and that also inspired me to continue to learn more."

She then got a puppy, a show quality Wirehaired Pointing Griffon.

"My breeder wanted her in the show ring. This was all new to me and I found a handler and my puppy started showing. Photographing her, at home as well as in the ring along with other dogs, started a more concentrated love of painting and drawing dogs, trying to capture their personalities, achieving a connection with each subject." She started selling photos of the various breeds to their owners, referencing photos for her artwork. "To see an owner's joy when they see their family member portrayed is heartwarming, especially if they are no longer with us."

"Running my dogs in hunt tests and hunting, photographing them doing what they are bred to do is rewarding and also challenging. Any action shots are great even at the dog park, trying to get their expressions, mannerisms, and body language to freeze that connection with them and the viewer."

After nearly 19 years in California, they settled in Fox Hollow and Edginton is looking forward to "turning the page to a new chapter."

I will continue exploring the area, photographing dogs and cats, now the birds, which are different than I am used to seeing." She recently finished a few canine and cat commissions and wants to continue to gain skills in watercolor and illustration work. 




