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Moyers wins Faulconer championship

88 golfers compete in three divisions

The weather was hot and dry and the Lake Monticello golf course was in excellent condition for the prestigious Faulconer Invitational golf tournament played on May 22 and 23. A total of 88 golfers competed in three divisions. The regular Championship Division saw golfers compete on both days from the blue tees, also known as "the tips." The Lake course is 6,930 yards long from

these tees and that is comparable to some of the PGA courses played by the Phil Mickelson's of the world. There was also a Seniors Division for golfers 50 and over and a Super Seniors Division for those 65 and over. The Seniors played from the regular men's white tees over a distance of 6,296 yards, while the Super Seniors played from the Gold tees over

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

a distance of 5,950 yards. The Faulconer champion is, of course, the winner in the championship men's division.

This year's Faulconer champion was Mikey Moyers who effectively won the tournament on Saturday, by shooting a very impressive two under par 70. This gave him a three-stroke lead going into the second and final round on Sunday. He shot a very creditable 75 on Sunday for a total score of 145. He won by two strokes over Bryce Johnson, who carded a 73 on Saturday and a 74 on Sunday. Third place went to Adam Marshall who shot 77 and 73 for 150. The difficulty of the Lake Monticello course from the blue tees is evident from the fact that these top local amateurs managed only one sub-par round in two days. Moyer's first round 70 was the only such round.

Moyers who is 30 years old, plays out of the Green Hills course in Stanardsville. He played in college for Virginia Tech and spent one year on what is now the Korn-Ferry pro tour for young pros aspiring to make the PGA tour. Moyers commented after his win that "amateur golf is a lot more fun." Lake Monticello golf pro Mark Marshall pointed out that Moyers comes from a long line of golfers. His father and

a great uncle each won the Faulconer Invitational twice.

The seniors Division was won by Jim Hurst, who plays out of the Fredericksburg Country Club. He shot an extremely impressive 70 and 69 to win by nine strokes. Second place went to Phil Mahone, who has been a top Charlottesville area amateur for years. He shot 148. Close behind in third place was Bowen Sargent with a 149.

The Super Seniors' winner was Dan McCarter with very solid 70 and 72 for two under par 142. He was followed by Tim Vigotsky who shot 144 and John Steele who came in at 145.

In the competition for the low score by a Lake Monticello resident, Jay Calvo and Eric Parlet both finished with a score of 160, but Calvo was declared the winner based on the established procedure of matching scores going backward from the 18th hole on the final round.

Fluco golf team stand-out, sophomore Killian Donnelly, was the junior golfer winner with a score of 155, very impressive for playing from the blue

re you a new entrepreneur or Are you a new consult. looking to start or grow your business in Fluvanna County? The Fluvanna County Economic Development Authority (EDA) received a Community Recovery and Catalyst Grant from CACF to assist Fluvanna Minority Business entrepreneurs and owners in growing their businesses. The grant is for scholarships for entrepreneurs and business owners to attend the training program offered by the Community Investment Collaborative (CIC)

The application deadline is June 11, 2021 for the class that starts in August 2021. Need based scholarships are available through CIC with the EDA reimbursing for additional costs for tuition.

This program is a 16week workshop that helps entrepreneurs develop new businesses or grow existing ventures. The workshop meets online through Zoom once a week and helps entre-

preneurs learn how to evaluate the viability of their business and learn the basics of running a business. CIC provides ongoing mentoring and technical assistance to

clients who have completed the workshop.



are making and what you are spending is essential to proper bill paying. 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Board defers action on centralized sewer system at Ballenger Bluff

A short agenda turned into a long session for the Board of Supervisors on Wednesday (May 19), as a public hearing over a special use permit for a proposed housing development's wastewater system stretched on for over two hours -- only to end in a deferred decision.

Developer Tim Miller began the permitting process for a tract of land off Courthouse Road, east of Palmyra village, in September 2020. Originally, Ballenger Bluff was planned for 48 single-family homes on a 124-acre property.

Residents in the Courthouse Road neighborhood have opposed the project from the start, arguing that the scant water resources in that part of the county would be further depleted by the addition of so many new homes.

During a public hearing before the Planning Commission in January, more than a dozen residents spoke out on their own ongoing issues with failing and dry wells, and their fears about the impact of Ballenger Bluff.

The commission deferred a decision until its March meeting, by which point Miller had amended his original proposal, reducing the development down to 20 homes on 48 acres.

The issue before the Board of

Supervisors on Wednesday night was a request for a special use permit for a centralized sewer system for the development.

Rather than install 20 individual septic systems and drainfields, Miller instead proposed a cluster system, where four homes share a single tank and drainfield. Under this plan, Ballenger Bluff would have four treatment tanks serving 16 homes, leaving only four properties with traditional septic systems.

Project consultant Mike Clarke of EnviroKlean explained that the system works like a miniature municipal wastewater treatment plant. Since graywater would be additionally treated with UV light, it would actually be cleaner than conventional wastewater plants.

While shared tank systems have been in use for many years, Clarke said this would be a first for this type of rural cluster development. He told supervisors that he believes it could be a model for future developments in Virginia.

 $Under the county's \, rules \, of \, subdivision,$ Miller wouldn't need a permit if he was just installing traditional septic systems. A centralized system, even a small one, requires local and state approval.

Douglas Miles of the Planning Department said he and his staff were satisfied with the plan and the Blue Ridge Health Department agreed it was the best system for the property. Unlike individual septic systems, the centralized system would be subject to periodic inspections and testing by the Health Department and would have to be maintained by licensed technicians.

However, during public comments, area residents argued that the system is still too experimental and worry that multiple houses sharing one tank could easily exceed the amount of wastewater a system could handle in a day, potentially impacting their adjacent properties.

Miller, for his part, objected to the Planning Department's conditions regarding the length of time he would have to maintain a bond on the system. He also complained about County Attorney Fred Payne having oversight of the bond.

Payne dismissed Miller's comments, noting that as county attorney "I approve all subdivision bonds." He said bond provisions outlined by the Planning Department were not unusual. Supervisors Patricia Eager (Palmyra),

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who has experience in developing a subdivision, agreed on both points, saying developers often have to hold a bond for many years.

discussion The between supervisors focused on two main points: the novelty of the centralized system and the fears of residents over its potential long-term impact.

Supervisor Mozell Booker (Fork Union) said she wanted to be sensitive to the concerns raised by locals and wondered why the disconnect between the staff's strong recommendations and the residents' fears. "Can we not explain or convince them that it's a good thing?" she asked.

Ultimately, there were enough lingering questions about centralized system to keep the board from making a decision without more information.

Mrs. Booker called for the motion to be deferred, which passed 5-0.

After further discussion, they decided to revisit the motion at the June 16 meeting, asking staff to set a presentation from the Health Department to try to resolve question from the public about the safety of the system.

With two and a half hours of discussion behind them, they took a rare midmeeting recess before moving on to the rest of the agenda.

At the start of the evening, the supervisors tackled a much easier special use permit request from Amy and Joshua Bower, who hope to become the new owners of the Thistle Gate Vineyard near Scottsville. The permit would allow them to hold special events like receptions and 5K to 100K runs on the property as part of their expansion plans.

Chairman Mike Sheridan (Columbia), who knows the couple, temporarily handed the gavel to Vice Chair Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) so he could personally make the motion -- something he cannot do while chair. Once the vote in approval of the special use permit was taken, he resumed his previous role.



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
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




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Fluvanna Art Association partners with Louisa Arts Center for art show

It has been two years since the Fluvanna Art Association has had a show. So the FAA collaborated with Louisa Arts Center-Purcell Gallery to have a featured show of all the member's work in January of this year. But COVID postponed the original show until June of this year.

Artists who chose to participate in the juried show submitted work to be selected for the final showing. Twentyone artists entered 36 pieces of work. The judge was artist Ruth Lefko, an experienced artist with a unique style of abstraction and realism.

Lefko gravitates toward deep, saturated colors which is the hallmark of her style. There is a subtle, quiet beauty in her work which she recognized in the work of FAA members, including Jane Prete and Jane Skatke, two of her top five picks for recognition.

Prete's style is similar with color being a dominant feature while her ethereal figures float off the page.

"I think the Fluvanna Arts Association show is a nice collection of works by local artists exhibiting an array of subject matter with eye-catching techniques," said Lefko. "One of my favorite paintings is "Middle Sister" by Janie Prete. Art tells a story and I sense one in this piece. I am always impressed with artists who can successfully convey emotions through figures in a painting."

Other favorites among the five, were "Garden Delights" by William Snow and "Blue Leaves" by Skafte.

"They caught my attention through the various techniques used to create layers." Kathleen Scott was among the selected five with her painting "Beach," which was used in the original promotion of the show, and Lorraine Momper for her "At The Outer Banks Brewing Co."

Her top five are an eclectic mix of styles, techniques, and mediums. Snow is known for his flawless, tight watercolors while Prete is more abstract. Momper is a realist and conveys mood by successfully manipulating light and detail in her pastels while Scott uses rich color and impressionistic methods. Skatke encompasses a little bit of all of them but is similar to Snow and Scott in her renditions of her subjects.


Among the familiar artists chosen to exhibit, Windy Payne has exhibited at the gallery before returning for this one with three of her signature landscapes. Also showing was Linda Staiger with her large impressionistic landscapes and Tom Ellis entered a couple of sculptures, including "Wind." 

Hiking in Scottsville

During the past year and a half, more people have gotten out into nature—wherever they could find it. One resource in Scottsville is the Van Clief Nature Area, 63 acres around Lake Scottsville (formerly Mink Creek Reservoir) with a network of trails. Daniel and Margaret van Clief gave the land to the town of Scottsville in 1998. Since then, a number of volunteers, headed up by Dan Gritsko,

a member of the Town Council, have been working to make this beautiful wooded property accessible to hikers and fishermen. Along the lake, Sam Hess built two nice foot bridges over one of the creeks and worked on some of the trails for his Eagle Scout project.

The Mink Creek Trail starts from Valley Street behind Doug's Maytag and runs along the north side of the lake. Beyond

the lake, one can continue on a loop trail through the woods, part of the way along the Albemarle County sewer line that runs from Paulett Town, north of Scottsvilledown to the sewage treatment plant. The sewer people maintain a nice, wide trail where companionable walkers can go two abreast. Here you can admire the vintage standpipes and manhole covers. This trail connects to the Batteau, Arrowhead, and Monacan Trails coming in from the north. Or one can access the Nature Area from the gravel road running between Union Baptist Church on Hardware Street and the cemetery.

The Eagle Trail also branches off the

Mink Creek trail, crossing the creek. This is accessible only if it's not too wet. Once across the creek, you walk along a succession of rocky cliffs and a bank draped with a lush carpet of mosses. Because the area is heavily wooded, there are not a lot of wildflowers, but last fall and winter the mushrooms were varied, colorful, and abundant.

There are trout in the Lake which is regularly stocked. To learn more about the Van Clief Nature Area in Scottsville, visit: Van Clief Nature Area and Scottsville Lake.
