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

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

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Stewart retiring from school board

Shirley Stewart announced she will not run to retain her seat on the Fluvanna School Board.

Stewart, who represents the Rivanna district, will serve the remainder of her term which ends Dec. 31.

In making the announcement, Stewart said she had "mixed emotions" about her decision.

"My greatest joy from serving on the school board has been getting to know many of the staff and excellent programs available in our school system," she said. "I appreciate how hard staff works to meet the needs of the students academically, emotionally, artistically and athletically."

Stewart said the past year "navigating the responses to COVID-19" has been tough.

During that time, however, she saw a lot of positives:

- Chuck Winkler and his team led the staff in planning for virtual and hybrid learning;
- · Most of the staff has been immunized;
- · Don Stribling's work getting those vaccines delivered close to home;
- The staff's willingness to develop and

follow mitigation plans that kept the community safe;

- · Under Josh Gifford's guidance families gained Internet access;
- •Brenda Gilliam juggled the ever-changing dynamics of COVID-19 funding and moving targets related to curriculum and instruction.

Stewart acknowledged students lost instructional time.

"It's imperative that we have the resources available to provide all students with support so they don't become a lost generation of learners," she said. "Providing summer school for those who are struggling the most is a great place to start."

Stewart said she looks forward to working with Peter Gretz, the new superintendent. Stewart said she'd like to work on expanding Career and Technical Education and building relationships with area businesses so students can gain experience in those fields. She'd like to see the system as a whole become less reliant on the Standards of Learning tests to guide curriculum.

"We also need to better understand our struggling learners and close the academic gaps with our students of

Bad precedent for our environment

The developer of the proposed Ballinger Bluff subdivision has applied to Fluvanna County for a special use permit for a septic system that would have sewage from 16 houses flowing to just four drain fields. This special use permit application is part of the developer's effort to crowd 19 houses, 19 wells, and risky drain fields on just 11 acres. The proposed system would be bad for our environment and for the homebuyers and neighbors.

This system--sewage flowing from four houses into two Norweco pre-treatment systems, and then flowing into one drain field has never been tried in any county in Virginia. There is a reason for that. Concentrating this waste into a small number of drain fields would increase the chance of the drain fields failing, leading to raw or partially-treated sewage floating to the surface and running into our nearby creeks.

The gentlemen who sells these pre-treatment

systems has argued that the special use permit would result in a safer system than 19 conventional drain fields. That is an irrelevant argument. The truth of the matter is that the developer does not have enough good soil to get approval for 19 conventional drain fields! It is more relevant to compare the proposal with what the developer can do by right. If this special use permit is denied, as it should be, the developer can build 19 pretreatment systems and 19 drain fields by right. That, obviously, would be safer than the proposed concentrated system described in the special use permit application.

The only reason for the board to approve this would be to help the developer crowd 19 houses, 19 wells, and some risky drain fields in an 11 acre area. This would be a bad precedent for development in Fluvanna. Please encourage the members of the Fluvanna County Board of Supervisors to vote against the special use permit for this untested sewage system at Ballinger Bluff.

No to experimental septic system

I live adjacent to the Ballinger Creek rural cluster subdivision being proposed on Oak Creek Road in Palmyra. A plan of 20 houses, each with its own well on 11 acres, is the highest density of wells ever to be placed in Fluvanna County, many of which are within 400 feet of eight other wells. Multiple existing neighbors have already reported insufficient well output or loss of wells in this area. What happens to the unsuspecting new homeowners if/when their wells fail and there is no available land to place another well?

Additionally, the developer intends to create a central septic/drainage system never before used in Fluvanna County or in the state of Virginia. Traditionally a home is built with its own well and septic system, with individual homeowners responsible for maintaining that system. Tim Miller's experimental septic system would drain effluent from four houses into one large collection system. (One person or 10 persons may live in each house!) Four of these large collection systems

would sit on 11 acres and be maintained by the homeowner's association. What happens to unsuspecting new homeowners as well as surrounding neighbors if/when the septic system fails to drain, backs up and flows on open ground, stinks, contaminates surrounding soil, creeks, springs, and wells, or must be emptied out or changed? Is there a contingency plan if the experiment doesn't work?

Multiple large experimental septic systems in a known-problematic water area on land that likely does not perk, to be tested in the midst of 20 new houses each on 0.35 acres is a frightening experiment that leaves no margin for error.

Please speak out and say no to a subdivision with 20 wells and four experimental centralized septic drainage systems proposed for Oak Creek Rd. Mr. Miller can create specially treated singleuse individual septic drain fields in the traditional way that has already proved itself in Virginia and in Fluvanna County. In this way, the natural drainage of the land with health department oversight determines the number of houses to be built, which is as it should be.

Scholarships Available for Entrepreneurs in Fluvanna County

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re you a new entrepreneur or Are you a new consult. looking to start or grow your business in Fluvanna County? The Fluvanna County Economic Development Authority (EDA) received a Community Recovery and Catalyst Grant from CACF to assist Fluvanna Minority Business entrepreneurs and owners in growing their businesses. The grant is for scholarships for entrepreneurs and business owners to attend the training program offered by the Community Investment Collaborative (CIC).

The application deadline is June 11, 2021 for the class that starts in August 2021. Need based scholarships are available through CIC with the EDA reimbursing for additional costs for tuition.

This program is a 16week workshop that helps entrepreneurs develop new businesses or grow existing ventures. The workshop meets online through Zoom once a week and helps entre-

preneurs learn how to evaluate the viability of their business and learn the basics of running a business. CIC provides ongoing mentoring and technical assistance to

clients who have completed the workshop.

To date 31 entrepreneurs in Fluvanna have graduated and started 23 new businesses. Eight existing businesses expanded. A total of 21 new jobs in Fluvanna were created plus seasonal work.

It takes missionaries to build a village

It has been several years since a dedicated group of missionaries from Sts. Peter and Paul Church - including Robert Maher, Marisa Vacca, Cynthia Aycock, Doug Mullinex, Peter Coleman, and others - have been instrumental in building a village in Uganda.

They began the project by building the villagers a badly needed health center. Many people living in rural areas have no access to medical facilities which are miles from where they live. Also, the roads are in poor shape, mostly dirt roads riddled with potholes, and are only navigable by foot, bike, or motorcycle. Motorcycles are the only way doctors can get to patients faster in a limited time frame and make it easier for house calls.

The village not only has the health center, but a church with a rectory, a school and thanks again to the missionaries, a well and electricity.

"The extended utility poles and wires

are three kilometers (one mile) to the village to give the health center, church, rectory, and school real power," said Robert Maher. "It also gives the locals who live along the path of the lines to be able to tap into it."

Fr. Gerald Musuubire, the former priest at Sts. Peter and Paul, now at St. Timothy's in Tappahannock and Fr. David Martin Ssentamu, here at Sts. Peter and Paul, are both from Uganda and support the effort. Musuubire explained why in the 21st - century electricity seems like a luxurious commodity.

"Back in 2006, the candidate running for president promised to get electricity to these areas if the people voted for him." He got elected and the people were left disappointed and with empty promises. With the help of the missionaries, the people put the electric poles in themselves by manual labor.

"The health center has been upgrad-

ed to a three (one below a hospital) by the Ministry of Health because it now has power," said Maher.

Now it has clean water too. Before the clean water well was dug, the people had to trek to a watering hole that they shared with wild animals or rely on a rainwater tank. The new well allows the villagers to have clean, uncontaminated water.

"The well was four feet by 150 feet and dug by hand," said Maher.

Medical supplies are always constantly needed and in November of last year, they built a shipping crate and sent the village an ultrasound machine, vital signs monitor, and centrifuge, in addition to medical supplies and clothing. The ultrasound machine was donated by Fredericksburg Pregnancy Center and the University of Virginia donated the vital signs monitor. It arrived and was delivered this past February to an excited and grateful group of healthcare workers.

To date, there are no COVID-related cases but schools are closed. Doctors are all vaccinated and immunizations are up to 2,700 for the year. They have delivered a few babies, had 36 in-patient visits and 358 out-patient visits. The clinic can deliver babies and perform minor surgical procedures but nothing major.

When Americans are talking about progressive measures, upgrading and revamping or even re-imagining infrastructure for the 21st century, in remote areas of Africa, they have never known clean water or electricity, something many Americans take for granted.

Some may wonder why it is that missionaries often focus on remote areas of Africa. For centuries, Africa was ruled by other countries, and their resources plundered until they began to set-up governments that, in some cases, were not much better than the imperialistic rule of past centuries.

"The political leaders and politicians don't want to share the resources," said Musuubire. "Colonialism ravaged the continent but did nothing to help its people." Africa lacks land reform and commercial agriculture, and this has hindered its people in prosperous economic development. He added that helping the people build these small areas of infrastructure goes a long way to giving them some independence and hope for a better future.

"So many remote areas, it's a small piece but it makes a difference to them," said Marisa Vacca. "I appreciate the U.S. When I come home."

As for the people, they could teach many of us about appreciation and gratefulness.

"Their sense of community is much stronger than here in America," said Doug Mullinex. "They are family-oriented not technology-driven."

Cynthia Aycock echoes the same thoughts and feelings about volunteering and the people they are helping.

"We are changing the lives of these people," she said.

Fluco softball team tops Monticello on the run rule

Softball is much less predictable than some other sports. In some sports, if a team wins impressively the first time two teams play, it is very unlikely that the losing team will bounce back and win big the next time the teams play. A week ago, the Monticello Mustangs beat the Flucos on a no-hitter. On Thursday, May 27, the teams met again, and it was a completely different story. In the bottom of the first, Fluco sophomore centerfielder Karley Hance tripled to right field off the pitcher who had no-hit the Flucos. She scored on a wild pitch for a 1-0 Fluco lead.


In the second inning, Fluco sophomore shortstop Brooke Napier doubled to start the inning and came in to score when the Monticello catcher made a throwing error. In the third inning, the Flucos jumped to a big 5-0 lead, as Hance blasted another triple, senior pitcher Calista Marsh walked and Napier connected again and this time she cleared the left field fence for a three run home run. Eight of the nine outs recorded in the first three innings by the Monticello pitcher were strikeouts, but the Flucos had her number in this game. Meanwhile, March was shutting down the Mustang batters, allowing only one single in the first three innings. A nice defensive play by first baseman Makayia Gentry ended the top of the third.

The Mustangs changed pitchers in the fourth and the Flucos greeted the new pitcher with some fireworks. Lead-off batter Lindsay Ward was hit by a pitch, second baseman Shantrice Rush singled. A fielder's choice followed. March then launched the Flucos third triple of the game to score two. A single by catcher Braelyn Via plated March and the Flucos led 8-0. Leading off the bottom of the fifth, pinch hitter Heidi Breedan hit an enormous drive to

left that cleared the fence with plenty of room to spare. When you send up a pinch hitter, you are normally looking for a single, not an out of the park blast. Back-to-back doubles by Ward and Rush upped the score to 10-0 and ended the game after 5 innings, on the run rule.

March pitched a five inning, one hit shutout for the Flucos. She struck out three and walked one. March mostly induced the Mustangs to hit ground balls, and Rush threw out five batters and turned in one outstanding play at second base. Coach Tre Smith said that this win ups the Flucos' record to 5-3. He was very pleased at how his team came back from the earlier loss to Monticello and really "attacked the ball" in this win.

On June 1, The Flucos hosted the Charlottesville Black Knights. On June3 they will host the Western Albemarle Warriors. The regular season ends with two away games, at Orange County on June 8 and at Louisa County on June 10.

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Local health clinic opens

When Family Nurse Practitioner Amy Beyer and her family moved to 2611 Thomas Jefferson Parkway she knew it was the place to make her dream come true.

Behind the large colonial home was a 2,000-square foot building being used for storage. It would become Beyer's health clinic.

For eight years Beyer honed her craft, working in several medical specialty areas. After spending time updating the building, now she's open for business. The clinic boasts three patient rooms, a bright, soothing reception area and everything Beyer needs to serve patients.

The Fluvanna Review visited Beyer and toured the clinic. Here are her answers to questions the Review asked.

What exactly is the Fluvanna Health Clinic and what is your dream for its future?

Fluvanna Health Clinic is an independently owned clinic providing primary care, sick visits, sports/employment/DOT physicals, lab services, and drug screenings to patients of all ages. My dream for the clinic is to provide a welcoming clinic space where patients can receive quality-based health care as I assist them on their healthcare journey.

What is your work and educational background?

I received my Bachelor of Science degree in nursing from Liberty University in 2007 and graduated from James Madison University with my Master of Science in Nursing, Family Nurse Practitioner in 2014. My work experience has included working inpatient at UVA, dialysis, urgent care, hospice, and postacute rehab. My diverse work experience has provided me the experience

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to provide well rounded care to our community.

If you are not a physician (medical doctor) how can you operate a clinic? Do you have a doctor under whose supervision you work?

Just like many states, Virginia does not require experienced certified Nurse Practitioners to hold a collaborative physician/nurse practitioner agreement. Healthcare is like a team sport, there are many players with different abilities and functions. This is practically seen as I collaborative daily with other providers in the area. I have always believed that collaborative care is good care and collaboration goes both ways between nurse practitioners, physicians, social workers, therapists, and other various health specialties. Throughout my work experience I've had physicians call me with medical questions or ask for advice- the same holds true for me collaborating with others.

As an independently owned clinic I am uniquely positioned to work collaboratively with all hospital systems/ offices. With today's technologies it is very easy to communicate with other providers even if we are not located in traditional adjoining offices. The unique setting also gives me the flexibility to spend more time with patients when needed and not get caught in the rat


THIS WEEK'S PET: ELLIE
