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
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




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Candidate for Cunningham School Board seat

- Operate in a cost-effective manner.

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
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Obituary

Member Guest tournament ends in lively shoot-out

The Lake Monticello Men's Member Guest tournament has an interesting and challenging format that ends in a six-team shootout to determine the event's overall champion. Six flights of six two-man teams were entered this year, which is full capacity. The teams in each flight play the other teams in the flight in nine hole matches over two days. On Saturday everyone plays 27 holes and on Sunday 18 holes. On each hole played, a point is awarded for the best gross score and the best net score. Therefore, for two days and 45 holes, every shot for each player counts. The team from each flight with the most points in gross and net competitions combined goes into a shootout on the 18th hole, organized and monitored by golf pro Mark Marshall.

The flights in the tournament are named for famous golfers and determined by the overall handicaps of the players on each team. Accordingly, flight one, the Nicklaus Flight, includes players with single digit handicaps, while the players in flight six, the Watson Flight have average handicaps over 20. However, in the shootout any team can win. Six teams shoot over a small pond, to the eighteenth green from approximately 100 yards in the first round. This is a distance from which all the players have a chance to make a really good shot, and a successful putt for a two could win the tournament for anyone. The 18th green is designed to allow for a considerable number of spectators and there was crowd of players and spouses on hand.

In the first shoot-out round, no one made a two, but teams from the fourth and fifth flight were eliminated as neither player on those teams made a three. For

the second round, Marshall moved the tee location back to approximately 125 yards, still within reach for all the players. With eight players hitting to the green, five balls were on the green. Wayne Leeder, guest of Tim Coons was closest at about eight feet. Leeder and Coons were from the first flight. Coons was about 25 feet away with what he would describe as a double breaking putt, definitely a tester. But Coons calmly knocked it in. He said he felt comfortable over the putt because his teammate was so close. No other team made two so Coons and Leeder were the winners.

The winners in each Flight in gross points and in net points were awarded an attractive vase. In flight one, the gross point winner was the team of Coons and Leeder with 30. The net point winner was the team of Jim Beach and Jim Forkowitz. They tied with Matt Hafer and Paul Logan, but were declared winners on an established matching of cards basis. In the second Flight, the Woods Flight, first place in the gross was won by Michael Mundell and Andrew Mundell. The net winning team was Bill Scanlon and Robert Chiovaro.

The third Flight was the Hagen flight. The gross points winners were John Roeder and Ed Webb. They dominated the Flight, scoring a tournament high combined point total of 67 points. The top net score in that flight was 26.5, posted by Justin Sullivan and Billy Groves. In the Hogan Flight, the winning team on gross points was Ted Moser and Rick Quintaro. The net winners were the team of Paul and Andrew Schmidt. In the fifth flight, the Player Flight, the gross points winner was the team of Gary Jenifer and Lance Clark. The most net points were accumulated by Phillip Scott and Shawn Brown. In the sixth Flight, the gross point winners were Cliff Altschull and Daniel Apple, the net point winners were LMOA Board of Directors Chairman Jay Hinkle and David Hall.

The Member Guest program included breakfast each morning and a box lunch on Saturday. Each player received a goody bag containing a hat and shirt. Players could also sign up, for a fee, for themselves and a guest for a upscale dinner on Saturday night at the clubhouse, and for a pork barbeque lunch on Sunday. Players were very pleased with the food offerings and with the course conditions.

The Economic Development **Authority A Year in Review**

This past year has been a whirlwind for the Fluvanna County Economic Development nesses. To date, 7 Fluvanna County businesses Authority. Before we get to a review of the year, we need to recognize our outgoing Chair, Mr. Curtis Putnam. Curtis led us through these very trying times with a great attitude. He oversaw the process of starting the transformation of the EDA into a change agent for Fluvanna County. He helped begin the process of re-imagining what the EDA can do for business in Fluvanna County. Thank you for your leadership Curtis!

Our partnership with the Fluvanna County Economic Development Office was instrumental in Fluvanna County being able to properly and efficiently utilize the CARES Act money for our county's benefit. In two underserved/unserved areas for broadband connectivity, CARES Act paid Firefly \$520,000 for a broadband expansion project in Fork Union. In addition, Appalachian Power Grid's Nelson Cable laid \$185,777.00 worth of cable along Poplar Spring Roads in Scottsville. The Rappahannock Electric Coop, Firefly and Dominion are doing a study of the remaining broadband connectivity needs. From the 2018 broadband project, CVSI completed Henson's Store substation and Zion Crossroads. Board of Supervisors allocated \$409,940 of CARES Act money to Funds for Recovery and Operations Management (FROM: Fluvanna's Small Business Grants). EDA oversaw the disbursement to support our for-profit and notprofit businesses and schools. This will allow them to recoup cost of operations, last revenue, and other COVID expenses.

Charlottesville Area Community Foundation whose mission is to improve lives of those most impacted awarded the EDA a \$10,000 grant and access to the Catchafire Program which provides free business expertise. This grant is designed to provide assistance to small minority and women owned businesses in Fluvanna

nesses. To date, 7 Fluvanna County businesses have received scholarships for the recently completed Community Investment Collaborative (CIC), spring 16-week session. We are currently processing applicants for the fall session. CIC courses are designed to help businesses learn what they need to start a business or to become a more vibrant and successful business. After the 2nd round of scholarships, any remaining money will be for alumni to continue their education at CIC. Central Virginia Small Business Development Center and/or Piedmont Virginia Community College. To further foster entrepreneurship, EDA became involved with the Career and Technical Education at Fluvanna County High School. This collaboration to help develop a skilled workforce was part of the reason that Stewart Tool Company with 20 new jobs chose Fluvanna. Along with Silk City Printing, Governor Northam made the announcement of both companies under the One Virginia Plan. Dr. Kevin McDonald was on the steering committee for the One Virginia Plan. He is a Vice President at University of Virginia. He made a presentation to us and addressed our many questions.

Through this past year, EDA with Bryan Rothamel of the Economic Development Office put up signs at Pleasant Grove, delivered \$3500 of hand sanitizer dispensers, distributed CARES Act money to support our businesses and economy, expanded the county's broadband connectivity and propelled our fledgling entrepreneurs.

Without a doubt we have had our busiest and most impactful year helping to turn our county into a beacon for small businesses in the Region. Thanks to all of our Board Members for their time and efforts to assist our county businesses in turning Fluvanna County into that beacon.

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Supervisors approve coal ash zoning requests; deny Ballinger Bluff permit

The Board of Supervisors approved two rezoning requests by Dominion Energy following a lengthy public hearing at their regular meeting on Wednesday (June 16).

The request to reclassify approximately 225 acres from A-1 (Agricultural) to I-1 (Industrial) is the next step in a 10-year project to move 6.2 million cubic yards of coal ash from an unlined pond to a fully lined and capped landfill.

Dominion has been ordered by the state to secure or recycle coal ash -- the toxic byproduct of decades of coalfired power generation at Bremo Power Station and other plants around the state -- within the next 15 years.

Prior to the legislation signed in 2019, Dominion had consolidated the coal ash at Bremo from two ponds that sat within the James River floodplain to the current North Ash Pond.

Now, Dominion plans to move the ash from that pond to the newly re-zoned property, where it will be completely encased in approximately three feet of liners and drainage layers designed to prevent the ash from seeping into the water table or escaping into the air. Under the plan, the coal ash will be moved entirely within Dominion's property and not have to be transported on local roads.

The public hearing, which lasted for approximately 90 minutes, included a review of the project and some changes to the original conditions set by the county.

A major concern of residents is that the term "sanitary landfill" could be used by Dominion to dump outside trash at the site. James Ashby Shipp of Bremo Bluff Road said the imprecise wording could allow even Dominion to contract to have garbage brought in from states like New York or New Jersey.

Dominion spokesperson Sarah Marshall said the site would only be used for coal ash from the site, construction debris from the project, and the liner on the current ash pond. Revised language in the conditions set by the county has been strengthened to prohibit outside trash.

Nadine Armstrong of Bremo Road said she has lived near the plant for most of her life and has been very aware of the coal ash issue in the West Bottom neighborhood. Voicing her concerns about the safety of moving the landfill even closer to West Bottom homes, she said "you can say what you want to say in reference to the coal ash not leaking, you've been saying things like that for years."

Talking about the \$47 million offered to the county from Dominion to upgrade area water systems and recreational facilities, she said she was "talking about people. I'm not talking about recreation. I'm not talking about water towers. I'm not talking about communities. I'm talking about people. What are you doing for the

people, themselves. Can you answer that question?"

Supervisor Mozell Booker, who represents the district, asked the Dominion representatives to continue outreach through local churches, to have points of contact where people could ask questions about Dominion's legally-mandated monitoring of area wells.

She and Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia) also noted there is a cemetery near the proposed construction site, and asked if Dominion could set up a system where any noise could be stopped during graveside services.

One area where Dominion was slightly less willing to compromise were days of operation. The county prefers to limit construction to Monday-Saturday, but the company would like Sunday operations as

They also want to be able to operate on a 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. schedule. Several supervisors thought a 7 a.m. start time would be better for residents, but Marshall pointed out that the hours fall within current county noise ordinances.

As a compromise, they suggested that no heavy equipment be used in that first hour or so; however, county Planning Commission official Douglas Miles said, for the sake of consistency, his department would prefer not to put those sorts of limits on specific operations.

Both zoning changes passed by a vote

Ballinger Bluff

A local developer's fight to build a new 20-home subdivision just east of the Village of Palmyra hit another snag late in the meeting as supervisors voted 3-2 to deny a special use permit for a central sewer system for the proposed Ballinger Bluff development.

Supervisors first heard the request for the special use permit at their May 19 meeting. Developer Tim Miller proposed a sewer system where clusters of four homes would share a septic tank and drainfield, rather than the usual system where each home has its own tank and drainfield. While the shared system isn't a new concept, it hasn't been used in this type of rural cluster development in Virginia to date.

Residents with properties around the proposed development have been critical of the project from the start, arguing that it might deplete the scant water supply in that part of the county. At the May 19 meeting, they issued several concerns about the potential impact to their properties if such a novel septic system were to fail.

Supervisors voted 5-0 to defer a decision until this week's meeting to get more information from the Virginia Department of Health on the safety of the system.

Jack McClelland, Director of Environmental Health for the Blue Ridge Health Department said that the proposed system is on the Virginia Department of Health's approved list and has been certified for use by the National Safety Foundation (NSF).

After questioning McClelland, it became apparent that some supervisors had doubts about how this system would work in real-world conditions.

Weaver and .Eager voted to approve



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the special use permit, with O'Brien and Booker voting against. After pausing for a moment, Sheridan voted no, and the motion failed.

Pay increase

County Administrator Eric Dahl presented a survey of pay rates for Boards of Supervisors all over the state and came back with a staff recommendation for a 6 percent increase for each member.

Under the proposal, the chair's annual salary would increase from \$10,200 to \$10,812; vice-chair would increase from \$9,600 to \$10,176, and other members would increase from \$9,000 to \$9,540.

After over a decade with no change in pay, supervisors last voted on a pay increase in May 2019, approving an additional \$100 per month for each member by a vote of 3-2.

This vote broke along the same lines, with Supervisors Sheridan, Booker, and Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) voting for the raise and Supervisors Don Weaver (Cunningham) and Patricia Eager (Palmyra) voting against.

The new rate will go into effect January 1, 2022.

- In other matters, supervisors:
- Approved a VDOT plan to abandon and replace a short segment of Academy Road (Rt. 652);
- · Approved an \$18,000 funding addition for replacement of Kent Store Volunteer Fire Department's Engine
- · Approved a contract with Robinson, Farmer Cox Associates for financial auditing services.
- · Approved an amended version of the county's mutual aid compact with Louisa County to include assistance with sheltering should Louisa suffer a nuclear accident
- · Renewed the contract for County Attorney Fred Payne at the current rate of \$10,000 a month, plus small hourly increases for county attorney staff members of less than 10% per employee.

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Empowered Players still growing after six years

When it comes to the arts, schools provide the students the basics but much of the visual and performing arts remain in the shadows of academics and athletics. Community groups that expand the arts through engagement help students to build on what they have already learned in school. Groups like Empowered Players give students a deeper and more enriching experience through the performing

Empowered Players began in the summer of 2016. In 2016 their first one-week camp had ten students. Today, they serve 150 students.

"It's been wonderful to see the program's growth, and we're grateful for the community's continued support," said its founder and director Jessica Harris.

Empowered Players is a nonprofit that pro-

vides accessible theater and arts education for students K-12 in Fluvanna County.

"Our mission is to uplift the human spirit through access to quality arts experiences, youth empowerment, and community service," said Harris. "Through our free year-long theater, writing, and voice classes, accessible performances, and volunteer opportunities, we seek to create a more connected, creative, and engaged community."

This year is special for EP. They have four graduating seniors that have been in their program since the first camp in 2016 and throughout high school. Among them her brother Josh Harris, who wore many hats from set designing to acting; Delaney Hammond, Mia LaRochelle, and Grace Lintecum adding their energy and dedication and believing in something worth-

"It's special for me to have watched them grow up in our programs and this community as they have become caring and brilliant young adults," she said.

EP like other art-related community groups creates an atmosphere that helps children interact with others and their environment. self-expression, and communication. The arts cultivate a multitude of other skills, including problem-solving, collaboration, creativity, and confidence. These and others are important components to shaping child development. The arts have proven to promote social development and motor skills as well as improve reading and math.

"One of the things that I'm grateful EP has been able to provide is a sense of family and

community for many of our students. We focus on striving to provide a positive, loving environment in all of our classes and troupes, and we hope to foster a place where all feel welcome," said Harris. "We've heard from families that students have been more interested in community service, more driven in their academics, and have seen increased social and emotional development. All of this drives us to do what we do, and it's been such a blessing to see the impact of EP."

Harris adds that through performances, volunteering, and accessible programs, EP has offered families and students access to the arts in tremendous ways. In 2020 they were able to expand their community outreach efforts with new virtual programming, from talent shows to costume contests to creative challenges and

"Our increase in youth theater programming has filled a large need in Fluvanna, and we're excited to expand our reach." Harris believes that as we emerge out of the pandemic, the arts will be important in helping rebuild, restore, and rejuvenate our community. For the future, EP is looking at how they can return to some form of in-person programming, as this past year they offered all of their performances and classes online. As they return to in-person learning and performing they are also looking for increased space to accommodate their growing number of students.

"We'll continue exploring ways to increase our accessibility - both in geographic location, variety of programming, and heightened opportunities. We'll keep supporting our community through events, services, and mentoring, and hope to continue to solidify our presence in Fluvanna. The future is exciting for us."

The Fluvanna SPCA will be closed to the public until further notice. Beating the pandemic: FCHS Class of 2021 graduates

Even though it was in the 80s, clouds came through to buffer the beating sun and breezes blew in to cool the crowd it was a beautiful night for a graduation

On Friday evening (June 18), 264 Fluvanna High School seniors walked across the stage and received the diploma they'd worked hard for 12 years to get.

But first they heard speakers - their own classmates, principal, incoming and outgoing superintendents.

Class President Delaney Hammond spoke about the trials they all encoun-

"It can't be overstated how challenging this year has been. But the challenges we

faced make it (graduating) even more impressive," she said. "We haven't shied away from challenge, but embraced it....if you did nothing else this year, you graduated, and that is something to be proud of."

Principal Margo Bruce announced the amount of scholarships the class received.

"This is a very, very, very smart group of young people," Bruce said. "They earned a total of \$755,938 in scholarships. They are an outstanding group of young adults."

Class Salutatorian Rebecca Taylor said over the years she learned a lot.

"Some things I might never use again, but most I'll never forget," Taylor said, then quoted Dr. Seuss: "You're off to great places. Today is your day. Your mountain is waiting, so get on your way."

Valedictorian Jacob Collier joked about being first and assured his classmates they weren't last. Collier said it was special being the first valedictorian to graduate from Abrams Academy (the alternative school).

"Never let anyone tell you who you are. There is nothing holding you back from being the amazing person you are."

Retiring Superintendent Chuck Winkler told the class: "I'm sincerely sorry the pandemic came at a time in your life that should have been the happiest and most joyous. But you have persevered."

As the keynote speaker, new Superintendent Pete Gretz said he and the class had something in common: "We are about to embark on something new."

Gretz acknowledged graduates often get advice about chasing dreams, climbing mountains and having self-confidence.

But he said it all comes down to living with integrity.

"The best definition I've heard of integrity is 'agreement between what you believe and what you do," Gretz said. "Letting go of what you believe will produce a conflict inside you that will eat you alive."

He encouraged them to dream big and not quit, but most importantly to "know who you are and live accordingly."
