This Bank Secret Can Be Yours Know the way loans work...

and use it to your advantage!

Every banker knows that the majority of the money they make on a loan is made in the first few years of the loan. By understanding this fact, you can greatly reduce the amount you pay when buying your house, paying off your student loan, or buying a car. Here is what you need to know:

Your payment never changes

When you obtain a loan, the components of that loan are interest, the number of years to repay the loan, the amount borrowed, and the monthly payment. Assuming a fixed rate note, the payment never changes. Here is an example of a \$250,000 loan.

It is important to note that your payment in month one is \$1,158 and your monthly payment thirty years later is the same amount...\$1,158.

Each payment has two parts What does change every month is what is inside each payment. Every loan payment has two parts. One is a payment that reduces

two parts. One is a payment that reduces the amount of money you owe, called principal. The other part of the payment is for the bank, called interest expense. Now look at the component parts of the first payment and then the last payment:

So while your monthly payment never changes, the amount used to reduce the loan each month varies DRAMATICALLY. Remember your total cost of borrowing \$250,000 includes more than \$166,000 in interest!

Use the knowledge to your advantage

Here's how you can use this information to your advantage.

For new loans

- Only sign up for loans that allow you to make pre-payments without penalty.
- When borrowing money, keep some of your cash in reserve. Try to reserve a minimum of 10 to 20 percent of the amount borrowed. So in this example, try to reserve \$25,000 to \$50,000 in cash.
- Immediately after getting the loan, consider

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using the excess cash as a pre-payment on the note. By doing this you can dramatically reduce the interest expense over the life of the note, all while keeping your payment constant. Even though your monthly payment may be a little higher, the extra payment amount will pay back the loan more quickly.

For existing loans

• Create and look at your loan's amortization table. This table shows how much of each payment is used to pay down the loan balance and how much goes to your lender as interest. In the above example, 67 percent of the first payment is for the bank, while only ½ of 1 percent of the last payment is for the bank.

• Pay more to you than the bank. Aggressively prepay down any loan until more of each payment goes to you versus the bank. This is the crossover point of your loan.

• **Find your sweet spot.** After hitting the crossover point, next consider the efficiency of each prepayment and determine when you consider your prepayment ineffective. No one would consider prepaying that last payment when interest expense is only \$4.00. But if more than 25% of the payment goes to interest? Keep making prepayments.

Final thought

When you make a prepayment on a loan, reduce the loan balance by your prepayment, then look at the amortization table. See how many payments are eliminated with your prepayment and add up all the interest you save. You will be amazed by the result. If you need help calculating this, give us a call.



Fluco volleyball squad stomps the Hornets from Orange

As volleyball is now played, with a point awarded on every serve, a team with superior talent can often run off a series of points while on service and put a weaker team hopelessly behind early in a game. The Fluco volleyball team under Coach Christi Harlowe-Garrett did just that in its match with the Hornets from Orange County High School on Oct. 13. The outcome was not a surprise, as the Flucos came into the match with a record of 13-2.

Fluvanna won the first game of the best out of three games contest relatively easily by a score of 25-16. The second game of the match was a rout, as Fluvanna held Orange to single figures, winning 25-9.

In the third game, the Hornets were more competitive. The Flucos started with junior Faith Shields serving. They won the first two points on volleys, before Shields served an ace for a 3-0 lead. After the teams traded points, Freshman libero Jillian Davis took the serve with the Flucos leading 5-2. The Flucos won three points to boost their lead to 8-2. Davis then fired an ace for a big 9-2 lead.

Three points in row for the Hornets made it 9-5. However, junior Kayla

Gentry won the serve back for the Flucos with a thundering kill shot. The Flucos built their lead to 17-9, and senior Sophia Denby and Junior Shelby Crawford both recorded kill shots to give the Flucos a seeming insurmountable ten-point lead at 19-9. Orange was not done though, as they responded with five straight points to make the score 19-14. The Flucos did not fold and the teams traded points from then on to reach a final score of 25-20.

The statistics for the Flucos were surprisingly well balanced. Denby led in kill shots with 14, but four other Flucos each had six kill shots. That list included Gentry, Crawford, and sophomores Emma Abel and Isabell Garrett. Shields was outstanding in her all-around play as she recorded 31 assists, 9 digs and an impressive seven service aces. SAVE RURAL FLUVANNA

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County faces tight deadlines for redistricting Must complete the process by Dec. 31

The Fluvanna Board of Supervisors has just weeks to decide on what the country's local electoral districts will look like for the next decade

Under Virginia law, localities must redistrict every ten years during the year ending in one (2021 in this case), using the most recent census numbers.

Decennial census data is usually available by April of the redistricting year, giving localities ample time to complete the process. But in 2020, the pandemic and other issues forced te U.S. Census Bureau to delay the results by 120 days past the April deadline.

Assistant County Administrator Kelly Belanger Harris said the 2020 Census information finally arrived in September, with critical data from the state's Department of Legislative Services (DLS) coming the first week of October.

This leaves around ten weeks for the supervisors to analyze the data, hold community meetings and public hearings, finalize the district maps and hold their final vote before the state's Dec. 31 deadline.

Compact & contiguous

The 2020 Census found that Fluvanna's

By district, the population grew in Palmyra, Rivanna, and Cunningham, and declined in Columbia and Fork Union.

State law requires localities to design districts that are "compact and contiguous," roughly equal in population, and show no racial bias.

Supervisors do have some freedom in deciding how to accomplish those goals. They could, for example, try to shift the boundaries of the five existing districts so each has approximately 5,258 residents.

Or they could create more districts.

During informal discussions at their Oct. meeting, they indicated that they might be willing to move to six or seven districts.

"Seven, to me, gives a more appropriate representation of every facet of the county," said Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia). That would work out to one supervisor for every 3.756 residents.

Adding two seats would expand the size of the Board of Supervisors -- and the School Board -- by 40 percent.

Community involvement

At the Oct. 6 meeting Harris walked through a tentative time frame for the coming weeks.

The Redistricting Committee, composed of Supervisors Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) and Donald Weaver (Cunningham), planned to discuss next steps before the Oct. 20 board meeting.

A work session on redistricting is scheduled for 5 p.m. on Oct. 20 at the Carysbrook Performing Arts Center on James Madison Highway.

County staff has been tasked with taking census data and putting it into a mapping program. From there, they can start creating potential maps of five, six, and seven districts to act as a starting point for further debate.

Supervisors plan on holding at least one informational meeting for the community, and members of the public will be able to attend work sessions and meetings. If everything stays on track, supervisors should vote on the finalized plan by Dec. 15.

Difficult choices

That's when things could get even more complicated.

Redistricting usually takes place in the spring. If new districts are created, candidates have time to run for new seats.

This time around, supervisors will be redrawing district lines during election season.

Sheridan and O'Brien are running uncontested, and two Cunningham candidates are vying to replace Weaver, who announced his retirement earlier this year. It's not clear what their districts are going to look like by the time their new terms begin on Jan. 1, 2022.

There is also little guidance on how to add new members if new seats are created.

"This is so mysterious," said County Attorney Fred Payne. "There are so many questions open that I think you face some very difficult choices."

The Census found that the population of Fluvanna County grew a modest six percent over the last decade, climbing from 25,691 in 2010 to 27,249 in 2020. Each household has an average of 2.99 residents.

The Census counted 1,037 inmates at the Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women in 2020. This population is not included in the numbers above, as they are not technically residents of the county. More than 100 of Fluvanna's business owners celebrated four women honored for their professional acumen and good deeds Thursday (Oct. 14).

At its annual meeting and silent auction, the Fluvanna Chamber of Commerce presented awards to the following:

- · Carolyn Herbert: Business of the Year, "Herbert's Wine Jellv,"
- Erika Mitchell: Emerging Business of the Year, "Sweet Art Emporium,"

Herbert started her business six years ago to help people with mental health issues who've been incarcerated earn an income. Besides making and selling wine jelly, many of the employees come up with their own creations, which Herbert packages and sells. You can buy the products online and in local stores.

Mitchell opened Sweet Art Emporium in Palmyra's Village Station in February 2019 and provides a place for more than 60 local artists to sell their wares. Like many businesses, Mitchell had to become more flexible and develop new strategies to sell when the pandemic hit.

Tatangelo moved to Fluvanna just a couple years ago and didn't hesitate making a splash in the business community. An ID/Legal Shield representative, Tatangelo has been a tireless advocate for the Chamber and founded Fluvanna Women in Business which boasts more than 40 members. Many Women in Business members decorated the tables at the annual meeting with centerpieces and favors highlighting their own business.

Armstrong is the director of Fluvanna's MACAA center in Carysbrook. Rudy Garcia and the Chamber honored Armstrong because during the pandemic Fluvanna's MACAA met the urgent and increased need to provide food for our hungry families. Before the pandemic, the center fed 146 families a month. That went up to 146 families a week. Fluvanna passes transgender policy

The Fluvanna School Board passed its state-mandated transgender policy at the meeting Wednesday (Oct. 13)

Fluvanna is complying with the law by adding the state code each current policy refers to. The motion passed 3-2 with Perrie Johnson (Fork Union), James Kelley (Palmyra) and Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) voting for the motion and Andrew Pullen (Columbia) and Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) voting against.

The Board recognized bus driver and teacher aide Ali Marks for superior performance.

During public comments Rebecca Newman introduced herself as the new Fluvanna Education Association president.

"I'm hoping to be proactive rather than reactive," Newman said.

Superintendent Peter Gretz said staff having to quarantine because of COVID-19 exposure won't have to use their sick leave and won't be docked pay. The policy will be retroactive to the beginning of the year.

Gretz said he's seen no abuse of this policy.

During his report, Gretz said a person

at each school will be designated to help coordinate with those learning at home whether because of quarantine or other long-term situation.

There is a higher volume of absences whether based on truancy or parental nervousness about quarantine, Gretz said.

Pullen said the message to parents of not sending their students to school if they have symptoms could be one reason for the lower attendance.

Gretz said he's sent two notices to families about signing up for Virtual Virginia. Sign up for the second semester begins Nov. 1

Director of Elementary Instruction and Federal Programs Gemma Soares and Executive Director Brenda Gilliam presented student assessment data. A full report can be found at https://go.boarddocs. com/vsba/fluco/Board.nsf/Public

Gretz pointed out that there were decreases in participation because many of the tests weren't required.

The achievement report showed Fluvanna students doing better than the state average in many areas.

"I'm very proud of this data and I had

nothing to do with it," Gretz said. "Kudos to the instructional team, to you and (former superintendent) Mr. (Chuck) Winkler."

On the other hand, Gretz said, teachers see a lot of students who don't have foundational skills and those skills won't come back guickly.

"The impact of last year will take a long time to recover from," he said.

Gretz said the COVID-19 mitigation plan is working well.

The district had 88 positive cases among staff and students since the beginning of the school year.

An additional 104 had to quarantine because of close contact with someone who tested positive. Of those quarantined, only 11 tested positive for COVID-19.

Gretz suggested a change in quarantine policy with the idea of balancing health and wellness of students and academic needs.

Right now if a person is symptomatic they must quarantine 14 days. If not symptomatic the person in quarantine can return to school on the 10th day with a negative test.

Gretz suggested if a non-symptomatic

quarantining person has a negative test after five days, they be cleared to return on day seven.

The Board agreed.

In other matters, Johnson suggested starting a day care center in the schools. It would serve staff and could possibly tie into a child-care instruction career tract. A discussion followed.

She also suggested having a staff liaison attend Board meetings as a way to get staff input on budget negotiations. Johnson said she thought the Fluvanna Educations Association could choose the liaison.

Pullen said he was against either a staff representative or collective bargaining.

Gretz suggested the role of staff liaison be clearly defined if the Board decides to have one.

No decision was made on either proposal.

The School Board budget seminar is scheduled for Oct. 20.

"You remember I have told you recently of the old sounds that barely linger, mere whispers, in our frantic, modern atmosphere, sounds that used to make Scottsville feel safe and children secure in their trundle beds; the old steam train coming around the Horseshoe Bend, and later, twilight games of hide and seek by the depot, someone calling, 'all-ee, all-ee in free." The lamplighter clattering by, bringing a warm glow to the evening streets; the rustle of water on the weeds and rocks by the ferry landing; cows on the hill, impatiently waiting to be called in for the evening milking at Valmont.

"But behind every sound of comfort and cheer, you must be aware, as well as I am, of the loss and despair of some torment or tragedy. Sad sounds, ominous sounds, sounds still echoing ..."

These are the opening lines of a chapter in Ruth W. Klippstein's forthcoming book, *Stories of Scottsville: Tales of a Small Virginia Town*. These words remind us of the Twilight Tours, which for seven years lit of the streets of Scottsville in late October with lively impersonations of spirits of the past. Foundation receives \$11,000 donation prior to fund drive launc

Even before the Lake Monticello Community Foundation's official fundraising launch later this week to raise \$100,000 to create an all-inclusive playground at Lake Monticello, the effort got a huge boost with an \$11,000 donation from Charlottesville's Mill Creek Orthodontics.

Dr. Markus Niepraschk presented an \$11,000 check to the Foundation Monday afternoon to buy a piece of equipment for the playground. That donation will double what the Foundation has already collected from a yard sale and other donations.

"Dr. Markus"—as he is called by his patients—said he is in the business of smiles and hopes his donation not only brings many smiles at the enhanced playground for years to come, but inspires other businesses to donate too. The father of five said he is proud to be involved in this project.

This Thursday at 9 a.m. the Foundation will officially kick off the \$100,000 fund drive at Lake Monticello's Lafayette Park-the park slated to receive the enhancements. The updated playground will be designed to be a unique playground where children of all abilities can play side-by-side.

"We're already off to a great start with fundraising," said Foundation President Nancy Parsons, noting a fundraiser and some generous donors, including Dr. Marcus, have already contributed more than 22 percent of the goal. She said the Foundation plans to begin building the new playground in the spring.

"Dr. Marcus is our largest donor so far and we are thrilled by his contribution," she added.

The Lake Monticello Owners' Association (LMOA) has approved building the playground expansion on LMOA land adjacent to the existing playground. The plan calls for adding inclusive playground equipment, installing a surface designed for maximum mobility and safety for all, and fencing the play area.

"The new, inclusive playground will be fun for all kids, not just those with physical or other challenges," said Foundation board member Alan Stewart. "The new surface will be great for wheelchairs or walkers, but it will be better and safer for all kids—allowing children of all abilities to play together."

It will also be much more convenient

for parents and grandparents with mobility issues to take children to the playground, Stewart noted.

Such a playground is definitely needed. Fluvanna County Schools have identified at least 130 students at Lake Monticello with special needs. Also, some parents and grandparents have mobility issues which the playground will help solve. Only a few dozen all-inclusive playgrounds are currently in use in Virginia.

Teri Morgan, executive director of the Virginia Board for People with Disabilities, said the Lafayette playground "is an excellent example of how the needs of people with disabilities can be effectively incorporated into communities, making them better for all people...The Virginia Board for People with Disabilities supports inclusive and accessible opportunities for all children to play together. Our vision statement supports opportunities for Virginians with developmental and other disabilities to direct their own lives and choose how they live, learn, work, and play."

The project will have no cost for the homeowners' association. The Lake Monticello Community Foundation will raise

the full initial cost, though LMOA staff may help with some work such as landscaping. LMOA will also maintain the playground, just as it does others in the Lake community of some 12,000 residents

"We're quite confident we can make this fundraising campaign a success," Parsons said. The Foundation is applying for private grants and will seek individual donations from local companies and residents. It also plans an extensive list of fundraisers, including the Christmas Memory Tree, teas and other fundraisers at private homes, the Christmas Festival of Trees, donation dinners at local restaurants, a Penguin Plunge, basketball and golf tournaments, a shredding event, a color run and contributions for Foundations volunteers' work at Lake triathlons.

The goal is a unique playground where children of all abilities can play side-byside. A place where children who use wheelchairs, walkers or braces, or who have sensory or developmental issues can have parallel playground experiences with more-abled children.

In the Foundation's 18 months of existence, it has already made grants to Lake Monticello Fire & Rescue, provided free season-long swimming pool passes to 40 needy persons, organized parades at the Lake and Fourth of July activities, organized a Christmas wreath and decorating contest, conducted a car show fundraiser for the Disabled American Veterans, and is planning to grant scholarships to local high school students who demonstrate service to the community.
