School Board - minus two - discusses budget

The Fluvanna School Board held its first budget seminar for Fiscal Year 2023 Wednesday (Oct. 20) at 8 a.m. and its first with new Superintendent Peter Gretz.

Two Board members, Andrew Pullen (Columbia) and Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) who are running for re-election, did not attend. The pair joined other conservative candidates at the Turkeysag Shopping Center for a "Coffee with the Candidates" event from 8-9 a.m.

On a video posted on the conservative candidate for School Board in the Rivanna District's Facebook page, Pullen and Rittenhouse put out a plea for votes.


One theme touched upon in the video is a promise to make sure parents are included in educational decisions and not people "who don't even know where Fluvanna is."

Meanwhile Chair Perrie Johnson (Fork Union), Shirley Stewart (Rivanna) and James Kelley (Palmyra) consulted with Gretz on budget priorities.

Gretz shared highlights of a survey he conducted asking parents, staff and the community about educational spending concerns

Of the 125 respondents, 74 were parents, 70 staff, three community members and one student.

Out of 25 cost saving measures sug-

- Sustainable garden for cafeteria;
- Combine health insurance with the county;
- Reduce funding for athletics; cancel football;
- Ask retired military personnel to volunteer in schools;
- Offer professional development virtually.
- The survey also asked for suggestions on new program or spending ideas. Respondents came up with 53 recommendations, including:
- Free lunch and breakfast;
- Lower student/teacher ratio;
- Better buses;
- More hands-on learning, less testing and homework;
- More mental health and instructional support positions.

Johnson wanted to find ways to equalize planning time for teachers. She said there seemed to be more time scheduled for those teaching upper grades than elementary. Johnson also suggested making a focus on students who aren't college bound by helping them with interview skills and other classes geared to finding a job.

Kelley said he wanted to discuss paying staff better.

Stewart said she wanted to focus on building a budget for the future with a focus on schools doing what they should for students.

Gretz said he will keep the survey up on the school website and to work through issues that are "global and come up often."

Executive Director for Instruction and Finance Brenda Gilliam shared the most recent funding figures from 2020. Out of 11 central Virginia counties and Charlottesville, Fluvanna is second to last in per pupil funding at \$11,185 per student. Only Orange spends less per pupil (\$10,990) than Fluvanna.

The state average is \$13,241.

Student enrollment for 2021-22 school year was projected to be 3,415. However, it hasn't reached that and is likely to settle around 3,271, Gilliam said.

The state promised not to cut funding for enrollment decreases this year.

Gilliam said in every gubernatorial election year, there are more unknowns than is typical regarding the budget.

Governor Ralph Northam will present his budget before the year is out. But there will be a new governor sworn in and he will present a budget. Also, the General Assembly will change, so that adds another wrinkle in the system.

Gretz said the good thing is state revenue has gone up steadily over the years.

"The forecast in Virginia is fantastic. Something like \$4.6 billion in increased revenue," Gretz said. "It grew by 15 percent due largely to non-withholding income revenue."

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
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Let the playground fundraising begin

Laker Jennifer Valentine, director of special education for Fluvanna schools, told the audience she knew of at least four families within a four-block radius of the new playground that would benefit from the planned playground updates. "This idea is just so inspirational," she said. Valentine had said previously that there are at least 130 children in the area who could benefit from the playground.

"I want to thank LMOA for putting together a work group of staff, LMOA board and Foundation members to develop a plan for the playground," Parsons said Thursday in prepared remarks. "We are indebted to that group for their diligence and determination to make this happen!" She said the group included LMOA Board members Jay Hinkle and Larry Henson, LMOA Staff members Director of Operations Tom Schauder and General Manager Steve Hurwitz and Foundation Board Members Alan Stewart and Scott Mein.

Since the Lake Monticello Community Foundation was founded two and a half years ago, it has given grants to Lake Monticello Fire and Rescue and to families who could not afford season's pool passes, Parsons said, adding "We have sponsored a number of activities and are planning to award community service grants to students and to give grants to organizations that support community needs, but our most ambitious project is this playground."

Parsons said the Foundation is especially grateful to people like "the very generous Dr. Niepraschk" for giving us a great head start to our goal of \$100,000. Dr. Markus, as his patients at Mill Creek Orthodontics call him, presented an \$11,000 check on Monday doubling the Foundation's playground total, bringing it to \$22,000 raised so far.

Dr. Marcus said at Thursday's official kickoff ceremony that as the father of five children (one of them with special needs), the playground project spoke to him. "I love the idea of lots of smiles here as we make this playground even more inclusive," Dr. Marcus said. "I hope other local businesses jump in and contribute. I think the Foundation will reach its goal way before May!"

Schauder also praised Dr. Markus. Thank you, Dr. Markus, for your generosity...your work as a dentist brings smiles to the faces of many, and your generosity will bring smiles and joy to many more in the years to come," Schauder said. "Bringing everyone together at this playground site builds community and fosters friendship."

"The positivity of this project is infectious, and we are very grateful for it," said Schauder. He said the new playground will "bring more smiles, more laughter and more joy" to the entire community, and the work of the Foundation "represents teamwork, generosity, and simply paying it forward."

An inclusive playground simply means "all children can play" in it, Parsons said. She said it will be used by children with "a wide spectrum of abilities," including being fun for the fully-abled, and will "encourage acceptance and belonging" among children of all abilities. "This is truly a game-changer for Lake Monticello," she said.







Fluvanna County Redistricting Committee: Seven District Scenario 2



County unveils preliminary redistricting maps

The Board of Supervisors got its first look at potential new voting districts during a redistricting work session ahead of its regular meeting on Wednesday (Oct. 20).

County Administrator Eric Dahl presented a series of maps showing the county split into five, six, and seven districts, based on the new-ly-released 2020 Census numbers.

Under Virginia law, localities must redistrict every decade in the year following the national census.

While redistricting can be a complex process, the general guidelines are straightforward: districts have to be about equal in population size, they have to be geographically compact, they have to be contiguous, and they have to avoid any sort of racial or other demographic bias.

Supervisors are also prohibited from splitting census blocks, a geographic unit defined by the Census Bureau.

Assistant County Administrator Kelly Belanger Harris said Fluvanna had fewer census blocks in 2020 than in the previous census. Supervisor Tony O'Brien (Rivanna), who sits on the redistricting committee, noted that this provides an additional challenge, as the population within each census block can vary quite a bit in size, "with some being 600 and some being eight."

Growth to the West

The census numbers show that Fluvanna's population has grown primarily along the western half of the county. O'Brien said "45 percent of the county [population is] concentrated within about two miles of the Lake."

According to adjusted census numbers from the Virginia Department of Legislative Services, Palmyra gained 885 residents and Cunningham grew by 403, while Columbia lost 971 residents and Fork Union lost 197. Rivanna, which encompasses much of Lake Monticello, added only 71 residents.

To keep at the current level of five districts, Palmyra and Cunningham would have to shed some population, and Columbia and Fork Union would have to gain some. Each district would have approximately 5,285 residents.

Dahl presented two scenarios, each showing the boundaries of Fork Union and Columbia pushing west into the developments that have grown around Lake Monticello.

He also introduced a map showing the county split into six districts of roughly 4,381 residents. Here, the borders of Fork Union and Columbia would shift less dramatically, but the western end of Lake Monticello and the growing developments on that side of the county would split into a new district.

Finally, he showed two different scenarios for a seven-district county, with each district containing around 3,756 residents.

One idea is to create two districts around Lake Monticello, one along the south side of the lake down to Rt. 53 between South Boston Road and Nahor Manor Road, and a second hugging the north side of the lake from South Boston Road to the western border of the county, and extend along one side of Mechunk Creek north almost as far as I-64.

The second map envisions the Lake split into two districts above and below Jackson Cove, and also creating a large V-shaped district between the current Palmyra and Columbia districts, ending at Central Plains Road. O'Brien said he felt this was the scenar-

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io that would work best for the long-term growth of the county population, as development was clearly going to remain concentrated on the western side of Rt. 15 over the next 10 to 20 years.

Equal representation

During the discussions about the merits of each scenario, some of the emotional and practical issues that surround redistricting came to the forefront.

Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia) stressed that he wasn't trying ot make it "us and them," but especially in the five-district scenarios, the 45 percent of residents who live in the population center in and around Lake Monticello would be represented by 80 percent of the supervisors.

At five districts, there is no way for Columbia and Fork Union to reach 5,258 residents unless they absorb some of that western population.

But with that sort of over-representation, "you could end up with somebody representing the entire east side of the county that has never been to the east side of the county," he said. "I just want to make sure that each voice is heard equally."

No matter what the final map looks like, voting locations are likely to move for many Fluvanna residents.

O'Brien said that this was perhaps the biggest complaint following the previous redistricting in 2010. "The more you move people around, the more it frustrates folks from that standpoint. It's just human nature," he said.

Legal ramifications

County Attorney Fred Payne also weighed in with his perspective on the ramifications of expanding the number of districts.

In his opinion, a five-district scenario "will be easier to administer and less inclined to have somebody challenged if somebody wants to challenge. It's also less costly to the county."

Adding one to two seats would require a special election and two more annual salaries to the county budget. The School Board and the Social Services Board would also have to add additional seats, and Supervisors would have to decide if they wanted to expand the Planning Commission.

"I guess I'm just a simple-minded kind of guy," said Payne. "It's easier to have a simple solution than a more sophisticated one. I'm not saying you can't do it or you shouldn't do it, but that's the way I view the pros and cons."

Next steps

Wednesday's work sessions as just one more step in a process that will continue for the next several weeks.

Plans are underway to hold one or more community meetings to introduce the different plans to residents.

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FOL ends the year with mystery writer

The Friends of the Library will welcome Fred Shackelford on Nov. 3 at 10 a.m. to discuss his book, "The Ticket," a suspense novel about a lottery ticket and a lot of money. This will be FOL's last program of 2021. With COVID they were able to eke out two programs and the annual book sale and hope 2022 will be a little brighter for more programming.

First-time novelist Shackelford has written a thriller that readers have raved about and have called a page-turner that burns and blisters the fingers with deliciously evil plot twists and a surprise ending. Shackelford is far more modest about his journey to write his first novel. With an undergraduate degree in economics and a law degree, lotteries and legalities are his field of expertise. Whereas the law worked for John Grisham in his legal thrillers, Shackelford is not looking for the end-game glory but seeing where the journey would take him.

A character-driven book that builds suspense, his protagonist, Channing Booker is a compulsive gambler, drug abuser, and philanderer; an overall loser whose marriage is crashing miserably. When everything seemed like it was closing in on him, Channing wins the Mega Bucks Lottery. Hoping for a quick divorce, he devises a plan to hide his fortune from his soon-to-be ex-wife. He plans to have a friend claim the \$241-million jackpot and secretly return the money to Channing after the divorce is final. But Susan leaves town with all her things, including the rare book in which Channing hid the winning lottery ticket. With time running out before the lottery ticket expires, Channing desperately searches for Susan, but she's covered her tracks well, fearing retaliation. To support herself, Susan begins selling possessions, including her rare books, unleashing a chain of events that puts not only her life in danger but others as well.

"I've never won much money in the Powerball or Mega Millions games, but I won \$1,000 when I bought my first scratch ticket," said Shakelford. "Five months ago, three of the six winning numbers for a \$515 million Mega Millions jackpot matched the numbers of the winning lottery ticket in my novel. Unfortunately, the prize for matching three numbers was only \$10." His winning numbers were 6, 9, 17, 18, 48, 8. In his book, the winning numbers were 2, 6, 9, 17, 55, 12. Shackelford considers himself a mix of plotter and punster when it comes to writing.

"When I started writing The Ticket, all I had in mind was the beginning and the end, so I just started writing and decided to see how it would go. I had no real concept of the "middle part" until I had written a couple of chapters," he said. "At that point. I had thought of some ideas to develop the whole plot, and I decided to write a rough outline. I plotted each chapter in a couple of sentences, describing the key events that would unfold in that chapter. As a rookie novelist, I hesitate to give writing advice, but if any aspiring writer asks me, I would recommend preparing an outline before starting a novel. Without an outline, there's a risk that you won't have enough material to carry the plot, and the book might fizzle out after a few chapters."

Many challenges face novelists, particularly first-time novelists. Staying engaged and keeping the momentum going is key to completion but how a writer views the journey can be what prompts the next novel, if there is one.

"I think the biggest challenge in writing any kind of novel is figuring out how to hold a reader's interest through several hundred pages of text. To do that, I introduced several subplots to keep the readers guessing," he said. "My novel is about a winning lottery jackpot ticket that is missing. Lottery tickets expire and become worthless if they aren't cashed in within 180 days. One of the challenges in writing "The Ticket" was timing. I tried to ratchet up the tension as the lottery deadline approached, timing it so that the search for the missing ticket would go down to the wire. I jotted down my clues and key plot events on an actual calendar to guide me as I wrote the book." According to his readers' reviews, he accomplished what he set out to do.

Though he is categorized as suspense, it has mystery. Channing needs to investigate and follow the clues to his wife's whereabouts to find the ticket and this element is what Shackelford enjoyed and what most mystery writers savor when putting the literary puzzle together.

"I enjoy sprinkling clues throughout the story to give readers a chance to unravel the mystery. I also like to develop interesting characters, often through their dialogue, and I try to include enough action to keep the plot flowing quickly."

He said he has experienced many forms of writing, from essays when he was at Woodberry-Forest where his father taught, to writing poems for family members, including grandchildren, to writing legal briefs. His first book was a departure from his current work. Titled *"Judges Say The Darndest Things,"* the book is a collection of humorous excerpts from legal cases. For some writing a novel could be compared to running a marathon and getting to the finish line has its rewards. He says "getting to the end" is one of the things he likes about writing in general.

"Writing can be tedious, so I feel a real sense of accomplishment when I write the last word of a story. It's like crossing the finish line in a race. There's a catch, though. It's hard to decide when a novel or short story is finished," he said. "Usually you have to go back and revise and polish your story. I was naive when I wrote the final chapter of "*The Ticket*." I thought my work was over, but I quickly realized that I needed to edit the manuscript to take out unnecessary material that was bogging it down. Eventually, I whittled my initial draft of 117,000 words down to the final version of 93,000 words."

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Fluco football team loses 8-0 in overtime

It was the Flying Flucos' Homecoming game. The crowd was large and the play on the field was spirited. Despite the fact that neither team scored in 48 minutes of regulation play, the game was entertaining and interesting. There were a number of big plays but both sides had some of their biggest plays called back for offensive holding penalties. There were turnovers and there were fourth down stops resulting in changes of possession. The Warriors from Western Albemarle High School had a long field goal try, but it was no good.

In high school football, if the score is tied after regulation play, each team gets to try to score from the ten-yard line, and if one team outscores the other, the game is over. The visiting team goes first, and Western Albemarle ran for two and three yards on its first two downs. Their quarterback then ran a sweep to the left and just got in for the touchdown before being forced out of bounds. The Warriors lined up to kick the extra point, but a bad snap forced their holder to run to his right and at the last second he spotted a receiver in the end zone and hit him with a pass for the two-point conversion.

The Flucos now started at the ten-yard line, with a tall order. If they did not score a touchdown and a two-point extra point they would lose. It was not to be. On first down, junior quarterback Owen Leydig handed to Addison Patchett for a two-yard gain. On second down, Leydig threw for Patchett in the right corner of the end zone. Patchett made the catch, but the throw was just too far right and Patchett came down out of bounds. On third, a Leydig pass was knocked down. On fourth and eight Leydig was forced out of the pocket and had to throw a desperation toss. The Warriors intercepted and the game was over.

Coach Michael Morris' squad played an outstanding game against an imposing opponent. The Warriors were decidedly taller and heavier than the Flucos, but the Fluco defenders worked hard all night and made a number of swarming team tackles. Frankly, the Flucos were not expected to be competitive. The Warriors came in with a 6-1 record, while the Flucos came in 2-5. The Warriors won, but they were in a real battle.

The Flucos started the game with a surprise passing attack. Leydig opened with a pass to junior Jacob Seymore for 19 yards. He then hit Patchett for nine yards and Seymore again for nine more. Unfortunately, a ten-yard penalty set the Flucos back and they gave up the ball on downs at the Western 31. The Warriors started to march down the field on the ground but their drive was stopped when they fumbled and the Flucos recovered. The teams then exchanged punts and the first quarter was scoreless.

On the Flucos' first possession of the second quarter Leydig made an impressive run dodging a number of defenders, but as he went down at the Western Albemarle 20, he fumbled and the Warriors recovered. The first half ended with a long pass by the Warriors that Leydig intercepted at the Fluco nine. In the third quarter both teams ran the ball almost exclusively, so the quarter went quickly. Both teams had big plays called back due to penalties.

Early in the fourth quarter the Warriors were facing fourth and three at the Fluco 20. Rather than go for the first down, they choose to attempt a field goal. The kick was wide left and the Flucos took over. The Flucos ran off a lot of clock, moving the ball down field, but an interception turned the ball back to the Warriors late in the game. The Warriors could manage only one first down and the Flucos intercepted a long desperate pass. The game was scoreless after four quarters. Overtime followed.

After the game, Coach Morris noted that senior fullback/linebacker Chase Paschall was outstanding throughout the game on defense, and he is a grinding power runner. Morris described Paschall as "definitely our team leader." The Flucos offense after the early passing spree was mostly on the ground. The burden was split between Leydig and Paschall, with senior Kobe Edmonds and Patchett contributing as well.

The Fluco season is winding down. On Oct. 29, the Flucos travel to Charlottesville to take on the Black Knights. Their regular season finale is on Nov. 5 when they host the Albemarle Patriots



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Lake Monticello women golfers win third consecutive Jefferson Cup
