Kesa is a super sweet lady. She loves to be petted and cuddled. Kesa came to the shelter as a stray and was never reclaimed.

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
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Flucos will be running, pressing

The Fluvanna County High School's boys' basketball Coach Heath Bralley said that he expects that his team will be playing up tempo this season with a lot of running and pressing. A couple of forecourt contributors from last season have graduated and one of the team's top scores from a year ago has transferred out. The team does not have a lot of height, but it does have some very talented back court players and Bralley described a lot of his squad as "hard working."

As of the time of this article the starting line-up was not certain, but Bralley suggested that it might likely be as follows. Guards, Kobe Edmonds, Bobby Gardner and Lance Bruce, and forwards, Blaise Silverman and Kenyon Smith. None of these players is taller than 6-1. A three guard and two forward alignment is quite common now at all levels of basketball now that the three-point shot has become so important.

Although lack of size may be a problem, there is some serious talent here. Anyone who has followed Fluco basketball knows that Edmonds is in his fourth year as a back court starter. Bralley describes him as "the rock" of the team, very smart, very talented and very experienced. Edmonds can hit the three-point shot and is a ferocious driver to the basket. Gardner is back with the Flucos after a year at Fork Union Military Academy. He has good size for a guard, has a good shot and is described by Bralley as "very quick." These two may be a force on defense forcing quite a few turnovers.

The third starting guard will probably be Bruce, a junior who got serious playing time in the shortened season last year. Smith at forward is a junior who got a lot of playing time last year. Silverman may be the tallest starter at 6-1, and he too got important playing time last season. Bralley has a 13-player squad and there is some height and size that will be available off the bench.

Mason Blackburn is around 6-2 and is described as very physical. A player with a lot of potential is 6-4 freshman Benny Denby. Grant Brown is also expected to be a force off the bench in forecourt. He may only be about 6-0, but he was second team All-Jefferson District as an offensive and defensive lineman. He is expected to be able to throw some weight around. Backcourt back-ups will include, Tyler Coleman, who Bralley describes as "a natural shooter," Clayton Cannady, a physical junior who is around 5-10. Quanir Payne and J.J. Glasscock are hard workers, while Chazz Barksdale-White also works hard and he is only a sophomore.

Bralley expects that the usual suspects will be his team's major competition in the coming season. He mentioned Albemarle, Western Albemarle and Charlottesville. However, he noted that he expects to be "in the hunt."

The regular season for the Flucos started on Dec. 1 with a game at Waynesboro. The home opener will be on Friday Dec. 3 against non-district opponent Chancellor High. On Dec. 7 the Fluco boys travel to Chancellor High and on Dec. 14 they play their first Jefferson District game, hosting Charlottesville High. After that they play four non-conference games, and they don't have another Jefferson District contest until the new year.

The Lake Monticello Rescue Squad will offer an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course beginning Jan. 6. Persons taking the course can become certified EMTs, qualifying them to volunteer with the squad or others, or to apply for professional EMT positions.

"This is a non-traditional course via an online platform," said Rescue Squad Chief Eddie Shifflett. He said students must have access to the internet, have CPR certification and be proficient in English. Classes meet Tuesday evenings

6-10 p.m. and 9 a.m.-5 p.m. some Saturdays. The 16-week course costs \$1,195. (Scholarships are available through the Office of EMS).

"Getting your EMT has several benefits," Shifflett said. "It offers you the ability to give back to your community. And it also provides a skill and a national certification that can be used anywhere in the nation. If you're looking for a career in emergency medical services, it's the foundation."

There's a definite shortage of qualified

EMTs, both at the national level and at the all-volunteer Lake Monticello department, Shifflett said. Volunteers staff Lake Monticello Rescue seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

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

Virginia Humanities awards grant to Fluvanna Historical Society for cemetery work

A \$11,900 grant from the Virginia Humanities will be used to support ongoing work in Columbia and West Bottom, where archaeological surveys of two historic Black cemeteries have recently been completed. "The final archaeological report, which we expect to receive in the next month, serves as the foundation of our work going forward in Columbia and West Bottom," said Tricia Johnson, executive director of the Fluvanna Historical Society. "There is still so much work to be done in collaboration with local residents," she added. "These two communities have a rich and inspirational past – and yet, that past is relatively unstudied and certainly untold. We look forward to continuing our efforts working alongside community members to rediscover and relate the stories of the lives lived in these remarkable places."

Future projects may include fencing the historic cemeteries of Free Hill and Oak Hill, installing markers on unmarked graves, and creating historical interpretive signage. Decisions about what work to do, and the specifics of the projects, are in the hands of the communities themselves. "We see our role as that of facilitator," said Johnson. "With these archaeological reports in hand - which include maps of all of the unmarked burials that were located - we will discuss with citizens of each area the possibilities for restoring and preserving these sacred spaces. The communities themselves - based around Columbia Baptist Church and West Bottom Baptist Church - will decide which projects to undertake."

Volunteers known as community historians are already hard at work,

digging through archival records and arranging for elder interviews to take place. "In West Bottom," Johnson said, "Nadine Armstrong and Melissa Hill have searched funeral home records and death certificates and have identified more than 100 people buried in unmarked graves at Oak Hill Cemetery. Thanks to the efforts of Maxine Baskfield-Spears, Carolyn Tinsley, and Stephanie Baskfield, we have already conducted several elder interviews in Columbia, which are helping us better understand the findings at Free Hill Cemetery.

The SHARP grant, awarded by Virginia Humanities, was designed to help support programming in non-profit humanities organizations that have seen a reduction in income caused by the current pandemic. Funding has been provided to the Fluvanna Historical Society from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) as part of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021. NEH is committed to Sustaining the Humanities through the American Rescue Plan (SHARP).

PVCC nursing programs ranks in top 15 for Virginia

The Piedmont Virginia Community College (PVCC) Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) program has been designated a top U.S. nursing program in the Nursing Schools Almanac 2021 rankings. PVCC ranked in the top 15 for the state of Virginia.

PVCC's two-year associate degree in nursing program prepares graduates to be contributing members of health care teams, providing direct patient care as practitioners of professional nursing in structured care settings. The PVCC ADN program provides an affordable, timely path to licensure as a registered nurse.

"We are excited to be named with so many great schools in this nursing program ranking. PVCC graduates the best nurses, and we hear this often from the area healthcare institutions that hire our graduates. In fact, University of Virginia Health has partnered with us to expand our nursing program to help produce more nurses throughout the



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year, thereby helping to address the area's nursing shortage," stated PVCC Dean of Health and Life Sciences Nicole Winkler.

The ADN program currently accepts 100 students each fall, and through the recently announced expansion, will also admit 50 students in a new cohort each spring, beginning in 2022. The fall entry program graduates students in May; the new spring cohort affords the opportunity to produce nursing graduates in December, increasing the overall volume of available resources and providing a constant flow of qualified nurses for the area. Most PVCC nursing graduates stay in Central Virginia with UVA Medical Center employing approximately 30 PVCC nursing graduates each year. Sentara Martha Jefferson and other healthcare facilities in the area also employ high numbers of PVCC ADN program graduates.

Exhibit celebrates Yancey School

In 2017, the Albemarle County School Board decided to close Yancey Elementary School in Esmont and move the children attending it to Red Hill and Scottsville schools.

In the wake of that decision, the B.F. Yancey Heritage and History Project started to work on an exhibit to celebrate the cultural importance of the school to the community of Esmont in southern Albemarle County.

This exhibit, "Making a Way Out of No Way," is a celebration of African-American education in Virginia. The exhibit is in the main entryway of the school, and consists of wonderful vintage photos and texts, from the opening of the first schools for Black children after the Civil War. For the ADN program rankings, the Nursing Schools Almanac research team compiled an extensive database of student performance on the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). Aspiring registered nurses in the United States must pass this exam before commencing practice. Nursing Schools Almanac used their database to calculate each program's NCLEX-RN pass rate among first-time test-takers. This is the standard program assessment metric reported by Pearson Vue (the test's administrator) and the Virginia Board of Nursing. these schools was the Glendower School in Keene, which was opened by the Freedman's Bureau in 1869. When Reconstruction came to an end, Black communities were on their own.

The earliest schools focused on primary education, but it was the vision of Benjamin F. Yancey that Black students deserved to advance further. In 1912, a School League was organized, and the school was expanded to grades 1 through 8. In the 1930s to the 1950s, Esmont High School served the upper grades until students moved to Jackson Burley High School in Charlottesville.

Yancey School is regularly open on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

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

Growers: Virginia Christmas trees are a key part of holiday traditions

More than 10,000 acres of pine, spruce and fir trees are grown on 500 Virginia Christmas tree farms, and that's good news for families whose holiday traditions include choosing a fresh Christmas tree.

Whether hand-cut or purchased from a local retailer, the state's growers insist there's nothing like the real thing. Their Virginia-grown Christmas trees illuminate homes statewide and brighten up living spaces from Ohio to Puerto Rico.

"Every local tree you can find will be sold this year," predicted Ryan Clouse, president of the Virginia Christmas Tree Growers Association and a grower with Clouse's Pine Hill Farm in Frederick County, a choose-and-cut operation. "Already-tight supplies were further impacted by heat and fires in Oregon, which is the largest tree-producing state," he said. "It's best to come the first weekend after Thanksgiving to have the best selection of trees!" Clouse's Pine Hill Farm was established in 1977 when Ryan's parents, Ron and Roberta Clouse, allowed FFA students to plant pine trees on their property for a project. The first crop of pines was harvested in 1984, and the family continues to plant 1,000 seedlings a year. About 15,000 spruce, fir and pine trees currently are growing on 20 acres.

"We like to see families coming back sometimes generations of the same families—who are really plugged into the Christmas tradition," Clouse said.

A crop that requires more than five years of cultivation is often harvested in a single weekend by families dedicated to the choose-and-cut tradition. Armed with saws, blankets, tarps and ropes, some of them line up at 9 a.m. on Black Friday to choose their trees.

Other families skip the saw and purchase fresh trees from local retailers. Many U.S. stores are supplied by wholesale growers like Bottomley Evergreens and Farms in Grayson County. Bottomley is Virginia's largest Christmas tree farm and plants 1 million seedlings annually on 600 acres.

"This year we'll cut around 600,000 (trees)," said Carlos Taylor, Bottomley's Christmas tree manager. "They'll go to Texas, parts of New Jersey and New York, Ohio, part of Florida and down to Puerto Rico."

Virginia Christmas tree sales top \$10 million annually, and the state is ranked seventh nationwide for harvest and production of fir, pine and spruce trees.

"And Fraser firs are the Cadillac," Taylor said. "They grow better in the Blue Ridge Mountains than anywhere else. But you can't pop a tree in the ground today and be ready to sell it this year."

Workers hand-harvest most trees in the seventh year following a multi-season regimen of trimming and shaping. Cut trees are chilled for freshness prior to shipping.



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Fire department costs up, funding down

Cost increases, many related to the pandemic, are making the annual fund drive of Lake Monticello Volunteer Fire & Rescue more important than ever, LMVFR officials said. The pandemic resulted in less county funding, less bingo revenue, and significantly higher operating and equipment costs, they said.

The fund drive now underway has a \$120,000 goal, LMVFR officials said. The pandemic has had less impact on fundraising than you might imagine, said John Lye, the department's head of water rescue. But other funding sources have been reduced, even as costs went up, he said.

"We've really been affected by the county's willingness to provide funds," Lye said. "They completely eliminated all CIP funds one year, citing COVID-related revenue decreases, and we have been playing catch up ever since. Meanwhile, all costs are going up, including vehicle repair costs, personal protective equipment costs, fuel costs, and apparatus replacements costs"

Gasoline and diesel costs have "almost doubled," said Fire Chief Richard Constantino, and propane costs also increased. "Firefighting personal protective gear (boots, coats, helmets, pants) costs have increased dramatically," Constantino said. "They've almost doubled for certain items compared to pre-pandemic. He said the \$85 cost of a pair of firefighting gloves, for example, has increased by 75 percent since the pandemic.

Even if it's available instead of sitting on ships, the cost of firefighting apparatus costs "has increased about 10 percent in the last year and half," with another substantial price increase expected Feb. 1. That means a \$160,000 increase in the cost of a \$1.6 million fire truck, for example, due to price increases of steel, aluminum and other factors that trickle down to the department. And it's often taking 18 months to receive a new fire truck, vs one year a year ago, Constantino said.

Meanwhile, LMVFR buildings are aging and need more maintenance and repairs, and "all those costs have increased," Constantino said. "Our fundraising helps offset our operational expenses that the county does not fully fund, as well as the building repair and improvements that are constantly needed," Lye said.

And it doesn't look like getting better anytime soon, Constantino said: "The future is very uncertain."

But the requirements for new equipment, most of which are financed by donations, continue. The Lake Monticello Volunteer Rescue Squad recently bought a new Road Rescue Ultramedic Type 1 ambulance with many nice features such as a front and rear liquid spring suspension system and LED Lighting.



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Virginia growers present grand champion tree and wreaths to governor's family

A Canaan fir seedling planted 10 years ago has grown into the tree that will debut this Christmas season at the Virginia Executive Mansion

The grand champion tree and handmade wreaths, selected by a three-judge panel for the annual Virginia Christmas Tree Growers Association competition, was delivered to Gov. Ralph Northam and his family on Nov. 29.

Tree entries are judged on straightness, fullness and overall health and color in the contest that celebrates the diverse variety of Virginia-grown Christmas trees. Trees and wreaths were judged at the association's annual meeting in August.

This year's grand champion fir was grown by Louisa County Farm Bureau members Virginia and John Carroll of Claybrooke Farms. They have planted trees on 25 acres since 1984, and their trees previously have been presented to former governors Bob McDonnell and Terry McAuliffe.

"It was a nice surprise because there were a good number of entries in the contest this year," John Carroll said. "We are honored to win and present the tree to Gov. Northam and the first lady at the mansion."

August's winning Canaan fir was 7.5 feet tall with green-blue hues, a pleasant aroma and sturdy branches. A similar, somewhat larger Canaan fir will have a holiday home at the governor's mansion.

"The contest encourages growers to continue to keep growing better trees, with quality at its best for our consumers," Carroll said, adding that cultivating gorgeous Christmas trees is a family endeavor.

"I didn't grow the tree by myself," he said. "But I did cut it!"

Robert O'Keeffe, who organizes the association's competitions, said four categories of trees can be grand champion—firs, pines, spruces and others, like cypress or cedar.


"Fraser fir is the Cadillac of Christmas trees. and most in-demand by consumers," he said. "But the other trees are eligible and do win."

Ken and Elaine Rhoades of Mountain View Christmas Tree Farm in Shenandoah County submitted August's grand champion wreath. The family will create similar, fresh wreaths to adorn the mansion's gates and doors.

The Rhoades' winning mixed green wreath was made with Scotch pine backing, topped with white pine, arborvitae and Turkish fir, with blue ice cypress accents.

Rhoades said his parents, Stephen and Sharon Rhoades, have long created the stylish natural wreaths, which have fetched the grand prize in past association contests.

"It promotes a little competition in the organization, plus it's a fun event," O'Keeffe said. "And it's beneficial for new growers to see the quality and variety of champion trees."





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
