

Mass shootings focus of Cariens' book

David Cariens understands what it is to lose someone in a mass shooting. His latest book, *The Murder of Angela Dales*, though written 21 years ago, is a revised and updated version with new information regarding the circumstances that surrounded her death.

In it, Cariens examines in factual detail the events that led up to the death of the mother of his oldest granddaughter. The book's revision sheds new light on the aftermath of the shooting and "his quest to find justice."

This is not Cariens first book. A prolific

writer of non-fiction, his favorite writing style, he has spent a lifetime writing for the government. A retired CIA analyst, policy writer, and teacher, non-fiction is comfortable for him. He explained that writing became a large part of what he did in his job after 9/11 during the Bush administration when congress wanted standardization of communications between departments - mainly the FBI and CIA.

After retiring and moving to Fluvanna, Cariens joined Blue Ridge Writers and other writer's groups and said he admired those who wrote fiction and poetry but was unable to embrace it himself. He wrote two memoirs which led him to write the true account of Angela Dales' death.

On January 16, 2002, his writing took him on a different journey that would lead him to gun control advocacy. After the shooting at the Appalachian Law School in Grundy, Virginia, a small town in southwest Virginia where Dales was killed and later with the mass shooting on April 16, 2007, at Virginia Tech, Cariens felt compelled to use his voice to make sense of events that could have been prevented.

In the state of Virginia, since 1988, there have been 12 mass shootings, including the shooting on June 14, 2017, of Republican Congressman Steve Scalise and others who were at baseball practice in Alexandria, Virginia. But the story of Dales and two others who were killed, and two wounded on that day in 2002, never made the list of



mass shootings in Virginia.


"A mass shooting includes three or more people," said Cariens. Some of the early cases didn't even reach three victims. But this was personal for Cariens. "I had planned to write the great southern novel but I had to expose the lies and deceit," he said, referring to his extensive research regarding the inconsistencies and loopholes in the law, flawed investigations, and the failures of public safety at the school.

His wife was leery of him writing about the event.

"She objected to me writing this book but after reading it she said, I understand why you did it." He said the subject is controversial but believes it is more important to bring it to light through the loss of Dales and perhaps find a way to prevent mass shootings. "I learned that women bring everyone together to heal and men want justice,." he said.

Yet nowadays, as it was in Uvalde, both sides demand justice. Healing comes in the aftermath.

His research turned up many disturbing aspects of the case, including that shooter Peter Odighuziwa showing early signs of violence, particularly toward women, and also to faculty, staff, and students. He



killed the dean, a professor, and Dales and wounded two others.

"He targeted her," said Cariens. "That day he chatted with and bypassed many male students but went up to her, shot her three times, and only wounded the other two women." In the book, Odighuziwa stated it was because "she was mean" to him.

He breaks down the elements of the book, from the profile of the shooter, to the

investigation, and the trial to build relevance and give meaning to the egregiousness and sadness of these all too common events. He makes sense of what is senseless and takes a realistic look at a broken system in need of attention.

He talked about Dales and her family's reaction to her death.

"She wanted to become a lawyer so she could help," he said.

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Tale of an appreciated Scottsville teacher

The first public school in Scottsville opened in 1871, pursuant to a provision in the 1870 Constitution that mandated free public schools-for white children only. One of the first teachers was Miss Willie Hickok, who claimed to be a cousin of "Wild Bill." Just before Christmas 1908 Walter Dorrier received the following printed letter:

"The present as well as the former citizens of Scottsville and community, especially those who have been her pupils, will readily vouch for the faithfulness of Miss Willie E. Hickok as a teacher. She has spent her life in the cause of Education and there are few boys and girls of this section who have not received their educational foundation from "Miss Willie." Old age and bad health have at last rendered this faithful servant of the people unable to teach, and she has been retired on a small pension from the State, about \$11 per month. Owing to the small salary paid her for teaching, she has not been able to save anything.

"Now to show our appreciation of what she has done for us, her old pupils are getting up a purse to be presented to her on Christmas Day, and the committee hereby notifies you of the fact, and asks you to send a liberal contribution for this purpose. The names of all who contribute will be sent in with the purse. Address your communications to any member of the Committee:

- "Jon. L. Pitts
- Jos. P. Blair
- Jackson Beal

There is no record of how much money was collected, but we do have Miss Willie's grateful response:

"My Dear 'Old Boys:"

You have indeed given me a "Happy Christmas," the one of my life. Such a stupendous testimonial of your kindly regard for your old teacher. Such a delightful surprise! I appreciate, more than all, the kind thoughts that prompted this tribute, the kind memories that you carry in your hearts all these years for "Miss Willie." Thank you one, thank you all for this tribute, the honor that you do me.

I have loved my work with you, I loved it with your children, and my happiest hours were spent in the old school room with my boys and girls around me.

Now, when I can work no longer for you, my great comfort is in knowing that you still love me and appreciate my efforts to help you.

The League invites the public to attend this free event. Masks are recommended, not required, in the library. Attendees may park at the Market Street parking garage one block away.



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Supervisors take first step to improving dangerous roads

Anyone who drives around the county knows Fluvanna has some dangerous intersections, narrow bridges, and blind turns – but making our roads safer can be a complicated and expensive proposition.

The Board of Supervisors took a step toward identifying and remedying some of the major problem spots during their regular meeting on Wednesday night (Sept. 7).

As Sandy Shackelford of the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) explained at the start of her presentation, the infrastructure bill recently passed by Congress allocated the US Department of Transportation (USDOT) \$5-6 billion in grant funding to distribute through the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program over the next five years. The goal of the program is to reduce roadway injuries and fatalities.

The catch? To be eligible to apply for USDOT funding, localities have first to conduct a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan.

None of the counties in the TJPDC area have done this sort of plan. To remedy this, Shackelford said the commission was applying for a grant to fund a regional study that would also include individualized plans for each locality. This approach would not only allow the commission to develop a comprehensive regional look at traffic issues, but it would also allow localities to split the cost of the studies.

By Wednesday night, the city of Charlottesville, Albemarle County, and Louisa County had opted to join the grant application. Shackelford asked the Fluvanna supervisors to approve a letter of support for the grant and commit to a local match of funds not to exceed \$30,000 should it be approved.

Noting that there were intersections and issues in the county that time had shown were "just not going to be addressed by VDOT," County Administrator Eric Dahl said his staff believed TJPDC's plan gave the county a better chance of being able to tap USDOT funding for a number of potential projects.

Supervisor Patricia Eager (Palmyra), who was participating remotely, said she often felt that the rural counties in the TJPDC didn't benefit as much as Charlottesville and Albemarle in these projects. "I'm just not sure we should go forward with this at this time, until there's more information on how the money's going to be spent and how much more, exactly, we are going to be expected to contribute," she said.

Chair Mike Sheridan (Columbia) and Supervisor Tony O'Brien (Rivanna) were more supportive, reeling off a list of several problem intersections along Rts. 600 and 618 near Lake Monticello and Paynes Mill Road, along with several other well-known accident hotspots in the county. Under the SS4A program, localities would generally be expected to match 20 percent of the requested grant amount. But Shackelford stressed those countries who participated in the comprehensive plan would not be obligated to apply for grants or take on projects outside their financial means.

She anticipated there would also be the potential to apply for regional implementation grants. "If we find, for example, something like there's an issue with left turn lanes on certain portions of roads, it's possible we could submit one application to install multiple left-turn lanes on certain kinds of roads across the region," she said.

Supervisor Chris Fairchild (Cunningham) said he wasn't sure they had enough information to go forward that night, or if they needed a comprehensive study at all.

"If it saves even one person's life, it's worth the \$30,000," said O'Brien.


Sheridan argued that they would make back that \$30,000 if they had even one successful grant application down the road, since the county's 20 percent match would potentially allow them to fund a project that would otherwise be beyond their means.

"I'm just not convinced that we're going to get the help that's being offered or suggested here," said Eager.

The motion to approve the letter of support passed on a vote of 4-1, with Eager voting against.

Other actions:

- Supervisors approved a \$2,097 funding request from TJPDC towards the development of a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for the region. They had agreed to the funding in principle at their Feb. 16 meeting;
- Gave authorization for the advertisement of a public hearing on Oct. 5 at 7 p.m. on a plan to repeal Chapter 21 - Water and Sewage Disposal from the county code and replace it with an updated chapter.
- Approved a new policy for electronic participation in meetings by supervisors to bring county policy into line with changes to Virginia Code §2.2-3708.3, which went into effect on Sept. 1.

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

School Board recognizes championship speech and debate team

As they did in August, the Fluvanna County School Board started its September meeting on a celebratory note.

They honored the high school's forensics team, which brought home their fourth state championship back in March. And – since forensics is the art of both speech and debate – they took the opportunity to fire off some friendly questions for impromptu response by team members.

Coach Craig Edgerton said that in his 12 years of running the Fluvanna program, "I have never known a greater group of kids."

"The amount of work these people do. You don't see it on a regular basis, but they're staying after school three nights a week, not counting the work they do at home," said debate coach Luke Divine.

This was the first time since the start of the pandemic that the competition took place in person. Fluvanna placed in a wide variety of categories, including first place wins in poetry, "serious duo," and extemporaneous speech.

After photos and congratulations, board members asked students about different aspects of competition. Superintendent Peter Gretz asked what kind of students would be interested in getting into speech and debate and what kind of students the team would like to recruit.

Student Congress debater Jackson Kinsella said, "if you have the work ethic and are willing to try hard and grind it out and won't give up and can persevere...perseverance is what I say is the number one asset you want to have."

He said a lot of people come into speech and debate without skills and are even terrified of public speaking, but if they keep pushing, and "if they believe in themselves and they believe in the team," they can compete and even win at the competition level.

Edgerton said that one of his team captains who graduated this summer had started in the eighth grade and was always so anxious that she invariably got sick before competing. That didn't stop her from becoming a state champion in poetry in her final competition.

He led them in reciting the team's mantra: "Win with humility, lose with grace."



Dr. Gretz said that the first weeks of school continued to run smoothly. Data on testing was expected shortly and would be passed on to parents as soon as it was available. Finance Director Brenda Gilliam gave a positive report on payroll and other financial matters, with most metrics meeting projections.

In a discussion of new business, where board members are allowed to introduce topics that were not on the main agenda, Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) said that he wanted to see "that there is no gender identity taught in Fluvanna schools. It has no place in public education. That's a private decision. We shouldn't be funding it. We certainly don't need to be muddling up the minds of these young people and question whether they're not the sex that they were born with."

Gretz assured Rittenhouse that there was no discussion of gender identity present anywhere in the school curriculum and was not something they were planning to add. After this reassurance, Rittenhouse said he had no need for further discussion.

Andrew Pullen (Columbia) said that Anti-Bullying Month was coming up soon, but the information he was receiving from parents was showing him that the schools needed to do more to clamp down on bullying and bad behavior by students. He said he had recently received texts from parents on incidents ranging from students exposing themselves on school buses to a threatened stabbing.

"Honestly, it seems like it's the same people over and over and over again, and I don't think there's any reason for us to celebrate Anti-Bullying Month if we're not going to take the bullies out of the schools and discipline and put the parents on notice," he said, "I think we got to get harsher with the punishment and we have to send a message to them that it's not acceptable."


He said that he thought "we need to put these administrators on notice: send these kids home."

Gretz said he couldn't comment on some of the specific incidents Pullen mentioned, because he wasn't aware of them. In cases he was aware of, he felt the administrators were acting appropriately and that the school in general "has really ramped up our responses to those things." He told Pullen he would be happy to reach out to parents to address those concerns and to discuss safety policies at later meetings.

August 15, 2022, Columbia Gas of Virginia, Inc. ("CVA" or the "Company"), filed an application ("Application") in accordance with Section 20 of its General Terms and Conditions, as contemplated in the Commission's November 28, 2011 Order Approving Steps to Advance Virginia's Energy Plan ("SAVE") Act SAVE Plan and Rider in Case No. PUE-2011-00049 and as most recently modified in Case No. PUR-2021-00145, for approval to implement a SAVE Rider for calendar year 2023.

In its Application, CVA states that its SAVE Plan is a program designed to accelerate the replacement of certain components of its gas distribution system infrastructure to enhance system safety and reliability. CVA has proposed a 2021 True-Up Factor of (\$452,523) and a 2023 Projected Factor of \$5,067,295, for a total proposed SAVE revenue requirement of \$4,614,772. As proposed, the 2023 SAVE Rider would decrease residential customers' bills by \$2.62 per month, for a total proposed monthly SAVE Rider rate of \$1.09.

The Company asserts that in its pending base rate filing (Case No. PUR-2022-00036) ("2022 Rate Case"), CVA requested Commission authorization to implement its proposed rates in that case, on an interim basis, for service rendered on and after the first billing unit of October 2022. According to the Company, the rates and charges proposed in the 2022 Rate Case will include recovery of costs associated with all SAVE in-service plant made through September 30, 2022, and excludes anticipated SAVE-related expenditures from October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023. Consistent with the Company's 2022 Rate Case filing, CVA requests recovery in this proceeding of SAVE-related costs post September 30, 2022, including SAVE-related investment; the SAVE-related CWIP balance at September 30, 2022; and any SAVE related revenue requirement not recovered in base rates in the SAVE Rider proposed to be effective the first billing unit of January 2023. The Projected Factor will be set to

zero concurrent with the implementation of CVA's rate case interim base rates effective the first billing unit of October 2022.

The details of these and other proposals are set forth in the Company's Application. Interested persons are encouraged to review the Company's Application and supporting exhibits for the details of these proposals.

TAKE NOTICE that the Commission may adopt rates that differ from those appearing in the Company's Application and supporting documents and may apportion revenues among customer classes and/or design rates in a manner differing from that shown in the Application and supporting documents.
