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

Harris, Trump vs. economy

Children are expensive, but who will help?

We all know that this upcoming election is important, but for those with children, we know its more than just who will be president for the next four years, we know that it will impact our children's futures. Before they can even have those futures though - what are the candidates going to do about the rising cost of having children -child care, medical expenses, etc.?

Vice President Kamala Harris plans to amend the current child tax credit to increase the maximum back up to \$3,600 for working families and bring in an expanded \$6,000 tax credit for families with newborn babies. That tax break is a major relief to families who want to have children but are worried about the exorbitant cost that comes along with child care and taking time off without universal paid parental leave. The current child tax credit is determined based on income and this would expand that program to help out low-income families with children so that they receive the maximum credit rather than it being cut off. "An estimated 1 in 4 children or roughly 19 million children — got less than the full \$2,000-per-child credit or no credit in 2022 because their families' incomes were too low." (CBPP.ORG)

If you missed it, JD Vance recently suggested that one way to "relieve a little bit

of pressure" on those families is "maybe Grandma or Grandpa wants to help out a little bit more." My child's grandparents would love to help out a bit more but are still working and cannot stop working just because we had a child. I'm not sure how Mr. Vance has gotten so out of touch but it is absolutely unrealistic to believe that asking grandparents to help is a solution to the burden of childcare.

President Trump's campaign has also suggested changes to the child tax credit, but would remove the income cap that is currently set at \$200,000 (or \$400,000 if filing jointly). Thoughts on gun violence prevention

In my neighborhood, I have an expectation that I will be safe from gun violence. In elementary school, I did not experience lockdowns due to threats from a dangerous person with a gun. When I went to college, I did not imagine being locked in a lecture hall because of someone's use of an assault rifle. When I began working in public schools, I had not even heard of active shooter drills. As citizens of Fluvanna County and the USA, we have a right and expectation to be safe from uncontrolled gun violence.

As an occupational therapist in public schools for 30 years, I saw the monthly fire drill procedures change overnight when the unthinkable happened at Columbine and Sandy Hook schools. Suddenly I was trying to keep my students with special needs calm while we sat in the corner of a darkened room. I tried to allay my students' fears about not seeing their parents again. The year after I retired, new safety procedures directed students to run to safe spots off campus, away from a shooter. These trainings help keep people safe from harm, but also provoke anxiety and fear. Our children should not have to live in fear of an active shooter on their campus

According to a CNN report, as of Sept. 19, there have been at least 50 school shootings in the United States. We need to keep our kids safe from gun violence. The experience of participating in shooter drills made me disappointed in our government, that they support guns over children and safe schools. Stronger gun laws, such as a ban on assault weapons, universal background checks and child access prevention will help keep guns out of the hands of dangerous people. We must work together to create safe and healthy communities for everyone.

The Democratic team of Harris/Walz, Kaine and Witt support common sense measures to prevent gun violence and protect our families.

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Caring For Creatures celebrates 35 years of rescues

For 35 years, Caring For Creatures Animal Sanctuary has been a safe refuge for cats and dogs who have been abused, abandoned, and forgotten. CFC has been a lifeline for these animals waiting for homes and for those who can love them, something many of them have never known. These dogs and cats came to the sanctuary fearful, shy, and some with behavioral issues. But with compassion, patience, and training from volunteers, staff, and professionals, they have overcome these barriers to interacting with humans.

Those that never get adopted, live their lives out at CFC but with the continued commitment of staff and volunteers who care for them as if they were their pets. Support from donors has helped to maintain their existence with food, medical care, medications, and a safe and comfortable environment. Mary Birkholz, the president and founder of CFC, has a holistic approach to the animals she cares for and sees each of them as special.

Over the years, CFC has taken in animals from high-kill shelters in states like South Carolina and found them homes in Virginia. They rescued many dogs and cats and even a horse from a hoarding situation in Columbia. The dogs lived in cramped pens with overgrown weeds. Some of the dogs had no medical care or grooming. During another rescue, a litter of abandoned puppies were found near a dumpster at a landfill and brought to the sanctuary. Recently, a man almost hit a puppy in the road and not only saved the pup but found the rest of the litter and their mother, who was dead. He



brought them to CFC. These are just a few of the stories.

Thirty-five years ago, cats testing positive for leukemia and/or FIV were routinely euthanized since rescues had no options. Thanks to support, CFC has always provided a safe refuge for these cats. Often, long-term residents were overlooked for adoption but over the years, adoptions have increased for these positive felines.

For the past two years, CFC has been involved with an unmanaged feral cat colony of abandoned cats, suffering from a lack of medical care and food and always on guard to stay safe.

Birkholz explained the ongoing plight of cats who are abandoned or born into a colony, where breeding is not controlled through spaying or neutering.

"These cats struggle to find food and shelter. I want to clarify that we are not referring to cat colonies that have proper caretakers who provide food, medical care (including spaying and neutering), shelter, etc. We are focusing on those large cat colonies that are continually reproducing and do not have a reliable source of food and usually there is a lack of shelter." They have trapped 108 cats and moved them to CFC. A total of 27 have been adopted and 16 were transferred to a rescue partner. Another 16 cats have been spayed/neutered and released back to the colony due to a lack of space at the sanctuary. She adds that they plan to re-trap the cats and bring them back to the sanctuary.

"Running out of space at their regular cat shelter, they made plans to build a small shelter to house 30-35 additional cats.

"This will help us make a larger impact. We provide complete veterinary care to these cats and our staff and volunteers work hard to socialize them. Surprisingly enough, the vast majority of these cats become tame pretty quickly - they are not true feral cats at all," said Birkholz. "Our goal is to place the cats into loving and responsible homes."

As space opens up in their larger Scratching Post cat residence, they will move socialized cats from Magnolia Cove to The Scratching Post for further socializing and adoption.

"We can then bring in more colony cats to Magnolia Cove. Moving forward and as space allows, Caring For Creatures has deemed Magnolia Cove as a place where we will assist cats living in unmanaged colonies."

Currently, she estimates there are about

50 cats at the colony they are helping. CFC provides about 150 pounds of cat food every week and provided housing and feeding stations for this colony.

As a result of a generous beguest and donor support, the work on Magnolia Cove began with volunteers coming together to do the work. The building consists of a small isolation area and two living rooms. Both rooms have a spacious outside patio/catio attached. The building has an HVAC system, inside living areas and the protected catios will include beds, shelves and perches, and hidey holes for those cats who prefer a low profile.

"We are grateful to a generous bequest which helped us get this project off the ground." She added they will need ongoing support to help maintain the building and provide medical care and food for their new

"The world of rescue over the past year has seemingly turned upside down. Most shelters and rescues are dealing with a large volume of requests from individuals who want or need to surrender their dog or cat companions. For many organizations, adoptions are not keeping pace with intakes or requests for help," she said. "As far as the feral cat situation, we have heard of at least two other unmanaged colonies in our general area with 100-150 cats each. Most folks do not even realize these colonies exist and the cats are struggling to survive."

Birkholz stresses that spaying/neutering is key to preventing this from happening in the first place, but many kind-hearted individuals who want to help the stray cat that appears on their doorstep cannot afford to provide those procedures.

"Availability of low-cost spay/neuters also cannot keep up with the need and appointments are like gold. It can take several weeks or longer to get an appointment in some cases. As a result, the number of litters being born keeps growing."

The name for the new cattery came from a large Magnolia tree not far from the building and one of the first cats they brought to the sanctuary, named Magnolia. The Cove came from its meaning of a small, sheltered space.

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State Police investigate fatal officer-involved shooting

The Virginia State Police Appomattox Field Office, at the request of the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office, is investigating a fatal officer-involved shooting that occurred Friday (Oct. 11) in the 400 block of Gravel Hill Road in the Fork Union area.

Deputies were initially called to the residence for an armed domestic distur-

During the incident, the suspect was found to be hiding inside a wall in the structure. When deputies attempted to remove the suspect, the suspect fired at the deputies, and they returned fire. The

suspect, Kenneth Wayne Foster, Jr., 37, was later pronounced deceased, and a firearm was located near by.

The Fluvanna Sheriff's Office has placed the deputies involved in the incident on administrative leave with pay.

The names of the officers involved have not been released.

Virginia State Police will turn over the findings, once completed, to the Commonwealth's Attorney's Office for final review and adjudication.



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
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

Aqua Virginia Updates Water Workgroup Members

The Water Workgroup met on October 9, and some of the topics discussed include:

- Ongoing infrastructure upgrades: The group felt that improvements such as remote monitors on pump stations may have contributed to the lack of significant sewage leaks this summer.
- Plans to educate
 residents: The flushing of wipes
 and grease continues to cause
 issues with the system, and the
 workgroup would like to hold a
 few educational events in 2025.
 According to Aqua Virginia's
 staff, grease and wipes (even
 "flushable" ones) are the number
 one reason for sewage backups
 and pump and grinder failures at
 Lake Monticello.
- Colonial Circle: The new development on Lake Monticello Road and Route 53 continues

- to concern the group. They plan to take further action; more details to come.
- Customer care: Unsatisfactory customer service continues to be an issue. Aqua Virginia must report resolutions to customer service complaints as part of the rate increase stipulation agreement with the State Corporate Commission (SCC). If you feel your complaint still needs to be resolved, please report this to the State Corporate Commission. Learn how to report complaints by calling SCC at 804-371-9051 for information or visit their website.
