Obituary

James "Jim" George Scott, Jr.



Local historian and published author James "Jim" George Scott, Jr. passed away on March 30, 2025, after a more than yearlong battle with cancer, which he fought fiercely. He is survived by his wife Juanita of 46 years, sons Ken (Laura), Clay (Celine), and Cole (Alyson), his father Jim, sister Sharon, grandchildren, many nieces and nephews, friends, and his adoring cats. He is predeceased by his mother Dot and brother Al.

Jim was born on Valentine's Day 1949 in Wilmington, Delaware. The oldest of three siblings, Jim spent his youth on the Eastern Shore before seeking opportunities across the country, including Kentucky, Oklahoma, and Maryland, finally settling in Virginia. Jim worked in many fields including telecommunications, computer systems, cabinet and furniture making, and heavy equipment. Jim retired from Lake Monticello in 2017.

Jim loved history and spent hours researching local civil war history that he used in his novel. He also loved his sons, which led him to write a children's book chronicling his journey as a father. When not reading or writing, Jim passed his days fishing at Lake Monticello and telling "big fish" stories.

Jim's tenacity and bravery in his fight is known by all. The family is extremely grateful for the care and compassion he received at Martha Jefferson Hospital under the guidance of Dr. Mark Prichard from the entire staff of MJH. In lieu of flowers, the family asks that gifts be made in his honor to Martha Jefferson Hospital Foundation Cancer Care Fund or The Fluvanna County Historical Society.

Dominion Energy files for 15 percent increase in base rates, fuel charges

Dominion Energy has applied to the State Corporation Commission (SCC) for a 15 percent increase in base rates, the company announced last week.

Dominion serves 2.5 million customers across Virginia, including 13,600 in Fluvanna County.

"We do not ask for this lightly, as we understand the economic pressures on our customers and the need to maintain rates that are cost-effective and a good value for them," Dominion president Ed Blaine said in the SCC filing.

The typical residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month would see the base rate increase by \$8.51 on January 1, 2026, and an additional \$2.00 on January 1, 2027.

Dominion also requests a \$10.92 increase in its "fuel factor," a charge covering fuel costs. That increase could begin as early as July 2025.

The company estimates the average \$140 monthly bill would climb to \$162 if the SCC approves the entire request.

Dominion officials say the increases are needed to grow the company's generation and distribution systems.

"Virginians are using about five percent more power every year," company spokesman Aaron Ruby told WTVR-TV Richmond, "and so we need to make investments in the grid so that we can reliably serve our customers' growing needs."

Demand is expected to grow by three percent annually for the next 15 years.

This is the first formal base rate increase since 1991. Between 2007 and 2023, all rate increases have come through riders that have allowed Dominion to adjust costs.

A 2024 SCC investigation found that the riders had increased customer costs by 47.6 percent during that 16-year period.

In 2022, Dominion agreed to refund customers over \$330 million after an SCC review found the company had over-earned by \$1.1 billion between 2017 and 2020.

Ideas to Improve Your Personal Cash Flow



One of the most common reasons businesses fail is due to lack of proper cash flow. The same is often true in many households. Here's how this concept of cash flow applies to you along with some ideas to improve it.

Cash flow defined

Cash flow equals cash coming in (wages, interest, Social Security benefits, etc.) and cash going out in the bills you pay and money you spend. If more is coming in than going out, you have positive cash flow. If the opposite is true, you have negative cash flow. Unfortunately, calculating and forecasting cash flow can get complicated. Some bills are due weekly, others monthly. A few larger bills may need to be paid quarterly or annually.

Create your cash flow snapshot

Before improving your cash flow, you need to be able to visualize it. While there are software tools to generate a statement of cash flow, you can also take a snapshot of your cash flow by creating a simple monthly spreadsheet:

- Type each month across the top of the spreadsheet with an annual total.
- Note all your revenue (cash inflows), then create a list of expenses (cash outflows) in the left-hand column.
- Enter your income and bills by month. Create a monthly subtotal of all your inflows. Do the same for your cash outflows. Then subtract the expenses from income. Positive numbers? You have positive cash flow. Negative numbers? You have negative cash flow.
- Create a cumulative total for the year under each month to see which months will need additional funds and which months will have excess funds

- Identify your challenges. See if you have months where more cash is going out than is coming in to your bank account. This often happens when large bills are due. If possible, try to balance these known high-expense months throughout the course of the year. Common causes are:

Build a reserve. If you know there are challenging months, project how much additional cash you will need and begin to save for this during positive cash months.

From disc golf to clean laundry, FLDP projects strengthen Fluvanna

This year's Fluvanna Leadership Development Program (FLDP) members presented their group projects to a packed audience at Fluvanna County High School on Thursday night (April 4).

FLDP is a long-running program that introduces a yearly class to the inner workings of county government and organization. Each class also breaks into small teams to identify an area of county life that could be improved and design a project to improve it.

Class 22, which started in August 2024, tackled projects ranging from recreation to at-risk students.

In the first presentation of the night, one team shared its project to popularize the disc golf course at Pleasant

"One of our key focuses was just to expand the community's understanding, getting people introduced to it, getting people to know we have a course," said Shannon Morton.

Team members Frank Abney, a disc golf enthusiast with experience on many other courses, and John Watermolen, a GIS specialist and map-maker, worked on highlighting and mapping the course and created new literature to support players.

The team also worked with the Fluvanna County Public Library to add disc golf equipment to its "Library of Things," which the public can check out for free.

The library was also at the heart of another team's project, designed to create "more robust adult programming," said Maurice Lange.

Some of the team's ideas included funding a bookmobile, working with local churches to host expanded programming, and holding pop-up enrichment events.

Librarian Cyndi Hoffman said they were always open to new programming, but staffing was a significant roadblock. Expanding programming would require an additional staff member, and the Board of Supervisors had declined funding for more staffing for at least the past two budget cycles.

A decline in public funding led to another project to help Fluvanna's high school students take the PSATs and SATs. These standardized tests can help with admissions and financing for the 60 percent of Fluvanna students who plan to attend 2- and 4-year college programs after graduation.

For a decade, Fluvanna County Public Schools had the funding to pay the testing fees of \$56 for the SAT and \$13 for the PSAT. This removed a barrier for students who might be unable to afford



the test themselves.

When funding ended in 2023, the number of students who took the test dropped from 565 to 241.

Team members first worked on getting the county to restore the \$26,000 in annual funding, but when that failed, they decided the solution was to "just pay for it," said Kelsey Cowger.

Rather than set up a separate nonprofit, they partnered with the county parent-teacher organization. Any money collected through donations and grants can be passed to the PTO for distribution,

They set up a donation portal on zeffy.com that has already raised about \$3600 of their \$30,000 goal.

The team hopes to raise the entire \$26,000 and create a self-sustaining process to provide several years of funding.

Student needs were the driving force behind the Fluvanna Laundry Initiative, a project that can meet the needs of children who cannot access basic needs like clean clothing.

The stigma of wearing dirty clothing is a known cause of absenteeism in schools, and absenteeism raises the risk that a student will drop out of school permanently.

Team member Kim Munson shared her own story of being a homeless young mother. "This social isolation, the lifelong emotional trauma, this was my reality over 30 years ago," she said.

The group has approached the Fluvanna Rotary for \$18,000 to facilitate the purchase of four industrial washer-dryer sets that can be strategically located in the areas of highest need. They believe they would need \$25,000 for machines, space rentals, supplies, and maintenance.

Rudy Garcia, a member of FLDP's Executive Committee, said this year's projects were more means-tested than some in previous years and praised the teams for taking ownership of their initiatives.

Nine-year-old from Fluvanna finishes second in National Drive, Chip and Putt competition

Lucas Dunaway of Troy won the Middle Atlantic Region in the National Drive, Chip and Putt competition to qualify for the national competition held on April 6 at Augusta National (home of the Masters.) Dunaway scored well in all three disciplines. He finished first for ten points in the chipping competition, and scored 7 points in drive and six points in putting for a total of 23 points, one point away from first place. Dunaway's home course is the Lake Monticello golf course where he has been coached by PGA pro Mark Marshall. Dunaway came to Marshall for coaching at the age of six.

Marshall said that six-year-olds normally do not take that well to coaching, but that he realized right away that Dunaway was a "different" student and a "great kid." Within six months, Dunaway was already entering tournaments for players of his age. Marshall accompanied his prodigy to Augusta but the rules of the competition state that once the competition begins, no coaching is allowed. So, Marshall watched nervously with the Dunaway

At the National Drive, Chip and Putt competition they have age groups of 7-9, 10-11, 12-13 and 14-15. Each contestant gets two chances at each discipline. Marshal explains that drives must end up in the fairway to count and the contestant with the longest qualifying drive wins the drive competition. The chip competition involves two chips from about 15-16 yards out and the competitor with two chips that have lowest combined distance to the hole wins that completion. The same is true for the putt competition, which involves two putts, one from about 15 feet and one from about 30 feet. Again, the competitor with the two putts that total closest to the hole wins that discipline.

Virginia farmers face fallout from USDA cuts

As hunger rates climb across the country, federal funding cuts are hitting Virginia farmers who produce food for nutrition programs.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced the cancellation of two programs that provided more than \$1 billion nationally for schools and food banks to purchase food from local farmers

About \$600 million would have been distributed to schools and child care centers across the country this year through the Local Foods for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program. The Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program also has been cut; it previously funded food banks and other feeding programs that reach underserved communities. USDA unfroze that program's funds for current sub-grantees but cancelled the second round of funding for 2025.

Virginia has received over \$13.6 million for LFPA and LFPA Plus programs to date and will lose about \$7.6 million for LFPA 2025 and potentially \$13 million for LFS, according to the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

The cancellation of the local food purchase program and the local foods for schools program does not affect current sub-grantees. VDACS will fully fulfill its obligations under the existing LFPA and LFPA Plus agreements, which remain in effect through July 15.

The Southside Virginia Fruit and Vegetable Producers Association in Charlotte County has sold about \$150,000 worth of fresh fruit and vegetables to food banks statewide through the local food purchase program. Those sales have helped the group of around 22 member farmers expand their businesses and recruit more members, including young and beginning producers.

"It's helped keep our farms alive and growing," remarked Goldman, SVFVPA president.

The group is cutting back on planting this spring as they scramble for replacement markets.

"It might be a tough year for us, but we just keep looking for other opportunities," Goldman added. "The sad thing is the food banks are going to lose the fresh fruit and vegetables they were really excited about getting."

The Federation of Virginia Food Banks benefits from \$250,000 in LFPA funds monthly under the current round—a valuable support system as rising food prices strain consumers and food banks alike. Traffic across the seven regional food banks and their network of 1,150 pantry partners rose 20% on average from 2023 to 2024, and the food banks spent nearly five times more on food than in 2019, according to the federation.

About 964,000, or 1 in 9, Virginians were facing hunger in 2022—around 37% more than the year before, according to Feeding America.

"We are really dependent on any sort of initiatives that we can find like the LFPA, and we particularly are grateful when they can benefit Virginia's ag economy and local farmers," remarked Eddie Oliver, Federation of Virginia Food Banks executive director.

The federation works to strengthen partnerships with Virginia farmers through initiatives like Farms to Food Banks, which includes The Virginia Agriculture Food Assistance Program. Farmers are paid the fixed costs associated with donating excess produce.

Nearly 2 million pounds of food were sourced from 65 local agricultural partners through the Farms to Food Banks initiative last year.

"We feel like the work of the LFPA and other grants to connect local farmers with the food bank network has been a tremendous success in Virginia," Oliver noted. "We just didn't expect the rug to be pulled out from under us this quickly, and we are scrambling a little bit to replace product?

Additionally, USDA paused \$500 million in funding for The Emergency Food Assistance Program, a core nutrition program that purchases U.S. commodities for emergency food providers. That program makes up about 30% of the federation's inventories.

"We're going to need a lot of support from the community, and we're hoping the state can help provide some additional support to offset the impacts of the federal cuts," Oliver added. "But we appreciate our partners in Washington and Richmond, and we're going to forge ahead as best we can."



Spring Safety at the Lake

These tips will help everyone enjoy the outdoors this spring and summer at Lake Monticello:

1. Walking the Cart Path

Walking the golf course is a wonderful way to enjoy the scenery, but for everyone's safety, you may not do so during play hours. Also, please note that bicycles and skateboards are not permitted on the course. You can enjoy a stroll on the cart paths in the morning until the first tee times of the day, following the order of holes 1-9 and 10-18. In the evenings, feel free to walk starting at the designated cart due-in time, which you can find under Course Conditions on the golf app. If you are bringing your dogs along, they are welcome during walking hours as long as they are on a leash, and you must clean up after them. Enjoy vour walk!

2. Beaches Closed to Pets

Please be aware that all beaches are off-limits to pets from April to November. Beach 2 and 5 are pet-friendly in the winter months only.

3. Using Electric Vehicles

Did you know that LMOA roads are classified as state highways for law enforcement purposes? As a result, only state-approved electric vehicles are allowed, and riders must adhere to all traffic regulations. For that reason, electric go-karts, golf carts, and

dirt bikes are not permitted on these roads. Low-speed vehicles (LSVs) are allowed and look like golf carts, so know the difference before you buy. If you have any questions about what is allowed. please contact the Lake Police before making a purchase. If you are planning to ride Class 3 E-bikes on Lake Monticello roads, make sure you are at least 14 years old, and don't forget to wear your helmet for safety. For those using E-scooters, you also need to be 14 or older. While helmets aren't required for E-scooter riders, we highly recommend wearing one.

4. Swimming After Rain

Please remember that LMOA does not recommend swimming in Lake Monticello after heavy rain. Rain washes chemicals and animal feces from yards into the Lake, and sewage can back up. Wait at least 48 hours after a storm before swimming in Lake Monticello.

Maintenance This Season

Our Facilities & Operations Team at LMOA does a great job keeping up with routine maintenance. Sometimes. however, it makes sense to contract out larger projects. This spring, you may notice contractors completing the following jobs:

Harbor Dredge and Dock will perform dredging operations starting on April 21, 2025.

This decision is necessary because our operator is retiring, and replacing the aging machinery is very costly. The board has approved outsourcing this project this year as a beta test. The company will be dredging in Jackson Cove (JA 1), Monroe Cove (MO 1), and Van Buren Cove (VB 1), which are the back areas of those coves.

Fairway Flooring and Parking Lots: From April 28 to May 1, 2025, the flooring in the hall between the Proshop and the Bunker Bistro is scheduled to undergo maintenance, and seal-coating and striping of the parking lots will be done at the Fairway Clubhouse. This will affect the bistro's operating hours and parking availability during that week. The seal coating could not be completed earlier due to night temperatures. Both projects are being done simultaneously to minimize the impact on the bistro, ensuring it is only affected once.

WEEKLY WATER SAFETY TIP

Brought to you by the Volunteer Water Safety Team Did you know...?

- Lake Monticello is NOT exempt from the VA law that requires all motorboats greater than 16 feet to have the following safety equipment on board: a Coast Guard-approved fire extinguisher, life jacket for each person, a whistle or horn, engine cut-off switch (boats manufactured after 2020), orange flag or other visual distress signal, navigation lights (red, green, and all-around white light). and a throwable life jacket.
- Boats under 16 feet are required to have the same equipment except for a fire extinguisher and throwable life jacket.
- Non-motorized boats are required to have a life jacket, whistle, and all-around white light for operating at night.

Please check your equipment to ensure it is serviceable and ready for a fun boating season.

Supervisors urge VDOT action after fatal Dixie crash

Following a fatal collision in Dixie last month, the Board of Supervisors is asking VDOT to investigate safety improvements at one of the county's most dangerous intersections.

A March 20 collision between a pickup truck and an emergency vehicle at Rt. 15 and Rt. 6 left a Henrico man dead and four others injured.

At its meeting on Wednesday night (April 2), supervisors told VDOT representative Willie Gordon that the intersection had seen multiple accidents and near-misses in recent years.

Gordon said the department could investigate some "alternative safety mechanisms" while searching for a long-term solution to the problems. A roundabout at the intersections could be installed, but that could take up to five years.

He said there was potential to install a temporary roundabout using barriers or other systems to improve drivers' sightlines.

Along with the VDOT report, supervisors discussed real estate reassessments - not the ones just completed, but the next round coming in 2027 and 2029.

One option would be to conduct an administrative reassessment in 2027 and a full review two years later.

An administrative reassessment uses fair market values to adjust valuations. Appraisers do not visit each property or take updated photos.

These types of assessments meet all the legal requirements and can be considerably less expensive for the county, but can often result in under-valuations because they miss upgrades and improvements like new sheds or generators.

Some supervisors felt that an administrative assessment could be problematic. Widespread community anger over the most recent valuations could well be repeated in 2027. Still, as Mike Goad (Fork Union) pointed out, the county could not show residents that appraisers had physically evaluated their properties.

"I feel like that really makes it tough for us to answer for that," he said.

County Administrator Eric Dahl said they would request proposals from multiple appraisal companies and get some hard figures for both full and administrative assessments.




