

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

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

Fluco softball goes to 11-5 with walk-off hit against Louisa

It was tight match-up on May 15 when the Fluco softball team hosted the Louisa Lions. Louisa jumped into the lead with two runs in the top of the second inning A Fluco error and two solid hits followed by a throwing error allowed the Lions to score twice. The Flucos got those runs back in the bottom of the third.


Fluco clean-up hitter, senior Amirah Bielke open the inning with her second single. Junior Natalie Gomez bunted Bielke to second. Junior Megan Pounsberry then smashed a double to score Bielke. With two out freshman first baseman Allison Gomez blasted a long ball to right center. It came within six inches of being a go ahead homerun, hitting the top of the fence and bouncing back, resulting in a game tying double.

The fourth, fifth and sixth innings were scoreless. Fluco starting pitcher, sophomore Lila Schwartz, shut down the Lions allowing only one single in each inning and walking no one. In the top of the seventh, the Lions opened with a triple and took the lead 3-2 on a wild pitch. Bielke who had come in to pitch in the seventh then closed down Louisa.

With one out, in the bottom of the seventh and final inning, Pounsberry singled. She stole second and the catchers' throw got away into the outfield and Pounsberry came around to score to tie the game. Freshman Aleah Anderson worked a walk to set things up for Allison Gomez. A very hard hit line drive over the shortstop split the outfielders and went all the way to the fence for a walk-off double, and a 4-3 win, as Anderson scored easily.

After the game, Fluco coach Aime McCall reported that her team has been playing solidly and she emphasized that she was impressed with Allison Gomez' hitting as she is only a freshman. McCall also complimented her pitchers Schwartz and Bielke, who did an excellent job in holding the Lions to only three runs. With a couple of games to play in the regular season it looks like the Flucos are likely to qualify for post-season play.

On May 20, McCall's squad hosted Goochland and on May 22 they traveled to Monticello High for the final game of the regular season.

Stams talks about photo montage

Fluvanna Art Association met May 15 with speaker and photographer Paul Stams. Stams discussed his lifelong love of photography and montage. A former middle school physical education teacher, assistant principal, and union representative, Stams delved into photography and montage more seriously after retirement.

He was at one time the center of a controversy with the old quard of the FAA, who believed photography had no place in the association. Other members supported Stams, who had a compelling argument that no matter what tools are used, photographers are still artists. Photography, like other mediums, uses certain skills and techniques to manipulate light and elicit a response from the onlooker. Stams explained it didn't matter what device the artist used, whether it was a paintbrush, pencil, or a camera.

"This is not digital, it is photography," he reminded those in attendance.

Photo montages became trendy in the late 19th to early 20th century. It is similar to a collage but was done in the dark room by combining or juxtaposing negative images over one another. Stams does this well and began creating his photo montages in 1972.

"One day, someone looked at my work and said, 'When did you become an artist?' I had never looked at my work this way," he said, stunned at the realization that he was taking his skills and techniques to a higher level.

In his later years, computers made combining, overlapping, repeating, and blending images much easier with Photoshop, eliminating the need to spend time in a dark room with toxic chemicals.

As his techniques and tools evolved,

so did his style and expression. His statements and messaging became clearer.


"Dadaists used montage as political dissent during the late 19th century." Stams has unusual gift for translating his photographs into ethereal, overlapping, and repeating images and blending them with bold colors. They are riveting works of art that keep the onlooker absorbed, wondering where reality ends and fantasy begins.

The places he has traveled to, including Amsterdam, London, Cuba, New York, and New Orleans, he cleverly arranges his photos in a whirlwind of familiar icons and personal expression.

"I use 15-30 pictures to complete a montage."

In his more serious pieces, he subtly combines images such as his hands with a cell phone looming large over a beautiful beach at dawn. The meaning was obvious, what we are missing in the moment in the natural world. Those things cannot be recaptured easily while we waste time on our devices. Some of his images can seem abstract and unrelated, but they have a deeper meaning that links them. In one photo, he has several African animals looking off in the distance at progress and development, and wondering why their environment was sacrificed for this.

His current photos of Charlottesville feature many subjects, including a ghostly black figure gliding over the railroad tracks in the Spirit of the Amtrak Station. He records the changes, the people who have come and gone, and the condition of the Downtown Mall in a series of photos that are a powerful expression of what he sees. His perspective is always "seeing " what is around him and translating it into meaningful art that takes us to a different level of thinking.

Kents store man fatally shot; another arrested for homicide

A Kents Store man was fatally shot Sunday and another arrested for his murder at a residence in the 3000 block of Kents Store Way.

Marcus Allen Vargas, 30, was pronounced dead at about 6:31 p.m. from a gunshot wound. Zhamere Llada Ross, 25, has been arrested and is currently in custody for homicide, according to the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office.

Authorities are continuing to process the scene and evidence. Vargas' body was transported to the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner in Richmond.

"At this time, the nature or cause of the initial disturbance is still unknown and remains under investigation," according to the sheriff's office.. "More information will be released as it becomes available and if appropriate. This incident appears to be an isolated incident and there is no continue threat to the community. The sheriff and his staff wish to extend their condolences to the family of Mr. Vargas during their time of loss and grief."

The sheriff's office also thanked the Louisa County Sheriff's Office and the Virginia State Police for their assistance.

Fluvanna school board pushes back against new SOL, textbook mandates

Members of the Fluvanna County School Board voiced strong opposition to new state educational polices around Standards of Learning (SOL) testing and new textbook mandates during its monthly meeting on Wednesday night (May 14).

Earlier this year, the General Assembly in Richmond passed a new bill mandating that SOL test scores account for at least 10 percent of a student's year-end grade starting in the 2026-27 school year. Gov. Glenn Youngkin recently signed the bill into law.

This new policy will move the SOLs to the last two weeks of the academic year and transition from a 600-point scale to a 100-point scale.

Supporters of the policy change have argued that it will eliminate a month of instructional time focused on the tests, which are currently administered more than a month before end of the school year, and the 100-point scale will make results easier to interpret.

By tying the test scores to final grades, supporters believe that students will be more incentivized to retain information throughout the year, rather than focusing on learning for the stand-alone test.

Students who fail the test will have the opportunity to re-test before final grades are calculated.

"I think that the folks who drafted this don't have a real good handle on what it looks like," said Superintendent Peter Gretz, "and trying to get all the different populations tested and re-tested, and I don't know what that looks like, either."

Board members agreed.

"You can take the greatest GPA student in the world and put them in a standardized testing environment, and you see a completely different student on paper," said Danny Reed (Fork Union).

James Kelley (Palmyra) said "this doubles down on what is effectively an American learned behavior, which is this asinine standardized test taking. It doesn't serve our students, it doesn't serve our teachers. I'm not sure who it ultimately serves."

Reed wondered what would happen if a district decided to opt out of the SOLs. "Is it 60 percent of our budget disappears if we just don't do standardized testing from the state?"

Members were also concerned about new textbook requirements that could end up costing the district \$200,000 to \$300,000 in the next couple of years. Gretz said he and other superintendents were working to get more clarity on what would be required and

whether the state would provide some funding.

The issue brought a rare moment of unanimity for the board members, as chair Andrew Pullen asked if they would help draft and co-sign a letter to the state.

"It's no secret that I'm pretty conservative and voted for the guy [Youngkin], but I think these issues he's failing us left and right," Pullen said. "So I think when you see unanimous support from a board like ours, which is wildly different in our political persuasion, if we send a letter like that to them, I think maybe, maybe we'll get some attention."

Storm brings five and one-half inches of rain to county

Parts of central and western Fluvanna County saw nearly half a foot of rain on Tuesday (May 13).

According to the National Weather Service's Rainfall Monitoring website, rain gauges in Troy and Palmyra reached 5.08 to 5.48 inches between Monday night and Wednesday morning.

Other areas were less hard-hit, with Scottsville recording 2.38 inches and others between 1.18 and 1.31 inches.

Water levels at the Crofton Boat Ramp on Rt. 600 crested at 21.9 feet on Wednesday, almost five feet above flood stage and the highest level recorded since May 2014.

Lake Monticello saw some minor flooding, particularly in the coves.

LMOA spokesperson Marieke Henry alerted residents on Thursday that the high water levels had swamped two sewage pumping stations between the Marina and the Main Beach.

As a precautionary measure, Lake staff took water samples to test e.coli levels, which were found to be slightly elevated.

Minor flooding also closed hiking trails at Pleasant Grove.

Timothy Adam, an amateur meteorologist and author of the popular Fluvanna County Severe Weather Facebook page, said the county found itself in a "Goldilocks zone - a corridor where atmospheric conditions aligned perfectly for sustained rain production."

While preliminary models showed the storm tracking west of Fluvanna, it ended up directly overhead.

As the storm system interacted with the mountains to the west and the northwest, "the moisture-laden air was forced to rise over the mountains, which enhanced lift and caused the rainfall to intensify and stall," he said. "This combination of moisture and stalled movement led to extremely high rainfall rates – up to an inch every 30 minutes."

No serious injuries were reported in Fluvanna. Charlottesville, which also saw areas of heavy downpours, saw one fatality, as a 12-year-old boy was swept away by fast-rising floodwaters near Crozet.

2025 Master Gardeners graduate and serve

Training has ended and community service has begun for the 2025 graduates of the Fluvanna County Extension Master Gardner Training Program. This year's cohort has enthusiastically jumped into the activities and is enjoying meeting new friends while continuing to learn and apply coursework.

Students completed 50 hours of instruction through lectures, demonstrations, and field trips, beginning in mid-January and completed in early May. Their course of study followed guidelines established through cooperative extension experiences of best

practices that are based on university-based research and applied to the local microenvironment of our climate and soil conditions.

Classes start at the basics of botany, soils and nutrition, and entomology, then continue through to pruning and propagation, as well as examining best practices to protect habitat for wildlife. With the successful completion of coursework, students will complete 50 hours of volunteer service during their first year, and 20 hours a year thereafter.

Volunteer hours are very easy to accumulate in the Fluvanna Master Gardner program, since the organization has many activities through school and library programs, the Butterfly Garden and Community Garden in Pleasant Grove Park, events and hikes in the park, Help Desk service for home gardeners at the library on Tuesdays, and caps the summer with an event for kids and grownups at the county fair.

The Master Gardener Training Program is offered only once a year. Full information and registration forms are online at the website www.fluvannamg.org.



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Storm Recovery and **Summer Preparations**

Last week, crews took out the worn docks at the Main Beach to prepare for a new, durable EZ Docks system. Contractor Harbor Dredge is collaborating with LMOA's Facilities & Operations Team on the planned replacement project. If this system performs effectively, the docks at the Lake Monticello Marina will eventually be replaced with EZ Docks, too.

The LMOA staff is diligently working on storm recovery initiatives which has hindered summer preparations. While previous efforts, such as replenishing sand on the beaches, have faced some setbacks, the team remains dedicated to ensuring the community is prepared for peak season, which begins on May 24 (please note that LMOA Admin Offices will be closed on Memorial Day).

The storms that took place May 13-15 were more severe than expected, resulting in unavoidable flooding. However, storm monitoring by LMOA staff was in place as usual. It is important to know that LMOA has revised its previous protocol. Staff no longer lowers the lake before a storm by manually opening the spillway, as this has been proven to be an unnecessary action that significantly damages the spillway. This was identified in 2021, when LMOA had to repair the damage and undertake extensive renovations.

Throughout last week's storms, the spillway of the dam operated as it should, draining the Lake at a rate that maintains the dam's integrity. At the time of the renovation and throughout the recent dam recertification process, LMOA received valuable guidance from engineers on best practices, learning that manually opening the spillway is not recommended.

These are some tips we recommend Lake residents jot down for future storms:

- When flood warnings are issued, it is important to remember to loosen boat lines before a storm to prevent damage to boats and docks. Tight mooring lines dislodge the wood pilons from their position, compromising the structure.
- In this area, residents should also be prepared for power and water outages. For a list

of recommended emergency supplies to sustain your household, visit:

VAemergency.gov/emergency-kit.

- If you are in a car and approach a flooded road, remember the rule,
- "Turn Around, Don't Drown." Please remember that LMOA does not recommend
- swimming in Lake Monticello directly after flooding. Rain washes chemicals, animal feces, and other contaminants from yards into the Lake, and sewage can back up. Wait at least 48 hours after a storm before swimming in Lake Monticello.
- Surface flooding in yards may result from clogged culverts. Before heavy rainfall, clear drains, culverts, and ditches of leaves and debris. This helps water drain properly and prevents leaves from washing into the Lake, which harms lake health.
- All beaches at Lake Monticello are equipped with flags that communicate whether the Lake is open or closed - a red and white checkered flag indicates a Lake closure.

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


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Ash tree program assists in preserving an icon of Virginia's landscapes

A tiny invasive beetle brought the once-noble population of Virginia's loftiest hardwoods to its knees.

Since its 2008 identification in the U.S., the emerald ash borer has killed millions of ash trees across the U.S. and is likely now in every Virginia community.

Without protective measures, all native species of ash trees are nearly guaranteed to be infested and killed by the emerald ash borer, contributing to an ongoing loss of an ecological icon, plus billions of dollars in property damage and threats to public safety.

Applications are now open for the Virginia Department of Forestry Emerald Ash Borer Cost-Share Program, which offers financial assistance for protecting ash trees from the emerald ash borer. Starting in 2018, the cost-share program, supported by Virginia invasive species funding, has reimbursed the costs for more than 2.400 ash treatments statewide. Landowners and organizations can apply for the program until June 13.

Amanda Conrad, DOF forest health program coordinator, said ash trees are commonly found in yards and lining roads.

"Left untreated, these trees will become infected by emerald ash borer and die, posing a significant risk to public safety," she said.

Infested trees become brittle and prone to breakage, which could be dangerous if ash trees are growing near homes, roads, parks or utility structures.

Farmers and landowners also are impacted—by both property damage and loss of the beneficial species.

"I know a lot a farmers who had them fall on fences," said Mark Campbell, Virginia Farm Bureau Federation membership & field services director based in Nelson County. "Ash trees have a fair amount of limbs that will shatter and drop if the tree is standing dead. But I don't know of too many farms that have living ash trees around anymore."

The responsibility of preserving a beloved ash tree is up to the landowner or locality, he noted.

The best way to save ash trees is treatment with systemic insecticides by a certified applicator, which protects the trees for up to two years. To help with costs, DOF offers 70% in costshare for eligible landowners, nonprofits, educational institutions, homeowners associations and organizations, including municipalities. A DOF forester must first assess the trees prior to treatment.

Fresh milk goes from Virginia dairy farms to your fridge in 48 hours

A safe, streamlined supply chain keeps farm-fresh fluid milk flowing from the cow to your cereal in an impressive turnaround time.

One Virginia dairy cow is milked about three times a day and produces an average eight gallons of milk. Within 48 hours of farm collection, that milk is processed, packaged and delivered to hundreds of stores throughout Virginia and surrounding states.

In Shenandoah County, a tanker arrives at French Brothers Dairy before dawn on alternating days. About 17,000 pounds of cold fluid milk, or 2,000 gallons, is siphoned from a bulk tank into the refrigerated tanker.

"A large farm may have two pickups a day," said Eric Paulson, executive director of the Virginia State Dairymen's Association. "A just-in-time system gets it to store shelves through a process that's been perfected over decades."

Processing plants hold milk in large, refrigerated milk silos before it's pasteurized, homogenized and packaged for distribution. Safe handling and inspections are overseen by Virginia Department of Health and Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services officials. They evaluate samples for bacterial counts or traces of antibiotics.

Pasteurization is a simple process heating milk to 161 degrees for 15 seconds and cooling it back down to kill any bacteria and extend the shelf life. Homogenization breaks milk fat into smaller molecules, improving texture, taste and product consistency.

The dairy industry offers an array of consumer choices beyond whole milk, 2%, 1% and skim, now including organic options and other fluid milk products developed with an A2 protein that may improve digestibility.

Paulson said the industry also has met a marketplace need for lactose-free milk.

"A soft-filtration process filters milk into base components that are put back together without the lactose," he explained. "It's still regular milk."

Many Virginians once owned dairy cows to sustain their families. By 1920, more than 13,700 Virginia farms engaged in commercial milk production, according to VSDA history. About 360 Virginia dairies are still in operation in 2025.

"We're producing more milk on fewer farms," Paulson said. "There's more concentration, and incredible gains in genetics and nutrition, which helps farmers be a lot more productive than they were over 50 years ago."

Though consumers are less connected to farm life, they are more curious about who produces their food, he added. The VSDA co-founded an online tool at whereismymilkfrom. com for consumers to track their milk sources with the code imprinted on cartons.
