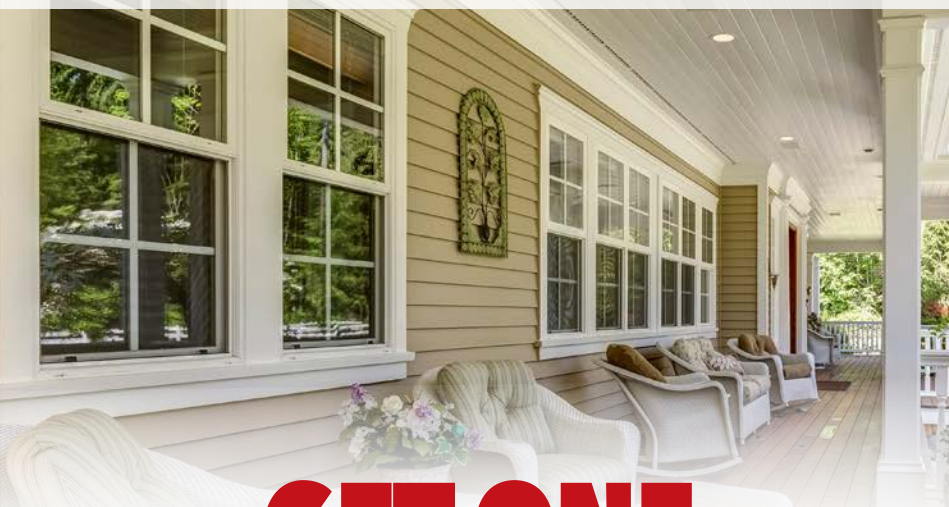

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Spanberger vetoes collective bargaining bills opposed by Fluvanna supervisors

Gov. Abigail Spanberger has vetoed legislation that would have expanded collective bargaining rights for Virginia public employees, ending, for now, a proposal Fluvanna supervisors had warned could drive up local costs and weaken local control.

The veto, announced Thursday, May 14, drew sharp criticism from labor unions that had supported Spanberger's campaign and urged her to sign House Bill 1263 and Senate Bill 378.

The bills would have expanded collective bargaining rights for state and local public employees, including teachers, firefighters, police officers, state workers, and other public employees.

Virginia currently operates under a "local option" system. A

2020 law allowed local governments to adopt collective bargaining ordinances, but did not require them to do so. The bills passed by the General Assembly this year would have gone further, requiring state and local governments to bargain with public employees if workers voted to form a union.

Spanberger said she supports collective bargaining rights but believes the bills needed additional changes before becoming law.

Her proposed amendments would have given public employers more flexibility regarding local budget timelines and delayed bargaining for some local employees until 2030.

The General Assembly rejected those changes, leaving Spanberger with the choice to sign the original bills, veto them, or allow them to become law without her signature.

Labor groups called the veto

a major setback. The Virginia Public Sector Labor Coalition said the governor had denied roughly half a million public service workers the ability to bargain over wages, health care, and workplace safety.

But the veto was welcomed by many local-government advocates and conservatives who had warned that a statewide mandate could strain municipal and county budgets.

That was the argument Fluvanna supervisors made earlier this spring.

On March 25, the Fluvanna County Board of Super-

visors voted unanimously to oppose the legislation, saying it would strip elected officials of local authority and place too much control in the hands of a state-appointed Public Employee Relations Board.

Under the proposed framework, the board would have defined bargaining units, or groups of employees with similar job duties. If a majority of workers in a unit voted for representation, the county would have been required to negotiate in good faith over wages, hours, and other employment terms.

If the two sides failed to reach an agreement, the legislation called for binding interest arbitration, a process in which an

outside third party could settle the dispute by setting final contract terms.

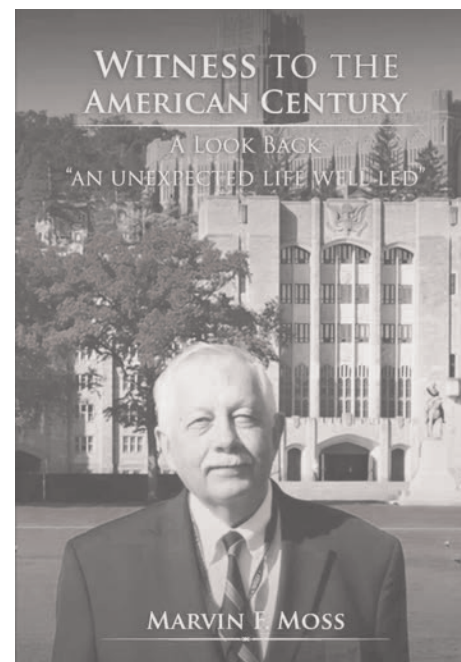
County Administrator Eric Dahl told supervisors in March that the mandate could increase personnel costs by 10% to 20%. He also warned that the county might need to hire negotiators, a labor relations administrator, and specialized legal counsel.

"It would be a nightmare," Dahl said.

The collective bargaining fight is likely to continue in Richmond. Spanberger said she wants to keep working with lawmakers, unions, localities and public servants on a public-sector bargaining system "that works for Virginia."

Moss book details a life spanning Fluvanna, Washington, and the world

Marvin Moss has been well known as one of Fluvanna County's most active and generous residents for the last 30 years. He's somewhat less well known as a key player in Congress and elsewhere, and even less well known as a gay man, a fact he goes truly public with for the first time in his new book, "Witness to the American Century."

Moss was truly a "witness," as detailed in his book — spending years in Africa in the postcolonial era, traveling extensively through Europe, briefing the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Secretary of Defense as a Defense Intelligence Agency staffer, winning a Bronze Star in Vietnam, meeting the high and mighty on multiple continents, and spending nearly four decades as a senior staffer

Dominion Energy's "Joshua Falls – Yeat 750 Kilovolt Electric Transmission Line" will plow through 115 miles and 2,787 acres of 9 Virginia Piedmont counties and will, if approved, cut Fluvanna County in half (see route options at vltransmission.com). Its final route will be announced by Dominion Energy at the end of May. This line is the biggest ever built in Virginia and is, as admitted by Dominion Energy representatives, designed to primarily serve data centers in northern Virginia. Taller than the Statue of Liberty, the line will need a 200' right of way (perpetually treated with herbicides) and will tower over homes and land at 165' (nearby homes, livestock, crops, schools, and churches will be constantly bathed in an electro-magnetic field). It provides no "public service" to those of us in the path. In fact, since the project announcement, the value of properties directly in the path have already declined by an estimated 40% and that effect will be felt up to a mile away from the line. At public meetings Dominion Energy officials describe the project as a power delivery "spine". Our neighbors who believe they are safe from the impacts of this project would do well to consider the future and what might grow out of this

monstrous "spine", like "feeder" lines to the east and west. At present, those of us in the way are in danger of having part of our lands taken by Dominion Energy in Eminent Domain proceedings. All affected counties, including the Fluvanna County BOS, have already issued Resolutions in opposition to the project. They will send those resolutions to the State Corporation Commission which has final say on the project in September. At least 7 counties (including Fluvanna) have active organizations of residents who oppose the project. A multi-county organization ("Preserve Rural Virginia") has just formed. Block-ValleyLink.org is a great source of information, resources, and humor. Now is the time to send letters and comments to our political reps, Dominion Energy at vltransmission.com, the SCC and your friends and Neighbors.

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on Capitol Hill.

Moss also was witness to the key societal changes of the 1960s and '70s, protesting the Vietnam War on weekends off from his Pentagon job, frequenting gay bars in the 1960s and living with a future Orthodox monk.

But Fluvanna residents primarily know him as a former county board member and board chairman, the longtime head of the Fluvanna Historical Society, the driving force and designer behind iconic county buildings, parks and other structures, and the person whose knowledge of Washington and Richmond grant processes brought more than a million dollars to help transform Fluvanna from a rural county of 12,000 when he arrived in 1991 to a beautiful, thriving community of more than 28,000.

Moss's book details how he bought the historic Glen Burnie house in Palmyra, which had been abandoned for 18 years, in 1991 as his future retirement home, then oversaw its extensive multiyear renovation before moving in in 1995. Glen Burnie was eventually listed on the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places, and Moss placed it under a historic easement that protects it from development.

Moss notes that he was "unsure how [his longtime companion Stephen Juli] and I would be received in this very conservative traditional community" of Fluvanna, but he seems to have settled in well. Friends were well aware he was gay and living with Juli and his identical twin brother, who were both Orthodox monks, but most of the county apparently was not.

Moss notes he was "quite secure financially" when he retired at 57, having come from a well-to-do Hagerstown, Md., family, having invested well, and with a federal pension. But he says in his book that he was worried he could become bored in retirement.

Instead, Moss quickly became actively involved in Fluvanna, arriving just as the county was beginning an unparalleled population increase. He became active in the Historical Society and Fluvanna Heritage Trail Foundation,

using his knowledge of federal and state grant processes to benefit the community, he says in his memoir.

He recalls helping design and build Palmyra Village Park, chairing the design committee for the Route 15 bridge, getting grants for Village Park and the Palmyra mill, raising \$750,000 for the Pleasant Grove restoration, leading the effort to fund and design the Palmyra fire station, helping raise almost \$300,000 for the Farm Heritage Museum, spearheading the effort to place thousands of acres of rural Fluvanna land under conservation or historic easements, leading the effort to convert a CSX easement into a rail trail, and helping buy Maggie's House and restore the Holland-Page Place.

Before Fluvanna, Moss tells of being chief of staff to Maryland Sen. Paul Sarbanes, helping pass the 1978 Panama Canal Treaty, pushing bills cleaning up the Chesapeake Bay and completing the D.C. Metrorail system, plus the landmark Sarbanes-Oxley Act that now requires corporations to do better financial reporting to investors.

The Washington career was only part of the justification for Moss's book's subtitle: "An Unexpected Life Well Led." One chapter, titled "A Gay Boy Goes to West Point," tells of "entering West Point, fully aware that I was gay, [and it] was a rash, bold decision involving considerable trepidations," and his infatuation with a non-gay roommate.

Another talks of "growing up" during his adventures in postcolonial Africa, which he called "a mecca for the bizarre," including participating in an umbrella duel, hosting the crown princess of Morocco, and meeting the woman who would become Queen Noor of Jordan, the president of Senegal and the prime minister of Rhodesia.

Yet another chapter discusses Moss's transition from Lutheranism to Catholicism to Ukrainian Byzantine Catholicism to Ukrainian Orthodoxy to Russian Orthodoxy to Bulgarian Orthodoxy, ultimately establishing an Orthodox monastery in Glen Burnie.

"Witness to the American Century" also notes Moss's presidential appointment to the National Historical Publications and Records Commission, that he was chief of staff on what he calls the most important study of the Naval Academy in modern history, his role on the Richmond Capital Square Preservation Council, his chairmanship of the Rivanna River Basin Commission, and his receipt of the statewide Virginia Unsung Hero Award.

All in all, "Witness to the American Century" is a reveal-

ing book about one of the most consequential people in Fluvanna County history, as well as a history of postcolonial Africa, gay America in the 1960s and '70s, the Vietnam War and the inner workings of Congress, the U.S. military and intelligence agencies.

"Witness to the American Century: A Look Back on an Unexpected Life Well Led" was published May 6 and is available on Amazon for \$19.99 in paperback, \$49.99 in hardcover or \$9.99 for Kindle.

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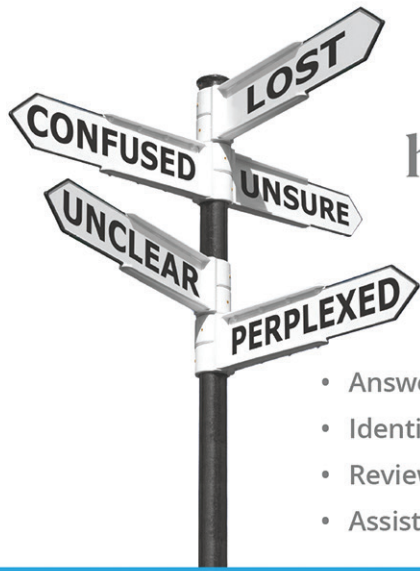
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Flucos fall to Western in 13-5 softball loss

Two strong softball teams looking to make the postseason met at Fluvanna on May 14. The Western Albemarle Warriors came in at 8-3 in Jefferson District play and 14-5 overall. The Flucos came in at 9-3 in Jefferson District play and 13-5 overall. Nothing went right for the Flucos.

In the top of the second, the Warriors' first two batters walked.

A single made it 1-0 with runners at first and second. A force out at second put runners on first and third with two out. The Warriors then went for a double steal. Rather than conceding the steal of second, the Flucos threw down to second and then home to the plate. Neither throw was on time, and the score was 2-0.

The Warriors added a run in the top of the fourth. Again, the run was scored by a leadoff batter who walked.

In the top of the fifth, the Warriors added two more runs. This time, with two out and two runners on base, a high routine fly ball to the outfield was dropped, resulting in two more runs scoring. Normally, the Flucos are the team that is stronger on defense. Not on this night.

The Flucos were hitless in the first three innings but started to get their bats going in the fourth. Senior catcher Megan Pounsberry and senior third baseman Bre Miller both singled in the inning but were left on base. In the fifth, freshman Lillian Mauck singled sharply.

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In the bottom of the sixth, the Flucos got on the board. Sophomore outfielder Aleah Anderson singled to lead off the inning. She moved to second on an infield out and scored on a single by sophomore first baseman Allison Gomez.

In the top of the seventh, the Flucos flubbed a double play early and the floodgates opened. The Warriors put up eight runs to assure their victory.

In the bottom of the seventh, the Flucos put up four runs for the final score of 13-5, but it was way too late. Ryleigh Birkhead singled, as did Peyton Baber. Junior pitcher Lila Schwartz singled. Anderson tripled, Pounsberry hit a sacrifice fly and Gomez hit a long single to the fence for the fourth run. The Warriors' first baseman made a

diving catch on a line drive by Miller to end the game.

After the game, Coach Aime McCall noted that sometimes nothing seems to go right, and this was one of those times. McCall said the Flucos will probably qualify for the postseason, but nothing is certain yet, as the point system to determine who is in and who is out is very complicated.

Dominion sale could affect Fluvanna customers

Florida-based NextEra Energy has reached a deal to acquire Dominion Energy in a \$67 billion all-stock transaction, the companies announced Monday.

If approved, the merger would create the world's largest regulated electric utility business, serving about 10 million customer accounts across Florida, Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina. Dominion currently serves about 13,600 customers in Fluvanna County.

The companies are proposing \$2.25 billion in bill credits for Dominion customers in Virginia and the Carolinas, spread over two years after the deal closes. The New York Times reported the

credit could equal about \$562 per Virginia customer.

The deal requires shareholder and regulatory approval and is expected to take 12 to 18 months to close.

School Board Honors Safety Leader, Advances Abrams Renovations

Fluvanna County School Board members paused during their May 13 meeting to honor the retirement of longtime school safety leader Capt. Von Hill, praising his decades of work building relationships between law enforcement and local schools.

Hill is retiring after 32 years in law enforcement, including more than 20 years working closely with Fluvanna County Public Schools.

Superintendent Peter Gretz called him “an incredible partner to the schools” and “a fierce advocate for students.”

In emotional remarks to the board, Hill said his work had never been about rank or titles.

“For me, it’s never really been about a position or a title in doing the work that I have done,” Hill said. “It’s about people and building relationships. And the relationships that I have sought to facilitate here in Fluvanna are the same that I would want to facilitate in my own personal life, which was looking out for the best interests of those around me.”

Hill spoke at length about the importance of school safety, collaboration, and supporting children, saying law enforcement needed “a seat at the table” when it came to helping schools solve problems and protect students.

Board members and administrators credited Hill with helping to shape many of the school division’s safety initiatives over the years, including vestibule security improvements and student prevention programs.

Abrams renovation

Early in the meeting, the board approved the first funding draw for long-planned renovations at Abrams Academy, a project officials hope to begin shortly after the school year ends.

Architect Josh Bower said contractors believe most — if not all

— of the renovation work can be completed over the summer if demolition and material ordering begin quickly. The initial phase includes classroom renovations, restroom upgrades, vestibule improvements and HVAC work.

Bower said demolition could begin around June 1, depending on how quickly contracts are finalized.

“Just let me know if you need help swinging a sledgehammer,” said Columbia representative Sean Brennan. “I love demo work.”

The board ultimately approved an initial \$451,323.27 draw for the project, though some members sought additional clarification on future costs and scheduling before later phases proceed.

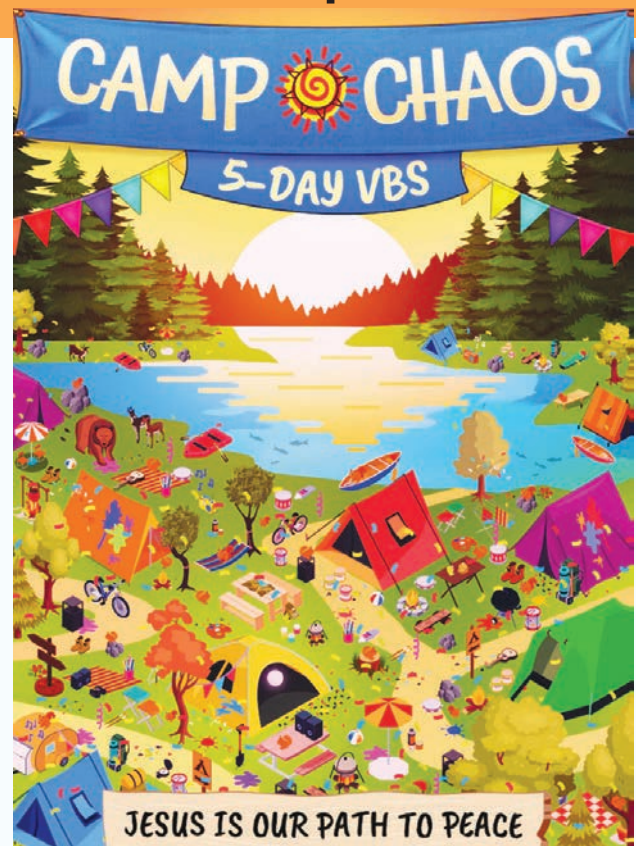

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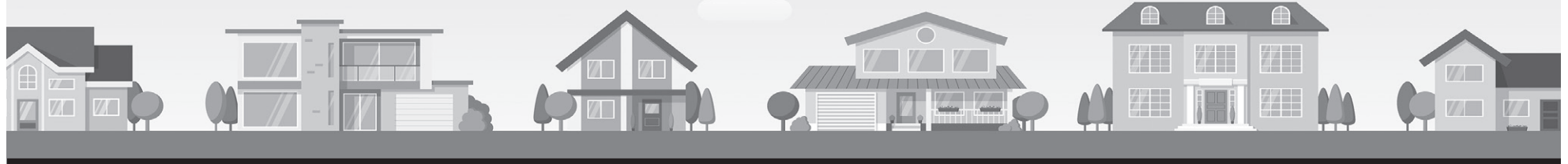

said the division plans to eliminate two vacant director-level positions following retirements and instead create several co-ordinator and supervisor roles focused on elementary instruction, testing and accountability, and alternative education student services.

The restructuring will also restore the title of assistant superintendent to two executive leadership positions that are already performing those duties, Gretz said. Administrators emphasized the changes would not increase pay or add new costs to the budget.

The board also received updates on employee bonuses and curriculum changes heading into the 2026-27 school year.

Finance officials said state-funded employee bonus payments are expected to be distributed on June 5.

Board members also approved a new 6-12 literacy curriculum recommendation after discus-

sion about textbook funding, digital licensing costs, and the use of state textbook funds to support the adoption.

Administrators said the division receives about \$300,000 annually in state textbook funding and had also carried over approximately \$200,000 from the prior year to help support the curriculum rollout.

The meeting closed on a celebratory note as board members looked ahead to Fluvanna County High School's graduation ceremony, scheduled for Friday, May 22, at 6 p.m.

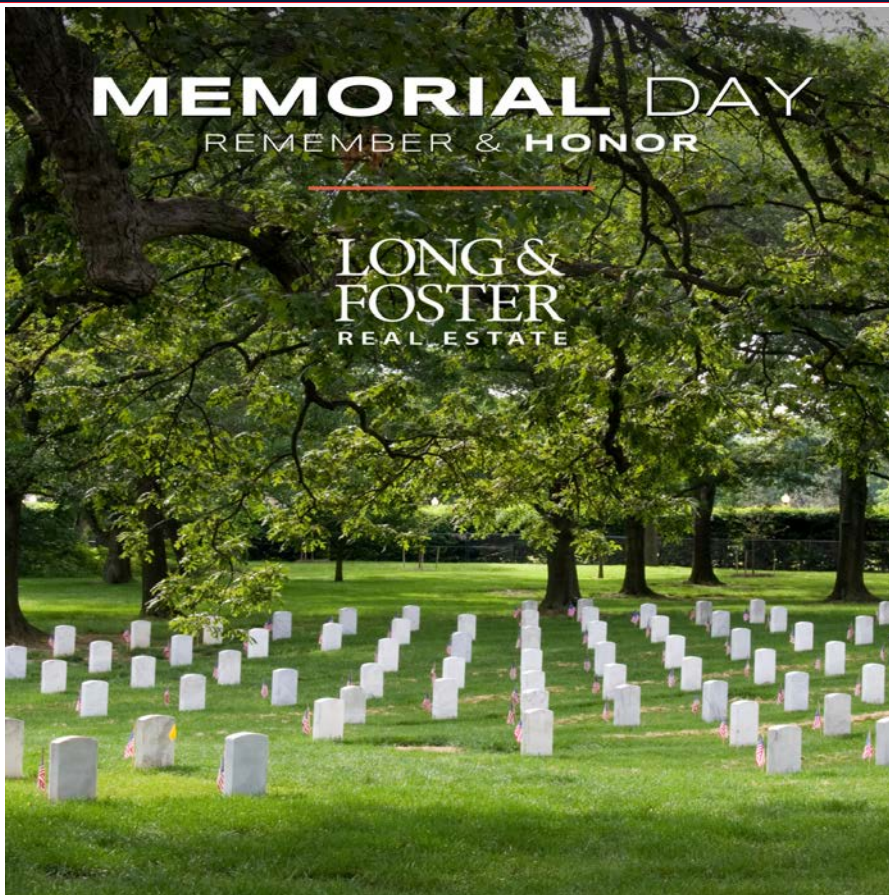

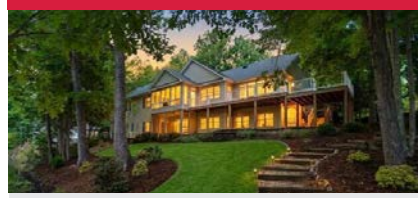
